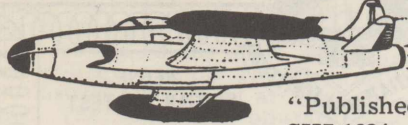
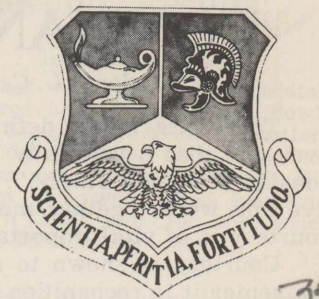

## Air Force Aid Society Campaign Opens

### Moves Aimed At Enlarging Classrooms

Need for additional room for academic classes when Reese enlarges its training program is bringing several changes in location of facilities.

Reese next spring will begin giving students pre-flight instruction and primary and basic pilot training, one of six bases in Air Training Command to have that mission. The move is to permit students to receive complete training at one location, instead of three. Re-location of some offices to facilitate operation also is being made.

The primary and junior departments of the Sunday School have moved from Building T-132 to T-455. The pre-nursery, nursery and beginners have moved to T-31. The adults also will meet in the latter building.

The base procurement building has been moved to near T-132 and is being connected to it.

Buildings T-244 and T-252 will be moved to near P-82 and will be connected together to provide offices for the Pilot Training Group. The survival training section will move temporarily to T-25 and T-1031 will be renovated to provide offices for the Air Base Group. Thus, T-815 will be cleared for academic classrooms.

T-242 is being connected with T-91 for flight training.

### Winners Selected In ATC Contest

MSgt. Lawrence Wicks of Chanute AFB has been named winner in Air Training Command's Military Suggestion Contest. He won \$1,000 for a suggestion on operation and maintenance of the KC-97 in-flight refueling system. Estimated first year savings is \$371,000.

Second place in the ATC contest went to TSgt. Donald L. Culver, ATC headquarters, and SSgt. Frank R. Ferguson, Randolph AFB, who divided \$400 for their proposal for reporting accrued military pay. Estimated first year savings at 10 ATC bases is \$30,082.

Consideration in annual contests of higher headquarters is given to suggestions saving \$10,000 or more each year.

### Navy Vet Commands Cadets

A former engineering major at Los Angeles Valley Junior College, Aviation Cadet Von M. Liebernecht, has been named commander of the Cadet Group at Reese. He will direct cadet affairs until graduation of Class 61-B.

Liebernecht, from Burbank, Calif., spent four years in the Navy prior to entering cadet training, serving a year and a half in the Far East. He received primary pilot training at Spence Air Base, Ga., prior to coming to Reese last March. He has been given the rank of cadet colonel.

Assisting him as group executive officer is Cadet Jerry B. Smiley of Arlington, Texas, former San Angelo High School athlete. He has been in service three years and received primary training at Bartow AB. He is a cadet lieutenant colonel.

Four cadet majors have been named. Peter H. McElwain of Bethlehem, Pa., is group operations and training officer. Former student of Trinity College, he received primary pilot training at Graham AB.

Group adjutant is Robert B. Phipps of LeMoore, Calif., political science graduate of the University of Southern California and trackman in high school and college.

Squadron commanders, also cadet majors, are Cadets Robert G. Manske of Milwaukee, Wis., and Arthur B. Cornelius of Lemon Grove, Calif. Manske is a former engineering major at the University of Wisconsin and a graduate of Bartow AB. Cornelius is a former economics major at the University of California and is a Bainbridge AB graduate.

### Six Civilians Awarded Service Pins For 137 Years On Duty

Six civilian employees of Reese who have served the government 137 years were awarded service pins Monday morning in the office of Col. L. C. Hess, commander of Reese.

Honored were George Farlines, 1901 Seventh Street; Lewis Johnson, 2222 Eighteenth Street; Gene C. Jones, 2116 Forty-eighth Street; Walter Cobb, 4320 Thirty-third Street; Clyde W. Cooper, 5102 Thirty-seventh Street; and Sebe B. Adams, 1928 Avenue O.

Farlines, aircraft mechanic, served for 26 years in the Air Corps and Air Force, has completed five years as civilian employee at Reese. He received a 30-year pin.

Johnson, engine manager, served 16 years in the Army and has five years as a civilian employee of the base. He was on the Bataan Death March in World War II and was a prisoner of the Japanese three years. He is a disabled veteran.

Jones, jet engine mechanic, served 15 years in the Army and Air Force and has five years as a Reese civilian worker. He is a disabled veteran.

Cobb, assistant fire chief, has 20 years of military and civilian

service. He is a disabled veteran, also.

Cooper, truck driver, retired from the Air Force after 20 years service and has five years of civilian service at Reese.

Adams, carpenter, has 20 years military and civilian service. He, too, is a disabled veteran.

Colonel Hess, in making the awards, cited that the base has been credited with several "firsts" in production.

"Your excellent work has added to our record and helped us establish the high points," he told the six men. "I know that as in the past you will continue to perform in an outstanding manner."

### Funds Sought For Assistance To Military In Time Of Need

The annual Air Force Aid Society drive at Reese gets underway Monday with a goal of 100 per cent participation. First Lt. John Sirman is the project officer. The campaign will extend through Aug. 15 and everyone on the base is being asked to contribute.

During the past year, the Society at Reese has made 49 loans to base people and dependents. These totaled \$4,900 and are repaid in a manner convenient to the applicant without interest or other charges. Grants totaling \$175 were made to three people for whom repayment would have caused hardship.

The Society operates to assist persons in financial straits who need "a lift." Aid is given in cases where:

The applicant, because of non-receipt of pay, allotment, or allowances, is without sufficient funds for food, rent, utilities, etc.

The applicant, because of other financial difficulties is without funds for food, etc.

The applicant is temporarily without funds for initial rent or will be evicted for non-payment of rent.

Limited assistance for funeral expenses of a dependent is required because the deceased was not insured. This assistance will not exceed \$350.

Dependents, because of ill health or other urgent circumstances, must leave the vicinity of an Air Force installation and return to their permanent home.

Government medical care does not cover the total medical costs and the applicant does not have funds to meet the emergency.

Emergency or convalescent leave has been approved and the individual is without sufficient funds for travel.

### Scouts Win Top Honors

Reese's Boy Scouts, Troop 148, carried off top honors in the Camporee last weekend at Mackenzie Park in Lubbock, winning five first places and several second places.

The troop tied with Troop 9 of Lubbock for the President's pennant and other prizes.

Troop 148 won first in the tug-of-war, three-legged race, height and distance measurements, and heaving bar. It received an excellent rating for its campsite and special mention for its survival display.

### NCO Reenlists At Midnight To Aid Team

Necessity for reenlistment last Friday failed to halt MSgt. Leroy Hanes from helping represent Reese in the Northern District ATC Squadron Level Softball tournament at Perrin AFB.

The sergeant had to reenlist on July 22. Rules required he reup here. He was playing-manager of the M&S softballers, which represented the base at Perrin.

So at one minute past midnight Friday morning Sergeant Hanes took his oath of office for reenlistment, with the OD, 1st Lt. Charles Thomas, administering. Then he took off by auto for Perrin, arriving early in the morning and playing third base in the afternoon.

The M&S team didn't fare well, with or without his help. It dropped a 6-3 game Thursday night to Vance AFB, and then lost to Mather AFB Friday afternoon by the same score. A2C Gary Harrison pitched a three-hitter against Vance, but errors behind him lost the game. Errors also helped determine the second loss.

### Educational Fund Aid Emphasized

USAF dependents without sufficient funds but desiring to attend college should take advantage of the Gen. Henry H. Arnold Educational Fund, officials said this week.

According to a special USAF survey, less than one per cent of eligible college students have used the educational fund, a part of the Air Force Aid Society. The fund is designed to help dependent children through college.

Personnel with children who wish to go to college but haven't the money may seek aid by writing the Director, Air Force Aid Society, National Headquarters, Washington 25, D. C.

### Center Coordinator Named

Mrs. Bernice Parker has been selected as coordinator of the Reese Family Service Center, with Mrs. Ruth Goodkin as Assistant coordinator. They will serve until next January 1.

Additional volunteer workers for the center are needed because of losses through reassignments and other causes, it was announced. An official uniform for all workers is expected to be selected soon.

The center in the past eight months has purchased eight crib mattresses with plastic covers, two port-a-cribs, three frying pans, many pieces of kitchen ware, two irons and ironing boards, and four dozen disposal diapers.

Since last Nov. 27, it has listed 305 houses and found housing for 74 families. It loaned household goods to 78 families and welcomed 80 newcomers. Eleven new workers were oriented and information on other bases was supplied to 97 families.

Information about Reese was supplied to 1,000 families through welcome booklets.

## From The COMMANDER'S DESK

There are many definitions of military courtesy, however one that I especially like is simply, "The expression of consideration for others." In military life where individuals live and work together more intimately than in civilian life, courtesy is of vital importance in developing team spirit.

Courtesy is shown to all, juniors as well as seniors. To the senior it is recognition of the responsibility and authority of his position. To a junior it acknowledges the essential part he plays as a member of the military team.

The most important of all military courtesies is the salute. The manner in which the salute is rendered is an indication of the individual's attitude toward his duties and his unit. A sloppy salute, or no salute at all, often indicates ignorance of his duties or a lack of confidence in his ability to perform them as well as a lack of pride in the military team. On the other hand, a smart, snappy salute immediately identifies the individual as one who is proud of his job, his unit and himself.

Have you checked your salute lately?

## Parenthood A Privilege

"Love and marriage — go together like a horse and carriage," runs the popular song. Marriage and parenthood go equally together. In the very first chapter of the Book of Genesis, the Bible states: "So God created man in his own image; in the image of God he created him; male and female, He created them. And God blessed them, and God said unto them: Be fruitful and multiply."

Husbands and wives possess a gift more wonderful than all others that they may have received — the power to reproduce themselves, to bring children into the world. But their work begins after the children are born. They must care for them, raising them with responsibility for their physical, mental, moral and spiritual welfare. Sacrifice will be necessary — but when we love, sacrifice becomes easier because there is a motive for it.

Children will require recognition for what they are — not for what the parents wish them to be. They require affection. Even when punishment must be doled out, children must know that they are loved even though their actions must require correction. And most important of all, they require directing. It will be from the example and teaching of their parents that children will find their places in life. "As a twig is bent, the tree is inclined."

Speaking of direction, this startling sign was seen recently on a stateside Air Base: "Don't send your children to church next Sunday — take them." The last two words are the key. The spiritual direction of children will best be accomplished by example and not by saying, "Do as I say — not as I do."

Parenthood is a privilege — not a burden. Children are a source of comfort and of consolation. They are the fulfillment of human marriage.

## Performance Recognized

Reese this week paid honor to civilian employees whose government service totals close to 400 years.

Six of these men received service pins presented by Col. L. C. Hess, the base commander. One was given a 30-year pin, five received 20-year pins. All are veterans of military service who turned to civil service after their separation. Twenty-three other men received 10-year pins; some were well past the 10-year mark.

Colonel Hess, in presenting the service pins, praised each man for his loyal service, saying that each had a part in assisting Reese to establish several "firsts" in the production and safety fields.

Everyone on the base is expected to perform his duty well and to be entirely familiar with his duties.

It is fitting that these veterans of military and civilian service receive recognition for their contributions. Had they not done highly successful work throughout the years they would not have been around to receive the service pins.

## Captain Cited For Airmanship

The Citation for Outstanding Airmanship has been presented to Capt. Marvin G. Ouren, Jr., officer-in-charge of the wing instrument school and former assistant flight commander. The award was for successfully landing a T-33 jet aircraft following a flame-out.

"Captain Ouren's proficiency and judgement undoubtedly prevented the possible loss of two lives and an expensive aircraft of the United States Air Force," said the citation signed by Lt. Gen. James E. Briggs, commander of Air Training Command.

The captain, flying with a student last February 12, was at 22,000 feet on a student training flight when he noted heavy engine vibration and oil pressure fluctuation. He turned back to Reese and secured emergency landing clearance. At 15,000 feet the oil pressure dropped to zero and a flame-out occurred. Captain Ouren dropped his tip tanks and came in for a safe deadstick landing.

Colonel L. C. Hess, Reese commander, presented the citation and the "Well Done" Award, an inscribed desk pen set.

The 1960 Reese Little League all-stars made a better showing than any previous such team but still ended up on the short end of an 11-8 score in the Thursday night district tournament at New Home. The Wolfforth all-stars were victors.

Two years ago Reese was victim of a no-hit, no-run game in the Lubbock tourney. Last year it became awe-struck over the opposing 5 foot, 11 inch pitcher and dropped a 21-0 one-hitter,

also in Lubbock.

Thursday night, before a boisterous crowd, Reese players snared seven hits, gathered six walks, and took advantage of four opposing errors. They rallied for four runs in the last inning and had the crowd wild with excitement. But the efforts were not enough.

Reese spotted Wolfforth three runs in the first inning and another in the second. It came back with two in the bottom of the second, only to see Wolfforth add another in the third, another in the fourth, three in the fifth, and three in the sixth and final stanza. Reese got single runs in the third and fourth innings.

Lefty Van Grady pitched all the way for Reese, striking out seven. But he gave up four walks and made five wild pitches. He also apparently was shaken at times by the four errors behind him.

Offensively, Charles McElroy contributed three hits and drew a walk in his four trips to the plate, and Steve Yother and Grady rapped two hits each, Grady including a double. Bubble-gum chewing Mark Vernon drew three walks, while John O'Connell had two.

Buddy Welch and Don Hendricks gathered three hits each for the victors, while Mario Corzales got two and Joe Garcia homored, Reese had six men left on base, Wolfforth seven.

Reese will assume all phases of pilot training next spring.

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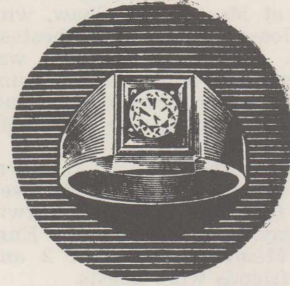
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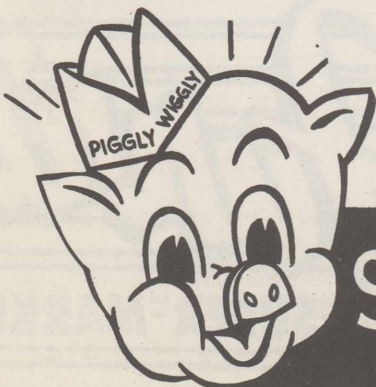
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### Woman's Chatter

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
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
