A. No attempt will be made to resolve ties. The individuals con- tered to every eligible airman. cerned will all be promoted. In the example cited, all five airmen would receive promotion.

2. Q. Will an airman who was awarded an AFSC by classification board action, after having failed the SKT, be required to retake the SKT or will the old nonqualifying SKT score be used for promotion purposes?

A. All eligible airmen will take the appropriate promotion SKT considered for promotion. before the first cycle under WAPS, regardless of the method by which the skill level qualification was obtained. The score attained at that time will be valid for one year only. The SKT must be taken once each year thereafter by eligible airmen.

3. Q. Will SKTs be developed for each AFSC? How about AFSCs which require proficiency in several types of equipmentwill tests be developed for these sub-specialties? (For example, the munitions field encompasses six different weapons systems. Knowledge on all of these is now required in order to successfully pass the SKT.) Since SKT is now to be used for promotion purposes, the airman who has no practical experience in certain systems, through no fault of his own, is concerned that he may be penalized. There are many AFSCs which present similar problems.

A. SKTs covering 97% of the airman force are expected to be available prior to the initial WAPS testing cycle. The AFSCs for which no SKTs will be develooped have too small a population to warrant their development. Airmen competing for promotion in those AFSCs will compete only against contemporaries with the same criteria applicable to all. SKTs for AFSC shredouts are developed where required to adequately measure specialized knowledge.

4 Q. Will date of rank in current grade or total weighted score be used to determine priority sequence in which selected airmen are to be promoted to the next higher grade?

A. Date of rank in current grade will be used. This policy continues our present, acceptable system of preserving senority

A. When available, the SKT is mandatory for promotion consideration. It is taken annually, not for each promotion cycle. It is used to establish promotion eligibility. It insures a current valid measure of knowledge (test score) for every airman being

9. Q. Will study courses and/or references be developed for the promotion fitness exams?

A. Study reference lists will be provided for all tests developed. These lists will indicate the basic material used in developing the test.

10. Q. Will there be a listing of airmen being considered for promotion for edit purposes?

A. Yes. The CBPO will continue to send each unit a list of its eligibles for posting on the bulletin board and for commander's recommendation. A list of ineligibles is also sent to the unit. Matching of CBPO/MPC data will provide additional checks to insure that no eligible airmen are overlooked. A further check will be provided by the promotion status card. If an airman is not on the selection list and does not receive a promotion status card, he is in a position to request supplemental promotion consideration.


11. Q. Will retesting each promotion cycle on PFE and supervisory examinations be mandatory if an airman has attained the maximum possible score during the previous cycle?

A. All candidates for promotion will be treated the same. Retesting each year (not promotion cycle) is mandatory. The score attained will be good for whatever number of promotion cycles to the next higher grade occur within that year.

12. Q. Will test scoring be on a percentile or standard basis?

A. Percentile scores will be used. WAPS was developed using this concept. Percentile score provides best means of differentiating among individuals.

13. Q. Can an airman with more than one AFSC in which he is eligible for promotion select the AFSC in which he desires to be tested and considered for promotion?
