
Free to all, there will be plenty of free parking available the day of the show.

# Learn to recognize Air Force leaders

Stripes, bars, oak leaves, eagles and stars on our uniforms tell the world that we're leaders. Our uniforms are outward, visible symbols of the leadership authority the service has vested in us. But I would ask you to pause for a moment.

Consider the observation of the prominent evangelist of some decades ago, Billy Sunday, who had some keen insights into human nature. On one occasion, he stated to the effect that going to church makes you no more a Christian than going to a garage makes you a car.

So it is with us in our profession. Just because we wear a uniform and are declared to be leaders doesn't make it so.

How can we tell if we're good leaders? I have a few rules of thumb I'd like to share

with you, and would advise you to apply them in your daily lives.

Set a good example. You can do so by making sure your act is together. Remember, you're a leader 24 hours a day, in and out of uniform, on and off base.

Avoid the "nine-to-five" syndrome. The Air Force is not just an occupation—it's a way of life. We're part of the service all the time. Clock-watching is not something we should practice or condone in others when there's pressing work to be done.

Get involved in the lives of your subordinates. Know their family situations. This will enable you to be of real help when they experience personal problems.

Keep your standards high and keep those of your subordinates high as well. Haircuts and uniforms may not be the most important things at the office or shop, but if they slide, so will everything else, including discipline and job performance.

Have a positive attitude and share it with your subordinates. Don't let them carp, and certainly don't support them or reinforce them when they do.

Be loyal to your subordinates as well as to your superiors. Support them when they deserve support, and they'll go the extra mile for you every time.

And finally, don't be swayed from your high standards when you see your superiors fail to live up to your expectations. Work and work hard, even if your boss doesn't. Your subordinates deserve it.

We live in a fishbowl environment. We have to understand that. But instead of being resentful, we have to realize that it's the price of leadership and a tool of leadership if we use it wisely. If we don't use it wisely, it becomes an oppressive burden.

Remember when an airman sees us acting improperly we lose credibility. The tragedy is that we all lose credibility and the service loses credibility, even if just one person in a leadership position behaves poorly. Inappropriate behavior on our part deprives our younger members the leadership they need and deserve.

We are, after all, their leaders.

## Fraud, waste and abuse - stealing from finance

You've heard it all before: Money is tight; we've got to do more with less. All Air Force agencies are affected by the current budget cuts, and they expect more to come. One sure way to prevent waste of limited resources is to prevent loss of what we have.

When a member receives unentitled pay, fraud, waste and abuse have occurred. The member may not realize it is illegal. To prevent that kind of waste, accounting and finance officers are increasing their efforts to inform all Air Force members about pay matters. Fraud, of course, occurs when members know they are receiving money not due them and say nothing about it.

Let's look at some ways fraud, waste and abuse occur:

•Basic allowance for subsistence. A member uses another individual's meal card to eat in a government mess while also drawing BAS; or a member issued a meal card uses the card to eat in a government mess while on leave.

•Basic allowance for quarters. A member is divorced or no longer has a dependent for entitlement to BAQ at the with-dependent rate, but does not inform accounting and finance to stop or adjust BAQ. •Leave. A member departs for leave outside the local area on Friday after work, but effective date of leave is the following Monday. The member is not charged for the two days' leave.

Do these people get away with this? A person may get away with fraud some of time, but many are getting caught. When fraud is proven, the member is subject to a fine of up to \$10,000 or five years in jail, or both.


If you are aware of someone who is receiving pay to which they are not entitled or who has filed a fraudulent claim or voucher, contact your accounting and finance office with the details, and let's put a stop to it.


Finally, card playing isn't in the same category as going to the gym to play racquetball. Staying in good physical condition is Air Force policy.

## **Clothing sales advises Reese** people of uniform shortages

Reese personnel may have some difficulty keeping their uniforms up to par, especially if they have not checked with the Military Clothing Sales Store to be sure the items they need are available.

The base MCSS store is now running short on certain blouses, maternity uniforms, the blue and white bucket hats for women, both women's short and long sleeve epauleted shirts, the old mess dress uniforms and the men's short sleeve

#### epauleted shirt.

**Reese MCSS management** explained that some of the items are just hard to get, but the shortage of mens shirts and mess dress uniforms was easy to explain.

The shortage of short sleeve epauleted shirts stems from the top three enlisted grades now having shoulder insignia instead of stripes on the sleeve.

Since the old mess dress uniforms can be worn up to 1988 many people are trying to keep them up. As a result mess dress items are hard to

come by and since the new mess dress uniforms will not hit MCSS stores until around the first of 1983, some may have to wear their combination ones to some messing functions.

MCSS officials here also advised customers that fall and winter are approaching; now is the time to buy the new pull-over sweaters. The pullover sweaters are maintained in stock, but when the cold gets here MCSS employees expect a possible surge in sweater sales, deleting usual stocks.

Six airlines-American,



Airlines based their case for charging the \$10 fees on additional administrative expenses involved in handling unused ticket refunds.


The Military Traffic the past year.



# **CAF** wages war in West Texas

World War II aircraft will again be soaring the West Texas skies this weekend as the Colonels of the Confederate Air Force turn the **Brownfield Municipal Airport** into Browndirt Army Air Field.

"We'll mock Midway, Pearl Harbor and several other World War II battles Saturday as we perform," said John Foreburger, Confederate Air Force representative.

In his account of the coming air show, Foreburger listed several vintage, yet classic WW II fighters and bombers that would be seen on the ground and in the air. Some of the aircraft will include the B-25 Mitchell, the A-26 Invader, a P-38 Lightning, a P-40 Warhawk, a P-51 Mustang, an A-7 Corsair, the Nazi Germany ME-108 and even a replica of the famed Japanese Zero.

In all Foreburger indicated

that people attending the aerial display and show could expect to see 30-40 different aircraft on static display. In some cases visitors might even get close enough to view the interiors of some of the classic aircraft.

For those aircraft enthusiasts who have enjoyed Project Warrior's aircraft identification contest this weekend event should be most enjoyable. To paraphrase a statement made in "Raiders of the Lost Ark", "We are merely passing through history; this is history."

The airport is located five miles east of Brownfield and gates open at 10 a.m. The air show begins at 2. There will be concessions available to spectators along with a mobile Post Exchange displaying various WW II memorabilia. The show will cost \$5 per person and children under 12 will be admitted free.

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

Under the previous rules, CHAMPUS paid for only electric wheelchairs that were not cart-type. Now, coverage for will "slow down or halt the the cart-type, electric vehicle has been authorized retroactively to Oct. 1, 1980, report CHAMPUS officials.

To qualify under the policy, the equipment must be considered "durable medical equipment," and must provide the basic mobility that further deterioration of a beneficiary's physical condition."

Officials cautioned that the policy will not cover both an electric wheelchair and an electric-powered, cart-type vehicle for the same beneficiary.

The next Project Warrior seminar is set for Monday at the officers' club beginning at noon. Capt. Mark Wells, military historian, will speak on the infamous Red Baron.




