Students come to us for training and the quality of that training is affected to a great degree by our quality and maturity. This equation of quality training to maturity is apparent in all areas of our operation from the flight line to the OJT program. As officers or airmen we must demonstrate high standards and personal integrity in all facets of our duties. We have the job, we are the example.

If we work at safety, honesty and quality - if we set the example for maturity - our mission cannot help but follow naturally.

Selfless men died

for right to vote

AFR 35-10 governs things besides hair

Are you in compliance with AFR 35-10? Before you answer "yes, of course" in pious indignation, you had better make a quick check.

Many people seem to get "telescopic vision" when it comes to grooming and dress standards, and only consider the provisions of the regulation concerned with hair. While these provisions are probably talked about more among the younger members of our force, they are by no means all-inclusive of what is expected of us.

A recent survey was conducted by students in the NCO Leadership School and in a short time they observed 126 discrepancies. No grade was exempt; they ranged from colonel to airman basic.

The discrepancies ranged from the ever-present haircut violations to unbuttoned pockets, jackets not

zipped at least halfway up, and pants too short.

The most frequently observed discrepancies were objects protruding from pockets. Does your checkbook extend above the top of your back pocket? Did you remember to rebutton your shirt pocket when you replaced your pen?

You may consider many of these discrepancies "nit-picking," but if you are a supervisor, remember that you are under constant scrutiny by your people. They just cannot understand why you are hassling them on their haircuts when you yourself are not in compliance with some provisions of the regulation.

The standards of AFR 35-10 have one purpose-to present a uniform, disciplined image to our friends as well as to our critics and potential enemies. If we abide by our regulations in small matters, we can be expected to do what we are called upon to do in carrying out the national objectives of our country.

I couldn't care less how you vote. (That's not completely honest, but let it ride.) Sure I have personal preferences; but what they are is none of your business, unless I choose to tell you. And vice versa.

In that case we can disagree violently; but I grant you full rights to your conviction and admire you for fighting for it at the polls.

Another thing: I've sworn off listening to nonvoters cry about 'our lousy lawmakers" after the election. Let 'em go find another nonvoter's shoulder to wet.

Vote. If you do, you're a duespaying citizen in good standing.

Spring weather brings tornado warnings

What started as a calm spring day, May 11, 1970 erupted into a nightmare. At 9:35 p.m. a funnel cloud protruded from a churning black sky and gouged an eight and one-half mile path out of north Lubbock. Moments later the vortex withdrew and in its wake 1,700 houses, 119 aircraft, and 10,000 cars were damaged or destroyed. The total damage was placed at \$135 million, most of which would never be recovered. Lubbock escaped with 28 deaths in its worst natural

Constant Watch

Both the National Weather Service and the AWS unit stationed at Reese AFB watch all threatening weather developments, and issue a severe storm warning as soon as possible. On the night of the 1970 tornado, a warning for severe

thunderstorms was issued one hour and 45 minutes in advance. Radio and television stations were alerted and broadcast further developments. Of the 28 people who died, few had taken the time to properly protect themselves.

Each Weather Bureau Severe Thunderstorm Warning should be treated as a primary alert. There is always the chance of a Severe Thunderstorm Warning being upgraded to a Tornado Warning. The forecaster has certain criteria to meet before a Severe Weather Warning is issued. When these are met, areas where potential storms may evolve are outlined. These areas often cover hundreds of square miles and last for several hours. Where a funnel cloud might develop and touch down is almost impossible to tell in advance.

The Tornado Belt

Reese is in the southern corner of the "Tornado Belt," which extends northward to Oklahoma and northeastward into Iowa. While tornadoes occur in other states, the greatest number occur in this region during the months from March to

The normal path of a tornado is

at about 30 to 35 miles per hour. Winds as strong as 300 m.p.h. have been observed in the stronger

Cooperative Effort

Detachment 11 of the 24th Weather Squadron at Reese and the National Weather Service, located at the Municipal Airport, assist each other during times of severe

Fireman and policemen are posted around the city at the beginning of a severe weather watch, and Reese has a trained observer ready to relay the approach of any danger. The National Weather Service issues its warnings to the general public through Civil Defense radio and television stations while the Base Weather Station relays its warnings directly to the Command Post. Sirens, both in Lubbock and here will not be sounded until a tornado has been sighted. Don't wait to hear the siren before reacting.

Preparation is the key to the protection of all those concerned.

The tornado instructions here will help. Cut out and place in a central location for quick reference.

WHAT TO DO:

TORNADO WARNING - Tornado has actually been sighted.

1. Monitor Emergency Broadcast System, KFYO Radio, 790 on the dial, for official Weather Bureau information if thunderstorm activity is observed.

2. For Weather Information on Television: Watch for the weather symbols that will be posted in the lower left hand side of the screen. The definitions of the symbols are listed below.

(Transparent Cloud) Severe thunderstorm watch.

(Transparent Funnel)

Severe thunderstorm warning.

Tornado Warning NOTE: The station will broadcast what counties the weather watch/warning will cover.

3. Secure all movable objects in the vicinity of your residence/shop. They readily become deadly flying missiles if left insecure.

4. Locate your children and restrict their movements to the immediate vicinity of your house.

5. Open windows slightly to help equalize inside and outside pressures if a tornado strikes.

6. Gather emergency supplies, i.e. flashlight, first aid kit, water, and have readily available.

TORNADO WARNING

1. STAY INSIDE YOUR BUILDING! Potential loss of life and bodily injury may result if you are caught in the open on

bodily injury may result if you are caught in the open on the move.

2. Monitor KFYO Radio 790. It will keep you posted on location and time of confirmed sightings and direction of tornado movement.

3. Listen for a 3 to 5 MINUTE STEADY TONE on the base siren system, or deep roar like the rumble of a large bomber squadron or a freight train.

4. Watch for a dark, funnel-like cloud.

5. If either the roar of the tornado or sound of base sirens is heard, or the funnel actually sighted, take immediate cover in the strongest part of your residence/shop by lying flat on the floor, using mattresses or blankets for protection from flying glass/debris. For Reese Village occupants this would be in the center hall or closet. Second floor BOQ and barracks occupants should go to the strongest portion of the first floor. In offices and shops, desks and tables could protect you if you stay underneath them. REMEMBER. LIE FLAT ON THE FLOOR UNDER SOME PROTECTIVE COVER. AVOID AREAS NEAR WINDOWS OR UNDER LARGE POORLY SUPPORTED ROOFS. DO NOT REMAIN ON THE SECOND STORY OF ANY BUILDING!

1. Keep calm, determine injuries, and render first aid.
2. Stay away from utility poles and power lines.





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Poor safety procedure causes fire

Five fires occurred in Air Training Command during January. One of these fires and its cause is provided for the information of all personnel.

A fire incident that occurred in a dormitory on Jan. 25 is of special significance and concern. Details of the incident show that an Air Force member was melting paste floor wax in his room for easier application to the floor. The wax ignited and, as the individual attempted to extinguish the flame with his jacket, the can of wax spilled, spreading fire across the

Room curtains, bedding, and a mattress were destroyed before the fire was extinguished by the fire department. A similar fire of this nature occurred in a dormitory in September 1975.

Paste floor wax is highly combustible, easily ignited, and must never be heated/melted for application to floors.

Carelessness and disregard of established fire prevention policies and practices and failure to exercise good common sense was the cause of most of these incidents, resulting in a loss to the Air Force of \$1,977.



Younger airmen who plan to reenlist should think about selling

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General Jones sets AF priorities

Randolph AFB, Tex. (ATCPS) --In his presentation to the house Appropriations Committee, Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. David C. Jones listed six future objectives and priorities. He said:

"The first is to maintain the qualitative edge we have gained. Technological advantages are perishable and in order to maintain the technical base which has so far managed to produce a qualitative edge, we must find a way to reverse the downward trend in research, development, technology and engineering (RDT&E) funding . . .

"Second, the efficiacy of tradeoffs between mass and quality has its limits. Therefore we need to maintain force structure of sufficient size to assure adequate capability for support of national objectives

"Third, we must continue to exploit the qualitative advantages we have (at whatever force levels are available) by improving our

readiness still further . . .

"A fourth management objective is to improve our methods of acquiring new weapons systems . . .

"Fifth, as part of both R&D and acquisition improvements, we must strive to develop systems with a lower life cycle cost, particularly costs for operations and

"Finally, permeating all the other objectives, we must maintain the professionalism of our people while achieving even better productivity."

The ceremony is planned in conjunction with the 64th birthday of Girl Scouting (March 12) and the 200th birthday of the United States.



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CHAMPUS rules undergo changes

On Feb. 9 President Ford signed into law the Defense Appropriation Bill which affected the Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services (CHAMPUS).

Past policy allowed eligible beneficiaries the option of selecting a military medical facility or a civilian medical facility under CHAMPUS for their inpatient care. However, it was the opinion of the Appropriations Committee of the House of Representatives that inpatient services of military facilities were not being sufficiently

Effective Feb. 9, active duty dependents (including those residing away from their sponsor), retirees and their dependents, and survivors of deceased members who reside within a 40 mile radius of a military hospital will be required to first seek inpatient care in that facility. If the inpatient care required is not available in that facility, CHAMPUS care may be sought by obtaining a Nonavailability Statement, DD Form 1251, from the military facility. No claim will be accepted by CHAMPUS for reimbursement without a DD Form 1251, except for those beneficiaries who reside outside the 40 mile radius. This change does not pertain to emergency patient care.
