For several weeks now the decision has been put off in the hopes that the economic situation facing the Register would improve, but is has not. No business, regardless of what it is, can continue to operate at a loss.

We felt when we purchased the Register that the people of Newcastle deserved a newspaper and we continue to feel this way. However, due to the economics of the situation, the Register can no longer be operated as a separate newspaper.

Beginning next week, the Register will be consolidated with the Olney Enterprise, but will remain separate insofar as news and advertising of Newcastle is concerned. Janelle Moody will continue to report the news events of Newcastle, but will be located in her home as the downtown office will be closed.

We want to assure the citizens of Newcastle that the events of their town will be reported. Subscribers will begin the considated issue of the Register and Enterprise and those who are presently subscribing to both will have the subscription extended for the balance of the time remaining.

We know that for some, this announcement will be upsitting, but we have tried and will continue to try to provide New. castle with as fine a newspaper as possible.
