Armed Forces Day Program Set For 11 A.M.

An estimated 10,000 persons are expected to visit Reese AFB tomorrow as the base holds open house in connection with the installation's 20th observance of Armed Forces Day.

The day was made official in Lubbock with the issuance of a proclamation by Lubbock Mayor W. D. Roger Jr. during a City Council meeting May 8. (See color picture below.) In presenting the proclamation to Col. Clyde J. Morganti, wing commander, Mayor Rogers called attention to the long-standing friendship between Lubbock and the base and called on Lubbock citizens to support the day by visiting the base during the open house, set from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Luncheon Scheduled

Highlighting the day's activities will be two significant events, the base's traditional Armed Forces Day luncheon featuring Dr. C. L. Kay, assistant president of Lubbock Christian College, as principal speaker, and a groundbreaking ceremony for the base's new \$2 million hospital at 11:30 a.m. (See story column

For the general public, the open house will offer a record number of aircraft on display for an Armed Forces Day at Reese.

Featured will be a static display of aircraft including those of the Air Force, U.S. Army and U.S. Navy. Scheduled for display are the McDonnell-Douglas F-4 Phantom II, North American F-100 Super Sabre, the McDonnell-Douglas RF-101 Voodoo, Convair F-102 Delta Dagger, tentatively the Martin B-57 Canberra, Bell UH-1 Iroquois helicopter from the Army, Grumman F-9 Cougar and Lockheed S-2 Neptune from the

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

Credit Union May Drop Requirement For Car Coverage

Jack Browder, a member of the credit committee, has proposed to the Reese AFB Credit Union board of directors the elimination of the requirement for collision insurance coverage when lower grade airmen ask for loans to purchase used cars for less

Brodwer said, "Liability insurance is required by the base and this costs a young airman as much as \$150 a year. Add to that \$125 to \$150 for collision insurance (the Credit Union requirement) and the insurance costs just about as much as the used

Browder added, "The cost of the car and the insurance raises the amount of the loan so high that it is prohibitive to the young airmen. Thus, the airman has to do without transportation.

"Dropping the requirement for collision insurance will enable many airmen to buy good used cars at a price they can afford. I have been a member of the credit union for the past 17 years and I know the financial responsibility of paying for a loan adds to a young airman's stature."

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

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
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
