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Turkey, playing before a homecoming crowd, appeared to have the game sacked up as they marched 38 yards in seven plays the first time they had the ball. The Turks got the ball when Mike Mitchell, kicking into a strong wind, had the ball go off the side of his foot and out of bounds on the 38. Turk halfback John King picked up 25 yards in four carries going over for the score from the five yard line.

The extra point try by quarterback Alton Setliff for two points failed but the Turks were ahead 6-0 with 7:27 left in the first quarter.

Newcastle took the ball on their own 23 following the kickoff. John Bullock picked up seven through the middle and Mitchell got a first down out to the 34 on a four yard scamper. Preston Pitts slammed off right tackle and went 66 yards for a score. Pitts kicked the extra point and the Bobcats led 7-6 with 5:43 left in the first period.

Late in the first period and early in the second quarter the Bobcats mounted an 80 yard drive starting on their own four yard line. Pitts attempted a 32 yard field goal which fell short of the mark. The remainder of the half was played in the Turk end of the

Turkey took the second half kickoff on their own 13 and moved down the field all the way to the Cat eight where King was hit hard and fumbled with Newcastle recovering. After an exchange of kicks with neither team being able to move the ball, Newcastle got the ball at their own three yard line.

And then, when we were living in our cabins, with drafts of icy wind blowing through chinks between the logs and not enough to eat, the spectre of disease knocked at our door.

Of those of us who came to Plymouth Bay to begin a new life, half died. It's hard to realize what that means - -"half dead." But everywh walk out to little Bessie's grave, and think on her golden hair and bright blue eyes, the words take on a meaning almost too real to bear.

But the spring did come. And the Good Book says there is a time for sowing and living, as well as a time for reaping and dving.

And the red people came to our houses. Heavens! I've never smelled anything, quite like those savages smelled. But the Good Lord must have sent them, because they brought that yellow grain with them, and showed us how to plant it and grind it and use it and store it for the winter.

Cotton Deadline Approaches Here

Farm operators in Young County were reminded today that application for the transfer of cotton allotments for the 1967 crop should be filed no later than January 3, 1967.

L. B. Creel, chairman, Young ASC County Committee, explains that notices of the cotton allotment and the projected yield for individual farms have already been mailed to county farmers, so farm operators now are in position to make their production plans for next season.

In Young County, growers voting in a special referendum earlier this year, failed to approve transfer of acreage allotments - by sale or lease - out of the county, so the transfer of allotments locally may be made from one farm to another only within Young County. In no case may allotments be transferred to another farm outside the State.

Transfer of allotments from one farm to another within the county and the transfer of allotments between farms (within the State) which are owned or controlled by the same owner are both authorized by law and not subject to to approval in a referendum. However, it is necessary that such transfers of allotments be filed with the ASCS county office before the January dead line.

The January 3, 1967, dead line, therefore, applies to all transfers of 1967 cotton allotments for Young County farms - whether by sale, lease, or the owner.



n't easy. The work is never done, even though one gets up at daylight and work till long after the sun sets. But the corn broke the ground and grew tall and began to bear ears.

And some of the seeds we brought from home grew during the warm months, and the children found hives of wild honey, and our men began to learn the ways of the wild game, and how to hunt it.

And we discovered that the rivers are full of fish, and wild berries grow on bushes in the forests.

Our ricks are full of corn, and the smoke house we built on top of the hill is hung to the rafters with roasts from deer and turkey. The wild geese we caught have laid and hatched eggs, and surely enough is laid up to last the cold months.

Emilie even found a bush that grows small waxy berries, and I have been experimenting and I believe the berries can be melted down to make candles . . . candles to light the dark, long months of cold in this new coutry.

So, here it is fall. The immense trees around our little home are touched with leaves of flame and gold and crimson. The winter is surely coming, but how different this winter will be!

So the other women and I have been cooking for three days now, to prepare a great feast. The children have turned huge roasts and wild turkeys on the spit, and we have prepared cornbread with nuts,

Page Eight and succotash and tarts made of wild berries, sweetened with honey.

We have made journey cake, baked on the hearth stones, and have prepared long tables outside for the feast.

The men have brought geese and ducks and fish, and we have invited the red men and their wives, and they will bring venison and turkeys.

(I am anxious to see the red women. My Jonathan was in the red people's town last month and he tells me the infant children are tied up on boards and hung on pegs.)

Fall flowers and huge bouquets of leaves will be set upon the tables. Madame Bradford thinks it frivolous, but God made them, as well as us, and surely it isn't sinful to delight in their joyful colors.

And it is, indeed, proper and good to give thanks for the blessings of the summer. This new land has been bountiful for us, and the Great God above us is holding us in His hand.

Perhaps we may celebrate a Thanksgiving Day every year of our life, and our children too, in a land of peace, prosperity and plenty, with freedom for every man of human kind.



n't easy. The work is never done, even though one gets up at daylight and work till long after the sun sets. But the corn broke the ground and grew tall and began to bear ears.

And some of the seeds we brought from home grew during the warm months, and the children found hives of wild honey, and our men began to learn the ways of the wild game, and how to hunt it.

And we discovered that the rivers are full of fish, and wild berries grow on bushes in the forests.

Our ricks are full of corn, and the smoke house we built on top of the hill is hung to the rafters with roasts from deer and turkey. The wild geese we caught have laid and hatched eggs, and surely enough is laid up to last the cold months.

Emilie even found a bush that grows small waxy berries, and I have been experimenting and I believe the berries can be melted down to make candles . . . candles to light the dark, long months of cold in this new coutry.

So, here it is fall. The immense trees around our little home are touched with leaves of flame and gold and crimson. The winter is surely coming, but how different this winter will be!

So the other women and I have been cooking for three days now, to prepare a great feast. The children have turned huge roasts and wild turkeys on the spit, and we have prepared combread with nuts,

Page Eight and succotash and tarts made of wild berries, sweetened with honey.

We have made journey cake, baked on the hearth stones, and have prepared long tables outside for the feast.

The men have brought geese and ducks and fish, and we have invited the red men and their wives, and they will bring venison and turkeys.

(I am anxious to see the red women. My Jonathan was in the red people's town last month and he tells me the infant children are tied up on boards and hung on pegs.)

Fall flowers and huge bouquets of leaves will be set upon the tables. Madame Bradford thinks it frivolous, but God made them, as well as us, and surely it isn't sinful to delight in their joyful colors.

And it is, indeed, proper and good to give thanks for the blessings of the summer. This new land has been bountiful for us, and the Great God above us is holding us in His hand.

Perhaps we may celebrate a Thanksgiving Day every year of our life, and our children too, in a land of peace, prosperity and plenty, with freedom for every man of human kind.





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
