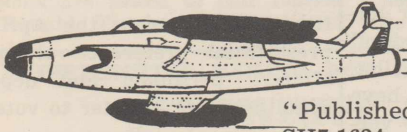

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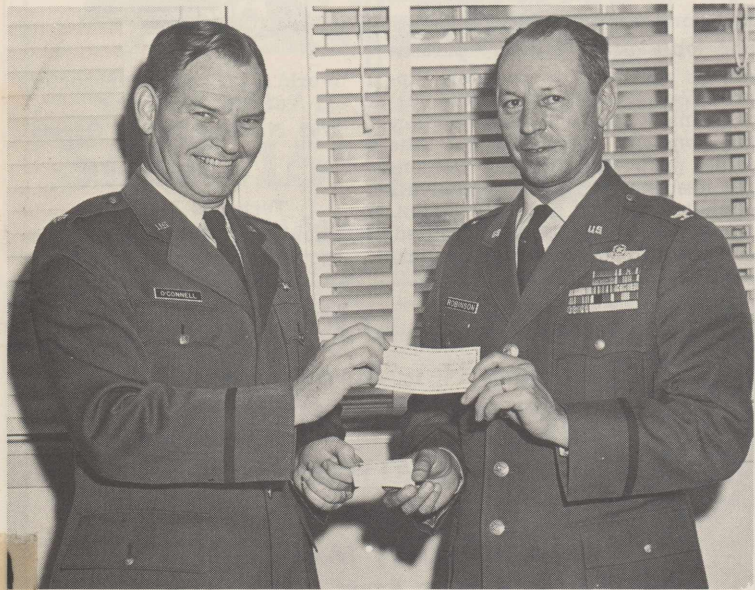

Colonel Returns For Safety Talks

Colonel Robert F. Wright, former commander of the 3500th Pilot Training Group, returned to Reese last weekend for safety talks with students and pilots.

As assistant to the Chief of Operations and Field Division in the Flying Safety Directorate at Norton AFB, the colonel discussed statistics on aircraft accidents with about 200 students and pilots. He pointed out that accidents have resulted in loss of many lives and graduates of Reese and other schools will face greatest dangers during their first three years of flying.

Colonel Wright, who received his pilot wings at Lubbock Army Air Field, predecessor to Reese, in Class 42-J, commanded Pilot Training Group in 1952 and 1953, following service as wing inspector. He was accompanied here by Col. J. A. Harrington, Chief of the Materiel Directorate at Norton.

Reenlistments Hit Another High Mark

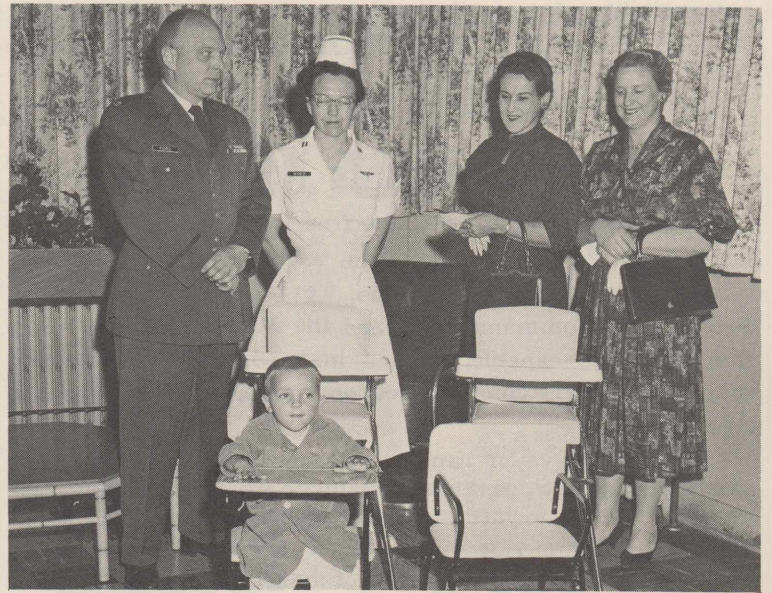
Greater Use Of URs Requested On Base

Reese, District Runner-Up, Enters ATC Volleyball Meet

The Installations Squadron volleyball team, Reese champion, is representing the Northern District this weekend in ATC conference play at Perrin AFB. The tourney started Thursday and terminates Saturday.

Perrin, represented by the 3554th Armament and Maintenance Squadron, won the district title here last weekend, upsetting Reese in strong 15-10 and 16-14 games. Reese defeated Mather, 4-15, 12-10, and 11-7, while Perrin overcame Sheppard, 15-5, and 15-3, in the opening round. Mather won the consolation prize. Perrin also is representing the Northern District in ATC competition.

Reese opened the final round with three points on serving of Capt. Leslie Johnson, but Perrin's TSgt. Charles M. Johnson opened with powerful spiking to turn the tide. In the final game Reese tied the victors repeatedly, but lost out in an overtime.

A championship trophy was awarded by Col. William A. Martin, M&S Group commander, to Sergeant Johnson, Perrin team captain. The runner-up trophy was presented by Col. Harold T. Babb, Air Base Group commander, to SSgt. Roy Wood, Reese captain, who also received the Most Valuable player award.

In the Installations Squadron starting lineup were Captain

Johnson, Sergeant Wood, A/3C John Gillen, A/2C John Kidd, SSgt. Chuck Shobe, and A/3C Joe Burt.

Last year Lowry won the district crown and also the ATC championship, but this year did not compete in the district tournament. Perrin finished second and Reese third in the ATC tourney in 1959.

COMMANDER'S DESK

Tomorrow marks the end of Job Safety Week which was proclaimed by President Eisenhower. However, each week should be Job Safety Week.

Safety, whether it be flying, ground, job, or in the home is everybody's business. To prevent accidents we must be safety-conscious all the time — not just part of the time.

A state of safety-consciousness, which will assure a maximum safety record, can be achieved only by each supervisor taking positive action to eliminate hazards and instill in his subordinates the value and importance of safety. This takes imagination and perseverance at all levels of command, but it pays off well. Our safety program cannot be given a minor role.

I charge each commander and supervisor with the responsibility of promoting safety at Reese by assuring that all subordinates are constantly safety-minded and aggressively accept their part in the program.



Man Controls Machine

Air Training Command, the free world's largest "school-house", has but one product—the well-trained man.

In a speech in San Antonio, Texas, Lt. Gen. James E. Briggs, ATC Commander, defined the ATC product as "... the dedicated, capable, trained man who can operate and maintain the very complex weapon systems of this Aerospace Age."

In these days of rapidly advancing automation, space satellites, and intercontinental ballistic missiles, thoughts are geared too often toward machines rather than toward human beings.

Machines are mere extensions of man's senses and facilities and should be kept in that perspective. Air Training Command is particularly interested in keeping this emphasis where it belongs—on the man—for no matter how elaborate machines may become, they will be only as good, or as effective, as the person who operates them.

A short time ago, Gen. Thomas D. White, Air Force Chief of Staff, compiled a listing of what he called, "the nation's ten most needed items." The list included intercontinental ballistic missiles; air-to-surface missiles; advanced tactical systems; vertical or very short take off and landing aircraft; a ballistic missile warning system; long range defenses; a network of instantaneous, reliable, and secure communications; advanced reconnaissance systems; a modernized cargo fleet, and advanced manned space systems.

This list of items at first glance appears to be just hardware since man was not among the "ten most needed." But the items listed are much more—they are weapon systems, and an integral part of each system is the trained man. Without man, these systems, no matter how refined they might be, would be totally inoperative.

To achieve the greatest effectiveness from these and future machines, man will remain the positive military requirement in the nation's Aerospace Force.

Four States Near Spring Elections

Personnel of four states should see their unit voting officer immediately to obtain a Federal Post Card Application for ballot. Voting laws in some states have changed to permit absentee voting.

Illinois will hold a presidential primary on April 12 to express a preference for presidential nominees, to elect delegates to the national political conventions and to nominate candidates for state office. School elections are April 5-12. No registration is required for military and dependents. Applications for ballots are being received.

New Jersey will hold a presidential preference primary on April 19 and will elect delegates and nominate candidates for state and local office. Military personnel do not have to register. Applications are being accepted.

Pennsylvania will hold primary elections on April 26 for the same purposes. Military personnel need not register; dependents cannot vote by absentee ballot. Applications are being accepted. Wisconsin is accepting applica-

tions for ballots in the April 5 presidential preference election. Military personnel and dependents need not register to vote.

The regular meeting of the NCO Wives Club will be held in the NCO Club private dining room at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday.

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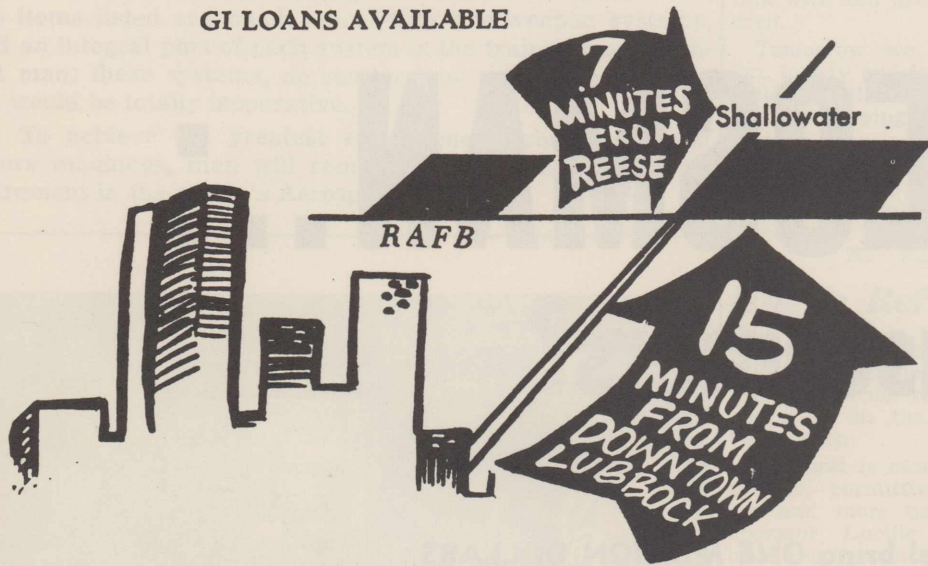
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
