

Two Defend Rodeo Championships

Two defending champions, John B. Fuller, civilian, and A/1C Jack Key, are among 43 entrants in the annual Reese Roadeo. Entries ended at 5 p.m. Tuesday, with 12 entrants in the light sedan driving class. 14 in the half-ton truck class, 3 in the ton and a half stake and platform truck class, 7 in the 29-passenger bus class, and 7 in the semi-trailer refueling unit.

Fuller for several years has been winner of the refueling unit competition, also winning FTAF and ATC competition. Airman Key is defending his half-ton truck championship.

All entrants were briefed Wednesday on what they will be expected to do and on what areas will be considered by judges. Today, first practice is permitted on the new course near the base hospital, where competition is scheduled. Practice is also set for next Monday and Tuesday, with preliminary competition set for July 10 and 11. Finals are planned for July 17 and 18.

Reese personnel will judge early competition, but judges in the finals will be safety officials from the Texas State Highway department and City of Lubbock traffic department.

All competitors will receive certificates, and other awards are planned for winners in each of the five classes. Roadeo competition will be restricted to each base this year, with no contests at higher echelons.

The education office was swamped with USAFI enrollments Monday, the last day the \$2 per course fee was effective. Starting Tuesday, July 1, the course fee went to \$5. Most of the day several persons were vaiting in line for assistance in registering for a course in the Reese education office. Enroll-

Reese re-enlistments took a sharp turn upward during June, moving from May's 11.1 percent of eligibles to 24.2 percent. Eligible to re-enlist were 33 NCO's and airmen, with 8 extending tours.

Retroactive Pay Set For July 11;

Pay day for civilians came even earlier than expected this week, as the accounting and finance office distributed checks today which were scheduled for next

"We expected to start paying on Friday, July 18, instead of Tuesday," Maj. Frank Fleming, tices in swimming and boating, accounting and finance officer, said. "However, our workers have speeded up so that we will start this week. Friday is a holiday, so this weekend. we are paying a day earlier on Thursday."

"Work to establish the new rate has begun and the higher pay will be in effect as of June 29, 1958," the major said. "Checks to cover retroactive pay, Jan. 12, be issued July 11, we expect. 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
