## Hermleigh Community Gets Much Needed Rain.

Heavy rain and strong wind invaded this part of the country last Saturday night. The cloud came up late in the evening and the rain and wind continued until early in the night. Very little damage was done by the wind, as has been reported. A few windmills were twisted and other minor damage done to crops, there being but little cotton in the fields which was not picked. The farmers have been keeping up with cotton picking well so far this season. It is thought by some that the rain will benefit the cotton, but with others it is questionable. October rains rarely benefit cotton in Texas, more often it is damaged than benefited by the late rains.

This was the heaviest rain fall this country has had in some time and the ground was beginning to get dry. Some farmers were ready to begin their fall breaking and had been delayed on the account of the ground being so dry and this will greatly benefit them in this way.

## Scurry County One of two Counties With Good Cotton.

DALLAS, Sept. 20. — Texas for once in its history, is in the position of having extreme prospects for a large cotton crop, but excellent chances for prosperity this fall, according to reports compiled by the Department of Public Relations of the Southland Life Insurance Co. up to Sept. 1.

Reports indicate without any doubt that there has been great deterioration of cotton since Aug. 1. Continued cool and rainy weather, the boll weevil, army worms, other insect infestation or shedding all have alternated to materially cut down prospects for a large crop. As the map showing conditions in each county indicates, but two counties in the state—Hardeman and Scurry Counties—could be classed as having excellent prospects for a large crop of cotton. Jefferson County shows on the map as "excellent" but is not a large producer. On the other hand, an extremely large number of counties show as "good" and "normal", while still others showing cotton conditions bad have had a good year in other respects.

Remarkable in some respects is the feeling that Texas may expect a good fall business. Even in those counties apparently hit by deterioration of cotton an unmistakable feeling of hopefulness is shown.

The low price of cotton last year has made money matters bad all over the country, and the fact that Scurry county is fortunate to have the best prospects of any county in the state save one, ought to be the occasion of great rejoicing on our own part.

Cotton in all parts of the cotton belt is a failure this year. There was too much water in the eastern counties and too dry in the western; floods, winds; boll weevils, boll worms, leaf worms and other pest known to the cotton farmer, were ours to battle against this year. Hermleigh people have no complaint to make against fate this year.

We were unable to get out

coming back to us slowly. Our  
health has improved some al-  
ready, we think. At the least  
we go to the table and eat, to  
the bed and sleep. This we  
have not been doing in the  
past, and if working sixteen  
hours per day aids health the  
Herald office force will be  
found on the job.

We have always had a de-  
sire to be an editor and until  
we have done this we shall  
not be satisfied. Others hav-  
similar desires: each accord-  
ing to his several ability, but  
our desires seem to be impell-  
ing. We do not have here  
all we are ambitious to have  
but the baby crawls before it  
walks. The challenge to build  
up this town with its various  
interests is now before us as a  
townspeople. The Herald is  
doing its best toward this end.

The Herald's editor is a lov-  
er of folks. This disposition  
led us at the first into the min-  
istry, but now that our health  
is forcing us to take up some  
other line of activity we are  
choosing the work of an editor.  
We feel there is a great ser-  
vice to be rendered in this way.  
It is our sincere desire to get  
in touch with the people with  
the view of helping them if  
we can, and certainly such  
service will be of great value  
to the general public. It may  
be the purpose of other news-  
paper men to make money; but  
such will not be the first object  
with us; our first purpose will  
be to serve the people who  
read our paper.

The editor was brought up

stooped may be the physical  
form because of the heavy  
load it has been laboring under  
it shall not matter to us how  
furrowed the face and hoary  
the hair because of hardships  
borne; it shall not matter to  
us how rough the hands and  
worn the "britches" because  
of hard work; it shall not  
matter to us how brown the  
skin because of exposure to  
sun, it is the moral character  
and the service men render our  
society that we shall give our  
attention to. In our way of  
thinking, many men who went  
to Abilene this week to see the  
distinguished Linbergh is just  
as great a man in his place in  
society as is Mr. Linbergh.
