Reese supports Marine Toys for Tots campaign

For the past 30 years the United States Marines in the Lubbock area have held their annual "Toys for Tots" campaign. This year they'll be getting some major support from Reese.

MSgt. Robert Sulligan, spokesman for the Reese Toys for Tots campaign, said Monday that there will be an extensive base-wide effort to collect and repair toys for needy children in the Lubbock area.

The first big push will be tomorrow. Local Boy Scouts will be traveling through base housing,

collecting toys, games puzzles stuffed animals ect., from Reese Village residents. Sergeant Sulligan notes that games and puzzles should be complete and that all toys should be repairable, especially wagons and bikes. The scouts will be in the housing area from 10 a.m. until noon.

For those not living in Reese Village, toy drops are located at the Four Seasons, Toyland, Main Exchange, Commissary and near the Main Gate.

"By collecting toys early," says

Sergeant Sulligan, "We hope to give the many units and organizations assisting with the drive a chance to have everything in "gift giving" condition in time for the holidays." He also pointed out that people without children that wish to contribute to the campaign can do so by buying new toys and leaving them in one of the many toy drops.

DoD releases negotiating, bargaining directives

The Department of Defense has issued a directive prohibiting commanders and supervisors from negotiating or engaging in collective bargaining with any person or organization about terms or conditions of military service.

DOD Directive 1354.1, "Relationships with Organizations Which Seek to Represent Members of the Armed Forces in Negotiation or Collective Bargaining," is effective immediately.

According to a DOD announcement, the individual military services are expected to issue implementing instructions within 30 days.

The DOD directive establishes specific policies and procedures concerning organizations or people whose objectives are to organize or represent military members for

purposes of negotiating or bargaining about military service.

The directive applies to active-duty military personnel, personnel on inactive duty training and members of reserve components serving in their military capacities.

"Negotiation or collective bargaining" is defined in the directive as discussion between commanders or supervisors and individuals or groups purporting to represent military personnel in resolving such matters as wages, hours, grievances, assignments or other terms or conditions of military service.

In addition to collective bargaining, the directive prohibits:

- Military personnel from engaging in strikes, slowdowns, work stoppages or other actions by

two or more people which are intended to and obstruct or interfere with performance of military duty;

- Military personnel from picketing to cause strikes, slowdowns, etc., when such actions are related to terms or conditions of military service;

- Specified efforts on military installations to recruit military personnel into certain types of organizations; and

- Military members from joining certain organizations in specific circumstances.

The DOD announcement also stated the services will conduct continuing information and education programs to assure the widest possible degree of understanding and compliance with regulations on the subject of negotiations and collective bargaining. (AFNS)

AF conference

IFS heads meet

Air Force Testing and Evaluation Center (AFTEC) is hosting its 2nd all Air Force simulator operational test and evaluation (OTE) conference here Oct. 26-28. Reese was chosen as the site so that attendees could be exposed to the newest and best in instrument flight simulators.

The agenda will include briefings on the UPT/IFS facility and their training program and lessons learned by ATC in the procurement

and testing of the new T-37 simulator. Discussion topics will be policies and procedures relating to simulator OTE as well as applicable directives, test plans and report standardization.

Headquarters Strategic Air Command, Tactical Air Command, Air Force Systems Command, Air Force Logistics Command, Military Airlift Command, Air Defense Command, and Headquarters U.S. Air Force will be among the attendees.

CFC donations shatter '73 contribution record

As of Monday, with still two weeks to go in the Combined Federal Campaign, Reese personnel had already smashed the base goal and topped the 1973 contribution record.

Maj. R. L. Woods, CFC project officer here, said that the Reese "fair share" contributions already totaled \$79,684.22, nearly \$10,000 more than in Reese's banner campaign of 1973. "The '77 base goal was \$60,000 and the goal for all of the greater Lubbock area was \$81,000 when the campaign started," beamed Major Woods. "Right now Reese has nearly matched the total goal and

combined with the Lubbock contributions the CFC has drawn just over \$101,000.

pointed out that the campaign was divided up between Reese and 12 other districts in the area. "Only one other district has surpassed its goal thus far," he said, "and the Reese effort has been amazing." The major noted that this year's record figures are even more amazing when you realize that Reese had more people back in 1973."

At a recent United Way report meeting at the Lubbock Civic Center, 17 units were recognized for having at least 90 per cent of their

personnel contribute at least 75 per cent of their fair share. Sixteen of those units were from Reese. Social Actions Wing Comander and his staff and the Maintenance Administrative Section were singled out for having reached 100 per cent both in participation and fair share.

Major Woods added that a few more dollars are trickling in each day but, that the majority of funds expected are already in. Contact your unit representative if you haven't given your fair share and help make a great campaign even better.

ENERGY TEST ANSWERS

- Approximately half of the gas used in a gas stove is used to fuel the pilot lights because pilot lights burn continuously.
 - Fluorescent lights give off three to four times as much light per watt of electricity used as incandescent lamps do. One 40-watt fluorescent light gives more light than three 60-watt incandescent bulbs and the annual savings may be as much as \$10.
 - Aluminum is a very energy intensive material with the largest share of the energy going to process the ore. Recycling is a great energy saver. The nation's total throwaway containers equivalent energy waste is equal to the output of 10 large nuclear power plants.
 - A 100 watt lamp could burn for five hours on the energy used to manufacture a disposable can or bottle.

During graduation ceremonies Friday for Class 77-A, Sergeant Helvey was presented the Honor Graduate Award, the Academic Award and the Speech Award.

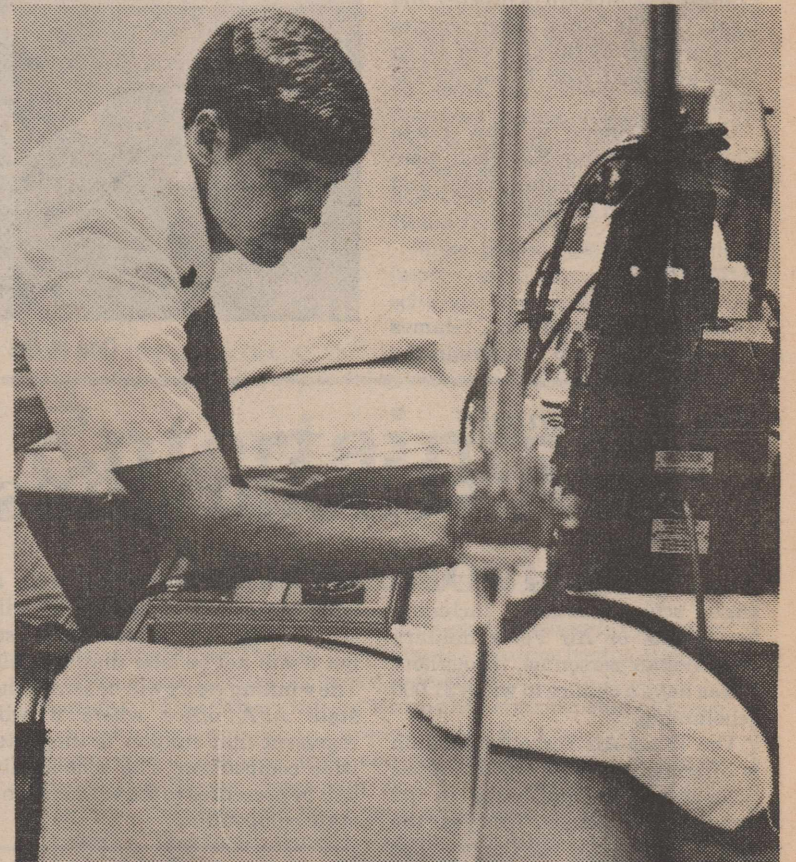

A copy of orders or a letter directing the move. A letter from the resident requesting reimbursement of relocation charges. A copy of the last bill at the old address. A copy of the first bill at the new address. This bill will clearly show the relocation charges.

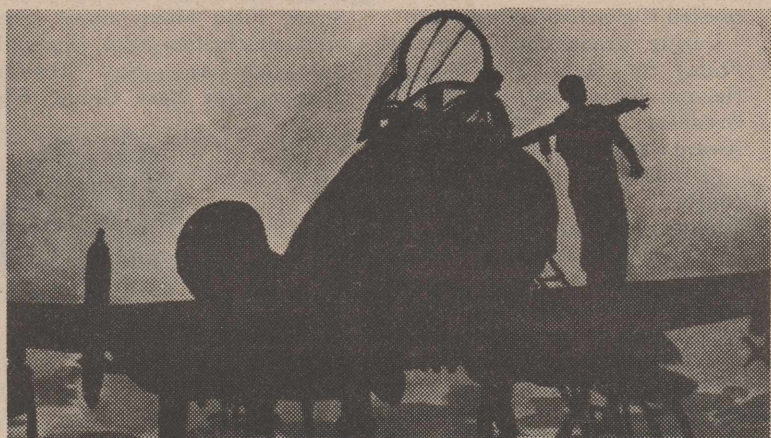

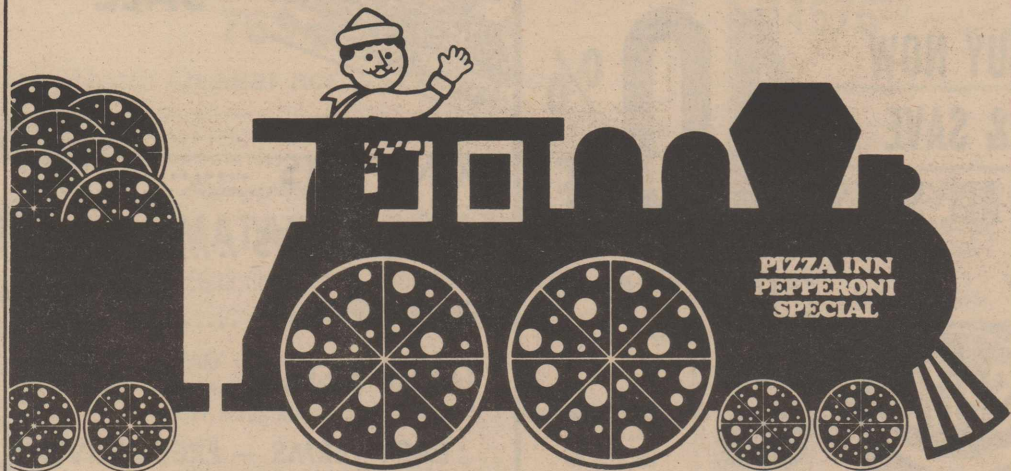

'Is my child a U.S. citizen?'

By Maj. David F. Sullivan

A frequently asked question in any legal office is . . . how can I obtain proof of citizenship for children born overseas?

If your child was born in the United States, he is automatically a citizen. An agency of the state in which he was born will provide a birth certificate so it will be easy to prove the child's age, place of birth and citizenship. Remember that the child may need a birth certificate in connection with a life insurance policy, application for admission to a school, passport application, or any number of similar reasons. It may be needed as proof of age, place of birth or United States citizenship.

Children born of American parents in a foreign country are legally citizens of the United States too, but a state-issued birth certificate will not be available to prove it. If a child of yours is in such a situation, there are two possible solutions to the problem:

First, you can obtain a Certificate of Citizenship by completing a Form N-600, which may be obtained from any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. The Personal Affairs Office of the CBPO also normally has a supply of Forms N-600. Supporting documents you will need include your marriage certificate, birth certificates of both parents, and the foreign birth

certificate issued where your child was born (with a translation if it is in a foreign language). If the parents were divorced, a copy of the divorce decree will be required. Supporting documents may not be returned to you, so they should be extra, certified copies. The fee for this certificate is \$10.00.

Second, you may be able to obtain

a Certification of Birth from the Authentication Officer, Department of State, Washington DC 20520, Consular Office (not all U.S. Consular Offices record births). A request for a Certification of Birth include the full name of the parents, the location of the Consular Office where the birth was recorded, and the date the Consular Report of

Birth was made. The fee for this document is \$3.00 for the first copy and \$1.60 for each additional copy. If the document exceeds one page in length, there is an additional charge of 60¢ for each additional page. The size and format of the Certification of Birth make it a very handy document to use in place of a state-issued birth certificate.

A patient, experienced Holloman squad spoiled the Rattlers' cage debut here last weekend, but, the home team learned from the loss and came back to split the series with a 75-70 win.

The opening minutes of game-one were pure pleasure for "team play" starved Reese cage fans. The Rattlers scored on five of their first six possessions as guards cut off picks and fed breaking forwards.

But before the first half was 10 minutes old, the inexperienced team made some critical turnovers and the opportunistic 49ers moved on out to a 35-30 lead at intermission.

Still struggling to find the controlled offense they had shown in the opening minutes, the Rattlers fell to as far as 11 points down in the second half. It was a familiar sight to Reese fans and it looked like another blowout.

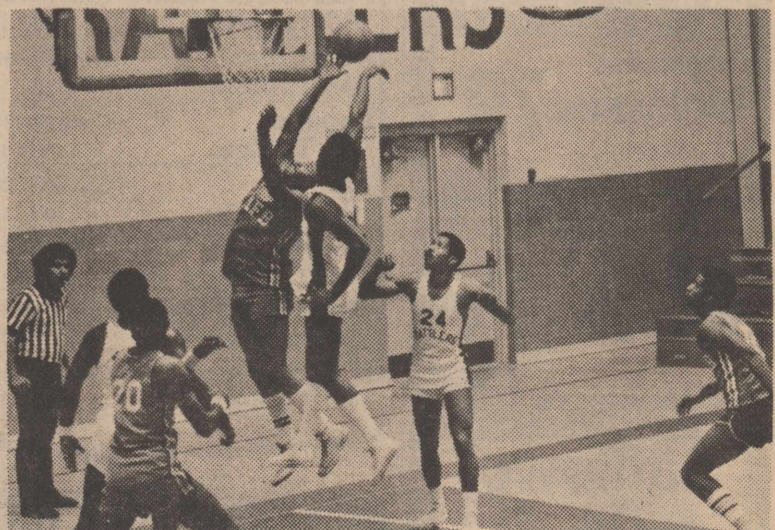
