Mrs-Helm Chosen To Aid With State Program

Mrs. R. H. Helm, President of the '17 Club, has been designated as the local coordinator for a cultural resources inventory to be taken in Newcastle as a part of an official statewide survey now being conducted by the Texas Fine Arts Commission, according to Mrs. Lynn L. Williams, president of the Mesquite District of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

John Ben Shepperd of Odessa, chairman of the newly created Fine Arts Commission, said, "We are indeed grateful to Mrs. Helm for undertaking the completion of our survey in Newcastle. This is a unique project in Texas; nothing of its kind has ever been attempted in the State of Texas before."

The purpose of the survey Shepperd explained, is to determine both the quantity and quality of cultural activity both by organizations and individuals now going on in the towns and communities in our state. "We plan not only to catalogue the various organizations active in the fine arts field in Texas, but to identify individual artists, authors and craftsmen, and the location and identification of local public works of art and collections," Shepperd said.




