201 years later, Americans continue to celebrate a freedom that began in . . .

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If celebrating our Nation's independence day on the Fourth of July was good enough for Thomas Jefferson, who had a significant role in writing the Declaration of Independence, it should be good enough for us today. Periodically writers or historians point out very learnedly that our independence did not in fact begin on the July 4, 1776, date.

It was Jefferson's idea that the Fourth of July should be the United States' primary national day. He set the tone for future celebrations on July 4, 1801, just after he entered the White House.

A guest described the festivities: "We found about 20 persons present in the room where sat Mr. J. surrounded by five Cherokee chiefs. After a conversation of a few minutes, he invited his

company into the usual dining room, whose four large sideboards were covered with refreshments (by this time the crowd had grown to 100)... Martial music soon announced the approach of the Marine Corps of Capt. Burroughs, who in due military form saluted the President accompanied by the President's March... All appeared to be cheerful, all happy. Mr. Jefferson mingled promiscu-

ously with the citizens. . . . "

In subsequent years,
Fourth of July celebrations have been the highlight of our national calendar. It is interesting to note, however, that if our independence does not stem from July 4, 1776, nothing else of any national consequence ever happened on that date. For example, George Washington assumed command of the Army beseiging Boston on July 2, 1775. On July 3, 1898, the

Spanish fleet was destroyed during the Spanish-American War. On July 2, 1921, a joint resolution of Congress declared the war with Germany at an end. On July 3, 1944, the First U.S. Army opened an offensive in France.

One event of interesting consequence, however, did happen on July 4. George M. Cohan, whose popular songs included "Over There" and "It's a Grand Old Flag," was born on Independence Day in 1878, a fact that he noted in one of his famous songs: "I'm a Yankee Doodle Dandy . . . Born on the Fourth of July."

Although most of Cohan's more than 100 songs are remembered only by oldtimers, his "Yankee Doodle Dandy" has remained a well-known favorite, revived each year on the Fourth of July by every band marching down Main Street, U.S.A.

Grounds maintenance for Building 800 is actually accomplished by two different agencies. Normally, a building custodian for a building is responsible for all grass cutting, policing and trimming around the building to a distance of fifty feet from the building, or to the nearest crub or street. In the case of building 800, the Civil Engineering Squadron has graciously used their large gangtype mowers to cut as close to the building as possible. This was done because the gang-type mowers can easily cut close the building with a few passes. This is being accomplished as a courtesy to the building custodian who is responsible for the finish mowing and trimming around the facility. Civil Engineering personnel who operated these mowers are thoroughly trained in their responsibilities, but sometimes building custodians' help is not properly trained. To that end, a series of articles will be published in the base newspaper to acquaint all personnel with requirements for maintaining grounds properly for good base apperance — to include proper grass height, cutting and watering frequencies.

The Bible says

Who creates man, how was mankind created

Question: If God created man, why is it that less than one per cent of all mankind knows that He exists?

Answer: There is more to this question than appears at a casual glance. Actually, three questions are asked in one, does god exist; if he does, did he create all things (especially man); and if He does exist and He did create man, then how do you explain why less than one per cent of all humanity knows of His existence?

First of all, the Bible begins with God, not with arguments for his existance. Genesis 1:1 reads like this,: "In the beginning God . . .". This leaves little room for speculation. Hebrews 11:6 reads, "But without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he that cometh to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him." According to the Bible, God does exist, He is. We each either choose to accept this as true or think it is a lie. Psalm 14:1 says, "The fool hath said in his heart, there is no God." Where do you stand?

Secondly, the Bible says that God did in fact create all things. This is clearly declared in the first chapter of Genesis, and you are urged to read it for yourself. Notice the appearance of these phrases: "God said ... and there was"; "God said ... and it was so"; "God created"; "God made". While some will say outright this is a lie, others will go for a

compromise by watering the Scripture down to "God made some basics and then merely watched things be made." There is no Biblical basis for such a "compromise". In addition to the Genesis record, John 1:3 reads, "All things were made by Him, and without Him was not anything made that was made." Colossians 1:16 says, "For by Him were all things created . . .". Now, unless we read something into or out of the Bible, it does not say the God watched, it says He made.

Thirdly, why does less than one per cent of all humanity know of His existance? I find this statistic most questionable, and know of no source whereby such a figure can be substantiated. But even without the statistic the question is worthy of answers from the Bible. The Bible says that God's existance is visible to all, not to a percentage. Psalm 19:1-4 and Romans 1:19-23 are excellent answers to this question. The heavens and the earth are testimony to God's existance to all humanity. The Bible says that through them God's existance is so clearly seen that we are without excuse! As Romans 3:11 so aptly puts it, the problem is not that He doesn't exist, but that there are none that seek Him. Instead He sought us out, and gave His Son, Jesus Christ, to die on a rugged Roman cross as our sacrifice. Thus we may, by placing our trust in Him, have forgiveness and peace, and life abundant and eternal.

Space 'A' travel: how, why it works for you

Space-available travel is probably one of the most misunderstood benefits of military life. Knowing a little more about how the space-A program works can help you take advantage of a number of travel opportunities.

Military forces have been reduced over the years and airlift requirements have been reduced accordingly. Consequently, there

"Many service people see this as a lack of sensitivity or responsiveness to their needs or desires to travel," says Lt. Col. Ramon Taranto, chief of the passenger section in the Air Force directorate of transportation.

"It is extremely important that prospective travelers understand how excess seats become available and may be used," he pointed out.

Perhaps the most important fact for potential travelers to understand is that the Air Force can make no special arrangements for space-A passengers.

According to Colonel Taranto, the services are prohibited from funding, providing manpower or scheduling aircraft specifically for space-A passengers. He emphasized that space-A seats are a byproduct of regular scheduling to support duty passengers and cargo.

The Military Airlift Command is the primary military operator of passenger aircraft. Air Force transportation officials say MAC averages about a 95 per cent seat use rate for duty passengers in high density routes leaving the United States.

Transportation officials also say improved scheduling and booking procedures are expected to increase duty-passenger use rates and further decrease the number of space-A seats.

The space-A roster is of obvious importance, but is also a source of confusion, to potential travelers.

"Many people don't understand how they can be number 8 on the roster at one time and number 20 a short time later," Colonel Taranto says. The explanation lies in Department of Defense Regulation 4515.13-R which contains policies affecting passenger transportation.

Duty passengers travel on a priority I, space-required basis. Military personnel on emergency leave travel in the same category.

There are four specific space-A categories (in order of priority): (1) dependents on emergency leave; (2) military personnel on ordinary leave; (3) student dependents; and (4) retired military personnel.

The colonel explains that personnel in categories two through four can expect the greatest amount of fluctuation as space-required and emergency-leave passengers seek transportation.

"It is also important for prospective travelers to be aware of their entitlements," Colonel Taranto said. For example, dependents become eligible for space-A travel through their military sponsor. When the member dies, the space-A travel is no longer authorized.

Another example the colonel mentioned is travel through error. If a member or dependent obtains space-A transportation to which he or she is not entitled, the individual must repay the government.

Repayment is required even if military officials mistakenly issued paperwork authorizing the transportation. The rates are listed in Air Force Regulation 76-28 and are about the same as the cost of commercial transportation.





Tax Reform Act approves SITW

Military members have been subject to state income tax for some time if they maintain a legal residence in the District of Columbia, or in one of the 36 states which tax its residents who have entered the military. In most cases, the requirement to file a state tax return (and if applicable pay state income tax) exists regardless of where you are stationed in the world. Unlike Federal income tax there were no provisions to withhold state income tax directly from an individual's pay until the Tax Reform Act of 1976 was passed. A part of this legislative revision requires the Armed Forces to withhold state income tax from their members' pay. The Air Force will implement state income tax withholding (SITW) today.

Not all members will be effected by SITW. There are 14 states which either have no state income tax, or

do not tax military pay. They are; Alaska, Connecticut, Florida, Illinois, Michigan, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, Washington, and Wyoming. Members who have legal resident in one of these states, will not have state income tax withheld from their pay. In addition, there are five states (California, Idaho, Missouri, Pennsylvania and West Virginia) which require withholding from only those military "residents" who actually reside within these states during their military service. Reese AFB personnel with a legal residence in one of these states will not be effected by SITW.

Personnel with legal residences in the states of New York or New Jersey must meet several special conditions to avoid SITW. Besides not physically residing in the state, members must also satisfy all of the following conditions.

• They must not maintain a per-

manent place of abode within the state (New York/New Jersey).

• They must maintain a permanent place of abode outside the state.

• They cannot spend more than 30 days within the state during the tax year.

Members meeting these conditions must certify so in writing. Certification forms were mailed to all members meeting the above conditions who have not yet returned their certification forms (or those who did not receive forms in the mail) should contact the Accounting and Finance Office immediately. New York/New Jersey legal residents who do not satisfy the special conditions will have state income tax withheld from their pay effective today.

All personnel should review their Leave and Earning Statements (LES) to insure two important bits of information have been properly recorded. First, the Remarks section of the LES contains the following statement, "Your State Tax Leg Res is (abbreviation of state)". Your correct state of legal residence should appear in this statement. Second, Block 50 of the LES should reflect your correct marital status and the number of exemptions you are claiming for tax purposes. If any of this information is wrong, contact the Accounting and Finance Office immediately.

On a special note, members should not make an arbitrary change of their legal residence to avoid taxation. Such attempts may result in legal actions should the orginal state question the change.

Members are urged to consult with the Staff Judge Advocate if they are contemplating such actions.

To date 19 states and the District of Columbia have finalized agreements with the U.S. Treasury to begin participation in the SITW program. Withholding for 13 of these states starts today. They are; Alabama, Delaware, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, New Jersey, New Mexico, New york, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Utah and Virginia. Six states (Massachusetts, Colorado, Indiana, Maryland, Wisconsin, and Rhode Island) and the District of Columbia will commence SITW on Aug. 1. Withholding for the remaining 17 states will start once their agreements with the Treasury are finalized. Base publications will advise peronnel of effective dates as they become known.



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

Byers performs safely, wins Quarterly Award

On February 15, 1977, 2nd Lt. Michael J. Byers, 64th Student Squadron, distinguished himself while performing as a solo student pilot in the T-37 trainer at Reese AFB, Texas and received a quarterly individual safety award for his actions.


At 11:40 A.M. on that date, Lieutenant Byers' aircraft experienced a flameout of the number one engine immediately after takeoff. His approximate altitude was 50 feet with airspeed approximately 100 knots, which prohibited him from aborting the takeoff. The aircraft was configured with full flaps and landing gear down. Accurately assessing the


situation, he quickly accomplished the appropriate emergency procedure enabling him to attain a safe air speed and altitude in spite of the limited thrust available. He then attempted an emergency airstart, which was unsuccessful.

While continuing around the outside pattern, another air-start was attempted which was successful, and a subsequent uneventful simulated single engine pattern and landing were accomplished. During the entire incident, Lieutenant Byers acted in a clam, professional manner and required only minimal assistance from the Runway Supervisory Unit Controller.

The Lubbock Red Cross will hold a free certified 8-hour course in Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation on Monday and Tuesday with class beginning at 6:30 p.m. - 1313 Avenue L. All persons at least 13 years of age are eligible. The cost for the book is \$2.00.

According to Sahab Ates, local Safety Programs Director, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, also known as CPR, is a combination of artificial respiration and artificial circulation, which should be started immediately as an emergency procedure, when cardiac arrest occurs, by those properly trained to do so. The Heart Association and Red Cross are actively engaged in training as many persons as possible in this Life Saving Technique.

The most common error is irrigating turf is applying water in the form of frequent light sprinklings rather than withholding water until foliage demonstrates definite evidence of, moisture stress and then recharging the soil to its full water holding capacity. When soil is recharged to its full moisture holding capacity

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and grass is allowed to almost reach its wilting point before additional moisture is applied, deep grass roots are developed. Deep roots enable grass to sustain growth and maintain attractive apperance for much longer periods of time than shallow roots under comparable conditions. By forcing grass to develop a deep root system using this method, a substantial reduction in water use can be made without detracting from grass appearance.

The amount of water that is required to recharge a soil will vary with many factors. During the growing season, two inches of water will be used during hot dry weather and the rate will reduce in proportion to growth and weather conditions. Most home and small sprinklers apply around one-half inch per hour, so it will normally be sufficient to water an area for four hours per week during the hottest dry weather. Most normal soils will not absorb water at one-half inch per hour, making it necessary to move sprinklers on and off an area several times before the total need is satisfied. In all cases, it is important

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to apply the total application in the fewest number of total elapsed hours possible.

Mowing height of turf is an important factor in reducing the amount of water required to maintain attractive turf. If the mower is set at one to one and one half inches in the early spring and slowly raised until it is one and one half to three inches (depending on specie of grass) when the hot weather of midsummer starts, the transpiration and evaporation rate from the soil will both be reduced. In

turn, less water will be required to replace that lost from transpiration and evaporation.

The following watering schedule

is established for Reese Village: • Monday, Wednesday and

Saturday - North side of Mitchell · Tuesday, Thursday and Sunday - South side of Mitchell

• The "Water Today" sign on Mitchell Street at the main gate will be posted accordingly.

It is each building custodian's responsibility not to water the same lawn area more frequently than once every seven days. This includes each occupant of Reese Village.

Also all watering will be curtailed for seven days after a rain of one inch or more. All personnel will be reminded of this by the posting of "No Watering Today" sign at the entrance to Reese Village on

In these days of cost consciousness, it is more imperative than ever to properly irrigate our turf areas with the least water required. Properly applied, irrigation water will provide attractive healthy turf and require less total water than has been the case in many instances in the past.

Take time when traveling to prevent holiday disasters

Taking a trip over the Fourth? Many of us will be. Go ahead, have fun. But be realistic. Don't try to overextend yourself. Divide the distance you plan to travel so it comfortably fits the number of days you have for your trip. Trying to go too far in too short a time can be a trip to disaster.

Nationwide there may be as many as 400 people who will lose their lives in accidents over the Fourth of July weekend. Last year in Lubbock 3 people died and another 31 were injured in accidents over the long weekend. Even closer to home, two Reese airmen were permanently injured in two separate, tragic motorcycle accidents.

Accident reports across the nation this coming weekend will probably reflect the same tragic story over and over again:

- "Driver was speeding and lost control.
- "Operator was under the influence of alcohol."
- · "Driver apparently fell asleep and crossed the centerline.'

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· "Occupant was thrown from the vehicle and killed. Safety Belts not




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Don't become a burglary victim

Yes. we want to help and if we would have known of your absence along with a neighbor, it might have been only a few hours after the crime occured that the break-in was found and our investigation might be aided by the time saved and we might have your property back on your return. Better yet, if we would have known of your absence and you followed our other suggestions, there may not have been any burglary or we might have apprehended the criminal at your home because we knew you were gone and so we were patrolling your home more frequently than normal.

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

AF wins okay to move mobile homes for junior enlisted due to base closures

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The Air Force has gained authority to move mobile homes at government expense for junior enlisted members individual members — is expected at scheduled for closure later this year. Military homeowners who have to

who have to relocate because of base closings. The most immediate impact — at significant savings to Kincheloe AFB, Mich.; Craig AFB, Ala.; and Webb AFB, Tex., sell their homes because of base closures can apply for relief under the Homeowners Assistance Program, but the program doesn't apply to mobile homes. Until now, the Air Force hasn't been authorized to pay for relocating mobile homes for junior airmen (E-4s with less than two years in service, and lower

"We know there are a number of airmen owning trailers who might have to go into debt or leave their homes behind, rather than face the moving costs," Secretary of the Air Force John C. Stetson said. "Selling their homes was not a viable option," he continued, "because the announcement of the base closure had depressed the resale market. Therefore, we appealed to the Department of Defense for a waiver to the Joint Travel Regulations (JTR)," the Secretary explained, 'and we are pleased that our request was approved."

The JTR was changed June 11 to give the service secretaries authority to make these determinations in the future for junior enlisted members at bases being closed without having to seek DOD approval. Air Force officials say the change is not retroactive and is not a blanket authority.

Air Force officials point out that individuals with mobile homes will still have to pay some moving costs, but their expenses should now be much less than previously. The current allowance for moving trailers is 74 cents per mile, but actual costs are estimated about \$1.50 per mile.

When a member receives his change of station orders, he or she works with base transportation officials to arrange for a commercial contractor to move the mobile home. The contractor bills the Air Force. The Air Force then determines the amount allowed for the move and bills the member for the difference.

The member must pay the difference between the two figures or file for "remission of indebtedness." The procedure is explained in Air Force Manual 177-373 and Air Force Regulation 177-1.

Depending upon the particular hardship involved and other factors, the Air Force may decide to cancel (remit) the debt.

Officials emphasize that remission of indebtedness is not automatic but is decided on a caseby-case basis. By law this avenue of relief is open only to enlisted

"The savings could range from several hundred dollars in moving expenses to several thousand if the member is forced to sell at a loss or abandon the mobile home because

of the expense of moving," he said. In addition to getting this special authority to move mobile homes, the Air Force is trying to get full travel and transportation entitlements for junior enlisted personnel.

Officials say extension of full entitlements to junior enlisted members will raise personnel costs so the matter is complex and will be time consuming.





have been detected in sufficient time to provide safe escape if smoke detectors had been installed. The Air Training Command has documented cases where installed smoke detectors saved the lives of occupants of on-base housing units; e.g., a family of six at Lowry AFB in December 1974, and, most recently, a housewife at Williams AFB.

The Air Force is endeavoring to equip each Air Force owned housing unit with smoke detectors using appropriated funds. However, this will be a long-range program. In the meantime, all housing occupants, both on and off base, are encouraged to purchase and install smoke detectors in their private quarters.

There are many high-quality, reliable detectors available at minimal cost in the Base Exchange and in local stores. Be certain the

smoke detector you purchase possesses the UL seal. This assures you the unit meets Underwriters Laboratories, Inc. (UL) testing and safety requirements. The ideal fire detector has not been perfected at a reasonable cost. No one type of detector, heat or smoke, can furnish 100 percent protection against all kinds of fires. Beware of some unscrupulous salespeople, sometimes in the guise of "fire experts" or "fire analysts", who use scare tactics to sell smoke detectors at grossly inflated prices.

An AF Form 332, Work Request, will not be required to install smoke detectors in Family Housing units on base. Dectors installed by occupants will be considered personal property. If additional information is desired, please contact the Family Housing Office, Ext.





The winners jumped off to a quick 9-1 lead, highlighted by a home run off the bat of Jun McClean and key hits by Mike Perry.


The roar of the Tigers was heard on the third and fourth innings, as they scored eight runs to tie the game. Chris Adams led the attack with a pair of singles.


