## Love Loaves help feed world's hungry people

feed starving people overseas, but don't know how," according to Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Ed Grimmett. 'We are bombarded by the cruel statistics of hunger on a daily basis, and the average person feels overwhelmed by the size of a problem like global famine. Yet, we have found that when we show Americans a way to relate to the problem, they help in the traditional unselfish way the United States has always responded to the need of the less fortunate."

Chaplain Grimmett was speaking on the hunger project being sponsored by the Protestant Con-

"People in our congregation became concerned," said Chaplain Grimmett, "and several came to me asking if we could do something positive to combat the world hunger situation. In the process we learned

that a majority of the world goes to bed hungry and some 10,000 people die every day from starvation."

The people of the Protestant Congregation decided to help in some tangible way and to participate in a nation "Love Loaf" program.

Small coin containers, shaped like minature loaves of bread, have been distributed to the families of the church.

"These will be kept on dinner tables," explained Chaplain Grimmett, "as a reminder that while we have much, others have little or nothing to eat. As the family prays for the world's needy, they also put coins in the Love Loaf each day. Youngsters will learn compassion as they put in their pennies and dimes and pray." The Love Loaf containers will be left in homes until Feb. 27. By that time, each should contain about \$10 in coins.

"It will be a modern-day version of

Chaplain Grimmett said, adding, "our goal is to raise enough money to feed 5,000.'

The chapel plans a Love Loaf Sunday Feb. 27 when the loafshaped banks will be turned in and the proceeds counted.

All the money will be given to the emergency relief ministry of World Vision International, originator of the Love Loaf program. World Vision is a nonprofit, inter-denominational Christian humanitarian agency that conducts programs of childcare, emergency relief, medical assistance, evangelism and community development in 26 countries. The organization is presently caring for more than 70,000 needy children throughout the world.

The Chapel still has some Love Loaves left for those who would like to have one in their office or home.

## President approves change to simplify, streamline MAC

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The Military Airlift Command (MAC), Scott AFB, Ill., has been designated a specified command.

Air Force officials say the change will simplify and streamline command relationships and provide better management of airlift resources, particularly during periods of crisis.

The President approved the change in December of last year and the Joint Chiefs of Staff (JCS) set Feb. 1, 1977, as the effective date.

The new status will place MAC in the JCS planning cycle earlier and ensure better response to JCSapproved requirements. The

commander in chief, MAC, will be in the chain of command under the National Command Authority, reporting to the President through the Secretary of Defense.

Normal MAC functions will remain virtually unchanged. The Secretary of the Air Force and the Air Force Chief of Staff will retain responsibility for administrative and logistic support, including policymaking, budgeting and programming.

Nonairlift technical services (Air Weather Service, Aerospace Audiovisual Service, and Aerospace Rescue and Recovery Service) are

command functions.

A specified command normally is composed of forces from one military service and has world wide responsibilities. The Strategic Air Command and Aerospace Defense Command are other specified Air Force commands.

Unified commands normally are composed of components of two or more services and are responsible for particular geographic areas. The U.S. European Command, Pacific Command, and Atlantic Command are examples of unified commands.

## Brown takes oath as Sec. of Defense

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Dr. Harold Brown took the oath of office as Secretary of Defense Jan. 21 during brief ceremonies in the Pentagon. He previously served as Secretary of the Air Force from October 1965 - February 1969, and has recently been President of the California Institute of Technology at Pasadena, Calif.

Dr. Brown was born in New York City on Sept. 19, 1927. He received a B.A. degree in 1945, an M.A. degree in 1946 and a Ph.D. in Physics in 1949, all from Columbia University.

He has lectured at Columbia and Stevens Institute of Technology and has served as a research scientist at

the University of California at Berkeley. He has been the director of the E.O. Lawrence Radiation Laboratory at Livermore, Calif.

The new secretary has served as a consultant to a number of Department of Defense advisory boards and committees and was appointed a member of the President's Science Advisory Committee in 1961.

Dr. Brown has conducted a variety of nuclear research projects and has participated in a number of studies in the area of arms limitation and control.

He is married to the former Colene D. McDowell of San Francisco,

## Severe Weather increases utilities cost

We are now approaching the fourth anniversary of the 1973 Arab Oil Boycott. We haven't been greeted lately by "SORRY, NO GAS" signs, waiting in long lines at gasoline stations, or 60 cents a gallon gasoline prices. But, with the tremendous increase in energy consumption created by the severe winter weather throughout the United States, we may soon recognize the energy crisis in our gasoline prices again.

Of much more immediate concern is the increased utility bills that we have been experiencing in our homes and working facilities. We are paying a lot more now for the utilities for base facilities and the housing area than we did in 1973. In Fiscal Year 1974 (June 73-74), the Wing spent \$366,000 for utilities consumption. We are programmed to spend \$650,000 in Fiscal Year 1977. This is an increase of 177 per cent in a four year period. This increase can be attributed to price increases, system inefficiency, wastefulness, and increased consumption due to severe weather.

Until recent years, most of us considered our energy sources to be both inexhaustible and expendable. It took a group of countries in the Middle East to show us we were wrong.

### Conserve resources

Whether you live and work on base or only work on base, as a member of the Reese community, you must join in the efforts to conserve our energy resources. Since we cannot control utility rates, we

must make every effort to reduce consumption, improve system efficiency, and eliminate wastefulness. Each of us must become energy aware and help to make our families and co-workers energy conscious.

The 150,000 government furnished family housing units controlled by the Air Force will use about 25 per cent of all energy consumed to provide utilities at our bases this year. About 54 per cent of the energy used in homes goes to heating and cooling and about 15 per cent is used just to heat water. Cooking, lighting, refrigeration, washing and drying clothes, and other appliances account for the rest. And yet, it is estimated that 30

per cent of the energy used in this country is wasted.

We can help eliminate waste by wise use of energy and, in the process, save precious energy resources for the Air Force and the nation. If you live in military housing, you will be saving money for the Air Force. If you are a home owner, you will be saving money for yourself.

The following energy-saving measures are not new, but they are simple and practical. It is hoped that you will share this information with family and friends in your efforts to save fuel which means saving money - a factor more important now than ever in the face of continually rising energy prices and shrinking budgets.

Keep draperies and shades open for sunny windows; close them at night.

Do not use hot water if warm or cool water will do the job.

Use washers, dryers, dishwashers, and electric irons during early morning or late evening hours.

# Afro-American patents make work easier for housewife

Editor's note: This is the second in the series dedicated to American Heritage Week, Feb. 21- 26. Next week's article will look at Afro-Americans in the Armed Forces.

Afro-American ingenuity produced certain household items that have made the Housewife's work easier.

One is the paper bag. William Purris did not invent the paper bag, but he did invent a machine to make paper bags, a machine that gave it

the basic form it still keeps today. Purvis held nine patterns for bag machines and some six for other items, including a fountain pen improvement and an electric railway switch.

Thomas Steward, in 1893, patented a mop handle which enabled the swabbing part of the mop to be attached, detached, or changed by raising or lowering a small clamp. The user could thus avoid discarding the still usuable

handle or doing a laborious job changing the swabber. Steward's mop handle is still in use today.

Earlier than the above items was a boon to many a host or hostess. The potato chip is said to be the brainchild of Hyram Thomas, a black chef at Saratoga hotel. Because of their place of origin, potato chips were long known as Saratoga chips. Their perennial popularity needs no further elaboration.

range. Freezers should be maintained at zero degrees.

Don't put warm items in your refrigerator.

Turn off electric stoves a few minutes before the food is completely cooked; the stove heat will continue to cook the food.

Turn off all unnecessary lights and try using the next lower wattrating of light bulbs.

Turn off radios and televisions when no one is listening or watching.

Use one large incandescent bulb instead of several smaller ones. The large bulb is more efficient.

All windows and doors must be closed during the heating season to prevent the waste of heat.

Setting a thermostat higher than the maximum setting will not heat an area any faster. A higher setting will overheat a facility and thus waste energy.

Check hot water heater temperature. Don't set a water heater any higher than is needed since the heater burns fuel to keep water hot when it is not being use.

Close off unused areas and rooms. Where possible, be certain that blinds or other window covering devises are closed and heat sources to the closed areas turned off.

We are all obligated to do our part in conserving energy. The military housing occupant, the military worker, the civilian worker, and the homeowner can play a major role in supporting the Air Force and the nation's energy conservation programs.

Only through the committment and cooperation of everyone can we achieve our energy conservation goals. Please help.

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## Dependent dental care reduced

Dental examinations, consultation and x-rays, unless related to a based Air Force dependents.

The change in policy is in response to a DoD directive that shuts off routine dental care to dependents living in the United

States but not in remote areas.

Overseas dependents, those living medical problem, no longer are in remote areas of the U.S. and available to most United States retired members will continue to receive routine care on a space-available basis. It is important to remember that first priority will go to active duty members.

The preventive dentistry program

for children still will include counseling, polishing, and fluoride treatments. It no longer will include dental prophylaxis (plaque, calculus, and stain removal) or examinations.

However, all dependents, in the U.S. and abroad, will continue to receive emergency and adjunctive dental care.

Emergency care includes treatment to relieve pain, eliminate infection, control hemorrhaging, cellulitis and respiratory difficulties, and ease trauma to teeth, jaws

and other facial structures. It does not include permanent restoration or replacement of teeth.

Adjunctive care is treatment that is recommended by a doctor and considered integral to the control of a primary condition. This includes eliminating infection, restoring decayed or fractured teeth and correcting developmental or acquired oral facial deformities. It also includes the eliminations of "Life-hazardous oral conditions" such as oral cancer, cellulitis and fractured jaws.

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### Security Police stop airmen marijuana

During a random seat belt check here, Friday, the Security Police apprehended three airmen for possession of marijuana.

The Security policemen on duty detected the odor of burning marijuana while making the check. This prompted the Security Police to obtain a search warrant from the

## Expanded overseas tour extensions available now

RANDOLPH AFB, Tex. (AFNS) - Overseas officers and airmen who want to extend may now request any period up to the "accompanied by dependents" length at their

extension program is part of a continuing Air Force effort to reduce permanent-change-of-station (PCS) costs and turbulence.

Recent changes in officer and airman assignment policies delete the one-year limit on overseas tour extensions. Accompanied or unaccompanied members may request an extension, in any increment, up to the "accompanied by dependents" tour length. The new policy even applies to those serving on an extension.

Those who currently have a request for extension pending above the local level are not affected by this change. However, if their current request is approved, they may request another extension under the new policy at a later date.

Applications for extension will continue to be processed as before. Contact the consolidated base personnel office for full details.

I have no way of knowing if you told anyone about the fly, but if you had, I am sure they would have disposed of the food and asked you to go through the line again. I believe our dining hall people take all reasonable precautions against flies — we will just have to apoligize for the one that got away, and try to do better.

### Newspaper Purchase

I am rather irritated by the fact that I have not been able to purchase a newspaper for the last three days. I know that newspapers used to be available only through the morning edition in front of the Caprock House or the NCO Club. Lately, I have not seen any there, and I would like to know why?

I can appreciate your irration. We talked to the Circulation Depart-

ment of the Alvalanche-Journal regarding base distribution of their newspaper and found that the regular delivery man has been on vacation and apparently did not brief his temporary replacement of the location of each newspaper rack. On Jan. 25 the delivery man was contacted and we discussed the fact that his present locations were limited to the NCO Club, Officer's Club, and Caprock Cafeteria and requested that he place a rack in the Wing Dining Hall on a trial basis to determine if sales would support its location. He stated that he was having considerable problems with his newspaper racks on base because people were taking the papers and not paying for them. He said if he continues to lose money on the racks that he will have to remove them. So, it is up to you — the customers - to protect this convenience. I appreciate you bringing this problem to my attention. I think we'll see better service in the future, if we cooperate also.

### Stray Dogs

On Jan. 12, I called the Security Police at a quarter till six to pick up three or four stray dogs. An hour later they responded on the call. They picked up one dog. The rest of the dogs ran off down McGuire.

Please give me some answer as to why the Security Police are so slow in responding to pick up stray dogs in the Village. As a result of a slow response by Security Police, three dogs were left running loose in the

Village and one dog was caught.

Thank you for your concern regarding stray dogs in the housing area. Our family housing regulation requires that pets be either leashed or fenced when outside the owners quarters; yet, many of our housing occupants disregard this directive to the displeasure of their neighbors. The Security Police have limited law enforcement people available to pick up stray animals and take action on each call received as well as making routine dog patrols. Our records for Jan. 12 show that at the particular time you called, the Security Police were involved in four other simultaneous activities (vehicle assistance, funds escort, prisoner processing, and subduing a choking animal) which precluded an immediate response to your call.





of the Recruiting mission and has my full support."

"A successful base-level lead referral system," said Lt. Col. Ivan R. Jenkins, Recruiting Liaison Officer (RLO), "is the heart of AFRAP, because it provides a way for all people at Reese or retirees in the Lubbock area to directly assist recruiting. Referral cards are available at the CBPO Customer Service Desk in Building T-1. Commanders and Unit INTRO Monitors will also have referral cards, and the printed form in today's ROUNDUP can be used by anyone on base to make referrals. The cards are designed to gather information recruiters need to faciliate contact with the potential applicants. Be sure to fill out the card completely. A copy of the Privacy Act Statement is printed on the lead referral card and you must inform the prospect of the proposed use of the information if you personally contact the individual to obtain this information.

Referral cards, when completed, should be returned to the CBPO Customer Service Desk, where a drop box will be provided, or if you prefer, place your card in a sealed envelope, address to Lt. Col. Jenkins, DO/RLO, Stop 13, and drop it in base distribution.

"Base personnel should talk candidly with potential Air Force referral candidates, discussing their own experiences in the Air Force. However, people here are not expected to recruit," said the RLO, "the recruiter will do

that after he determines the prospect's eligibility."

"Let's get behind AFRAP and do our part," Colonel Jenkins added. "Fill out a Lead Referral Card today, and return it to me. Help a young person find a future in the Air Force.'
