Seminole will perform at 9:20 a.m. in the old Brownfield High School Auditorium. There is no admission charge and the contest is open to the public.





The School Board met Monday night with the staff of the Jr. High School presenting the curriculum activities and policies of that building under the direction of L. L. Moore, principal. They gave this as their Philosophy and General Statement. - - The needs, interests, and abilities of our students should be the controlling factors in determining the curriculum, activities, and policies of the school. It is the duty and privilege of the faculty and community, in cooperation with the students, to find and develop the best in each THURSDAY individual, to lead him through a normal growth and development which will instill in him the fundamental knowledge, skills and tools with which to continue his education throughout adult life, to guide him in establishing personal relationships that are satisfying both to himself and his associates, and to enable him to understand and appreciate the privileges, and assume the responsibilites, of our democratic way of life. - -

2. A summer program for grades 4 thru 12 was discussed and the following program was approved beginning June 7th and ending July 2nd. Students will attend 4 weeks, 5 days per week, 3 hrs. per day for a total of 60 hours. Classes will be held in any field where as many as 10 students sign up. The cost will be \$15.00 per subject to students.

3. The summer recreation program was planned for track, baseball and tennis. These programs usually last 6 to 8 weeks and the sponsor is paid \$100 per week.

4. The swimming pool, it's management, it's opening and closing was discussed and past-over until the next meeting.

5. The procedure was discussed with the board how monies would be borrowed through the local bank in lieu of an estimated \$609, 120.03. This represents a total evaluation of tax due from Amerada Oil Company, Hess Division, Atlantic Richfield and Mobil concerning law suit now pending.

6. Virgil Keyes, principal of the high school was present, giving the following figures on the D. E. and I. C. T. program. He gave the following information. 68 signed as of Monday. 34 in D.E. and 34 in I.C.T. This program would give on the job training to Juniors and Seniors in the high school.

7. Rayford Bates was appointed by the local board and will seek a position on the Texas Association of School Board executive committee that has become vacant.

8. The fireman's volleyball tournament has been re-scheduled for the 13th, 14th and 15th of May due to a conflict in schedule. An O.K. was given by the board.

9. Several School Board members will attend the Texas Tech workshop that begins A pril 28th in Lubbock and completed the same day. 10. Automatic transmissions for three buses received a no vote because of cost and dust problems in this area.

11. A request was granted to rent a 3M "209" Automatic Copier. The machine will copy everything from ball point signatures, full color pages in bound books and magazines, blueprints, photographs, or anything on paper. The copy will be on white 20# bond paper. Our rental cost will be \$37.50 per month.

over 1967 and it is growing at an accelerated ratio each year. The risk of becoming a victim of serious crime increased 16 percent in 1968, with more than two victims per each 100 inhabitants. Firearms were used to commit more than 8900 murders, 65, 000 assaults, and 99,000 robberies in 1968. Since 1964 the use of a firearm in murder was up 117%; armed robbery 113%. Daytime burglaries of residences rose 247 percent from 1960 to 1968. Narcotic arrests in 1968 were up 64% over 1967. The percentage of police solutions of serious crimes declined 7% in 1968; since 1960 this aspect of crime fighting has shown an overall decline of 32 percent. Total crime rate (number of offenses per 100, 000 Population) up 99% from 1960 through 1968. Crimes of violence (limited to murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault) up 106% over the same period.

THIS IS WEST TEXAS --- A camera's eye can only see one thing at a time. These seven pieces of pipe hauled in from West Gaines County to Ross Irrigation had six rabbits in them. It was a peculiar load coming down the highway with six rabbit heads sticking out the ends of the pipes. The five pictures tell the story of the protection of the pipe and the rabbits' home. Coyotes and dogs have a terrible time trying to get the cotton-tail rabbits out. 




