New pilots emerge from graduation today

Graduation ceremonies for the 37 student pilots of Undergraduate Pilot Training (UPT) Class 74-01 will be held at 10 a.m. today at the base chapel.

Two foreign students will be graduating along with 35 American officers at the event this morning. Featured speaker at the graduation will be Brig. Gen. Larry M. Killpack, assistant comptroller for the Air Force. General Killpack is also the commander of the Air Force Accounting and Finance Center at Denver.

Commander's Cup

Capt. Charles S. Hood will be presented the Commander's Cup at the graduation as well as the Flying Trophy. Captain Hood is also being graduated top in his class. Another award that will be bestowed upon him will be the Leadership Award for the class. He will be departing Reese to go to MacDill AFB, Fla., for assignment to McDonnell F-4s.

Another distinguished graduate in the class, 2nd Lt. Dudley W. Karstensen, will also be stationed at MacDill in the F-4 as will 2nd Lt. William V.S. Hester.

Two other men were also selected as outstanding graduates. They are 2nd Lt. Richard A. Wojdyla, who also received the Academic Award, and Capt. Earl T. Kuhn. Captain Kuhn will return to the Air National Guard and Lieutenant Wojdyla will travel to pilot instructor training before his return to Reese as an instructor pilot in the Northrop T-38 Talon.

Other awards to be presented today include the Citizenship Award presented to a student by the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, Armed Services Committee. It will go to 2nd Lt. Joost Van Bastellaar. Lieutenant Van Bastellaar will also be assigned to Reese and T-38s after PIT.

The 54th Flying Training Squadron will gain two more men from Class 74-01. They will be 2nd Lt. Lewis C. Sanford and 2nd Lt. Kenneth R. Rees Jr.

Five more of the new pilots will be assigned to Reese as instructors in the Cessna T-37 for the 35th Flying Training Squadron. They will be Second Lieutenants Edward Graf Jr., Edward A. Weitz Jr., Roger F. Tyler, Samuel P. Eskew and John E. Taylor.



"We must do our part to protect the public dollars entrusted to us"

Financial Management is the responsibility of every member of the Air Force team. Rising tax burdens affect each of us as well as our friends and families outside of the Air Force. Unlike those who work outside of government, we can do more than voting against higher taxes—we can influence how the government spends the tax money.

Nearly everyone at Reese has some control over resources which are paid for by taxes. Although most people influence the spending of only a few dollars, the total amount is staggering, even at Reese.

Utilities are expensive for the base—over a quarter of a million dollars each year. Each of us can help reduce this cost by turning out lights, keeping water from running in the streets, having Civil Engineers repair leaky faucets, and using heating and air conditioning to the minimum extent needed for comfort.

Most of us use supplies in our jobs, such as pencils, paper, pens, aircraft parts, vehicle parts, tires, fuel, and so on. Reese spends over \$2,600,000 each year for supplies. Only you know for sure whether all of the supplies you consume are really necessary for your work.

Our greatest cost at Reese and in the Defense

Budget, is the cost of personnel. At Reese we will spend \$29,467,000 this fiscal year for pay, allowances, and benefits for civilian and military personnel. Does Reese get over \$29 million worth of work from the personnel assigned here? Few people think we do. Are you one of those people who fail to give a dollars worth of work for a dollars worth of pay? Are you satisfied that you help the taxpayers save money? Are you satisfied that the Air Force gets full value for the money spent? What about your own home—how much government property can be found there such as pens, pencils, tape, paper or tools?

The American people rightfully demand better management by government. We must do our part to protect the public dollars entrusted to us. We should be honest with ourselves in deciding whether we really need certain supplies or equipment, in delivering all of the work we're paid for, and in leaving government property on the base for official use.

As public servants, we can do no less than demonstrate integrity in our jobs. Each of us, with only a little effort, can save tax dollars, and make them available for tax savings or better services from the government. Won't you do your part—it's your money too!

It's time to search your conscience... now

Rats rush to certain quick death by deserting a sinking ship. There is a revised version of a popular song again making the rounds entitled, "Nobody Wants You When You Are Down and Out." Then there is the old adage about fair weather friends...

We all perhaps have had someone let us down at a time when seemingly we needed him most. However, we toughed it out and somehow came through it all with a few scars and our spirit and determination still intact.

To accomplish its mission the military is structured to rely upon each man. This point is underscored when it is given the signal to take the field and demonstrate what it is paid and

equipped to do-defend the nation.

When the military has to take the field in a life-death struggle, it needs a united, 100 percent effort from all people. It has no time for deserters. It's way too late for one to jump the team for a newly discovered troubled conscience.

Lt. Cdr. John S. McCain III knows what it is like when the going gets rough. He spent more than five years in a North Vietnamese prison. He offers some advice for all in the military. He says that if you do not know what your country is doing, find out. If you not like what your country is doing, get out before the chips are down.

He reasons that once you become a prisoner of war, you do not have the right to dissent, because what you do will be harming your country. You are

speaking as a member of the armed forces of the United States, and you owe loyalty to the commander in chief. Search your conscience, now.

Carelessness causes 12 senseless accidents

During the first six months of this year, Air Training Command (ATC) personnel were involved in 12 senseless firearms accidents.

All of these accidents resulted from unauthorized and careless discharge of privately- and government-owned vehicles. In one instance, an ATC security police sergeant, while engaged in horseplay on duty, accidentally shot himself with a .38 caliber service revolver

Last March, a staff sergeant decided to practice his "quick draw" and accidentally shot himself in the leg with a privately owned .22 caliber pistol.

These, and the more than 1,000 firearms-related deaths reported by the National Safety Council in 1971, indicate the need for more responsible handling of firearms.

To avoid needless injury and death, ATC officials suggest the following firearms safety checklist:

• Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. This is the first rule of gun safety.

 Always carry your gun so you can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble. Keep the safety on until you are ready to shoot.

 Never point a gun at anything you don't want to shoot. Avoid horseplay when handling a gun.

Unattended guns should be unloaded. Keep guns and ammunition stored separately beyond the reach of children and thoughtless adults.

 Never shoot a bullet at a flat, hard surface or the surface of water when at target practice. Be sure backstops are adequate.

"There is no shortage of meat from any of the suppliers to the Reese commisary", the major remarked, "People believe there is so they go out and buy more than a reasonable amount."

Effective immediately, checkers at the commissary will determine what they believe to be an unreasonable amount of meat in a purchase and require that the commissary patron return a portion of it. The tendency of "hoarding" is drastically reducing the selection of meat at the The major, continued, "I strongly urge patrons of the commissary to exercise restraint in the purchase of meat. There is no shortage in the supply and we don't expect any," McCrary concluded.


Hospital announces plan for children's physicals


School physicals for the upcoming school year will be given to children at the Reese USAF Hospital from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 4:30 p.m. Thursday.

and give your money to the people at the golf course clubhouse. For the entry fee you get greens usage, free meals, and a change to win some good


