Bobcats Out Run Jackrabbits to Win No. 6

The Newcastle Bobcats made it six wins in seven starts Thursday night at Newcastle, as they beat off the Bowie "B" Jackrabbits for a 20-0 win.

The Bobcats held the Jackrabbits to one first down in the first half. The Jackrabbits made two serious threats in the ball game. One came close to the end of the first half, with the Bobcats in the lead 7-0. Jackrabbit Safety Billy Kelly, intercepted a Casteel pass and raced it back to the Cat 15, but four plays later the Cats took over on their own 25. Bowie's last threat came in the closing minutes of the ball game as they made four first downs in a row to move to the Bobcat 21, but the Cats held and ran out the clock.

The first Bobcat TD came in the second quarter on a 69 yard run by Tailback Donnie Hulse.

The Jackrabbits kicked off to the Cats to start the third quarter. The Cats scored in 12 plays with FB Wayne Fields going the last 6 yards. Fields carried the ball 9 of the 12 plays on the drive. Tomlinson kicked the point after.

The Cats scored again in fourth quarter on a 29 yard TD pass from QB Danny Casteel to Mike Mitchell. Mike took the ball on the 10 yard line, and a fine block by Jack Clayton broke him open for the score.

Defensive standouts for the Cats were John Taack, Alton Beckham, Harold Whiteley and Mike Mitchell. Offensive standouts were Danny Casteel, and Wayne Fields.

The Bobcats have an open date this week, before taking on Throckmorton in the district opener next week.

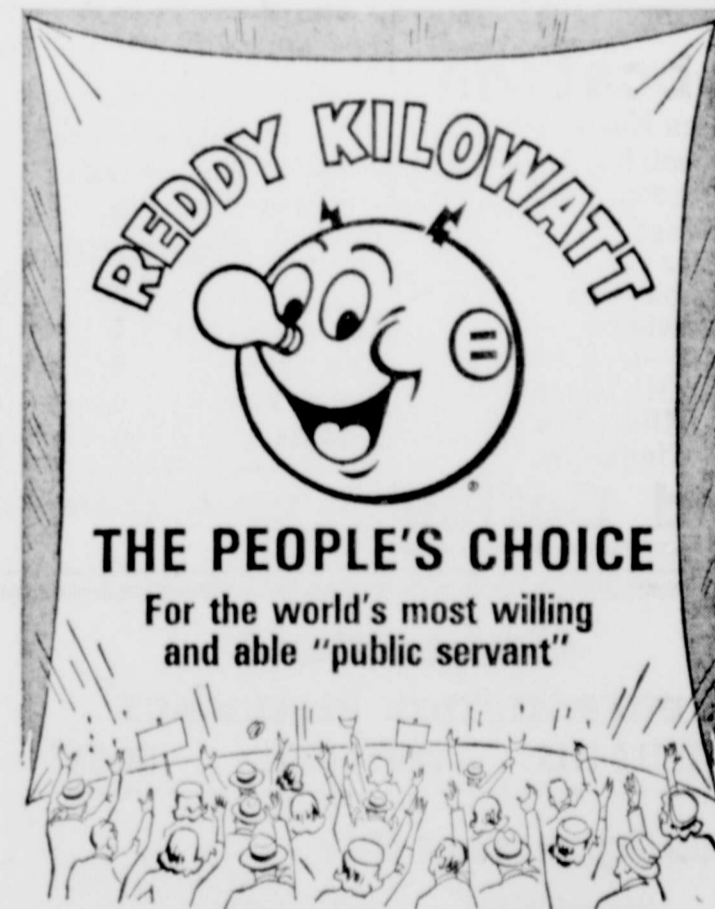

Fort grounds get black top on roads

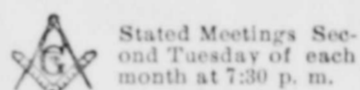
