Present day tourists, too, will be able to pause, read and know of Farmer's value in the beginning of prosperity and comfortable living.

A two - page, authentic history is required by the Texas historical society for any site to receive a marker.

In Farmer, Dan D. Cusen bary, a boyhood resident, comsettlers, friends, and interested piled the two - page history. He

records that in 1877, a missionary preacher, Rev. William H. Farmer, set camp there, established a general store and a post office, on Aug. 7, 1878.

The town seemed to grow, bloom, and fade away. Carr Rutherford, a member

of the Young County Historical Survey Committee, and a native son of the Farmer area. solicited and received funds to mark the site.

The common grave in the Proffitt cemetery, the second Young County site eligible for a marker, is the burial spot of the sons of three pioneer families in this area.

Rice Carlton 19, Reuben Johnson, 20 a son of J. Allen Johnson, and Patrick Euell Proffitt, 19, son of Robert Smith Proffitt were killed in an Indian raid. They were at work in a stock

pen and were killed during the raid on Elm Creek, July 17, 1867.

Remember to remind your employers that this is a very worthwhile effort and they give their employees time off so they might give a pint of blood. Very iew employers have called Lynn Rieves, Oiney Blood Program chairman, to tell him that they would be more than happy to cooperate. All of us connected with the blood program are very disappointed but feel that they just haven't had time and that wnen the date approaches they will come thru with flying colors. If Aero Commander can transport their employees about five miles into town, we feel sure that those employers just a few blocks from the Community Center will be glad to transport their employees.

Another thing to remember is that you do not pay for the blood you receive - only for the administering of it. Your bill will seem high, but compare \$17.50 - \$22.50 you pay for the lab work on the blood to \$50 to \$55. you would have to pay for each pint of blood - including the lab fee - if we were not serviced by the Red River Red Cross Regional Blood Center in Wichita Falls.




