

# **Enrollment down** in Snyder schools

District Superintendent Gayle Lo- (250 as compared to 304). max presented some figures to the board of trustees Thursday that

shows a decline in attendance. tending class in the system this year as compared to the same time in 1994. A look at 1993 indicates that figure is even greater — 152 less students.

Enrollment as of Jan. 6 was 3,384, compared to 3,522 in January of 1994 and 3,536 in the first month of 1993.

Enrollment at Snyder High School and at the Hobbs Alternative School is up 16 students from last year and 35 students from the year before. However, the freshman class begins to set the trend for declining enrollment as there are 11 less ninth graders this year enrollment is 273 currently and was 284 last January.

Enrollment at Snyder Junior High has decreased by 14 students from 575 to 561. There are 20 fewer seventh graders enrolled this year (274 to 294). And compared to 1993, in which 299 were enrolled, there are 25 fewer.

The greatest decline in enrollment is in the elementary grades. year as compared to 1994 and 190 Tuesday. fewer students than in 1993.

Overall elementary enrollment was 1,857 on Jan. 6, compared to 1,997 for January of 1994.

# Dry mouth, eyes may be Sjogren's

DEAR DR. GOTT: My sister has a very dry mouth continually and sometimes is unable to speak. She's been to many doctors, but no one seems to be able to help her.

DEAR READER: Without examining your sister, I cannot diagnose her condition. However, her doctors might wish to consider Sjogren's syndrome as a cause of her problem.

This disease, which is an autoimmune disorder, commonly affects people middle-aged and older, and is characterized by dry mouth and eyes. In addition, arthritis is often present.

The diagnosis is made by blood tests, especially those that measure SS-B antibodies (proteins that have been formed as part of the immune system). Also, a biopsy of the salivary glands may demonstrate the inflammation that marks Sjogren's syn-

Treatment consists of constantly wetting the mouth with liquids, chewing sugarless gum (to stimulate production of saliva) and using a mouth-

an underactive thyroid condition, anxiety, sleep difficulties and palpitations. Could it be related to my toothpasteswallowing habits?

DEAR READER: The inconsequential amount of toothpaste that may be swallowed during a brushing is not harmful. Specifically, the symptoms you mention are not caused by your practice of swallowing toothpaste.

My question is: Why do you do it? Dentifrice is to be used for cleaning the teeth; after this process, it should be spit out. Why complicate the issue? Use the toothpaste appropriately, then you won't have to worry about the effects it might have.

Your symptoms need to be addressed by your family doctor. In particular, you should be prescribed thyroid-replacement medicine, such as Synthroid, to treat this deficiency.

Also, you should be tested - with a cardiogram and, perhaps, a stress test - to discover the cause of your palpitations.

Finally, your anxiety (and the resulting insomnia) may require

Along with reviewing these health issues with your doctor, you should spend some time discussing your toothpaste swallowing behavior, because you may need some advice about overcoming this habit.





The declarer grumbled about his bad luck, unaware that he had made a mistake. There were two main chances for the contract: clubs 4-4 or the spade finesse working. As the latter could wait, South should have thought more about a possible even club break. To benefit from that, South would have to ruff two low clubs in his hand and still have a dummy entry left.

By now, you will have seen the right play. At trick one, South must unblock his heart king under West's ace. He wins the heart continuation in the dummy, ruffs a low club, plays a diamond to dummy's jack, ruffs another low club and draws trumps. Dummy is entered with a heart and the top clubs cashed. When they break, South claims. But if the clubs are not 4-4, the spade finesse is taken.

People associated with Winfrey's show could not be reached Thursday night. But Deborah Johns, a spokeswoman for the show was quoted by the Post as saying: "Oprah made a spontaneous admission to mothers battling drug addiction that she also had used drugs.'

"Oprah's words on the show are the best expression of how she feels," Johns told the Post. The newspaper said she declined to release a transcript of the show.

It quoted Gaines as saying Winfrey began to cry before making the admission to her guests. Gaines said Winfrey told her later that the drug use had been at the behest of a man that she was involved with when she was in her 20s and that when the two parted, she stopped using drugs.



#### Bosnian Serbs asked to talk

PALE, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Moving quickly while a fragile truce still holds, international negotiators asked Bosnian Serbs today to discuss terms of a lasting peace

In neighboring Croatia, the threat of renewed war grew with President Franjo Tudjman's order that U.N. peacekeepers leave his country. A U.N. pullout could reignite the Croats' 1991 war with ethnic Serbs, and violence in Croatia would be liable to spill over into Bosnia.

Mediators from the United States, Russia, Britain, France and Germany, had met Thursday in Sarajevo with officials of the Muslim-led Bosnian government. Details of the talks were not made public, and none of the participants answered questions from reporters afterward.

No details were immediately available on today's meeting with the Serbs in their stronghold in Pale, outside Sarajevo.

A peace plan drafted last summer by the five nations gave the Muslim-Croat majority 51 percent of Bosnian territory and Serbs 49 percent. The Serbs, who hold about 70 percent of Bosnia, repeatedly rejected the plan.

The mediators said last month that the plan could be modified by mutual consent. But the Bosnian government insists the Serbs accept the plan before negotiating details.

On Wednesday, the United Nations said it had secured agreement between the Bosnian government army, its Croat allies and Bosnian Serbs on expanding a

truce that took effect Jan. 1. The agreement committed the Serbs, who surround Sarajevo, to opening road access into the besieged city by Saturday and called for joint patrols of a demilitarized zone south of the capital.

Plans to open routes into Sarajevo snagged today. U.N. officials said Bosnian Serbs wanted to limit the traffic to civilians and humanitarian aid, while the government wanted to include commercial traffic.

# **Father** charged

#### Month-old son critically hurt

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - An unmarried man who paid a surrogate mother to bear his child was arrested after admitting he beat and critically injured the 1-monthold boy, police said.

Jonathan Alan Austin was in critical condition this morning at Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, spokeswoman Sara Jarvis

The father, James Alan Austin, 26, was charged with aggravated assault, endangering the welfare of a child and recklessly endangering another person, state police Cpl. Ralph D. Fiorenza said.

Jonathan was born Dec. 8. Police said Austin, a bank financial analyst from Hanover Township in northeastern Pennsylvania, admitted he beat and shook the boy several times since Christmas. Authorities said the abuse also included repeatedly spanking the boy, slapping his face and striking him on the back of the head with a plastic coat hanger.

Austin brought the unconscious child to Muhlenberg Hospital in Bethlehem on Sunday, where doctors found a fractured skull and internal head injuries. He was transferred to Children's Hospital, police said.

Austin was arrested on Sunday and remained in Northampton County Prison on Thursday in lieu of \$10,000 bail.

'In 1967, Janis was strange and freaky," said Melissa Etheridge, who inducted Joplin and sang her "Piece of My Heart." "I think today she would be pretty hip, alternative."

Many of the inductions were posthumous — Joplin, who overdosed on drugs in 1970; Zappa, killed by cancer two years ago; Berry Oakley and Duane Allman of the Allman Brothers, both victims of motorcycle accidents; drummer John Bonham of Led Zeppelin; and four of the five founding members of The Orioles.
