Baccalaureate Services Set Sunday For 1966 Graduates

The graduating seniors of the 1966 Class of Newcastle High School will have their Baccalaureate Services Sunday, May 15 in the Newcastle High School Auditorium.

Ann Phillips will play professional and recessional music for both Baccalaureate and Commencement.

Commencement services will begin with an Invocation by Garland Hankins. Nancy Morris, class salutatorian, will give the Salutatorian Address and Linda Day will give the Valedictorian Address. Miss Day is the 1966 Valedictorian.

Principal J. E. Murphree will present the senior awards, and School Superintendent Wayne Hales will present each graduating senior his diploma.

Wayne Davis will give the Benediction to close the ceremonies.

Gray To Participate In TCU Institute

Gerald J. Gray, Newcastle Public School, will be among the 100 high school teachers of physics, chemistry earth science, mathematics and biology to participate in a Summer Institute of Science and Mathematics at Texas Christian University from June 6 to July 15.

Made possible by a grant from the National Science Foundation the six - week session will be directed by Dr. Daniel Jarvis, associate professor of geology, according to an announcement by Chancellor James M. Moudy.

The institute, the eight consecutive NSF - sponsored one for TCU, will have a program planned to provide an opportunity for the teachers to enrich their basic knowledge in their particular fields, acquaint them with some of the more modern aspects of the subject areas, emphasize the interrelationship of science and mathematics and the importance of the specific fields in the world of industry.

Nearly 2900 voters went to the polls in Young County's 14 precincts Saturday to vote in the first Democratic Primary. Highlight of the local contest was the State Representative and the County Treasurer's race.

Ken Andrews, Graham attorney, polled 1684 votes in Young County with Charles Finnell of Holliday, Texas receiving 969 votes, and Anthony Fenoglio polling 259.

Finnell, 22 a newcomer in Texas politics, led the three contestants in the six county district receiving over 5,000 votes. Andrews, 27, placed second with over 4900 votes.

Andrews and Finnell will face each other in the June 4 runoff for State Representative of the 86th District composed of Young, Archer, Throckmorton, Montague, Clay, and Jack Counties.

Mrs. Vesta McCluer of Graham won the Democratic nomination for the office of County Treasurer of Young County over two opponents. Returns from the 14 precincts gave Mrs. McCluer 1462 votes, Mrs. Glenn Denny, 908, and Mrs. Myrtis Smith Womack 512 votes.

Sam Furr, Jr. of Olney defeated Ben Northcott, 408 to 355 for the office of Peace Justice.

Young County voters favored Waggoner Carr for Senator as they gave him 2458 to his opponent, John R. Willoughy, who received 323 votes in Saturday's election.

Governor John Connally maintained a strong lead over his opponents in the county. Voters gave him 2402 votes compared to 416 for Stanley C. Woods and 47 for Johnnie Mae Hackworthe.

The County Democratic Executive Committee met Tuesday to canvass the election returns according to C. E. Penix, County Democratic Chairman.

The Young County Crops Subcommittee have cooperated with members of the Olney Chamber of Commerce in planning what should be one of the most successful Small Grain Field Day and tours to date. This should prove interesting to farmers and business men alike. Plan to attend Saturday.

I enjoyed working with the 4 - H Horse Club members and their leaders in the playday last Saturday. Mr. and Mrs. Willis Atchley are always gracious host and hostess. Mr. Elmer Carter of Archer City did a fine job in judging the classes and events.

The 4 - H Rifle Club members are in need of additional adult help in order to get this worthwhile program underway again. If you have a boy or girl between the ages of 9 to 19 and if they are interested in marksmanship and gun safety, please attend the meeting in the livestock barn in Graham on Thursday evening at 7:30.

The Graham 4 - H Adult Leaders Club is most anxious to help with the improvements inside the livestock barn. They have pledged \$500 toward building a kitchen.

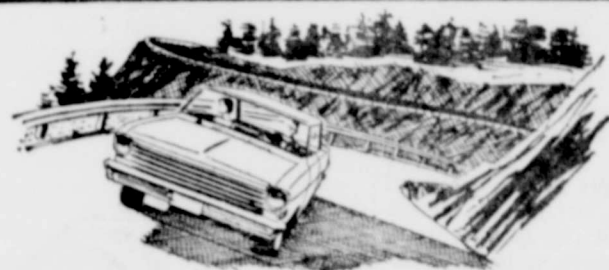
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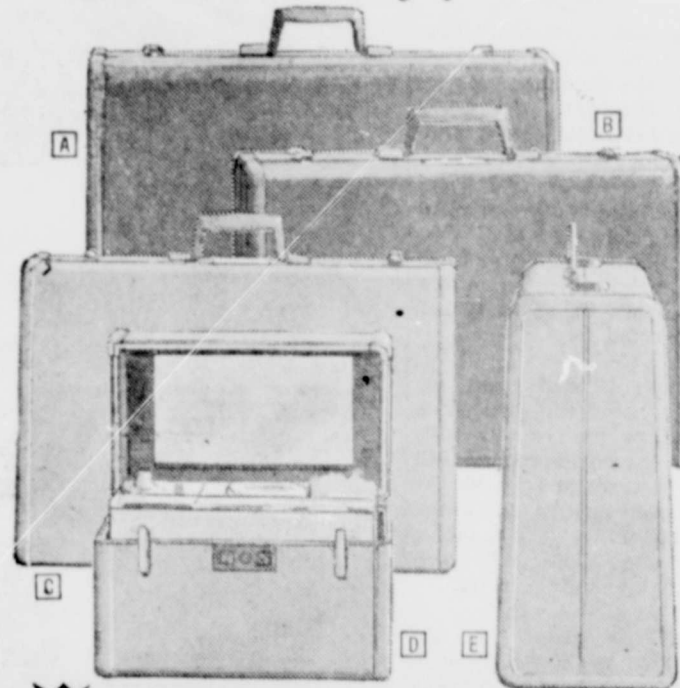

Law officers, spurred by reports, searched Thursday night and Friday morning in the area near Murray for two escaped prisoners, Billy Wayne Howard and Darwin Meharg, but attempts to locate the men proved in vain.

County Ranks 72nd In Oil Production

As Texas celebrates its 100th anniversary as an oil-producing state, Young County shares in the development that made the Lone Star State the No. 1 energy source for a booming American civilization.

In 1866 Lyne A. Barrett - a man most history books forgot - drilled the first Texas oil well near Nacogdoches at a depth of 106 feet. In the one hundred years that followed, the search for oil and gas spread to every county in Texas, and today Young County is one of 210 which produce oil or gas.

Barrett and other pioneer Texas oil men left a legacy for Young County that can be measured at approximately \$14.8 million a year, based on statistics compiled by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

During Texas' first century of oil production (29 billion barrels), Young County has contributed approximately 196.5 million barrels, its record dating from 1917.

The latest U. S. Bureau of Mines figures (1964) show Young County produced more than 4.8

million barrels of crude oil valued at \$14.4 million; and 3.4 billion cubic feet of natural gas worth about \$422,000. The 1965 output would be approximately the same, preliminary estimates indicate.

Young County ranks 72nd among the Texas counties producing oil and gas.

Payrolls, distribution of royalty checks to local landowners, new drilling ventures and tax payments are some of the ways by which oil and gas revenues are injected into the Young County economy.

One of the most important "crops" harvested by Texas ranchers, farmers and other landowners is the royalty interest from oil and gas operations. These payments are at the rate of approximately \$1.8 million a year in Young County. Many more thousands a year are paid in lease rentals and bonuses on acreage which operators hope will some day yield oil and gas.

In addition to sharing the tax load for local schools and levels of government, oil and gas producers and royalty owners send some \$690,000 a year to the State Treasury in severance taxes. Oil taxes account for \$680,000; gas \$30,000.

Triggered by the first discovery in 1917, the search for oil in Young County is still under way. The Oil and Gas Journal reported 189 wells were drilled in the county last year. Sixty one of these were "wildcats" seeking new fields or production from new strata. Results: 82 oil wells; 2 gas wells; 102 dry holes; 3 service wells. Oil men and other investors risked an estimated \$3.8 million in Young County to drill 629,000 feet of

Road Construction Given Graham Firm

A contract for 3.121 miles of Construction on FM Road 2898 in Young County has been awarded to a Graham firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Zack Burkett Company submitted the low bid of \$64,099.44 on the project for grading, structures, base and surfacing, and is expected to take 90 working days, according to L. B. Dean District Highway Engineer at Wichita Falls.

T. H. Sutherland, Resident Engineer at Graham will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.

Some \$1.8 million disappeared forever in dry holes.

The Texas Employment Commission reports an industry payroll of about \$3.6 million a year for Young Countians who are directly employed by oil and gas firms. This, of course, is only part of the total employment created by petroleum operations for many others work in related service and supply jobs.

One of the most significant technological developments of the last two decades has been the high recovery of liquids like butane and propane from natural gas. Two plants operating in the county process approximately 9.5 million cubic feet of gas a day, which gives added value to gas production here.

Funeral services for J. Tee Hutchings, 72, pioneer Olney merchant and life-time resident, will be held at 2 p.m. Friday in the First Baptist Church in Olney with Rev. Paul Powell, pastor, officiating.

Hutchings died in an Olney hospital about 11 a.m. Wednesday following a two-week illness.

He and his father operated the first meat market in Olney. Later he was also engaged in farming, ranching and cattle buying.

Hutchings was born November 15, 1893 in Olney. He married Clara Steele in Olney in 1915.

Survivors include his wife,

one son, Jimmie S. Hutchings of Graham; two daughters, Miss Della Hutchings of Olney and Mrs. George Stinnett of Brownsville.

Lunn Funeral Home is in charge of the services with burial in the Olney Cemetery.



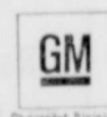


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
