Tornado season nears

Shortly after 9:30 p.m., May 11, 1970, a black, twisting vacuum stretched down from turbulent skies and ripped through Lubbock—powerfully, quickly and unpredictably.

Left in the wake of the storm were 1,700 heavily damaged homes, 119 smashed airplanes and 10,000 wrecked vehicles. Property damage was set at \$135 million. Twenty-eight persons were dead.

Advance planning is the key to personal safety. At the first sign of severe weather, stay tuned to a local television or radio station and secure shelter. If a storm shelter is not available, use the strongest portion of your dwelling.

A central closet or bathroom will offer the best protection. Be sure to open windows to compensate for vacuums created by the twisting storms. The adage about standing in the southwest corner of your home will succeed only in having the southwest wall collapse on you.

If traveling, keep an eye out for menacing sky conditions, tune to a local radio station for weather reports and try to drive at right angles to the storm's path.

When danger is inevitable, stop the car, crack the windows and use the seat belts. Protect your face and exposed areas from glass and debris.

When cover is not available, lie flat in a low spot or gully and shield your face and hands.

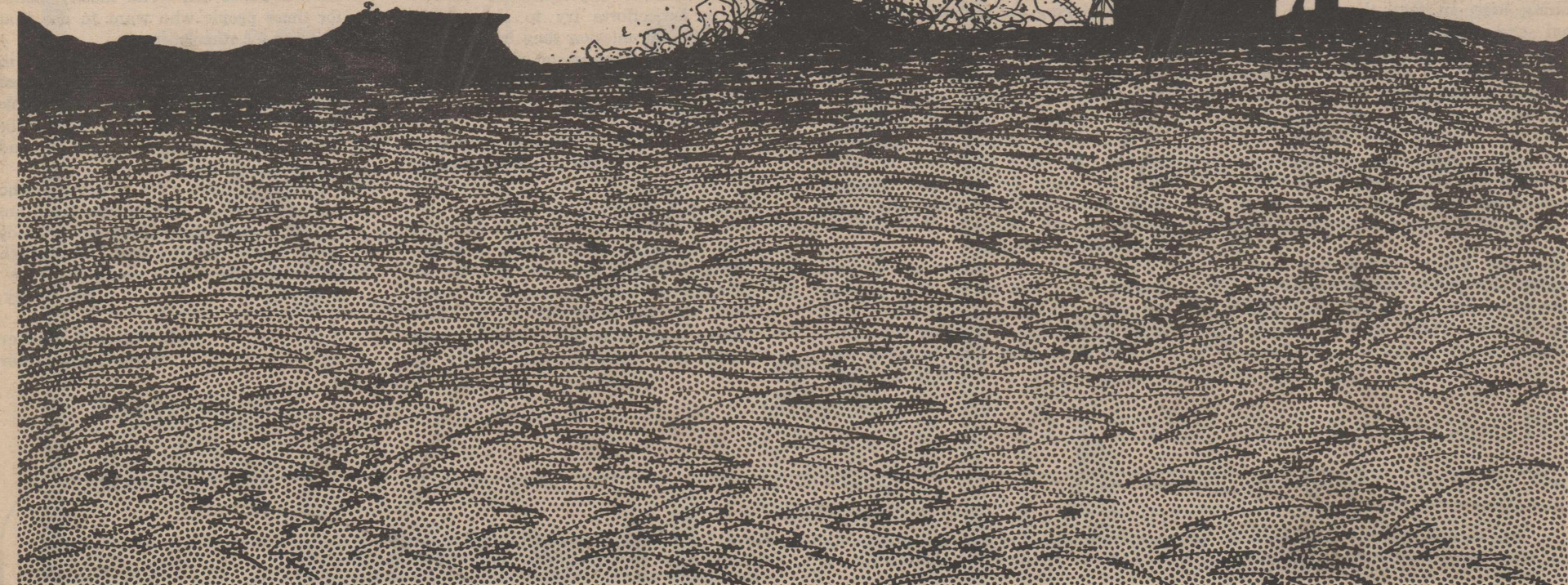
Office buildings offer the best protection in a central hallway or basement. Avoid structures on weak foundations or rooms with suspended ceilings.

Tornado watch is a term used by weather forecasters to indicate weather conditions are favorable for the development of tornadoes. When a tornado watch is issued, prepare for an emergency and remain vigilant.

Tornado warning indicates a tornado actually has been sighted and precautions should be taken. On base, listen for a three to five minute steady tone on the base siren system or a deep roar like the rumble of a large bomber squadron or freight train.

Should you sight a funnel cloud, hear a tornado approaching or receive a warning, take cover.

The return of our prisoners of war from Southeast Asia was watched with interest by millions of Americans through the medium of television. I was tremendously impressed and touched by the manner in which they spoke of their pride in our country and the gratitude they feel toward those who made a peace with honor possible. It was, no doubt, this peace with honor that made them hold their heads high as they walked down the ramp at Clark AFB.

I find it a curious paradox that they should be thanking us for what we have done when it is really we who are deeply indebted to them for their sacrifices to free people the world over.

Since their return, I have had the opportunity—no, the privilege—of talking with two of these returning POWs. That they have managed to maintain their spirits, morale and love of country in

the face of the tortures and indignities heaped upon them by their captors is a credit to them personally and speaks well of their military training.

Apparently their return from captivity has not ended their ordeal completely, for even before the last POW had returned, one vocal dissident was reported to have called those POWs who claimed they were tortured and mistreated by their captors liars even as those same POWs displayed scars and maimed limbs suffered at the hands of their captors.

This same dissident was reported to have said that history would record their (the POWs) infamy, but I know history will record: It will record that these men performed superbly under the most trying of conditions and that their conduct while in captivity was such as to make every American—and especially this one—extremely proud to be an American.

Editor's note: The following letter has been condensed to conserve space. Hopefully its meaning is unchanged.

Dear Colonel Baxter:

When we arrived at Reese three years ago, I was pleasantly surprised at the active youth program which was running here. In fact, the youth program and facilities were the main reasons we decided to live in Reese Village instead of living in Lubbock. However, it seems the program has been going downhill ever since the first year. I realize that budget cuts have affected all areas of operation and the youth budget must feel those cuts too, but I also feel I must make an appeal for help for our young people.

Since the Youth Center was condemned, our young people have nowhere to go just to sit and visit with their friends. They are not overly welcomed at the cafeteria and Talon

Inn, and indeed most of the parents would prefer that they didn't hang out there. Many evenings there is not much for them to do so they walk the streets.

I am worried that some night a bunch of young people are going to be in an automobile accident just riding around looking for something to do or somewhere to go.

Another area of concern is activities. At a recent meeting of parents many people expressed a willingness to help but have heard nothing from the youth officials. We offer very little for girls and the older youth. Last summer many of the activities which were supposed to run through the summer months were cancelled.

I've stated the problems, Colonel Baxter, but I and many other parents are willing to help. The primary need is for a building. If it would take some work to fix one up, I know many par-

ents and kids who would be willing to donate their time to help. The young people would certainly be ready to raise the money for any supplies which would be required. But we do need something to start with.

Our families, our children, they are of the utmost importance to us. We all in our efforts try to support the men and the mission they have to perform, but for many of us the effort would be better if we were not concerned about our youth.

Dear Mrs. Rowley:

Your concern over the youth activities on base is absolutely justified. Effective April 15 we will convert the Community House (across the street from the kindergarten) to a Youth Center until a building can be built. The new building has finally re-

ceived ATC approval and nonappropriated funds of about \$200,000 are expected as soon as Headquarters, U.S. Air Force approved the project. Design and construction will require 18-24 months thereafter. Between now and that time the Community House will have to do. It will be an inconvenience for those people who want to use that building for other purposes.

A new Youth Center has been in Reese plans for years and it is most unfortunate that funds were unavailable until after the old building had to be condemned. I think we should be glad that this situation is a rarity.

I hope we have a lot of parents who are as concerned as you are, for I am certain a good youth program depends upon parent involvement. Our youth officials will be calling upon you.

OB-GYN to move under CHAMPUS

Reese is one of 12 Air Force installations where hospital staff obstetricians and gynecologists will no longer be assigned after June 30, according to Air Force medical officials.

Since critical physician shortages in the OB-GYN specialty are expected to persist, command surgeons have been urged to consider hiring qualified civilian obstetricians/gynecologists whenever feasible.

Capt. John R. Beaty, hospital administrator, has noted that the Reese USAF Hospital will be without a Department of Obstetrics beginning July 1. OB-GYN service will be offered until that time. The capability for cancer screening will not be affected nor will the ability for individuals to obtain birth control pills and family planning counseling.

Ladies who are scheduled to deliver on or before July 1 will be taken care of at the Reese facility, but those who are to give birth after that time will be personally contacted by hospital officials and furnished necessary information.

The care of expectant mothers will be handled under the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS), or they will be cared for by other military medical facilities if possible.

The other 11 bases that will be affected by the shortage are: Chanute AFB, Ill.; Columbus AFB, Miss.; Forbes AFB, Kan.; Griffiss AFB, N.Y.; Grissom AFB, Ind.; Hill AFB, Utah; Myrtle Beach AFB, S.C.; Patrick AFB, Fla.; Plattsburgh AFB, N.Y.; Tyndall AFB, Fla.; and Webb AFB, Tex.

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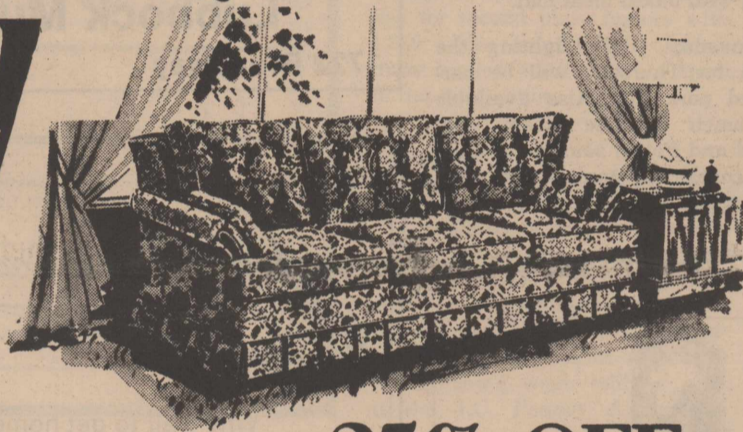

According to the base Education Office, "Wayland's flexible scheduling and liberal evaluations make it an attractive program for those needing upper division work."

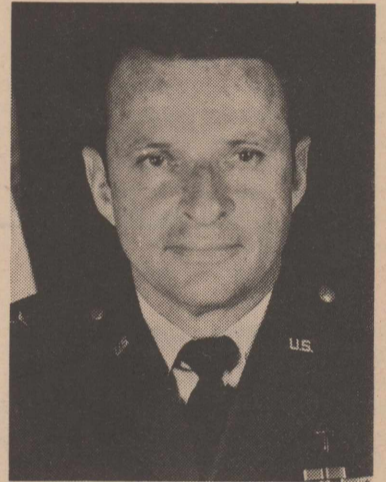

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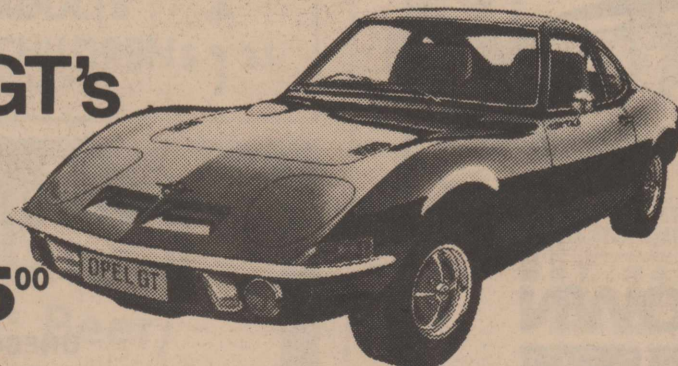


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Annual skeet shooting event to be held at Ent AFB, Colo.
