Vote Registration Not Necessary For Those Over 60

Attorney General Crawford C. Martin said today that persons over 60 years old who live in a city of less than 10,-000 inhabitants, or in a rural area in any county except Bexar County, will not have to register in order to vote in elections held during the year 1967, regardless of the out come of the pending lawsuit on the constitutional amend ment which would require all voters to register. Martin said that House Joint Resolution No. 13 which proposed the constitutional amendment, expressly fixes the effective date of the amendment as Feb. 1, 1968, and consequently it does not apply to elections held before that date.

A Travis County district court ruled last that the amendment, which appeared on the ballot as Amendment No. 7 at the general election last Nov. was not validly adopted because the proposition on the ballot did not give notice of the full contents of the amendment. The State is appealing from this decision.

Bloodmobile Due February 23

Four weeks from today, on Thursday, Feb. 23, the Red River Red Cross Regional Bloodmobile will make its first visit of the year to Olney.

As in the past, all visits of the Bloodmobile will be staged in the Olney Community Center

Blood officials here often speak of the record - setting year of 1964, when Olney citizens never failed to give more than 90 pints at a single Bloodmobile visit.

On one visit in 1964, Olneyites set their all-time record of 122 pints in a single visit.

Until 1964, officials point out, the Red River Blood Center in Wichita Falls had rated Olney as a "border - line community."

Since 1964, Olney is considered a "solid community."

In other words, before 1964, other communities supplied blood for Olney's needs. Presently, Olney citizens provide blood for their own and are able to help other towns.

The Young County annual quota is 600 pints of blood. Graham citizens started the year off with a good collection of 91 pints, but Olney blood program officers point out that i f area citizens donate generously, they can at least equal the 91 pints, and perhaps better it.

The club voted to plant a tree at Fort Belknap as a memorial, in the New Beautification program of the grounds.


Mrs. T. J. Gardner was director of the program, "The Road Ahead in the American Melting Pot." She gave many details and changes which are being made in our population through the melting pot.
