Reese earns ATC TOPS safety honor

The 64th Flying Training Wing is the winner of the 1974 Air Training Command (ATC) Undergraduate Pilot Training TOPS Trophy.

The trophy is the highest award presented by ATC in recognition of an outstanding flight safety program. It is awarded to the wing with the lowest aircraft accident rate during a calendar year.

The 64th FTW, which last won the trophy in 1971, flew more than 157,000 hours with a zero accident rate.

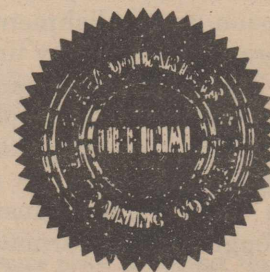
Two other undergraduate pilot training wings — the 29th at Craig AFB, Ala., and the 71st at Vance AFB, Okla. — also were accident free during 1974. Reese was selected the TOPS trophy winner because the 64th FTW had accumulated more flying hours since its last accident.



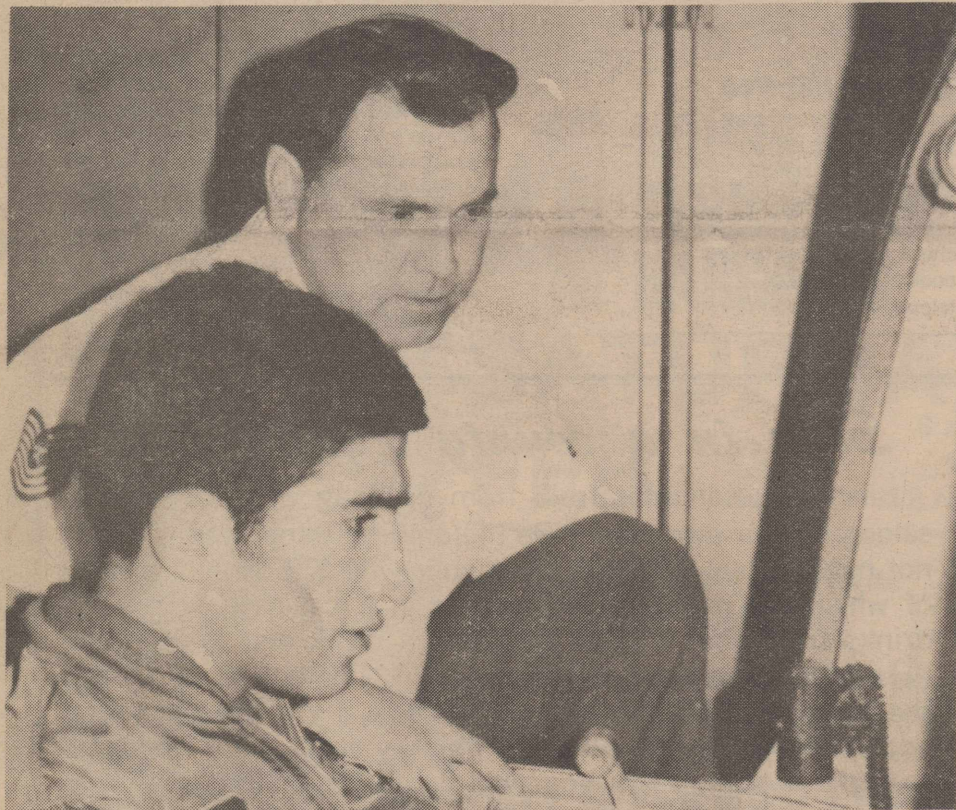

The Air Training Command UPT TOPS Trophy is awarded to the 64 Flying Training Wing, Reese Air Force Base, Texas, for outstanding achievement in aircraft accident prevention for Calendar Year 1974. The 64 Flying Training Wing achieved the most significant undergraduate pilot training record by maintaining a zero accident rate since 21 Jan 1973 while flying over 157,000 hours. The conservation of training resources, through a sustained and effective accident prevention program, perpetuates the highest traditions and standards in the field of flight safety. This achievement places the 64 Flying Training Wing TOPS in the Air Training Command Flight Safety Program and reflects great credit upon the 64 Flying Training Wing and the United States Air Force.

The NCOIC of the T-37 Instrument Trainer Section has been named the Outstanding Senior NCO of the Year for 1974.

MSgt. Nicholas Olenik was nominated for the honor by Lt. Col. William V. Finn, 64th Student Squadron commander.

Sergeant Olenik's job requires a close working tie with the 35th Flying Training Squadron in scheduling student pilots for instrument trainer sorties and all aspects of his trainers' abilities.

Colonel Finn cited Sergeant Olenik's ability. "His superb knowledge of management enables him to consistently achieve outstanding results in the use of his resources." His efforts toward getting the utmost use from the T-37 instrument trainers has also paid off well. The effective use of the trainers from Sergeant Olenik's scheduling is now averaging 90 per cent, whereas other Air Training Command bases are averaging 80 per cent use.

During the most recent ATC inspector general visit, Sergeant Olenik's section was found error free and was cited for providing excellent support to the local flying program. Colonel Finn further praised him for his efforts, "Sergeant Olenik is always willing to interrupt his supervisory duties in order to provide more instruction to a student with problems."

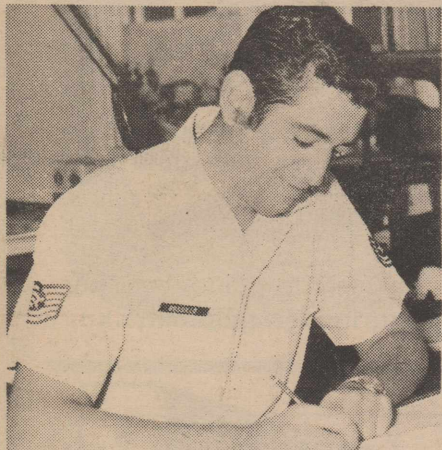
In the area of self-improvement, Sergeant Olenik has spent much time increasing his personal knowledge. He has also amassed 14 semester hours of college credit in his off-duty time from South Plains College. He is now enrolled in seven semester hours of classes and is taking the senior NCO course from the Extension Course Institute.

Sergeant Olenik has done his part to enhance base-community relations through his hobby of auto racing. Not only does he promote racing but driving safety is emphasized on and off the track. He is the vice president and publicity chairman for a local racing association, and uses this position to promote the image of the Air Force.

The nominating letter from Colonel Finn concluded, "Sergeant Olenik's leadership has been fundamental to the outstanding support of his unit and the excellent esprit de corps of his men. He exemplifies the highest standards of the NCO corps. He displays the fine character, technical expertise, and the knowledge of human relations so necessary in today's Air Force."

"His enthusiasm, superior ability and excellent military bearing make him a great asset to the Air Force and well deserving of the honor of 64th Flying Training Wing Outstanding Senior NCO of the Year."

Rossillo garners Wing NCO of Year honor

"The most qualified surveyor at Reese" has been named Wing NCO of the Year by a board that met recently.

TSgt. Alexander Rosillo Jr. was given that title by Maj. Valerio A. Santos, commander of the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron (CES), partly because of his work toward the building of multimillion-dollar simulator building which will begin to be built at Reese soon. Working against a very short deadline, Sergeant Rossillo worked overtime to prepare the plans needed for the huge building. Major Santos noted that the plans were of extremely high quality and rated praise from the project officer at Air Training Command headquarters.

Another Short Suspense

Assigned to the Engineering and Construction Branch of the 64th CES, Sergeant Rossillo prepared the site and utility plans for the 1976 Military

Construction Program projects. These were also prepared to meet a short suspense. While the Electrical Engineer was away on temporary duty, Sergeant Rossillo derived all the data for these plans, a job often done by a graduate electrical engineer.

Sergeant Rossillo also assumed the duties of a pavements engineering technician when the former technician retired. Major Santos said, "Calling upon his vast experience, Sergeant Rossillo made the required changes to a taxiway repair project, thus enabling the design section to complete the project."

Sergeant Rossillo is in charge of all surveying at Reese.

The sergeant has won many Wing honors during his tour here. He has been named both his Squadron's and the 64th Flying Training Wing's NCO of the Quarter. He has also been named 64th

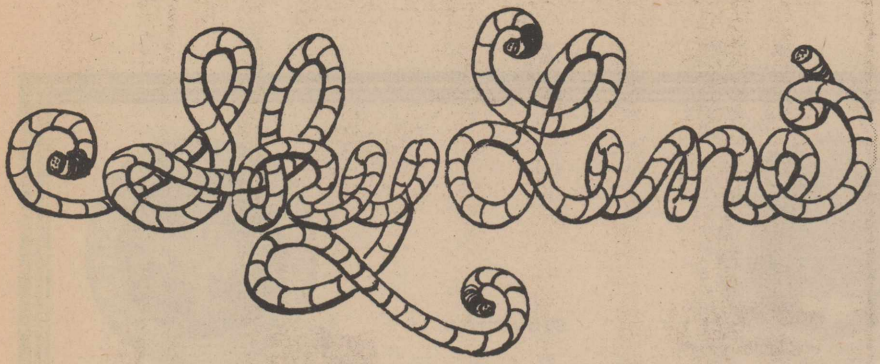
CES NCO of the Year and now he has won the same honor for the Wing.

Furthering Education

Sergeant Rossillo is taking off-duty college courses in management and engineering. He has finished the required courses for an associate degree in management and has amassed enough credits to be classed as a sophomore at Texas Tech University's Civil Engineering School.

"As a result of his education, Sergeant Rossillo has been able to assist the engineering staff in the solution of complex problems. With the shortage of engineers in the 64th CES during the past year, his aid has been invaluable in the detailed design of several pavement projects and the Youth Center project," said Major Santos.

During the summer months Sergeant Rossillo coaches a Little League baseball team for about 10 hours a week.

Code of Ethics

Any person in Government service should:

Put loyalty to the highest moral principles and to country above loyalty to persons, party, or Government department.

Uphold the Constitution, laws, and legal regulations of the United States and of all governments therein and never be a party to their evasion.

Give a full day's labor for a full day's pay; giving to the performance of his duties his earnest effort and best thought.

Seek to find and employ more efficient and economical ways of getting tasks accomplished.

Never discriminate unfairly by the dispensing of special favors or privileges to anyone, whether for remuneration or not; and never accept for himself or his family, favors or benefits under circumstances which might be construed by reasonable persons as influencing the performance of his governmental duties.

Make no private promises of any kind binding upon the duties of office, since a Government employee has no private word which can be binding on public duty.

Engage in no business with the Government, either directly or indirectly, which is inconsistent with the conscientious performance of his governmental duties.

Never use any information coming to him confidentially in the performance of governmental duties as a means for making private profit.

Expose corruption wherever discovered.

Uphold these principles, ever conscious that public office is a public trust.

Don't let leisure cooking turn into tragedy

A recent grass fire in Reese Village, which seemed to be caused by careless outdoor cooking, points out the fact that many people do not know what to do and what not to do when cooking outdoors.

The Reese Fire Protection Branch has released some good DOs and DON'Ts to guide you when you use your barbecue grill:

DOs

- DO use only approved charcoal (not cigarette lighter) fluids, kindling or paper to start charcoal.
- DO store your lighter fluid in your locked carport. Remember this equation: Kids + Matches + Fuel = Fire.
- DO cook downwind of your house if the winds are gentle.

DON'Ts

- Don't light or use charcoal broilers on porches or in carports.
- Don't use gasoline, alcohol or other flammables not approved for lighting charcoal.
- Don't add more lighter fluid to help a struggling fire along.
- Don't leave the broiler unattended.
- Don't cook on your grill any closer than 20 feet from any building.
- Do use only approved charcoal (not cigarette lighter) fluids, kindling or paper to start charcoal.

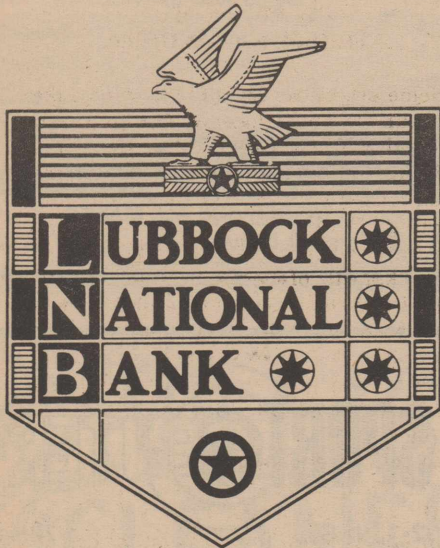

Buyers, beware of carpet ripoffs

(Editor's note: This is the first of a special series *THE ROUNDUP* will print from time to time to alert Reese consumers, so that they may get the best products and services for their dollars. These articles were prepared by the Texas Attorney General's office.)

total of, say, 80 square yards, for the same price as another three rooms with a total of on 60 square yards.

According to complaints which have been received by my Consumer Protection Division, this sort of advertising has been used as a come-on for what is known as "bait-and-switch."

Unless a homeowner has some sound knowledge of textiles, or knows just whom to turn to for expert advice, it can be extremely difficult to know how to purchase carpeting.

If you have decided that carpeting all or part of your home will give it that finishing touch, you are headed toward a major — and expensive — step in home improvement.

But where do you go from there? You may have formed some basic ideas about hue or color, and know wether you'll settle for shag or sheared type of carpeting.

You may start watching carpet ads, and confusion can set in.

Various Prices

A similar type of carpeting may be advertised at various rates. You must check to see if the listed price is for the carpeting only, or whether it includes cost of installation — a substantial item. And, does the installation estimate also include the price of padding to put under the carpet?

This sort of variation in pricing is not necessarily an indication of misrepresentation of total cost. Since some flooring firms contract out their installation work, their only interest is in showing you the actual carpet cost. Others include it in a package.

The usual guide to carpeting cost is in terms of so many dollars per square yard. And while some volume sellers market carpet by the linear foot, for the do-it-yourselfer, most flooring specialists consider the per-square-yard estimate to be the consumer's easiest indication of expense, without unnecessary waste of material.

If you run across an offer of carpeting quoted by the cost per square foot, beware. This can be misleading.

The same holds true for the type of advertising which boasts that you can have "three rooms carpeted for as little as _____."

Obviously, it would be impossible to cover three rooms containing a

That means that after a consumer goes to see goods boosted at a special price, the salesman disparages the quality of the material, and tries to talk the person into accepting a better grade of merchandise instead of the one advertised.

"Bait-and-switch" is one of the deceptive trade practices which is prohibited under the new Deceptive Practices-Consumer Protection Act.

Other prohibited practices include advertising that a product, such as carpeting, is on sale, when in fact it is not; misrepresenting that high quality carpeting can be purchased at a special price because it is left over from a commercial contract, when that is not true, and claiming that carpeting is "guaranteed," if no written guaranty is furnished to the customer.

Since carpeting is a major investment for any homeowner, it would be well worth your while to bone up on the differences in carpet qualities and prices. Literally, hundreds of carpet choices are available on the market, and if you understand your needs, it is quite possible to find a real bargain.

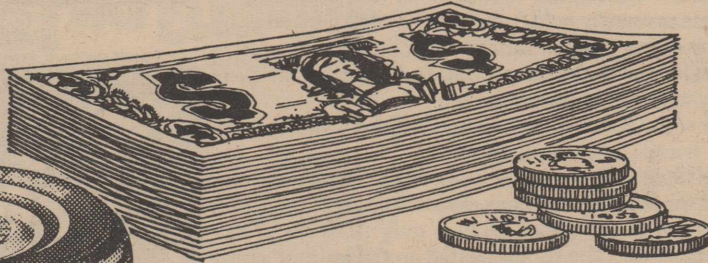
Accredited consumer guides and governmental textiles brochures and county home demonstration agents can be helpful in making your selection.

And do not hesitate to shop around, too, when it comes to financing the cost of carpeting. Compare the interest rates offered by the merchant, and the rates available through home improvement loans offered by savings and other lending institutions.

If you do encounter any deceptive practices, feel free to contact your local county or district attorney, or one of the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division offices in Austin, San Antonio, Dallas, Houston, Lubbock or El Paso.

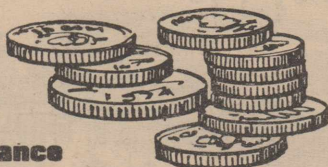

Veterinarian deals with rabies myth



(Editors note: It has been noted by the base Veterinarian, Dr. (Capt.) G.M. Stay, that many pet owners on and off base, are not having their pets vaccinated. This is written to present and attempt to refute some of the wrong ideas people have about rabies shots. It is also designed as a survey, asking Reese pet owners why they do not have their animals vaccinated.)

1. Rabies has not recently been found in this state, county or town.
 A: Texas is the number one state in the nation as far as number of cases, with 361 cases reported in 1974. Four of these cases, (one each cat, skunk, fox and bovine), were found in Howard County, which is just a few miles south of Reese. With the stray dog population that Lubbock "supports", this town is "ripe" for a rabies outbreak. An outbreak in El Paso, Tex. last summer had over 60 dogs diagnosed as rabid. Vaccinate your pets, just in case our town is next. Rabies is invariably fatal to both pets and humans, so protect your pet, yourself and your children before it is too late.

2. The shots hurt my pet so much that I do not feel it is worth it.
 A: The rabies shots are no more painful than an antibiotic shot a doctor gives you. The vaccine is given in the muscle of the hind limb and the pet may feel a slight soreness for four to six hours. Exercise is usually the best treatment - walk your pet. The benefits of the vaccine (protecting the pet from rabies) greatly outweigh the small amount of discomfort that a pet will feel.

3. Rabies is not important to me; it's the last thing in my mind. I am more concerned with caring for and feeding my family during these inflationary times.
 A: If you own pets, then you have a responsibility to see that they are cared for. You say the number one item on your mind is caring for your family. I suggest you care for them in part by protecting them from rabies. Have your pet vaccinated!

4. The base regulation and the State law requiring rabies vaccination is not enforced, so why bother?
 The Reese Chief of Security Police says that Wing Reg 125-6 requires that all dogs and cats over 12 weeks of age have a rabies shot and that it be repeated yearly. Disobeying this regulation will be just cause for removal of their pet from the base. He also says that spot check surveys of base housing will be made to insure that all pets are vaccinated.

5. The cost of the vaccination is too high.
 A: The Base Veterinary Service provides rabies vaccine at near cost. If an owner cannot afford \$1 for vaccine, then he should not have a pet because he cannot afford to feed it (pet require an average of \$100 to \$150 worth of feed each year).

6. The hours of the clinic are hard to meet since both my wife and I work.
 A: The vaccination clinic is presently held from 8 to 11 a.m. Wednesday by appointment only. The time owners spend having their pets vaccinated is time well spent and supervisors should know that and see that all their people are given time from work to do this.

7. Cats do not need rabies shots because they are not as likely to get rabies as dogs.
 A: Cats are just as likely to get rabies as are dogs. Many cats roam the neighborhood at night and for that reason their chances of running into a rabid skunk, fox, cat or dog are pretty good. All cats over 12 weeks of age should be vaccinated for rabies, with the shot repeated on the animal's first birthday and every year at that time for the rest of the cat's life.

8. My cat runs loose and is never at home on my appointment day.
 A: When you set a date you should keep your cat penned up so it will be there when that day arrives. If you live on base or in town, you are breaking the law by letting your pet run loose.

9. My pet never goes out of doors and I do not think he will have a chance to get rabies.
 A: I honestly doubt that any pet is so confined that it never gets outside. What if you leave the door open one day? What about vacation or trips to the country? Do you ever walk your pet? Did you know that bats have been found in buildings on this base? Have you ever noticed a stray in your yard? I would suggest you have the animal vaccinated for rabies and play it safe, even though your pet is confined to the home.

10. The hassle of taking my pet to the clinic and waiting 30 to 45 minutes is not worth it.
 A: Very seldom, if ever, does a person have to wait 30 to 45 minutes to see the Veterinarian. Appointments are set up every five minutes and if you arrive at your appointed time then you can expect to spend 10 to 15 minutes per appointment. If you arrive early or late it will take longer.

New info issues on commissary

Further information about the recent commissary issue has been received.

THE ROUNDUP announced last week that commissary patrons throughout the Armed Forces would begin bearing more of the cost of the stores' operating expenses than in the past, as a result of measures to cut down Federal spending. The article said that patrons would begin paying about half of the costs, supported by appropriated funds before, starting Oct. 1 of this year, followed by the patrons assuming all of the costs a year later.

This will be done through a surcharge increase, an item in Air Force News Service (AFNS) revealed. The present surcharge of three per cent will be increased to five per cent Oct. 1. Then, on Oct. 1, 1976, all of the operating costs will be borne by store patrons, raising the surcharge another three to five per cent.

The surcharge fees are used to buy such things as paper bags, meat trays, and plastic wraps. They are also used to replace cash registers, scales and freezer wrap.

The AFNS article went on to say, "On Feb. 18 a Department of Defense committee consisting of military service representatives has convened at the Pentagon to review the commissary organization and examine possible further concepts of operations."

"Officials emphasized that any proposed changes that impact on management procedures have yet to be approved by Congress. They said a clearer picture will be presented to the field as soon as Congressional action has been taken," AFNS concluded.

ATC woman nets \$2,500 for idea

Randolph AFB, Tex. (ATCPS) - The combination of an Air Force Form 1000 and an idea can be a winner, both for the Air Force and the suggestor.

Case in point: Mrs. Gayle S. Johnson, a civilian employee of the 3560th Air Base Group, Webb AFB, Tex. Her idea was simple, but it earned her a \$2,500 cash award and eliminated delays and sometimes hardships for other members of the Air Force.

Mrs. Johnson suggested putting on separation orders the maximum distance that personal property may be shipped by members separated from the service in a nonpay status.

The suggestion, approved for Air Force-wide adoption, will require changes to Air Force Regulation 10-7 (Administrative Orders) and Air Force Manual 75-4 (Movement and Storage of Personal Property).

This will help Air Force personnel by eliminating delayed pickup of personal property. It will save the Air Force money by eliminating unnecessary storage and associated charges.

Ideas do not have to be complex to save money or earn cash awards. One evaluator of Mrs. Johnson's suggestion wrote: "As simple a process as this may appear, it is one of the more beneficial suggestions received . . . over the past several years."

Got an idea? Put it on an AF Form 1000. The maximum allowable cash award is \$25,000 for both military and civilian personnel, so the stakes can be high.

Suggestion forms are easily available. If you need advice, check with Fred Flewelling at the base Suggestion Program Office, Ext. 2823.

Know when your home state will hold elections

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Certain states will hold primary and general elections in 1975. The states and election information follow:

(1) Wisconsin will hold a general election April 1, 1975, to select one state supreme court justice and other judicial officers along with local officials.

(2) Kentucky will hold a primary election May 27, 1975, to nominate candidates for the following offices: governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, auditor, clerk of court of appeals, commissioner of agriculture, judicial officers, three railroad commissioners, secretary of state, one-half of state senate membership, state representatives, superintendent of public instruction, and treasurer.

(3) Mississippi will hold its primary June 3, 1975, to nominate candidates for governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, auditor, commissioner of agriculture, three highway commissioners, insurance commissioner, land commissioner,

all members of the legislative, three public utilities commissioners, secretary of state, one state supreme court clerk, two state supreme court justices, superintendent of education, and state treasurer.

(4) New Jersey will hold a primary June 3, 1975, to nominate members of the general assembly (lower house of the legislature).

(5) Virginia will hold a primary June 10, 1975, to nominate members of its general assembly (entire legislature).

Kentucky, Mississippi, New Jersey, and Virginia will hold their respective general elections Nov. 4, 1975, to choose officials from the candidates nominated in the primaries.

Locked gas caps hold overseas shipments up

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Locking gasoline tank caps and other antisiphoning devices are complicating the shipment of

privately owned vehicles (POVs) for overseas.

The Military Traffic Management Command (MTMC) requires fuel tanks to be drained at the departure port. Cars with locked gas caps or antisiphoning springs installed must be drained by pumping the gasoline through the fuel line at the point where the line enters the fuel pump.

Employees of MTMC may not forcibly remove the gas cap lock, anti-theft spring, or any other device attached to the automobile.

In an effort to reduce possible delays in processing POVs, MTMC has asked the voluntary cooperation of owners. Vehicles with a locking gas cap must have caps replaced with a nonlocking cap or an extra key must be available for the processing section along with the automobile. If installed, the antisiphoning spring should be removed prior to delivery to the port. Minimum fuel should be left in vehicles on turn in.

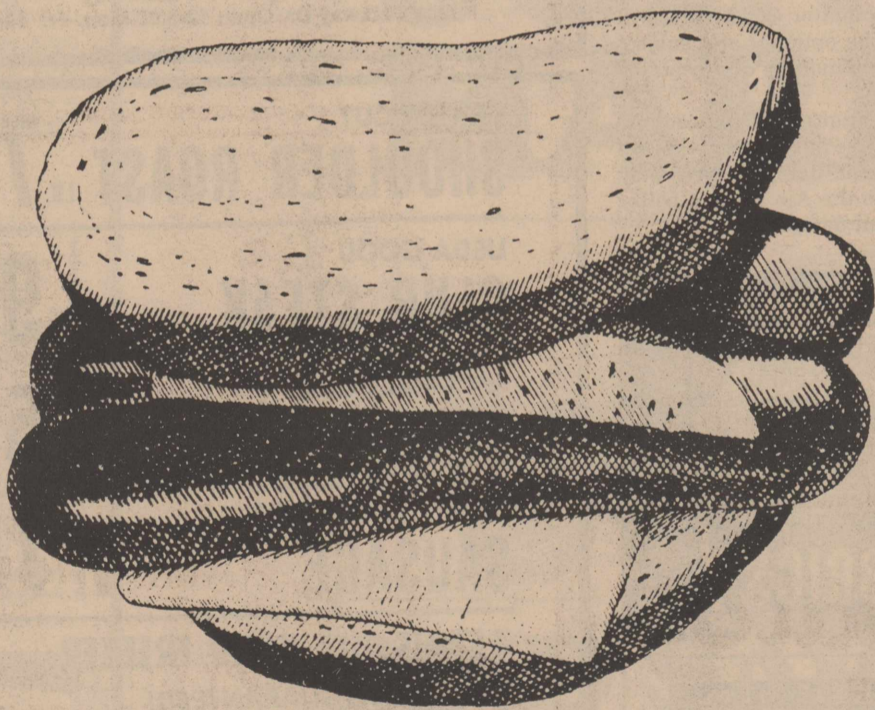

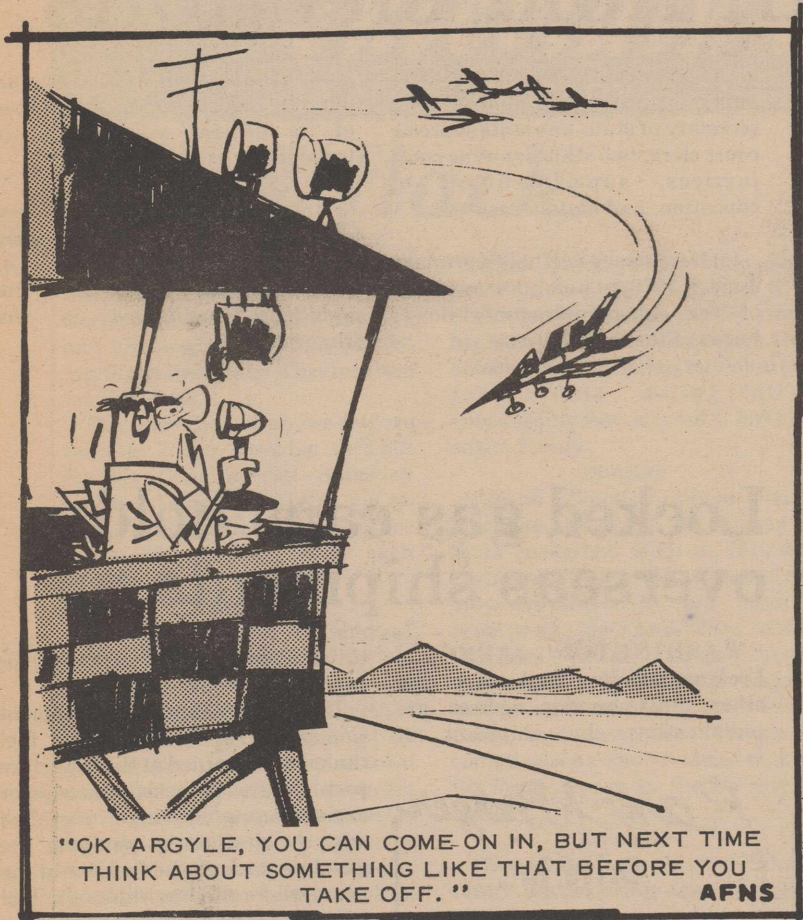

CU findings back cold detergent use

WASHINGTON (AFNS)—New Consumers Union (CU) findings that detergents can get clothes clean in cold water point the way to reduced fuel bills and conservation of the nation's energy resources.

Tests of laundry detergents indicated that all those examined, even one that did not make cold-water claims, produced cold-water washes that looked as clean as those done with hot water. CU points out that slight differences could be detected with instruments, but not with the unaided eye.

Consumers may save as much as \$50 a year by washing in cold water—a potential national saving of \$2 billion a year in energy.

Two no-phosphate detergents with a sodium carbonate "builder"—a water softening and cleansing agent—proved generally most effective in CU's tests. They outperformed the high-phosphate detergent, except in soft water. Those formulas with silicate or citrate builders or no builder at all did not perform as well in either hard or soft water, as those with a carbonate builder.

None of the six detergents tested were very effective in removing mustard, lipstick or other difficult stains, or in bleaching.

No-phosphate detergents, particularly those with carbonate builders, may eventually nullify flame retardants in children's sleepwear, CU reported. To restore the flame retardant qualities, the government recommends adding a cup of vinegar to the rinse cycle.

No-Good Gadgets

Also, many gas-saving automobile gadgets have no significant effect on mileage, according to tests conducted for Consumers Union.

The union's October report also says that claims of reduced automobile exhaust emissions were not borne out in testing. One device actually increased emissions and lessened engine performance. Many of the devices also claim to increase horsepower; all those tested failed to do so, according to the report.

To achieve maximum engine efficiency, invest in an engine tuneup, keep tires properly inflated, and drive slowly; save money by not buying add-on gadgets that do not work, CU advises.

OER survey discusses inflation

"Everything you've wanted to know about the new officer evaluation report (OER) system but probably were afraid to ask..."

The following is the second installment of an eight-part series on the new OER system. The answers to the questions were provided by Lt. Gen. John W. Roberts, Air Force Deputy Chief of Staff for Personnel.

Question: Most officers agree that something had to be done about OER inflation. That translates into some kind of control system. However, why did a completely new evaluation system have to be implemented? Why didn't the Air Force simply direct that only 22 per cent of officers get "9s," 28 per cent "8s," and 50 per cent "7s" or lower?

Answer: The new officer evaluation system is more than just a "rating control scheme." We should not lose sight of the fact that it also includes several major changes in rating philosophy and administrative format and style.

Philosophically, the new OER system requires an officer's job performance to be measured against job performance standards. These evaluations are not subject to rating controls. The more traditional contemporary evaluation has not been totally abandoned, however. It will still be used to obtain an "evaluation of potential" from the reviewer, which is the only rating subject to rating controls.

These changes in rating concepts allow the rater to focus or concentrate on providing a better performance evaluation. The reviewer, in turn, can use this input and other aids to assist him in determining the final "evaluation of potential."

These changes are intended to foster evaluation objectivity. They also recognize the strong preference expressed by the Air Force officers participating in the Air Force Human Resources Lab's field tests for job performance evaluations.

The form was also redesigned to accommodate several administrative changes which allow for a more flexible format. These changes allow the Air Force to employ the "exception" principle. Instead of recording several lines of a duty description, for example, the officer's duty title and the unique aspects of his job will be highlighted. Instead of requiring several paragraphs of justification for an evaluation, only the "exceptional" job performance ratings need to be justified and these justifications are to be in the form of specific examples placed immediately below the rating. Finally, evaluator comments will generally be optional and subject only to the standards of acceptable English.

Such changes in philosophy, administrative format, and style are not superficial. In my opinion, they will provide the Air Force a better management device.

Other directors of the Center are Lynne Swinney and Juan Gonzales.

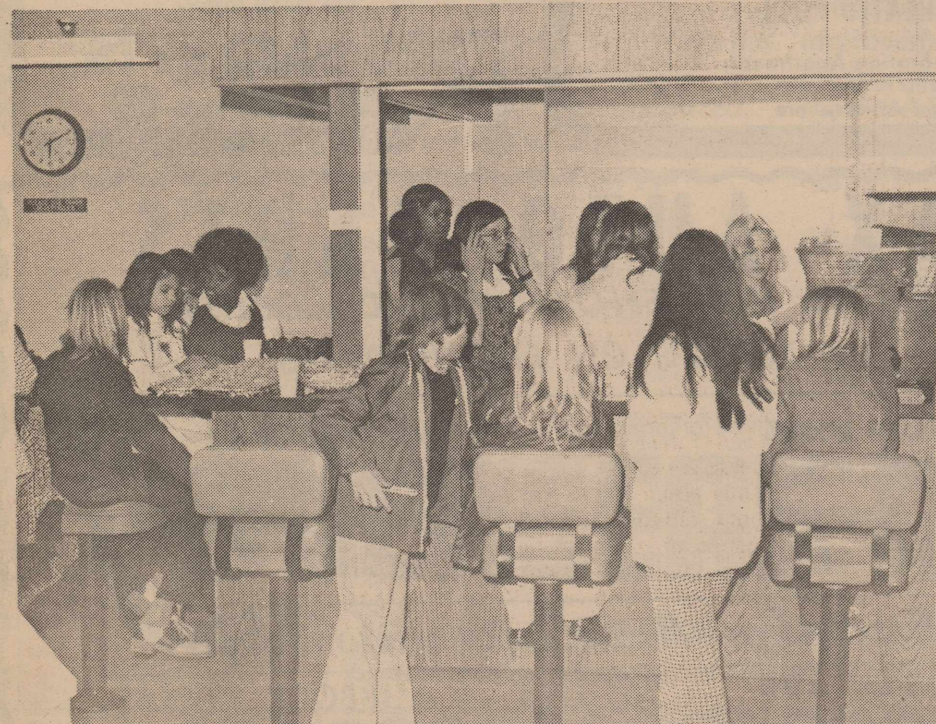

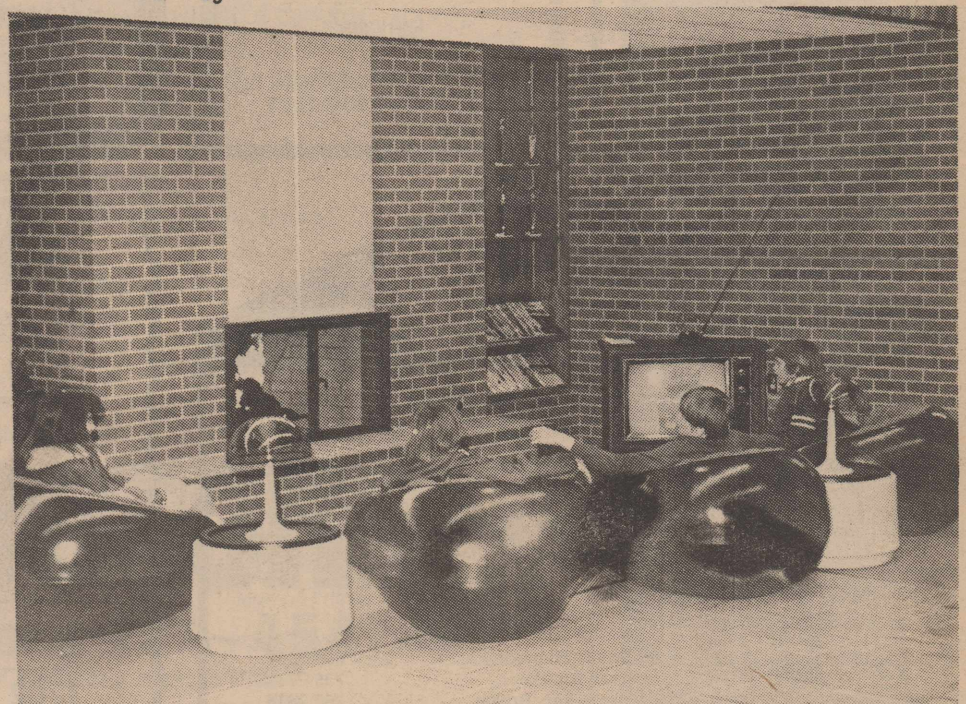

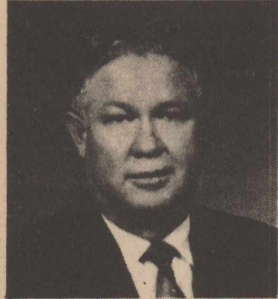

The second term was marked by the army camp and the hospital ministries and work among young people. They continued their military evangelism in Cong Hoa military hospital during their third term. They then were asked to transfer to the Dalat School for special ministries to the end of their term.

A recent decision by the Air Force Uniform Board allows women in the Air Force to wear a new style uniform. The board approved a blue pantsuit as an optional uniform for women officers and enlisted women. The uniform's specifications, type of material and availability date are not known yet. In another decision, the Air Force has amended its uniform regulations to allow Air Force women to wear oxfords and shoes with patent leather finish with their uniforms. Previously, military women could wear Corfam shoes with the uniform but not patent leather finish shoes.

Bring LES, remember travel obligations, too

A change in the Accounting and Finance system was made in December 1974.

To conserve paper and halt excess filing, Accounting and Finance no longer maintains a file copy of each member's Leave and Earnings Statement (LES) in his or her finance records. If you visit Finance to ask a question about your pay, bring your LES with you.

By having quick access to you LES, the pay clerk can cut by one-third the time needed to answer your question. The time saved will make your visit easier for you, quicker for us and more convenient for the next person waiting in line.

The need for complying with permanent change of station (PCS), temporary duty (TDY) and permissive TDY does not end when the travel itself is over.

Each person is charged to fill out a travel voucher within five work days of the end of their travel. Even if there is no money involved, a travel voucher still has to be filed.

Many people feel that once they receive the advance payment that their responsibility has ended. Even though a person may have received all the money to which he or she is entitled, we must prove that the person was supposed to get that amount received.

In the case of permissive TDY, where there are no funds involved, we must show whether the member entered a leave status at any time during the travel. In most cases, the travel voucher may allow the member more travel pay, than he or she received in the advance.

Travel vouchers are vital part of travel and members have a duty to complete them as soon and as accurately as they can.

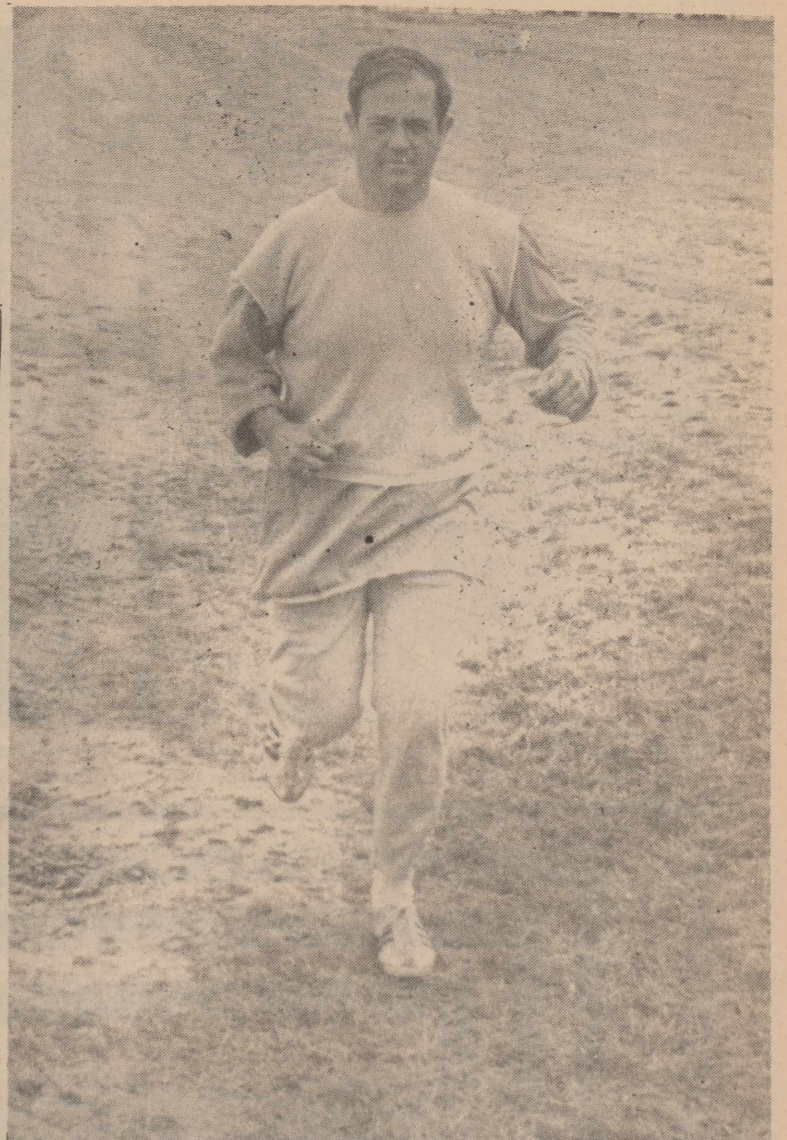
