One morning Mr. Shannon did not show up for school. I was sent for. Upon arrival at her house she started laughing and could hardly quit, and said, "I've got to tell someone. " Mr. Shannon hollered from a near bedrrom, "Don't tell Walter, both of you will never get 'Dilly Belle' milked."

But she told me. It seems that the evening before the professor got sick and, as was his habit, took two big spoons of soda. He had not eaten anything and at bedtime he was about to starve. He told his wife he was much better much, much better. She felt he should not eat.

He opened the ice box, spotted some buttermilk that was good and aged. He drank a bunch of it. Well, the acid in that buttermilk made the soda

PEANUT GROWERS URGED TO VOTE

Texas peanut producers are reminded to vote on the referendum being conducted to deter mine whether or not an assess:ment will be effective on peanuts at market time to raise funds for research, promotion, education and disease and insect control. Ballots for voting on this proposition as well as voting for a producers board to administer this program were mailed to peanut producers on September 6. In order to be valid, ballots must be marked and returned not later than September 24. Growers who did not receive ballots by mail may obtain ballots at the offices of County Agricultural Agents.

The assessment program will become effective about October 1, 1969, provided two-thirds of the peanut growers voting vote in favor of the assessment, or provided those voting for the assessment produced at least 50 percent of the peanuts in Texas in 1968. Assessment amounts would be collected at the first point of sale or mortgage and would be remitted monthly by buyers and warehousemen to the producers board elected to handle the funds. Growers who are dissatisfied with the program may obtain refunds of money collected by contacting the producers board within 60 days following the date of assessment.

Officials of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association stated that every effort is being made to obtain a representative vote from the state's 12,600 peanut growers. SWPGA is the organization certified by State Agriculture Commissioner John C. White to conduct the referendum. Association personnel have conducted educational meetings throughout Texas regarding this matter.

Wishing to make the voting procedure as convenient as possible, SWPGA officials are enclosing a return postage paid envelope with each ballot mailed to growers. Peanut growers who have not voted to date are urged to excerise this right prior



Starting out in their backfield will be Gene Richardson, senior quarterback; left half Larry Clinton; fullback Jimmy Young-




James Hill, playing end last Friday in the practice game against Brownfield, caught the ball, juggled it and held on for a real gainer.

The Student Dress Policy for grades 7 through 12 was a subject of discussion at the School Board Meeting Monday night, September 8. The dress policy was reviewed by the Board and on recommendation by the principals, a fifth statement was added to the dress policy for girls. "5. Girl's dresses shall not be shorter than four inches above the knee nor more than six inches from the floor when the girl is in a kneeling position."

The following is the policy concerning student dress as printed in The Indian Guide, Handbook for High School Students with the above statement added as approved by the Board of Education.

REGULATIONS FOR SCHOOL DRESS

It is one of the aims of Seminole High School to display to the public at all times a standard of moral conduct, attitude, dress,

courtesy, and friendliness which will be above reproach or criticism.

As young ladies and gentlemen, these requirements demand very careful thought on the part of each student because the public will judge our school on the basis of any or all of these characteristics as found or not found in each student at all times. Therefore, in keeping with the above aims, each student in Seminole High School

will be expected to dress appropriately. The following standards will

serve as guides in helping students determine whether or not they are dressing appropriately:

FOR BOYS:
Wear shoes or boots that do not attract undue attention because of heavy taps. (Shower shoes or thong shoes are not appropriate footwear.)

2. Wear trousers at waist level and with a belt. Slacks, blue jeans, or any othertype of trousers are acceptable.

- 3. Wear shirts tucked into trousers. Sport shirts designed to be worn on the outside of trousers are appropriate.
- 4. Wear shirts buttoned, except top button, at all times.
- 5. Wear neat and trim conventional haircuts only.
- 6. Be clean shaven at all times.
- 7. Hair should be a natural color.

FOR GIRLS:

- 1. Wear appropriate shoes that do not attract undue attention.
- 2. Wear dresses or skirts and blouses, or sweaters, to class.
- 3. Extreme hair styles and excessive make-up are not appropriate for school dress.
- 4. A lady-like appearance is expected of all girls at all times.
- 5. Girl's dresses shall not be shorter than four inches above the knee nor more than six inches from the floor when the girl is in a kneeling position.

HUNTING REGULATIONS FOR 1969

- H. T. Lloyd, Gaines County game warden, would like to remind dove hunters of the following hunting regulations for 1969.
 (1) The season opened September 1 and will close October 30.
- (2) The daily bag limit is 10.
 (3) Possession limit is 20. This includes the frying pan, deep freeze and refrigerator.
- (4) Shooting hours are 12 noon to sunset.
- (5) No hunting permitted in game refuges, state and federal parks, game reserves or within corporate city limits.
- (6) The retention of one fully-feathered wing on dressed doves is required in those counties having a white-winged dove season when both mourning and white-winged doves may be taken.
- (7) Shotguns must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

--- August, 1969, Texas Park and Wildlife Department.

Mr. Lloyd further reported that dove population is low at present but could be changed almost overnight with changes in weather and rains in other areas.



THE MEANEST MOTHER

THIS ARTICLE WAS PRESENTED TO THE NEWS BY MRS, NUEL BOWEN, WE THOUGHT THIS WAS WORTH REPRINTING.

The article originally appeared in a Tulsa, Oklahoma newspaper, and was reprinted later by a Houston Post columnist.

It is entitled 'The Meanest Mother' and it is credited to a Robbie Pingaro. It reads:

'I had the meanest mother in the whole wide world. While other kids ate candy for breakfast I had to have cereal, eggs and toast. While others had candy and Cokes for lunch, I had to eat a sandwich. As you can guess, my supper was different from that of other kids,

But at least I wasn't alone in my suffering. My sister and two brothers had the same mean mother as I did.

'My mother insisted upon knowing where we were at all times. You'd think we were on a chain gang. She had to know who our friends were and what we were doing. She insisted if we said we'd be gone an hour that we be gone an hour, or less.

'I am nearly ashamed to admit it, but at times she actually struck us. Not once, but each time we had a mind of our own and did as we pleased. That poor belt was used more on our seats than it was to hold up daddy's pants. Now you can see how mean she really was.

"We had to wear clean clothes and take baths. The other kids always wore their clothes for days. We had to be in bed by 9 each night and up by 8 in the morning. We couldn't sleep till noon, like our friends. So while they slept my mother actually had the nerve to break the child labor laws...she made us work! We had to wash dishes make beds, learn to cook and all sorts of cruel things.

By the time we were teenagers our life became more unbearable. None of this tooting the horn of a car for us to come running. She embarrassed us no end by making You cannot plow a field by turning it over in your mind.

our dates and our friends come to the door to get us. If I spent the night with a friend she checked on me to see if I was really there...can you imagine! I forgot to mention, while my friends were dating at 12 and 13, my old fashioned mother refused to let me date until I was 15 or 16. Fifteen, that is, if I dated only to go to a school or church function.

'Through the years things didn't improve a bit. We could not loaf in bed 'sick.' like our friends did, and miss school. Our marks in school had to be up to par. My mean mother would settle for nothing less than passing marks.

'As the years rolled by, first one then another of us was put to shame. We graduated from school. With out mother behind us, talking, hitting, and demanding respect, none of us was allowed the pleasure of being a dropout.

'Each of my brothers served his time in the service of his country. And who do we have to blame for the terrible way we turned out? You're right...our mean mother.

'Look at all the things we missed. We never got to march in protest parades, or take part in a riot, or burn draft cards, or do a million-and-one other things that our friends enjoyed. Our mean mother forced us to grow up into Godfearing, 'square', educated, honest adults.

'Using this as a background, I am trying to raise my own three children. I stand a little taller and I am filled with pride when my children call me mean.

'Because, you see, I thank God he gave me the meanest mother in the world.'







Vaudine Browne Returns

If all American visitors had the attitude that Vaudine Browne had when visiting Greece, no doubt world relationship with the United States would be much improved. Vaudine was sponsored by the local Rotary Club in her visit to Lisa, Greece.

"I loved the people there; I loved their customs. I loved my family of Nick and Effie that I lived with for six weeks. They told me when I left that just as soon as the new member (their first born) arrived they would call me or wire me about my new niece or nephew."

Vaudine went on to tell about the city in which she visited, the the Conference room of Memorial temperature - 140° each day. The family with which she stayed spoke good English. She taught a private school in English." Dating, as such, was forbidden in their country. If a boy and girl were seen together they were usually engaged. All the food, yes, all the food, was cooked in olive oil. Eggs, however, were fried in butter. They served tremendous amounts, served with wine. The morning meal was usually breads, sweetbreads, with some sort of tea. Lunch was served at 3 p.m. with wine, watermelon, with a cantaloupe or honey dew-like melon served at the end of the meal. Their sweets or pastries were so good. (I'm on a diet).

> "From 4-6 or 7 p.m. was siesta time. After the afternoon rest we went to the square where one could see magicians, singers, or other type entertainment, or to a show. Movies were not too far progressed in Greece. The evening meal was served from 12 to 1 or 2 a.m. (Oh, those pounds.) About the best place to visit was an oil company station (American) where they had good places to eat and those nice, nice rest rooms. If you think the smell is bad in some of the out houses at state parks and national parks you should visit Greece and use some of their public toilets.

"The people in Greece were very affectionate. Men walked down the street arm in arm; also women. Men greeted other men with kisses; women greeted other women with kisses. The 80 year old mayor of the city loved to kiss us, but our male traveling companion, Ed, said the mayor was in bad need of a shave.

"Farmers in Greece use their tractors like cars; they had beautiful tractors. There were John Deeres, Farmalls and Fords. They had air conditioning, radios and cabs on them. The country was 80% mountains but they were more of the rolling hill variety than they were high mountains.

"If I learned anything in Greece it was to love the other members of my group that I lived with constantly whether they were black, brown, yellow, or white. I learned to love the people of Greece because they too were full of love. They had a soul and were looking for a better way of life."



A part of Shafter Lake can be seen in the background behind the three cowboys. On the left is Johnnie Frier, a rancher; center Dick Dillard, one time sheriff of Andrews County; and Fisher Pollard of Ft. Sumner, New Mexico, on the right (an uncle of Mrs. R.M. E. Hughes). If that's not the Elam Hotel on the right a correction will be made next week.

The horse ridden by Pollard was a fovorite cutting horse, named 'Doodle Bug'. Just this side of the hotel a man is pulling a buggy. A wagon loaded with coal can be seen on the right and another indication of the time of the year would be the coats all the cowboys are wearing. A house can be seen in the distance behind the #1 horse and immediately in front of the team. Another house can be seen over the top of the team. The windmill represented the town's waterworks. The continuous tracks on the ground shows they had two different kinds of wagon wheels; a na.row wheel called a 'butcher knife' and then the wider tires.

EDITORIAL

What is a cord? A string, a measure of wood, a rib on the surface of a fabric, something to draw or hold a person through moral influence - so Mr. Webster says. How much is a cord of wood? You ask ten people and you get ten different answers. One answer was - "a big cord or a little cord?" Someone else said, "I carried many a cord into the woodbox in my arms."

For a number of years wood haulers have stopped their trucks on our street and tried to sell us wood. Their question generally was "Would you like to buy a cord of wood?" A cord of wood measures 128 cubic feet. If the stack is 2 feet wide, 4 feet high and 16 feet long, MRS. RAGSDALE WINS it would measure a cord; or the stack could measure 4 feet wide, 4 feet high and 8 feet long and measure a cord; or any variation that would equal 128 cubic feet.

One trucker tried to sell me wood cut in 18 inch lengths, 4 feet high and 12 feet long for a cord of wood. That is a little bit over one rick, which would measure 64 cu. ft. or $\frac{1}{2}$ as much as a cord. If you purchase a cord of wood and the lengths of the wood are cut to 18 inches you have been shorted 25% or $\frac{1}{4}$ on the cord. Also if the logs have not been split the bigger the logs the bigger the air space. Another trucker tried to sell me some wood that had two pieces turned crosswise to create more vacant space. One of the favorite ways to sell wood now - the word 'cord' or 'rick' is never mentioned. "This much wood for \$35." It kinda makes some truckers unhappy for you to discuss ricks, cords, measurements and prices. If you drive a hard bargain with a trucker you'd better stay around for he's likely just to dump off a big pile on your property. How can you measure a pile of wood? You can't! It's got to be in the form of a cord or a rick before it can be measured.

If you buy wood this winter you'd better buy it from a local merchant or a trucker you know and get the amount of wood you pay for. If he's selling you a cord of wood he'll tell you how much a cord is and leave it stacked on your property so there will be no doubt. Also he can make you a better price, generally, if the order is given in advance and not wait till the Thanksgiving or Christmas holidays.

The straighter the wood is the more wood you'll get in a cord, less air pockets. The smaller the pieces the more you would get in a cord. The dryer the wood the faster it will burn up. The greener the wood the more weight you've bought. And finally, you people who enjoy a fireplace, you'd better hurry. It will not be too many years that the smoke from your fireplace will be considered too much contamination for the air.

Keep children far away and keep an eye on flying sparks.

In some areas, leaf burning might be restrict. ed to certain times or completely outlawed. Find out the exact regula tions in your town.

" THE ITCH"

From a book "Helpful Hints to the Newly-Weds, " Kansas City, Mo., 1890.

The itch is a parasitic skin disease, due to the presence of the itchmite or Sarcoptes hominis. At one time it was extremely common, but is now comparatively rarely met with, at all events in England. It attacks the hands and feet chiefly, and rarely or never the face. It gives rise to a good deal of discomfort and irritation, and keeps the sufferer awake at night. It is distinctly contagious, and is readily conveyed from one person to another by the simple process of shaking hands. The itching which it gives rise to is distinctly beneficial, for it serves to impress very emphatically on the patient the necessity for adopting curative measures. The complaint is by no means difficult of recognition, for the intense itching between the fingers and toes is sufficiently characteristic, and admits of no doubt as to its nature. It is apt to be a little bit obstinate; but simple cases are readily cured by the application of an ointment composed of equal parts of sulphur and lanoline or lard. Should this fail to produce the desired effect in a couple of days, the patient should take a sulphur bath.



Information Fram Social Security Office

Until recently, social security beneficiaries sent cards to one of the several payment centers over the country to report address changes and other events affecting receipt of or entitlement to monthly benefit checks. New system changes now make possible direct transfer of this information from the local social security office to the master computer records in Baltimore, Maryland by teletype.Beneficiaries should now mail the reporting cards to their local social security ofCALL YOUR NEWS 758-3003

fice which in turn, will teletype the information directly into the master computer payment records in Baltimore, Mary land. Most things which require reporting are listed in the folder "A reminder to applicants for social security benefits" available at any social security office.

This new method of reporting required information will assist the social security office in providing even faster service.

Reports may also be made by telephoning the Odessa social security office at 332-9423.

SCHOOL ENROLLMENT

CONTINUES TO CLIMB

School enrollment continues to climb, but still lags 24 behind last year's figure for a comparable date, according to latest figures available.

Total enrollment is now 2, 045 against 2, 069 as of this date last year. Present High School enrollment stand at 586, up 6 from this time last year; Junior High is up 19 pupils with 375 on the roll; the Elementary school is down 14 students with 420; F. J. Young Elementary is up 2 at 271; the Primary is off 41 pupils with a current enrollment of 389; and Special Education is down 7 with 10 students currently listed.

Traditionally enrollment continues to rise until near Christmas with the peak usually reached during late November of early December and school administrators expect this pattern to continue this year.
