

J. W. 'Wes' Patton, Former County Official, Dies Tuesday in Abilene

CLYDE — Funeral services for J. W. "Wes" Patton, 76, were held Thursday, June 22, at 2 p. m. in Clyde church of Christ. Officiating were Roy Premister, minister, and John Estes, elder.

Burial was in the Eula Cemetery under the direction of Bailey Funeral Home. Mr. Patton died at 10 p. m. Tuesday in West Texas Medical Center, after a lengthy illness.

Mr. Patton served as deputy sheriff and acting sheriff of this county from 1947 until 1950. In 1950 he was elected Commissioner and served in that office until 1954. He also served on the Enterprise School Board. He moved to Big Spring and entered the race for constable and won that position in 1956, and later became deputy sheriff in 1958. He retired from that post in 1966.

He was associated with Cosden Petroleum Corporation in Big Spring from 1932 until 1942. He was born August 8, 1895 in Pattonville, near Paris. He married Dessie L. Merrick at Baird in 1917. They celebrated their 50th anniversary in 1967. He farmed and ranched in both Callahan and Howard counties.

During his high school days at Clyde High School, he was outstanding in sports, and led Clyde to the state championship in track in 1916. He played semi-pro baseball with the Cosden Oilers of Permian Basin League, as a catcher.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Cliff Patton of Big Spring; two daughters, Mrs. Bonnie Tubbs and Mrs. Zirah Bednar, both of Big Spring; two brothers, T. W. and Ray, Clyde; nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

ABILENE — Seven Clyde students have enrolled for the McMurry summer semester, according to Dr. Joe Humphrey, summer school directors.

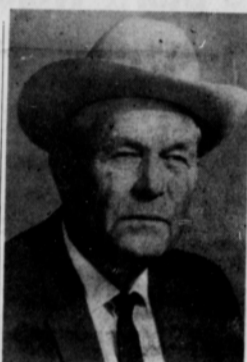

Work Begins on 22 Housing Units On Hwy 80 and Near High School

BAIRD — The preparation of the property for the construction of 22 units, and a community building, have been in full swing for the past two weeks. The building sites are on East Business 80 and near the Baird High School. Baird Housing Authority issued a proceed order effective June 12th, and contractors for the projects are Porter & Rhodes Construction, Inc., of Lawton, Okla.

Tone of cement, iron and other unsuable material is being removed from the project site on East Business 80, where two stations and a small cafe once stood. Drive-way cement

has been broken up in movable sizes and is being hauled from the site.

The Community building will be a great asset to our town with a building large enough for numerous organizations to meet, gatherings of family reunions and many other uses. The building will consist of 1808 square feet overall space, with complete kitchen facilities, assembly rooms, lobby and office areas.

East of the Community building will be 10 units built to rent for families who are on the list for a place to live, with 12 units being constructed near the school. The 22 units will ease the shortage of liveable housing here in Baird, which has proven to be somewhat of a problem in the past year.

Porter & Rhoads Construction Inc., announced that the buildings will be near completion in approximately 8 months.

The completion of the 22 units will make the third project for the Baird Housing Authority in the City of Baird.

Claud Holley, Manager of the Chamber of Commerce, is largely responsible for the success of these projects. His work with the Chamber, in cooperation with the Housing Authority has produced living quarters for families in this area. The 22 new units will bring the total to 50 units, ten of these close in to the downtown area, and 18 units on Eugenia and Girard Streets, in Northwest Baird.

Callahan County Ranked 130th In Oil & Gas Production in Texas

BAIRD — Sale of Callahan County oil and gas production accounted for \$4,562,638 of the county's economic output for 1971, according to a study by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assn.

In producing 1,192,725 barrels of crude oil and 2.4 billion cu. ft. of natural gas, the county ranked 130th in Texas. Value of its crude oil was \$4,198,392; natural gas value was \$364,246.

The county is among 190 Texas counties with oil and gas production value topping \$100,000, although 211 counties produce oil and gas.

"Callahan County oil and gas wells made a significant contribution to Texas' share of the nation's energy needs last year, but growing demand is sapping reserves in Texas faster than they can be replaced," Robert A. Buschman, Association president, said. "As fewer new fields are discovered, due to less drilling, the continuing strong economy and tax base of many Texas counties may now depend on updating Texas oil conservation laws to encourage wider use of new recovery technology," he said.

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OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

BY VERN SANFORD

A marvelous lake that fishermen can really enjoy is Lake Livingston. It's that beautiful body of water in Southeast Texas, between Huntsville and Livingston. It was built by the Trinity River Authority and the city of Houston about five years ago and is now full to overflowing.

Thousands of bass, crappie and catfish were planted in this new impoundment. Some of the bass now are of jumbo size.

Lake Livingston is located in a fertile area, where much of the brush has been left standing. Water runoff has been sufficient to provide a great deal of nutrition and frogs and crayfish are plentiful. All this adds to the food supply of the fish—which means quicker growth.

Lake Livingston, like all the other recently built East Texas lakes, has a great deal of brush. Engineers removed brush only in the main channel, which might someday be used for barge traffic on the Trinity River. In fact, Lake Livingston dam is the first to be built on that stream to provide for locks in anticipation of the river becoming navigable in the years ahead.

A good portion of the land adjacent to the lake is in private ownership. Unfortunately public access was not provided by the builders, although numerous recreational areas had been projected. But as soon as the lake was formed, land prices got out of range. Later, however, private developers began to move in and there still may be enough good sites left for recreational purposes.

Also, there is a large island in the lower end of the lake being developed for recreation and recreational housing. Already numerous mobile home sites have been constructed.

Both Livingston and Huntsville have ample motored accommodations only a few miles from the lake. There are numerous

places where bank fishing is convenient. Also several good launching ramps are available to those who trailer in their boats.

Physically, Lake Livingston is about three-fourths the size of Sam Rayburn Lake, which is but a few miles away. Characteristics of Lake Livingston are similar to Rayburn . . . lots of adjacent timberland and big stands of pine and hardwood.

So far Lake Livingston has been free of pollution, despite the fact that two big metropolitan cities are located upstream

on the Trinity River. Perhaps with the present drive against pollution, Lake Livingston waters may be kept clean. What will happen when and if the stream is made navigable is another question.

Information on the lake may be obtained by writing either the Livingston or the Huntsville Chamber of Commerce . . . or to the newspapers — the Enterprise at Livingston or the Item at Huntsville.

If you want a big weekend of fishing, give serious thought to this fine new body of water.

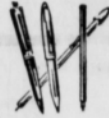

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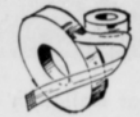
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Clyde Braves Win Two Games, Both Halted in Fourth Inning

MEXICO CITY — Mexico opened an institution of higher learning in the United States this week - in San Antonio. Why?

The answer to that question lies in the personality, leadership and goals of Mexico President Luis Echeverria Alvarez. The new dynamic President of Mexico is visiting in the U. S. this week to discuss a couple of major problem areas between Mexico and this country.

If his track record here comes close to his achievements in Mexico since his inauguration December 1, 1970, he will go back home with some commitments about the Mexican laborers in California and the salinity problems of the Mexicali Valley caused by the Colorado River water.

His visit to Texas gave this state a clue to his major goals in Mexico. He dedicated the San Antonio Cultural Institute - located in Heriasfair's Mexico pavilion. It is symbolic of the principal changes Echeverria is attempting in Mexico's way of life.

His enthusiasm and determination to solve Mexico's problems has become contagious among all government leaders in his country.

His common workday is 12 to 14 hours - with no complaints from Mexico's government leaders and their staffs.

There is no "siesta" in Mexican governmental circles these days. The new leadership in Mexico is determined also to get rid of the "manana" image - and turn it to "today and tomorrow."

They recognize internal problems - and have programs to do something about them.

"Most of Mexico's problems can be solved by education," Echeverria believes.

His program for educational reform in Mexico points out the fact that he means what he says.

Echeverria anticipated the country's education problems before he started his six-year term as president (a president may not succeed himself in that country).

"President Echeverria studied the country's population statistics and discovered that 500,000 children per year will be entering the elementary education program," states Mexico's Secretary of Education Victor Bravo Ahuja.

"Mexico has a population of 50,000,000 - half of which is in the rural areas. One-fourth of the population is between six and 14 years of age. There were no schools for 150,000 students wanting to enter elementary school.

"More than 12,000 new teachers must be trained each year to educate these new students," the Secretary of Education continued.

Mexico will have 11,000,000 or one-fifth of its entire population in elementary school this year. Only 57 percent of the elementary school students finish grade school - and this is up from 45 percent two years ago. Echeverria's goal is to get 75 percent of the grade school students into high school.

He does not believe all high school graduates should go to college. (There are 133,000 students attending the University of Mexico this year).

Echeverria has more than doubled the budget for technical institutes. Although the cost of colleges is only \$12 to \$15 a year tuition in Mexico, the Mexico President is trying to direct high school graduates into technical and trade institutions.

"We believe that is a mistake to send everyone to a university. The President's education policy has three principal points," the Secretary of Education relates, "giving students a chance to accept every educational opportunity, get into their working lives without frustration, and the economic opportunity to reveryone to be educated."

Here are some other facts and figures given to newsmen by Mexico's Secretary of Education Victor Bravo Ahuja.

27 percent of the national budget (up 23 percent from last year) goes to education.

66 percent of the people on Mexico's federal government payroll work in education.

83 percent of education in Mexico is financed now by the Federal government.

With all of this interest on education - it is easy to see why President Echeverria wanted to open a Mexican educational institution in San Antonio.

More buildings will be added later, classrooms, labs and a library. Operated by the Secretary of Foreign Affairs Emilio O. Rabasa, the Institute will feature classes in Spanish for four levels, also anthropology, literature and Mexican history.

Exhibits of Mexican arts and crafts, Mexican painting and excavation of ancient temples will be featured also.

DEMOCRATS CONVENE — George Wallace and George McGovern were high-point winners in Texas delegate strength for presidential nomination at last week's stormy, marathon state Democratic convention.

Democrats milled around for more than 15 hours before they could agree on the slate of 130 Texas delegates who will attend the party's national presidential nominating convention.

Wallace got 42 of the delegates, McGovern 34, Hubert Humphrey 21, and 33 are uncommitted.

Main fireworks at the long-drawn-out convention came on the election of the largely-ceremonial vice-chairman. State Democratic Executive Committee Chairman Roy Orr of DeSoto was defeated 2,125 votes to 1,795 by Mrs. Eddie Bernice Johnson of Dallas, a black nominee for state Representative.

Gubernatorial nominee Dolph Briscoe had his way with other convention offices and nomination of Democratic national committeeman and committeewoman. Jess Hay of Dallas will be the new committeeman and Mrs. Roland (Jane) Blumberg of Seguin, the new committeewoman. Calvin Guest of Bryan served as convention chairman.
