



Secretary Freeman pointed out that a 1965 progress survey showed that during the program's first year:

1. The average gross income of rural families using Economic Opportunity Loans to finance nonagricultural enterprises went from \$3,100 to \$5,900.

2. Loans to farm families for agricultural purposes helped them boost their average gross income from \$2,500 to \$3,400.

3. Cooperatives, most of which were formed to buy farm equipment, showed they had earned an average ennual income of \$1,120.

4. Benefit to the average cooperative member was about \$300.

5. The average borrower in 1965 paid almost 8 percent more on his loan than was due.

Seventy percent of borrowers receiving Economic Opportunity Loans during 1965 were 40 or more years of age.

Nearly 60 per cent had less than \$1,500 available for meeting family living expenses.

Loans for financing farming operations were used mainly to purchase needed livestock and to improve or buy land, while loans to finance small business



# **Be Grub Checked**

Beef cattle producers often fail to notice the hidden damage Belknap community and once inflicted by cattle grubs, according to county agent, L. M. McCarroll.

The agent says, that these losses began when heelflies attach visited the Wray cemetery, whetheir eggs to cattle and continue re he has a infant sister buried. through the period when the grubs appear as lumps in the back

The agent goes on to explain that grub losses can be reduced gram and more than 40 years with timely application of any one of several recommended sypersonal discussion and free stemic insecticides. These insecticides are called systemics because they are distributed inside the body of the animal and carried to the site where the grubs occur.

McCarroll reports that only one application is necessary, and that timing is all important. He says, that early application of systemic insecticides are considerably safer and more effective than later ones. He believes that greatest efficiency may be obtained when the application of recommended insecticides are made between May 1 and September 1 or as soon as possible after heel fly activity
