"To speak his mind is every freeman's right" (borrowed from The Newcastle Register) and good Americans exercise this privilege. Let us speak the truth, and with dignity with our lips, and the press. The final word, after all, is spoken with a ballot.

Let not the world judge a State by the actions of a city within our boundaries, diseased and politically insane. Please believe that crackpots are in the minority.

We pray that our late President's ideals will be strengthened by his death and that politicians will erase the image portrayed before the American people of corruptness and unproved accusations. Cotton quota election Dec. 10

The cotton quota vote coming up Dec. 10 will mark the 11th consecutive year in which growers have voted on marketing quotas for their upland cotton crop.

Beginning with the referendum on marketing quotas for the 1954 crop, growers have approved quotas for each year's cotton crop. In the vote last year, on quotas for the 1963 upland cotton crop, 93.7 per cent of the growers voting approved the quotas.

By law, quotas must be proclaimed by the Secretary of Agriculture in years when the cotton supply exceeds normal. The estimated 1963-64 total supply of upland cotton exceeds the estimated normal supply by 7.8 million bales.

If at least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum approved quotas for the 1964 upland cotton crop, price support at a level within the range of 64 to 90 percent of parity will be available to growers who comply with their farm allotments and marketing quota penalties will apply to any "excess" cotton produced on a farm.

If more than one-third of the voters oppose quotas for the 1964 crop, the allotment program will remain in effect, and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 percent of parity, as provided by law.

All farmers who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1963 are eligible to vote in the December 10 referendum.

Funeral services for R. L. Heard Sr., 88, were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday from the First Baptist Church in Olney. Burial was in Olney Cemetery under direction Lunn Funeral Home.

Heard, a native of Georgia, died early Monday in the Archer County hospital at Archer City. He was born in Cheri County, Ga., Aug. 23, 1875 and moved to Young County in 1898 and moved to the Padgett community in 1907, and farmed there many years. He was the last surviving charter member of the Padgett Baptist Church, and leaves 94 direct descendants. His wife died in 1962.

Survivors include one daughter and six sons.
