General Roberts takes over top ATC post

Randolph AFB, Tex. (ATCPS) - Lt. Gen. John W. Roberts assumed command of Air Training Command (ATC) Aug. 29, replacing Lt. Gen. George H. McKee.

General McKee, ATC commander since August 1974, retired during the formal change of command ceremonies, ending a 35-year military career. He will make Lakeland, Fla., his home.

General Roberts voiced the traditional "I assume command, sir," to General William V. McBride, a former ATC commander and the new Air Force vice chief of staff. Also attending the command change was David P. Taylor, assistant secretary of the Air Force for Manpower and Reserve Affairs.

No Stranger

No stranger to the command or the San Antonio area, General Roberts was an operations officer at ATC headquarters here in 1957 and 1958. As the former deputy chief of staff personnel at U.S. Air Force headquarters, General Roberts was responsible for developing Air Force poliby on all personnel matters, including ATC's mission of recruiting and training over 80,000 young men and women each

A native of Mankato, Minn., General Roberts began his military career in March 1943 as an aviation cadet. After earning his pilot's wings and commission in 1944, he served at Luke Field, Ariz., as an instructor pilot for two years.

After serving in Korea as a fighter pilot, flight commander and operations officer with the 4th Tactical Fighter Wing, General Roberts was assigned to ATC headquarters, then at Scott AFB, Ill., as a research and development and education and training officer.

After attending the Air Command and Staff College at Maxwell AFB, Ala., in 1957, he commanded the 3529th Combat Crew Training Squadron at Williams AFB, Ariz. He came to ATC headquarters at Randolph in late 1957 as an operations officer in the office of the deputy chief of staff for plans and operations.

Many Staff Jobs

In the years since, General Roberts has served in several command and staff positions in the United States, Hawaii, and at Air Force headquarters in the Pentagon. From 1968 to August 1970 he commanded the F-4 equipped 366th Tactical Fighter Wing at Da Nang AB, Republic of Vietnam, and later served as director of the Tactical Air Control Center at Seventh Air Force, Tan Son Nhut Airfield, Vietnam.

Since August 1970 General Roberts has served at Air Force headquarters, holding positions as deputy director, and later director, of personnel plans; assistant

deputy chief of staff for personnel and, finally, deputy chief of staff for personnel.

In the latter position, General Roberts assumed responsibility for the management of Air Force military and civilian personnel, insuring that skilled people were available for worldwide requirements. Besides recruiting, training, and education, General Roberts developed Air Force procedures for assignment, career development, promotion and separation of personnel.

As ATC commander, he will be responsible for all initial Air Force training - military, technical and flying - plus all Air Force recruiting activities. The command has more than 120,000 personnel at its 15 major installations throughout the country.

Education Background

General Roberts earned a bachelor of science degree from Mankato State Teachers' College, Minn., in 1942. He received his master's degree in business administration from George Washington University, Washington D.C., in 1961. He is a 1964 graduate of the National War College in Washington, D.C.

Awards and decorations which General Roberts has earned include: the Distinguished Service Medal, with one Oak Leaf Cluster; the Legion of Merit, with one Oak Leaf Cluster; the Distinguished

Flying Cross; the Air Medal, with seven Oak Leaf Clusters; the Air Force Otstanding Unit Award, with V for Valor; Korean Service medal, with two service stars; the Vietnam Service Medal, with three service stars; and several awards from the Korean and South Vietnamese governments

General Roberts is married to the former Fern Johnson of Mapleton, Minn. They have four daughters: Nancy, Susan,

Fewer ATC people killed, injured in '75

Randolph AFB, Tex. (ATCPS) - Fewer Air Training Command (ATC) military personnel were killed and injured in the first six months of 1975 than in the same period in 1974, according to the command director of Safety

Analysis of statistics compiled during the first half of 1975 for the Safety '76 program shows ATC exceeded its goals in four of the five reporting categories. The only area in which there was an increase was in civilian disabling injuries.

The federal Safety '76 Accident Prevention Campaign began in January 1974 and will continue through 1976. Its purpose is to emphasize the top management and supervisory involvement in accident prevention. In addition, the program establishes yearly goals of five per cent reductions in the number of fatalities, military and civilian injuries, and private and Air Force motor vehicle accidents.

Nine persons died in traffic accidents in the first six months of 1975, compared to 15 in the same period in 1974. Three other prsons died in sports and recreation accidents, compared to two in 1974. One person died of smoke inhalation in the 1975 reporting period. There were no fatalities in this category in 1974.

There were 271 military disabling injuried during the first six months of 1975, which cost 4,158 mandays and more than \$1 million. Also, 30 civilians were injured resulting in 353 lost mandays and

a cost of \$37,055. There were 65 private motor vehicle accidents in ATC in the first half of 1975, a reduction of 38 per cent over 1974. The number of Air Force motor vehicle accidents increased slightly during the reporting period, but the command was still within the established

The CFC organizations perform services that are essential to the well-being of the hungry, the sick, the handicapped, and the disadvantaged persons of all ages who need assistance. By participating in this year's appeal, and giving generously, we will be continuing the tradition of responsible citizenship which has always characterized Air

"Emphasis is directed to the prohibition against employee quotas, assessments, or any other form of coercion. Contributions must be on a truly voluntary basis." The CFC drive at Reese begins Sept. 12.

Company responds to: "Why phone deposits?"

Since there has been much interest shown by Reese people in commercial telephone deposit procedures, the topic was brought up at the July 25 Base Community Council meeting.

At Reese's request, information on deposit policies was provided by Southwestern Bell. The General Telephone Company of the Southwest has not responded yet.

Southwestern Bell's Lubbock Division Manager, Bob Dunbar, wrote, "Southwestern Bell's deposit policy is designed to protect the company and other telephone users from added expense caused by uncollectable bills.

"Appropriate credit information is considered individually on each request for telephone service. A decision as to whether a deposit may be required is based solely on each customer's credit circumstances. Credit factors considered include employment and past telephone payment history, among others.

'Deposit requests usually are limited to those cases where telephone credit has not been established with Southwestern Bell, or if there is a history of poor payment of telephone bills.

'All pertinent information provided by the customer is considered. The company always is willing to make further investigation into telephone credit information upon the customer's request.

"If a deposit is required, it is held (at six per cent simple interest) until a satisfactory payment record is established. At least six to nine consecutive months of satisfactory payment generally are required before the company will consider return of a deposit. Accounts are reviewed approximately twice a year to determine if a customer's payment history will allow return of a deposit," Dunbar concluded.

And that's the way it was - 200 years ago

That Stamp Act was something else. As I remember, my school history books indicated that the sole reason the Americans became so enraged when the British Parliament passed the Act in March 1765 was because it was unconstitutional, because "the rights of Englishmen" dictated "...that no taxes be imposed upon them but with their own consent, given personally," through their own representatives. In short, taxation without representation.'

That was true. The way in which the tax had been imposed was insufferable. But there was something else that I don't recall the books talking about too much, what today we would call a "gut issue" & dollars and cents, English pounds and shillings


What brought this on is that I recently read the Act itself through for the first time. It was monstrous, could easily have broken the colonists' backs.

While I tick off some of the taxes it levied, bear in mind that in those pre-Revolutionary times 20 pounds was considered a good yearly salary. (I assume that 20 shillings made up a pound, as they do today.)

The tax on newspapers was an extra shilling per page, plus two more for every advertisement in it. A deck of cards called for a shilling tax. And dice shooters were sure dealt a body blow: the tax on a pair of those was 10 shillings.

The Parliament, hoping to raise 60,000 pounds quickly, didn't miss a trick. Charitable donations, college degrees, liquor licenses, mortgages, calendars the list was endless. Everything was

No wonder the citizens were mad. As John Adams wrote (marking his entry into active politics). ". . . Considering the present scarcity of money ... the execution of that Act for a short space of time would drain the country of its cash, strip multitudes of their property, and reduce them to absolute beggary. .



SERVICE BICE

So 28 representatives from nine colonies assembled in New York in October 1765 and resolved not to buy any more English goods subject to the tax.

That did it. London merchants quickly petitioned the House of Commons to back off, asserting that the colonists wouldn't be able to pay several million pounds due them. Parliament saw the light and repealed the Act in March (1766).

But the damage had been done. Besides John Adams, other citizens who had been comparatively quiet up till then joined the fight.

Like Patrick Henry. Protesting the Act in Virginia's House of Burgesses, he came up with a line that set the colonies on fire.

'Tarquin and Caesar each had his Brutus," he said; "Charles the First his Cromwell' and George the Third.

Here he was interrupted by cries of "Treason!" Treason!"

When they subsided he calmly picked up where he had left off: "... and George the Third may profit by their example.

Then came the stirring phrase that still rings out as loudly and clearly as our Liberty Bell must have sounded when first tolled:

"If this be treason," he shouted, "make the most of it!"

From that moment on, the Stamp Act was dead, and the colonies had found their

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Dental clinic serves needs of Reese, local community

The dental clinic at all military installations is provided for your well being and convenience. Reaching its full potential is everyone's right and responsibility.

Here at Reese is one of the finest dental clinics in Air Training Command. We have daily sick calls from 8 to 9 a.m. and 1 to 2 p.m. Annual dental exams are given to every active duty member stationed in the Reese area. These appointments are scheduled through squadron orderly rooms.

During each appointment X-rays are made. Also, a thorough oral examination is given and an appointment for teeth cleaning and required dental treatment is set. The appointments are made as soon as possible. Through your efforts we have a very small percentage of broken appointments.

Contacting the dental clinic in the event of conflict with a set appointment is everyone's responsibility. This allows the clinic to use all available time by filling in cancellations

Military retirees are authorized complete dental care and are offered this service. As one of the benefits promised to our retired members, it is indeed a luxury to still be able to obtain treatment. In many areas this benefit has been either suspended or is on a space-available

Now we would like to address everyone's questions concerning dental care for dependents. Congress has placed upon us rather stringent restrictions on the type of dental care we can provide. All dependents are eligible for emergency care. We cannot provide routine care. However, many other benefits are available. Requests by orthondontists for extractions of teeth are honored. X-rays are taken and mailed to civilian dentists upon written request by them. Temporary fillings can be placed but they require followup treatment for the permanent filling by a civilian dentist. Some abscessed teeth and fractured teeth of your young children can be treated. Impacted third molars causing pain are scheduled for extractions by our staff on a space available basis.

Our concern in emergency treatment is to get you, the patient, free of pain.

Of primary importance is the Children's Dental Health Program. On the sponsor's birthmonth, children can be given a dental appointment which includes dental

X-rays for all children five years of age. Their teeth are also cleaned, a fluoride treatment is given and a dental exam is rendered for all dependent children 5-21 years of age (the age limit is extended on dependent children in college up to 23 years of age).

A meeting of the dependent children and at least one sponsor is held at 5:30 p.m. the last Thursday of each month at the Reese Elementary School. A movie, "The Toothkeeper," is presented and a lecture by the Preventive Dentistry officer is given. Unfortunately less than 40 per cent of the eligible dependent children take advantage of this program. It is up to you, the sponsor, to take advantage of this program and make appointments.

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Base vet discusses plague

(Editor's Note: Several Stories have appeared recently in the local news media about possible cases of bubonic plague in New Mexico and West Texas. The concern expressed by some Reese people warrents a clarification of the local situation. Dr. (Capt.) G.M. Stay, base veterinarian provides the following

Bubonic plague is known to exist in the western third of the United States. Plague in man in the U.S. is limited to rare instances of exposure to wild rodents or their fleas.

Bubonic plague is passed by the bite of an infected flea, or by handling the tissue of an infected animal. Vaccination of persons living in areas of high incidence is justifiable but not to be relied upon as the main preventive measure.

The best prevention is to

discourage rats by good housekeeping. Control of food, garbage and refuse and ratproofing of buildings to reduce rodent breeding places and harborages are all good measures.

A recent survey of the Reese grounds reveals a very limited number of prairie dogs. Those species of wildlife on the golf course which have been presented to this office for examination have not been flea bearers. As stated before, the flea transmits the disease from animals to humans.

Still, a plague outbreak on Reese is possible. However, based on the wild animal population, the surrounding terrain (farm land versus pasture land), and good housekeeping practices employed by Reese people, the chances of an outbreak on this reservation are very, very remote.

- Air traffic control recording in accordance with Federal Aviation Administration rules.
- Strategic Air Command primary alerting system.



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
