# President Nixon halts promotions, hiring

President Nixon announced on Dec. 11 that he has imposed an immediate freeze on all military and civilian promotions and hirings.

The President said that the freeze will remain in effect until the federal budget is transmitted

to the Congress in January.

In announcing the freeze the President added that it will have no effect on employees eligibility for step increases or on the scheduled comparability pay raise for federal employees at the turn of the year. The freeze order has an immediate impact on the 16,300 airmen and 2,400 officers on promotion selection lists.

Exceptions to the freeze order the President said, will only be permitted in cases where the actions are essential to preserve human life and safety, to protect property, to preserve the continuity of government or for emergency situations—such as the need for the postal service to hire temporary help to meet the Christmas mail rush.

All exceptions will have to be approved on a case-by-case basis by the office of management

and budget. Some exceptions to the freeze have been approved. They are as follows: astrict promotions required by law; this includes officers holding a temporary promotion who have fulfilled the requirements for a permanent promotion; astrict people in MIA/PW status; also excepted are people completing training programs which lead to promotion, such as six-year enlistees who are guaranteed promotion to E-3 after completing basic military training. This also includes airmen in commissioning programs who will continue to be promoted to E-5.

Astrict promotions to E-2 will continue for those who are otherwise eligible and who have completed four months total active federal military service. The exception does not apply to accelerated promotions to E-2, therefore the promotion of the top 15 per cent of each basic military training class to E-2 is suspended until the freeze is lifted. No other exceptions to the freeze have been approved.

# Personnel talk to commander via Box 64

Not often do we get letters to Box 64, but I am always pleased when we do, for I feel that it is a good way to feel the pulse of the wing and communicate my ideas to you. This week we received two letters, and although they are unsigned, I will personally attend to their reply. I will address them in the order in which they were received: Letter No. 1

"Sir: Why is it we at Reese have no Commander's Hot Line, where questions may be directed to you, the base or wing commanders? Questions like:

"Why do so many officers wear wellington boots in direct violation of 35-10? Why do so many officers wear colored T-shirts with flight suits? Are all people supposed to wear hats from the parking lot to their office? Why are blacks allowed to wear excessive Afro hair styles? Show me a black with a mustache and seven times out of 10, it will be in violation of 35-10 and have a fly to boot. Why are the supervisors

"Why not let GI functions take priority for Party House reservations? Why are young troops allowed to wear uniform clothing with civilian attire? Why is it, unless you're a member of the NCO Open Mess, you cannot even buy a cup of coffee in the evening-not to mention a burger?

'Minor?" Yes. But in today's people-to-people Air Force, these are a sample of the questions the people want answered. This is a fraction of what's on my mind, and I am only one of hundreds. Let's communicate.'

I think some of the answers are self evident: We do have a hot line drop box to the commander . . . you used it. I'm unaware of "so many" officers violating 35-10. When I see a violation, I correct it on the spot . . . officer, NCO or airman, and I expect everyone in the chain of command to do so. Discipline is a continual problem, haircut and mustache problems are not limited to blacks as you suggest (I wonder about your perspective and attitude as a result of your comments). Concerning colored Tshirts with flight suits-I have no objections, flyers have my permission to wear colored scarfs, too.

Reservations at the party house are "first come, first served"in the event of a tie, the GI party wins. Now about your wanting to use the NCO club without being a dues paying member-either join up or use the BX facilities. The dues paying members didn't join to pass our charity to others who get paid on the same scale. Now, on the subject of communication -sign your next letter so we can really talk these things out. This column will take up the whole paper and still not be as good as talking face to face.

Letter No. 2 (Editor's Note: The following letter has been paraphrased because of limited space in the Roundup.)

An NCO went to bat for airmen who have been working overtime in 64th Field Maintenance Squadron and the 64th Organizational Maintenance Squadron. He suggested to Colonel Baxter that:

1. The airmen involved in working overtime "week after week, month after month" be awarded the Air Force Commendation Medal (Meritorious Achievement). He suggested this because "the airmen would be credited with three points in his WAPS score" and thus would not just be a "recognition gimmick." He added that "Anything short of the Commendation Medal would be an empty gesture in the young airmen's eyes.'

2. We shouldn't "be too critical of the depth of documentation" on the flight line, "in the interest of improving morale" in these areas.

"You may not know this, but my first duty in the Air Force was as an aircraft crew chief on P-38's in the middle of the Arizona desert called Luke Field. For that reason, I am most sensitive to the plight of the mechanics. They work under the worst of conditions, in the snow, sun, rain and wind. They work long hours, long duty weeks, odd hours and the work is frequently dirty, often physical and always pressure packed. The lives of the pilots depend upon the work of the me-

I understand and I appreciate these things. I also know that the 43xx career field gets a lion's share of the promotions because of the understanding of our leaders and policy makers.

l also know that while the dramatic impact of working weekends and odd hours may not be as clear in other cases, we have other people who routinely work odd hours, weekends, far more than 40 hours per week, etc. Let me name a few, and let me bet that you will still be able to add jobs or names to the list: Security Police, doctors, civil engineers, firemen, chaplains

and their assistants, gym supervisors, motor pool drivers, supply specialists and (from time to time) squadron and wing commanders. Perhaps you'd even be surprised to learn that student pilots have an 11.5 hour scheduled day, on the average, every day they are in the 52 weeks of pilot training, and that doesn't include home study, weekend flying or required navigation training.

Let me get back to the subject now, or maybe I've already led you to the conclusion. I don't believe we can simply reward with a medal, everyone who works long hours-the rewards would become meaningless. I'm confident, too, that the esprit in LG is not simply a function of time off, medals or some sort of recognition 'gimmick". Esprit is built by leadership and pride; it is a resul of mission achievement. Little l can say or do will add to or detract from your feeling of accomplishment-if you don't feel it, you simply don't know how well you have done, for the wing has done extremely well, and to continue to do so will require continued hard work and long hours. Much of the recognition for this will be selfpride generated right there in your work center by your attitude.

I know you don't like the weekend work, but don't buy all the silver bullets-you're not the Lone Ranger.

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

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
