Tornado watch increases as season nears

Nearly seven years have gone by since one of the most destructive forces on earth whipped through the city of Lubbock.

What started as a calm spring day, May 11, 1970 erupted into a nightmare. At 9:35 p.m. a funnel cloud protruded from a churning black sky and gouged an eight and one-half mile path out of North Lubbock. Moments later the vortex withdrew and in its wake 1,700 houses, 119 aircraft, and 10,000 cars were damaged or destroyed. The total damage was placed at \$135 million, most of which would never be recovered. Lubbock escaped with 28 deaths in its worst natural disaster ever.

Constant Watch

Both the National Weather Service and Det. 11, 24th Weather Squadron at Reese watch all threatening weather developments, and issue a severe storm warning as soon as possible. On the night of the 1970 tornado, a warning for severe thunderstorms was issued one hour and 45 minutes in advance. Radio and television stations were alerted and broadcast further developments. Of the 28 people who died, few had taken the time to properly protect themselves.



Each Weather Bureau Severe Thunderstorm warning should be treated as a primary alert. There is always the chance of it being upgraded to a Tornado Watch or Warning.

The forecaster has certain criteria to meet before a Severe Weather Warning is issued. When these are met, areas where potential storms may evolve are outlined. These areas often cover hundreds of square miles and last for several hours. Where a funnel cloud may develop and touch down is almost impossible to tell in advance.

The Tornado Belt

Reese is in the southern portion of the "Tornado Belt", which extends northward to Oklahoma and northeastward into Iowa. While tornadoes occur in other states, the greatest number occur in this region during the months from March to September.

The normal path of a tornado is from the southwest to the northwest at about 30 to 35 miles per hour. Winds as strong as 300 mph have been observed in the stronger vortices.

President nominates Roberts for promotion to full general

RANDOLPH AFB, Tex. (ATCPS) Secretary of Defense, Harold Brown, today announced the President has nominated Lt. Gen. John W. Roberts, commander, Air Training Command (ATC), for promotion to general. Additionally, the President has designated the position of Commander, ATC, as a consibility requiring the grade of a general.

Known as a man who is truly concerned about people, General Roberts, is responsible for managing more than 117,000 people and operating one of the largest

school systems in the free world. A native of Minnesota, General Roberts entered the service as an aviation cadet. After receiving his wings and commission as a second lieutenant, he began a career that has carried him throughout the world in both operational and support assignments-but assignments that have always kept him close to the "people" action. An experienced fighter pilot, General Roberts has served in many operational duty positions including Squadron Commander. His credentials as an "expert" are reinforced by the fact that he won the trophy for top individual scoring

at the First United States Air Force Jet Fighter Weapon Meet.

In 1973 he was appointed Deputy Chief of Staff, Personnel-a job described by General Roberts himself as being one of the most challenging and rewarding "people" jobs in the Air Force.

As Deputy Chief of Staff, job of importance and re- Personnel, General Roberts was responsible for developing policies and programs that affected the recruiting, training, education and career development of all active duty personnel, civilians and military. In February of last year, General Roberts was presented the 1975 Eugene M. Zuckert Management Award in recognition of his outstanding contributions to personnel management in the Air Force.

General Roberts became Commander of ATC, with headquarters at Randolph Air Force Base. Tex., in August 1975. He will remain in his present assignment and his promotion to four star rank will be affective upon Senate confirmation.

FROM THE

Our Base Commander, Col. Joseph Brotherston, has a few words to say touching on involvement, my favorite subject. Listen to what our "Mayor" has to say.

One of the most perplexing responsibilities of a Base Commander is the enhancement of base morale through recreational opportunities. Obviously I cannot create programs in isolation that will satisfy entertainment, sports and recreation needs for the maximum number of people without feedback through both formal and informal communication channels.

I have a highly experienced professional staff that is responsible for the day-to-day management and maintenance of our recreational facilities. I expect them to be advocates for their respective activities while competing for the limited funds and other resources that are available

for our total Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) Program. Moreover, they are expected to continually search for new innovations that will promote the maximum utilization of their

There is a vital communication link, however, that is absolutely essential if we are to spend our limited resources wisely on meaningful programs—and that is the advice and support of our numerous advisory committees composed of representatives from each unit. I recently asked the NCO Leadership Class if anyone knew who represented their unit on the NCO Club Advisory Committee. Not one student knew. I wonder how many of you readers know that we have numerous advisory committees such as The Athletic Committee, The Entertainment Committee, The Officer/NCO Advisory Committee, and The Golf Committee. Do you know who represents your unit as a spokesman and advocate? I would

be willing to bet that there are a few Unit Commanders and Senior NCO's who don't know the answer and, in some cases, could care less.

When I attend some of the advisory committee meetings or review their minutes, it appears to me that the same few people are involved. In fact, one officer has been simultaneously serving as chairman of two of our most important and influential committees. Conversely, it is common to note that the same people are usually absent from meetings.

Unit commanders and senior NCO's have an inherent responsibility for the welfare of their troops. This responsibility cannot be fulfilled by just letting others carry the burden if they are willing or simply blaming the system if those who are involved in morale programs do not serve the best interest of your organization. Select your best people to represent your organization and be sure they are

known to everyone and have the means for obtaining group opinions. Follow-up by reviewing the committee minutes to insure that they are supporting the whole unit and replace them if they're not. Support your representatives by encouraging them to be actively involved and free to attend the meetings.

Effective entertainment, sports and recreation activities cannot be dictated. They must evolve from the known desires of the troops and must be supported by responsible supervisors.

Gen. Brown speaks on defense, benefits

(Editor's Note: Following are comments made by Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Gen. George S. Brown in a statement to the Congress on the U.S. defense posture for fiscal year 1978.)

"Readiness of our force is being threatened by mounting concern among the Service members for their benefits, and standard of living. These true volunteers freely commit themselves to the defense of our Nation. In return, they expect their leaders to commit themselves to the Service member in insuring that they have an adequate standard of living.

"Since 1972, there have been repeated attempts to reduce, eliminate, transfer, and transform military benefits which in the past have helped to convince the individual to enlist or to make Military Service a career. The GI Bill, which in the opinion of some recruitment officials has been the single most important enlistment incentive, has been restructured and replaced by a pay-as-you-go

"Pay raises have been held below the rise in cost of living, resulting in reduced purchasing power. Medical benefits have been modified. reduced, or eliminated. Threats of further reductions are constantly highlighted by private publications targeted at the Service member.

Twenty per cent of our Army's enlisted members work at a second job and approximately 50 per cent of their wives work. More than 60 per cent of our current enlisted personnel have entered the Service since 1972. Since they enlisted they have, in effect, experienced only losses in their purchasing power and benefits. We must defuse this issue before it severely impacts on our readiness.

"As a minimum, I believe there should be a one-year moratorium on changes to the compensation and Manpower Commission. Then, a Compensation and the Defense Service member.



Some states still offer Vietnam Veterans bonus

(AFPS) - Vietnam Veteran bonuses are still available from 12 States which have application deadlines in 1977 or thereafter. In all cases, eligibility determination rests with State authorities and individuals applying must meet all the State's requirements.

A point to remember, as income tax-time approaches, is that State bonus payments are wholly exempt from Federal and State taxes and need not be reported on either tax form.





Tornadoes

Weather Squadron at Reese and the National Weather Service, located at the Municipal Airport, assist each other during times of severe weather.

Firemen and policemen are posted around the city at the beginning of a severe weather watch, and Reese has a trained observer ready to relay the approach of any danger. The National Weather Service issues its warnings to the general public through Civil Defense, radio and television stations while the Base Weather Station relays its warning directly to the Command Post. Sirens, both in Lubbock and at Reese will not be sounded until a tornado has been sighted. Don't wait to hear the siren before

Preparation is the key to the protection of all concerned.

The tornado instructions here will help. Cut out and place in a central location for quick reference.

Tornado Instructions

TORNADO WATCH: Weather conditions are favorable for the development of tornadoes. Tornado activity may be expected.

TORNADO WARNING: Tornado has actually been sighted.

WHAT TO DO:

TORNADO WATCH:

1. Monitor Emergency Broadcast System,..KFYO 790...for official
Weather Bureau information if thunderstorm activity is observed.

2. Weather Information on Television: The following weather symbols may appear in the lower left hand side of the screen.

TRANSPARENT SOLID WATCH WARNING





TRANSPARENT SOLID station will broadcast what counties the watch warnings

- will cover. Secure all movable objects in the vicinity of your residence or work area. Have the movements of children restricted to the immediate vicinity of
- your home. Open windows slightly to help equalize the inside and outside pressure. Gather emergency supplies and have them readily available.

- TORNADO WARNING:

 1. STAY INSIDE YOUR BUILDING! Potential loss of life or bodily injury may occur if you are caught in the open.
 2. Monitor radio station KFYO 790. Confirmed sightings and movements will be broadcasted when sightings occur.
 3. A steady 3 to 5 minute tone on the base siren system indicates a tornado has been sighted and Reese AFB appears to be in its path.
 4. If either the base siren, a loud roar, or you sight a tornado, take cover in the strongest part of your residence or work area. Cover yourself to provide protection against flying debris.
 (a) AVOID AREAS NEAR WINDOWS
 (b) DO NOT REMAIN ON THE SECOND STORY OF ANY BUILDING
 (c) LIE FLAT ON THE FLOOR UNDER SOME PROTECTIVE COVER

Keep calm, determine injuries, and render first aid.
Stay away from fallen power lines.
Cooperate fully with first aid teams, Security Police, and other damage assessment and recovery personnel.
Do not leave quarters until ALL CLEAR has been broadcast by the Security Police.



The recent reduction of dental care for dependents, at Conus Air Force Bases, has been temporarily suspended.

The suspension has been instituted pending a clarification and resolution of the interpretation of Title 10, United States Code

Until the issue is resolved the preventive dentistry program for dependent children will continue as it existed prior to the curtailment February:


