Bases close in major realignment

to save \$\$

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - A decision to close Craig AFB, Ala.; Kincheloe AFB, Mich.; and Webb AFB, Tex., has been made by Secretary of the Air Force Thomas C. Reed.

Secretary Reed said, "These actions, streamlining our organization and reducing overhead, are necessary if we are to modernize our combat forces—as we must. These actions alone will save at least \$75 million per year. There is no alternative to such actions in light of the hard realities of defense budgeting.'

The closings are part of a major Air Force base realignment package announced March 11, 1976.

Officials said that movement of people and equipment at Kincheloe AFB will occur during the summer of 1977. Students at Craig and Webb AFBs will complete their current phase of training in place. Those bases will be reduced to caretaker operations and then declared excess to Air Force requirements.

Job reservation not hurt by retraining application

RANDOLPH AFB, Tex. (AFNS) -First-term airmen with an approved career job reservation (CJR), who have extended their enlistment a year, can now keep it if they want to apply for retraining into a shortage career field, according to Air Force Military Personnel Center (AFMPC) officials.

If the retraining application is approved, the original CJR will be cencelled automatically and a retraining CJR in the new Air Force specialty code will be issued. Previously, airmen requesting retraining had to cancel the CJR they held and, if the retraining

request was disapproved, had to start over again on the waiting list.

Air Force needs about 3,000 retrainees each year to balance skill shortages and surpluses. To encourage more retraining applications, the new procedure was introduced. It eliminated the risk of losing an approved CJR when a retraining application is not approved.

Personnel officials stress that it is important for first termers to apply for a CJR when they first become eligible. Early application will enhance an airman's chance of receiving a CJR in his or her current

In addition, AFMPC officials say that the selective reenlistment bonus (SRB), Zone "A," multiple one, is expected to become effective in October. The new bonus level will be in addition to SRB in multiples two, three and four which are already in effect. The new level will be payable in two equal installments.

The officials add a reminder that the regular reenlistment bonus, with a maximum of \$2,000 as a cumulative total throughout a military career, doesn't apply to those who came on active duty after June 1, 1947.

Small Claims Court settles legal disputes for small fee

Many times people discover that they have been legally wronged, but it would cost more to sue than they would have a right to recover. More often than not, the person who has committed the wrong knows this and their response to a demand for settlement is all too often "So sue me!" The solution to this problem is Small Claims Court.

In Texas, the Small Claims Court is a division of the Justice of the Peace Court. It has the power to hear and settle disputes not exceeding \$150.00. If the dispute is over wages, the Small Claims Court can hear cases not exceeding the judge. If you have witnesses or

\$200.00. The cost is minimal; only a small filing fee and citation fee are required.

The most important feature of Small Claims Court is that no attorneys are necessary. To file your case, simply go to the Clerk of the Small Claims Court at the County Court House. The clerk will help you fill out a petition which will be served on the other party. The other party has a specified period of time to answer. If that party does not answer or does not appear at the time set for trial, you will win by

If the case is contested at trial, simply tell your side of the story to documents, take them with you. The opposing party will be given the same opportunity.

If the judge rules in your favor, a judgement will be entered that the other party must pay within 20 days. If he does not pay, an execution of judgement may be entered and conveyed to the sheriff. The sheriff can then seize the defendant's property.

If you think that you have a possible claim, make an appointment for legal assistance by calling the legal office at ext. 2505. The attorneys in your legal office will be glad to evaluate your case and help you prepare for your day in

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CCAF awards 4 hours for NCO School diploma

In January 1977 the Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) Policy Council accepted the ATC NCO Leadership Schools as an affiliate. With this affiliation, CCAF is awarding four semester hours of college credit in management.

The Professional Military Education (PME) Center has furnished CCAF with required data on each graduate of the Reese NCO Leadership School. Data on individuals who graduated from other ATC NCO Leadership Schools is being furnished to CCAF by the PME Center from which the individual graduated.

All graduates are encouraged to take full advantage of this opportunity to gain credit. You can obtain the credit simply by visiting the Base Education Center and requesting an official transcript. Your must have your copy of your

Air Force Form 1256, Certificate of Completion. Individuals who have previously obtained a transcript from CCAF need only to present their AF Form 1256 to the Education Center and request an update.

K. I. Sawyer joins base stabilized tour program

RANDOLPH AFB, Tex. (AFNS) -K.I. Sawyer AFB, Mich., has been added to the Air Force's voluntary stabilized base assignment program (VSBAP).

K.I. Sawyer joins Minot and Grand Forks AFBs, N.D., in the program which offers airmen a

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guaranteed assignment to one of these bases for a five-year period. The VSBAP approvals at K.I. Sawyer will be limited to 50 per cent of authorizations in all Air Force specialty codes.

Personnel officials said that VSBAP is not expected to be offered at more than a few bases because of the adverse impact an overstabilized force would have on worldwide requirements.

For the first 30 days, applications will be accepted only from overseas returnees and members presently at K.I. Sawyer. During this period, airmen in these two categories who already have an assignment will be given the opportunity to apply for the program.

After that, the program will be opened to airmen at other stateside bases as well, including for a second 30-day period stateside airmen who already have an assignment. After this 60-day period, normal application procedures will apply

for everyone. Additional details are available at the Consolidated Base Personnel

Transportation Division

Separated into three separate section are about 100 men and women who comprise the Reese Transportation Division. Their work in Motor Vehicle Operations, Vehicle Maintenence and Traffic Management touches nearly every person and organization on Reese.

Those people working in Operations handle the driving. They drive everything from staff cars to tractor-trailer rigs in their job of transporting people and materials.

Insuring that all these vehicles are kept in top operating condition is the job of people in Vehicle

Maintenance. When one considers that there are 213 registered vehicles, which includes special equipment vehicles such as firetrucks and road graders, to maintain, an idea of how busy they are is seen.

Perhaps just as busy are the people in Traffic Management. They handle about 12,000 transactions a year encompassing outbound and inbound household goods, freight shipments and passenger accomodations. Their work is valued at more than \$1.4 million a year.

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CHAMPUS news

(Editor's Note: This is the first in a series designed to assist in understanding CHAMPUS more fully. Each item deals with one particular ct of the new CHAMPUS Regulation.

CHAMPUS is one of the finest, most comprehensive medical benefit programs in existence today. As with any such program, however, there are limitations with respect to benefits, eligibility, cost sharing, etc. Some limitations and other aspects of the new CHAMPUS Regulation are explained in detail

For additional information, call the CHAMPUS advisor at ext. 2522 or write to OCHAMPUS, Denver, Colorado 80240.)

The Regulation sets forth a multilevel administrative procedure under which beneficiaries and certain providers can appeal claim decisions that have been made by a CHAMPUS contractor or by OCHAMPUS. "Multi-level" means that the appeal starts at one level and moves to the next if the appealing party still is not satisfied.

Although an informal appeals mechanism has always existed for CHAMPUS beneficiaries, the formal procedures spelled out in the Regulation are new to the Program. They do not replace a beneficiary's right to initiate legal action. However, a court of law rarely agrees to consider such a case until all administrative remedies have been exhausted.

• Informal Review by the Contractor

· Reconsideration by the Contractor - any decision involving \$50 or less is final at this level

• OCHAMPUS Review. Any decision involving \$300 or less is final at this level Independent Hearing. Amount

in dispute must be over \$300 If a hearing officer and the Director of OCHAMPUS disagree on a decision at the hearing level or the decision is unfavorable to the appealing party, the case is referred automatically to the Assistant Secretary of Defense (Health

There are three levels to which an OCHAMPUS decision can be appealed:

Informal Reconsideration by **OCHAMPUS**

 Formal OCHAMPUS Review -Any decision involving \$300 or less is final at this level

• Independent Hearing. Amount in dispute must be over \$300.

If a hearing officer and the Director of OCHAMPUS disagree on a decision at the hearing level or the decision is unfavorable to the appealing party, the case is referred automatically to the Assistant of Defense (Health Secretary Affairs)

Benefit requirements

To qualify as a CHAMPUS benefit, a service or supply must be medically necessary and must be required for the diagnosis and treatment of illness or injury, or for maternity care.

This is not a new rule—it has been the basis for CHAMPUS payments since the Program was launched. But it will be enforced more strictly under the Regulation, which provides that all claims will be subject to special review-peer review and utilization review.

Beneficiaries should be aware of the intensified enforcement. And, it should be explained carefully to their physicians. Failure to do so could create financial hardship for a beneficiary who finds himself or herself faced with a doctor's bill which CHAMPUS will not share because the care is not considered medically necessary.

Two examples of unnecessary care are tests not related to a diagnosis and admission of a beneficiary to a hospital for care that could have been provided on an outpatient basis.




