But all three were apove average and entirely satisfactory, the article points out.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has done several tests comparing the feeding of bulls, steers, and heifers. In all tests, bull calves were superior to steer and heifer calves in weaning weights; bulls gained more economically and faster than steers or heifers; bulls had larger ribeyes; and little difference was noted in tender-

A six - member taste panel gave beef the final test. They rated it acceptable in all categories; tenderness, juiciness, flavor and overall satisfaction.

If the demand for beef is increasing - - and it is; if bulls can be produced more efficiently - - and they can; it seems evident that consumers will be seeing more and more bull beef in the meat cases at supermarkets, and who knows, a new trend may be in the making.
