CARE line expands two-way communication

"Commander's CARE Line", a 24-hour message recording service, has been installed in wing headquarters as part of a continuing effort to provide open communication with the Wing Commander.

The service is designed for use by all Reese personnel, their dependents and all civilian employees. It is intended as an avenue for expressing complaints or commendations and for stating questions or recommendations for the improvement of programs or facilities at Reese. All messages will be presented to Col. Walter H. Baxter III, wing commander.

Identification Urged

While a caller may choose to remain anonymous if he insists, each caller is encouraged to leave his name, rank, address and telephone number so as to insure his receiving an answer. No action will be taken against anyone regardless of the question he might raise through the use of the recording service.

Questions and answers which do not have base-wide application—those which are of a personal nature or which might apply to only the caller—will not be printed in the Roundup to give the caller his answer. In these cases, it is easier to contact the individuals directly to answer these rather than use vital space in the Roundup to answer these questions without base-wide interest. By the same token, callers who do have questions of base-wide interest and

which might appear in the Roundup may choose to have the replies kept in confidence or they may choose to have them printed without names being used.

Dial C-A-R-E

Anyone may call the Commander's CARE Line by dialing C-A-R-E (2273). The phone will be answered with a brief recorded explanation of how the system operates. A beep tone will follow at which time the caller should state his name and rank or the fact that he wishes to remain anonymous. The comment or question should then be stated.

Commenting on the value of the new message system, Colonel Baxter remarked, "I strongly urge the people at Reese to take advantage of this opportunity to express themselves. There are no formalities involved, those having questions don't even have to write anything down.

Comments Invaluable

"Questions, comments or constructive criticisms about things can be invaluable", the colonel added. "They sometimes bring to light problems, errors or different ways of doing things that can help Reese do its job better and make our people happier."


Colonel Baxter concluded, "We're not forgetting about the other channels of communication we have here—they're still vital. But we are concerned that we establish as many communication systems as we can. This Commander's CARE Line is a valuable addition."

Hospital's services overcome limitations

Each month Reese physicians, dentists, nurses and technicians care for more than 6,500 persons through appointments, emergency services and sick calls.

Though the Reese USAF Hospital is limited in some areas, most illnesses can be treated.

Outstanding Manner

Lt. Col. Clarence K. Whiteside, hospital commander, explained, "Obviously along some lines we don't have the capability to take care of people. But for what we are set up to do we can do in an outstanding manner.

Capt. John R. Beaty, hospital administrator, said the most efficient way to see people with so few doctors is on an appointment basis, though emergency services and sick calls are available.

Problems Realized

He identified two particularly acute problem areas concerning hospital operation—unrealistic expectations by patients and the myth that military doctors are inferior to civilian doctors.

"Our experience indicates fewer irritants in military hospitals than in civilian hospitals," Captain Beaty explained. He cited less waiting time for treatment and less cost among the numerous advantages of the military medical system.

Quality of work by doctors does not change from military to civilian life because of the nature of medical training and practice.

Captain Beaty, in citing unrealistic expectations of patients as a source of irritants, said, "People have a natural tendency to take their medical benefit for granted. For example, they have erroneously viewed emergency rooms as 24-hour clinics and have felt that patients must be seen immediately at all hours of the day or night regardless of the nature of their complaints.

Evaluation Recommended

"In this regard we would ask people to more sensibly evaluate the severity of their illness. Just because the service is free and available, don't overuse it. It is not an unlimited resource," the Captain said. Many people do not understand that a doctor who works nights as Medical Officer of the Day (MOD) is doing so after he has worked a full day; and after the night MOD shift, he is expected to have regular office hours the next day. For this reason, the MOD is expected to get a full night's sleep unless he is needed for a legitimate acute emergency. Our capabilities are limited; our resources are not inexhaustible," he added.

When our hospital does not have the capability for a particular kind of service, it provides military members with the care either through another Air Force hospital or civilian services.

The mission of the United States Air Force is to fly and fight. Our mission here at Reese is to train those who do. We, of course, must do this efficiently with great concern for the quality of our product.

This seems like an over-simplification of a difficult mission to many of our people but actually it isn't. The complications begin when the human factors of motivation, desire and professional performance enter the picture.

Everyone at Reese AFB is engaged in the fullfillment of that mission. Whether a job is directly tied to it as with our instructor pilots, or indirectly, as with our maintenance forces, the fact remains: the principal reason for being here is to efficiently train quality pilots for the Air Force.

Reese is one of 10 bases in Air Training Command currently supporting this most important mission. It is a matter of pride that we want Reese to rank as the best, as number one, in mission performance in ATC. If we are to achieve this goal we must reexamine and re-evaluate the individual human factors so vital to the accomplishment of our mission.

Motivation is a word we have heard so often that it tends to become trite, but motivation is the first step toward success in any endeavor. Every commander, supervisor and worker at Reese must have the motivation to make our mission accomplishment number one. Unless all our people are properly motivated we will lack the teamwork necessary to fullfill our mission in a professional manner and it is our commanders and supervisors who must insure that our people are motivated.

We must also have desire—a work often mistaken for wishing. A person who sits around wishing for success isn't likely to find it. However, a person who has been motivated and whose desire is great enough can accomplish almost anything. You can wish to fly an airplane but only strong desire and work will put you in the cockpit. You can wish to be a leader but only strong desire and work will make you one. You can wish to be number one, but only strong desire and work will make it so.

Professional performance is the culmination of motivation and desire. It is, in effect, the ending aim and final test of all we do. If we have been properly motivated and if the desire is strong enough we will become professionals. That is true and whether your field of endeavor is sports, business, engineering or training pilots. There are a myriad of human factors that go hand-in-hand with professional performance—pride being the forefront. If cold is the absence of heat and war is the absence of peace then surely amateurism is the absence of professional performance.

We can make Reese the number one UPT base in ATC. We can start with motivation, then instill the desire-desire strong enough to make us work at being professionals in what we do, whether the job be as an instructor pilot or flying a desk in wing headquarters. Whatever your job, it is vital to our mission. Do it well and your reward will be pride and satisfaction that money can't buy.

Command Highlights

highlights include: Twice-weekly meetings at Columbus AFB, Miss., sponsored by the Social Actions Office and the Afro-American Cultural Workshop. These focus on drug (including alcohol) education, human relations, health and black history. They are attended by youth from "Project Help, Inc.," a non-profit, charitable organization, chartered by the State of Mississippi to serve the youth and aged of the community.

Volunteers at Craig AFB, Ala., provide free supplementary tutoring, counseling and coaching to 49 community and dependent children with learning and behavioral problems (funded by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare).

Keesler AFB, Miss., volunteers show movies with subtitles for deaf children; also, training was conducted for 12 nurses' aides in cooperation with the Neighborhood Youth Corps.

Basic trainee volunteers (bona fide) from Lackland AFB, Tex., helped to renovate and restore two Spanish missions and an 18room house in San Antonio used for the emotionally disturbed. Officer trainees from the same base are working at the San Antonio Free Clinic doing janitorial work, sanitizing the clinic and beautifying the outside.

Teaching Aid At Laredo AFB, Tex., 26 ATC wives tutor children with learning deficiencies-teaching English, math and speech.

Personnel at Vance AFB, Okla., hosted 3,000 Boy Scouts in a Scout-O-Rama. Also, an ecologyminded group started a paper recycling project.

Williams AFB, Ariz., provides movies and dances for youngsters from Arizona Boys' Ranch.

Facilities and transportation are furnished for Youth Unlimited, a choral group of underprivileged children, at Lowry AFB, Colo.



UNC program offers masters to Reese, Lubbock residents
