

Civilian payday will come four days earlier, starting July 18, Maj. Frank Fleming, finance of-

Civilians have been paid on Tuesday, but after the change they will receive pay the preceding Friday.

"Payday is changed, due to the increased efficiency of the accounting and finance civilian payroll section," the major commented. "In addition, civilians are being given the advantage of having their pay for use over the weekend."

The major warned, however, that some sections may not get their pay early if the payroll clerks are late with turning in attendance records.

"The change can be successful only if time and attendance reports are submitted by responsible personnel to the accounting and finance office before 10 a.m. on Mondays when due," Major Fleming said. "The sooner we get these reports, the sooner we can get to work on the payroll. There really should be no reason these reports are not turned in shortly after 8 a.m. the Mondays either, for attendance reports to be held until Tuesday. If they are held, the civilians in the section which is late just won't get 1951.

The major said Friday pay will be sent to banks or hand carried to various offices after 2 p.m.

He added that if and when the bill to raise civilian pay becomes law, a one-time supplemental payroll will be set up and checks Base Made Explorer of retroactive pay will be issued as soon as possible. "The Air Force general war forces contain built-in local war strength," says General LeMay. "Deployed forces, tactical and strategic, can perform local war missions with speed, power and finesse."

The Air Force, says General White, "has examined local wars from the standpoint of possibility, the conditions apt to prevail, and the dangers involved in the conflicts themselves. Our tactical air forces, used independently or in conjunction with other arms, provide a potent force which is particularly well suited for such actions. We have perfected a procedure to quickly employ selected efforts from these forces, wherever required."
