Bobcats keep slate clean beat Carroll 34-20

The Newcastle Bobcats give away 22 pounds per man, but still beat the Max Boydston coached Carroll Dragons of Grapevine in the first home game of the season 34-20. The Cats playing without the services of QB John Tomlinson found that freshmen QB's Danny Casteel and Preston Pitts could and did move the ball real well.

The Cats kicked off to Carroll, the Dragons took the ball down to the Cats 6-yd. line, and the Cats held on downs. The Cats fumbled the ball back to Carroll on the 25. Again the Cats held. After another fumble exchange, the Cats got to moving with Casteel at QB. The Dragons defense moved to cover the strong Casteel counter Back with Mike Mitchell going for 14 yards and the TD. After a Carroll punt, Donnie Hulse got away for a 53 yard run and two plays later Hulse scored from the Dragon 29 yard line.

Carroll scored on an 8 yard dive play by FB Mike Harwell. But the Cats lost little time getting back in the game. On the first play after the kickoff Hulse passed to End Aaron Hughes for 30 yards and on the next play passed 33 yards to End Jack Clayton for the TD. Hulse scored the two points after for a 20-6 halftime lead.

The Dragons kicked to the Cats to start the second half. The Cats got a drive started quick with Hulse going the last 26 yards for the TD. Hulse also scored the points after. Carroll came right back and scored with HB Ronny Moffatt scoring from 4 yards out.

The last Newcastle TD came on a 28 yard run by Hulse after Preston Pitts set it up with a 29 yard reverse play. Carroll come back to score with two minutes left to make the final score 34-20.

Defensive stand outs for the Cats were Alton Beckham, John Taaek and Harold Whiteley. On offense, Hulse, Jim and Mike Mitchell, Pitts Wayne Fields, Casteel, Clayton and Creel.

88 Year Old Pharmacist Still Goes to Work Daily in Newcastle

Walter Lavosier Pevehouse, 88 year old Newcastle, Texas, pharmacist still goes to work regularly six days each week. Born in Corsicana, Texas, December 20, 1876, he must be one of the oldest, if not the oldest active pharmacist in Texas today.

He began working as a druggist in 1894 at the age of 18. He was introduced to the mortar and pestle quite by accident and was an accomplished apothecary several years before the Texas Pharmaceutical Association was organized in 1907. Pevehouse went into the apothecary work at the encouragement of his brother-in-law, Dr. Hughes, who was a medical doctor. W. L. first became an apprentice under the watchful eye of Dr. Hughes.

Dr. Hughes of Bryson, Jack county, Texas, bought the Wells Drug Store and asked W. L. to help him with the store. At first W. L. ran the store and later began to fill prescriptions prescribed by Dr. Hughes. Much of the time he spent in the saddle while collecting bills for Dr. Hughes. He recalls that this was one of the most enjoyable aspects of the job. He was reared on a Texas farm and much of his early life had been spent in the saddle.

By 1911, W. L. owned his first drug store in Jermyn, Texas. Ida Lasater Huckabay's History of Jack County, lists Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Pevehouse as pioneer settlers of the Jermyn boomtown. Mr. Pevehouse stayed in business in Jermyn for 25 years. He worked in Megargel before coming to Newcastle, where he was a pharmacist in the Arnold Drug Store. He recalls that in 70 years this job with Doc Arnold was the only job where he ever had any time off. The working day of a druggist was always from 12 to 15 hours each day and while working in the Arnold Drug, Doc Arnold would alternate time off with his pharmacist.

Upon Mr. Arnold's death, Mr. Pevehouse went into his own pharmacy business again, and now works in cooperation with Dr. J. B. Mars, who has a building and an office on main street in Newcastle.

In 1912, Texas pharmacy laws were strengthened and began requiring college training for certified pharmacist. At that time active and practicing phar-

macist were allowed to go to Austin and take examinations for certification. W. L. Pevehouse journeyed to Austin and he remembers the exams lasted four days. There were some 1,400 pharmacist taking the examinations.

On September 17, 1912, Mr. Pevehouse was issued certificate No. 4395. He still has the original certificate on the wall behind his drug counter, and is still an active pharmacist under this original certificate. Of course, he pays his annual renewal fee.

W. L. was the son of David and Mary (Green) Pevehouse. His father was born in 1845, in Montgomery County, Texas, and his mother was a native of Louisiana. His father was a Civil War Confederate veteran and both parents lie buried today in the Wynne Hill Cemetery in Jack county. His grandfather was also David Pevehouse, born in Ireland, and came to Brazoria County, Texas, via Arkansas.

W. L. has one family heirloom of which he is very proud. Shortly after his grandfather arrived in Brazoria County, he was scouting through the timber one day in the 1830's and came upon what he thought to be an ivory handled walking cane leaning against a tree. It was a walking cane with a beautifully tempered sabre hidden inside the walking cane. There are no inscriptions or identification marks on the sabre and the handle is ivory. It has been in the Pevehouse family for about 130 years.

Pevehouse married Miss Ida Streun Her parents were natives of Bosque county, and both lie buried today in Young Co.

Mr. and Mrs. Pevehouse are parents of three children and three grandchildren: Maurine McClure and son, Bill, of Loving; Bobby York and daughter, Linda, of Ashboro, N. C.; and David Arnold Pevehouse and son, David Arnold II, of Boys Ranch, Amarillo, Texas.

Mr. Pevehouse speaks of his life and comments about his good life. Reminiscing about if he had his life to live over, he stated he would have stayed in the farming and ranching business and pharmacy would have been his second choice. Pharmacy has been too confining for a man who loved back page


