Promotions Up 136 Reese Men

Dozen Moved To Staff, 91 Named To A2C

One hundred thirty six Reese airmen will assume higher rank Feb. 1 as a new promotion cycle in the Air Force takes effect.

Twelve of the promotees will become staff sergeants, 33 airmen first class and 91 airmen second class.

New Contract For Phase I Training Near

Bids for conducting Phase I of the undergraduate pilot training program of Reese under civilian contract will be opened at 1 p.m. Feb. 28, in the Reese procurement office.

If the present contractor is a successful bidder, the new contract will be from July 1 1966 to Sept. 13, 1967. If another contractor is successful the contract will start a month earlier in order to permit time for qualifying instructors.

In the UPT program the first 30 hours of pilot training for Reese are conducted by a civilian contractor who provides his own field and maintains the T-41 aircraft which he leases from the Air Force. Training is under supervision of liaison personnel of Reese who see that training and maintenance meet Air Force standards.

The contractor presently is Marlman and McPherson of Los Animas, Colo., who have been conducting T-41 training since July 1. Civilian pilots hired by the firm teach Reese students.

The new contract will extend longer than the one-year present agreement as Air Training Command is changing dates for contracts to run at each of the eight undergraduate pilot training bases. In later years all Reese contracts will begin and stop Sept. 13 annually.

The new contract will be similar in detail to the present agreement, with some minor changes. Landing strips under the new contract must be hard-surface, instead of either hard-surface or turf. The successful contractor must use his own field, within one hour's bus trip of Reese. Students will live on the base and be transported daily by Air Force bus to the Phase I training field. The new contractor also must supply his own fire protection.

Marlan and McPherson are using Abernathy Municipal Airport for training and are using Lubbock pilots, in the main, as instructors.

Bidding for the first contract were 24 civilian firms from several parts of the nation. About the same number of bidders are expected next month, including the present contractor.

Military Suggestors Sought

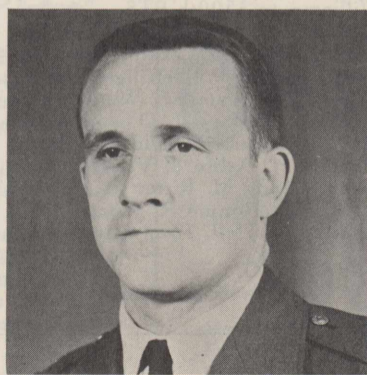

Edict Cancels Athletic, Art, Talent Events

Sports and recreation competition at the command level has been eliminated via an ATC message to the Reese Personnel Services Branch.

The message cited "shortages in personnel, billeting facilities and support airlift" as contributing factors in the cancellation of "the command level sports and recreation program as presently constituted . . . and the ATC Commander's Trophy Program . . ."

Affected by the termination of ATC level competition were such programs as basketball, boxing, judo, volleyball, wrestling, track and field, bowling, swimming and diving, tennis, golf, baseball, softball, touch football, handball, table tennis, squash, badminton, basketball and softball clinics, library publicity program, service club program contest, art, talent, short story contest, model airplane contest, chess, photography, designer-craftsman, and group singing.

Despite the discontinuation of competition at command level, the higher headquarters message encourages commanders "to continue to place strong emphasis on the base intramural sports and recreation program . . ."

"There will be no change in the sports and recreation program at the base level," said Leonard Maranto, assistant personnel services officer.

Reese teams will continue to compete with teams from other bases as they have in the past. The only change is the absence of an ATC tournament in any sport.

"ATC is in the process of developing a substitute program and a means of using intramural competition for identifying ATC participants for USAF world-wide competition," states the message.

Suggestion Cuts \$3,800 In Costs

An incentive awards suggestion for repair of T-38 flowmeters has brought a \$3,800 savings to Reese in the Cost Reduction Program for fiscal year 1966.

Reese built its own flowmeter test equipment, ceasing shipment of the flowmeters to depot in Middletown, Pa. The new system permitted self-sufficiency in bench check, overhaul and repair of the T-38 flowmeters.

Cost of work was considered the same at Reese and Middletown. But cost of handling and transportation was eliminated. Costs were \$12.06 per unit for handling and shipment. Processed annually were 312 units. Thus \$3,762.72 per year was saved.

Equal savings is projected for fiscal years 1967 and 1968.

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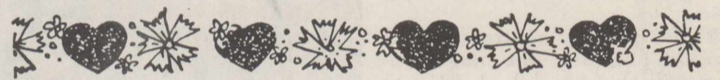

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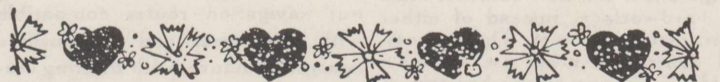
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Air Force Seeks Olympic Athletes; Reese Officer Trains For Javelin

The Air Force has called for its members to enter competition for the upcoming Olympics and Pan American games and at least one Reese man has already answered the call.

The President's Committee recommended more emphasis on amateur sports programs. It is promoting the programs as a means of providing more United States participation in international sports. It encourages military personnel to participate. It asks that outstanding athletes have sufficient time to train and that just prior to tryouts for the Pan American and Olympic games full-time for conditioning be allowed.

Second Lt. Robert G. Lambert, administrative officer, daily is working out at Texas Tech during the noon hour to get in shape for what he hopes will qualify him for the Olympics. He's working with weights and bars and in other ways to increase his strength.

Lambert holds the Air Force Academy record of 232 feet, 1 inch in the javelin and the Acad-

emy high jump record of 6 feet, 9 inches.

Last spring he extended his javelin mark to 240 feet, 10 inches in the National Collegiate Athletic Association competition. He thinks he can toss the javelin farther with a little more weight and strength.

Competition in all events will be held throughout the Air Force and inter-service meets are planned.

★★USAF VIETNAM BATTLE REPORT★★

TOP COMMANDERS TOUR
SAIGON (AFNS) — Three top commanders visited Air Force installations in Southeast Asia last week for a first-hand look at operations.

Arriving at Bien Hoa AB, Gen. Hunter Harris, commander-in-chief, Pacific Air Forces, checked base construction and development programs and presented two unit and two individual citations.

Air Force Outstanding Unit Awards went to the 3rd Tactical Fighter Wing at Bien Hoa and the 315th Air Commando Group at Tan Son Nhut.

At Pleiku, Gen. Howell M. Estes Jr., commander of the Military Airlift Command, was on hand to observe progress of Operation Blue Light, the airlift of the Army's 3rd Brigade, 25th Infantry Division, from Hawaii to Vietnam.

The operation, the longest combat airlift in military history, began in mid-December and was in its fourth week.

Meantime, Lt. Gen. Richard L. Bohannon, Air Force surgeon general, began a five-day visit to Air Force medical facilities.

In air activity over South Vietnam, Air Force pilots flew more than 920 strike sorties, dropping more than 6,000 bombs and expending 200 rockets.

In one of their busiest weeks in recent months, Strategic Air Command crews flew five strike missions in Boeing B-52 Stratofortress bombers.

O-1 Bird Dog, observation aircraft; C-47 Skytrain, cargo; AC-47 Skytrain, fire support; C-123 Provider and C-130 Hercules, airlift; C-124 Globemaster, performing intra-theater and trans-Pacific airlift; C-135 Stratolifter and C-141 Starlifter, trans-Pacific airlift; and F-5 tactical fighter and photo reconnaissance plane.

THIRD TOUR FOR F-100s

The Silver Knights of the 416th Tactical Fighter Squadron equipped with North American F-100 Supersabres have returned to Southeast Asia for the third time within a year.

During previous stays, the Silver Knights flew more than 2,000 combat sorties and logged more than 3,800 combat hours over both the Communist North and Republic of Vietnam.

LEAFLET WARFARE

Nearly 30 million leaflets have been dropped on both friendly and enemy areas in the Republic of Vietnam since Jan. 9.

Additionally, over 65 hours of broadcast time have been logged by Air Force loudspeaker-equipped aircraft flying over the same areas.

Officials said leaflet drops and loudspeaker broadcasts directed to Viet Cong areas urge Communist troops to return to their homes for the Vietnamese New Year celebration later this month — and to remain at home after the holidays.

ASSORTED PLANES FUNCTION

The Air Force has 25 types of aircraft operating in Vietnam, carrying out various duties.

Seven of the types are fighters — the F-100 Supersabre, tactical fighter; RF-101 Voodoo, reconnaissance aircraft; F-102 Delta Dagger, fighter-interceptor; F-105 Thunderchief, all-weather tactical
