Student pilots rescue fire victims

"Apprehension and a feeling of not doing enough" were the thoughts of Second Lieutenants Chris Manno and Bob McNeal after they and two other student pilots were credited with saving the lives of two Lubbock residents in an apartment fire Monday evening.

Assisted by Second Lieutenants Jim Rowland and Gary Loughrey, the four 64th Student Squadron members reacted without thought of possible injury to themselves while removing Jeanne Blakemore and Richard Charles Wallace from the blazing apartment.

"We just reacted to an emergency situation," said Lieutenant McNeal."As pilots, we are trained to react to emergencies," he recalled. "I don't think any of us were that calm inwardly but the training

just took over and we reacted."

These four future pilots' instincts, in a situation which was at best chaotic, were of working together to get the people out and warn the other occupants of the building.

Lieutenant Manno first discovered the fire when he saw smoke coming from the back patio door of the apartment. When he went around to the front of the apartment, he encountered a wall of smoke billowing through the open doorway. "I then crawled into the apartment and saw a man. I hollered at him but he just stood there in a daze. The room was full of smoke and just hollering took all my breath. I backed out fast and started yelling "Fire" and for help," explained Manno.

"I was in the shower," said Lieutenant Rowland, "when I

heard someone yelling. I couldn't tell at first what was going on so I put on some clothes and hurried outside. I went to the back of my apartment, saw smoke pouring from an upstairs apartment and Lieutenants Manno and Loughrey trying to get a man away from the fire. I helped them get the man down the stairs. We were asking him if

Gets hard labor

Court convicts airman

A Reese airman has been sentenced to at least 120 days at hard labor for violations of the articles of the Uniformed Code of Military Justice.

The airman, who pleaded guilty during a special court-martial here Nov. 28, was convicted on two counts of larceny (Article 121), one count of attepted larceny (Article 180) and four counts of writing bad checks (Article 123A).

The conviction carried a sentence of a bad conduct discharge, confinement at hard labor for 120 days, reduction in grade to airman basic and a fine of \$250. The airman will be retained in confinement until the fine is paid, but, not beyond 60 additional days of hard labor.

He is currently serving his sentence at Fort Sill, Okla.

The use of the kitchen is a privilege, not a right and the kitchen was closed until dormitory residents came up with a set of guidelines to ensure something of this nature does not reoccur. The kitchen will remain open as long as these guidelines are observed.

'Tis the season to get drunk???

As the Christmas and New Year holidays approach, many people will increase their consumption of alcoholic beverages for special occasions.

During the next few weeks you will be made aware of the possible consequences of driving your automobile while under the influence of alcohol. Basically these messages are designed to inform you that you or members of your family could be injured or

killed either because of your driving while intoxicated or because "the other guy" had a few too many.

However, everyone should be aware that he can suffer other serious consequences from driving while under the influence — even though he is not involved in an accident.

A person suspected of driving while intoxicated on Reese AFB will be asked by the Security Police to submit to a blood alcohol or other test to determine whether the individual is in fact intoxicated. If the person does not consent to the test, the test will not be administered. However, just because an individual does not receive a chemical test, this does not mean that he cannot be found guilty of driving while intoxicated. For example, the testimony of a Security Policeman, by itself, about how a person talked, acted, or looked may be enough to convice the appropriate authority that that person was indeed intoxicated.

Government employees who are apprehended on base for driving under the influence will have their base driving privileges revoked for six months if they refuse to submit to a chemical test or if they are found to have been intoxicated while driving. In addition, service members may receive a letter of reprimand or an Article 15, or even be court-martialed because of such an incident. Normally a dependent or other civilian who is not employed at Reese would be excluded from the base for an indefinite period of time if he were found to be driving on the base while intoxicated. Finally, the base commander may withdraw an

individual's government driver's license in these cases.

Of course, any person who drives on Texas Highways is subject to Texas traffic regulations. Texas law provides that any person who is convicted of driving while intoxicated will be punished by (1) confinement for not less than 3 days but not more than 2 years in the county jail and (2) a fine of not less than \$50.00 but not more than \$500.00. However, a judge can substitute 6 months probation for the jail sentence. Therefore, the least punishment an individual can receive for driving while intoxicated in Texas is 6 months probation and a \$50.00 fine.

In summary, the purpose of laws against "drunk driving" is to prevent accidents and injuries or death resulting therefrom. There are serious penalties for those who disobey these laws. You will frequently be urged to drive safely, especially during the holiday season — "if you drink, don't drive." However, remember that if you drive while intoxicated — even if you avoid being involved in an accident — you may subject yourself to serious criminal penalties.

The facts about paraquat

Marijuana Paraquat

Q. What are the chances of buying marijuana that is contaminated with paraquat, and what problems could I experience if I smoke this contaminated pot?

A. About 35 to 50 per cent of the marijuana sold in the United States is contaminated with the weed killing chemical (herbicide) known as paraquat. Paraquat is a highly toxic chemical that can cause permanent damage to the

When a "joint" is smoked most of the paraquat is burned and broken down into harmless products. However, about 0.2 per cent is inhaled into the lungs unchanged. The acute effects (immediate or shortterm) are chemical pneumonia

(due to the irritating effect of the paraquat) and kidney and liver damage. If the acute effects do not kill you, you will probably develop a chronic (delayed or long-term fibrosis of the lungs known as pulmonary fibrosis (fibrous tissue within the

Ampicillin Information

Q. My two year old son has an ear infection and is receiving a suspension called ampicillin. What information do I need to know to give this medicine correctly?

A. Ampicillin is an antibiotic used to treat a variety of infections caused by different organisms or bacteria. To insure that the antibiotic provides optimal results, it should be given on an empty stomach, preferably one hour before or two hours after a meal. It should also be taken "around the clock" at specific intervals, i.e. every 6 hours - 6 a.m., noon, 6 p.m., and midnight. Milk, juices or antacids should also be avoided for one hour before and two hours after each dose.

Before giving each dose, shake the bottle well to insure it is mixed. After giving each dose, place the medication in the refrigerator, this will allow the product to be used for 14 days if necessary.

Avoid freezing. The suspension can be left at room temperature for seven days with minor loss of potency, however, it should be destroyed after the seventh day.

Your child may experience loose stools while on this medication. If they become persistent or severe, notify your physician. Your physician should also be notified if your child develops a skin rash while on this drug.



AF Reserve retirees may opt for 'SB' plan

Air Force Reserve retirees may now choose to participate in the Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) before reaching age 60, the previous cut-off.

Eligible members may now ensure that a portion of their retired pay goes to their surviving dependents whether the retiree lives to age 60 or not. Reservists possessing a 20-year pay eligibility certificate may now choose one of three options:

a. Defer decision to join SBP until age 60.

b. Select an annuity payable to the survivor which begins on the 60th anniversary of the deceased designator's birth, or the day after the designator's death if he or she lives beyond

c. Select an annuity payable the day after the participant's death, no matter when he or she dies, even if prior to age 60.

Another benefit brought about by the recent passage of Public Law 95-397 in addition to annuity selection is that dependents will receive medical and dental benefits after the 60th anniversary of the designator's birth.

anyone else was in the apartment but couldn't get an answer from him or any of the bystanders.'

"By then, smoke was really coming out of the apartment and windows were exploding," he added. "In a few minutes, we saw a woman coming through the smoke, but; another window exploded and she turned back into the apartment."

"We rushed in to get her. By the time we reached her, her hair was smoldering and her blouse was burning," he continued. "We used a blanket Gary had gotten for the man to smother the fire on her."

Lieutenant McNeal added, "There wasn't room for all four of us at the door to the apartment, so I went down and began to clear a route for the



emergency vehicles. It was really something. It just seemed everyone was confused or something. Earlier, I had to tell one of the building residents five or six times to call the fire department and I still don't know if she called. Someone had called because the fire department and ambulance did get there pretty fast. The Lubbock Fire Department personnel really impressed me with their courage in going into the apartment, checking for other occupants and getting the fire out so quickly."



Shell gas cuts may force rationing

Corporation officials to cut back on the base service station's gas authorization this month, may mean rationing for lead-free gas

According to Dan Arais, Base Exchange manager here, Shell Oil has reduced Reese's commercial gas allotment by 25 per cent from last December's figures. Meaning, Reese will receive about 64,000 gallons this month. Last year, the base

gallons of gas.

'The 25 per cent reduction in itself won't be much of a problem," says Arias, "but, a further restriction on lead-free gas may cause us some problems.'

The restriction allows the base to order only 38 er cent of the total gas authorization in lead-free gas. That comes to about 24,000 gallons. In November, the base service

A decision by Shell Oil received approximately 86,000 station sold more than 27,000 gallons of the special gas.

"Regular gas is our top seller," continued Arias. "We can cut back on our premium and increase our regular gas orders without causing any problem for our customers. But the lead-free situation may force us to limit customers to 10 gallons per visit."

The Exchange manager went on to explain that rationing, if necessary, probably won't come

until the second half of December. Holiday leaves may lower the lead-free usage to the point where no rationing will be needed at all.

"We aren't sure that rationing will be necessary, points out Arias, "But just in case, people should be thinking about ways to cut back on usage."

He also said that Shell hasn't indicated whether or not the authorization limits will continue into next year.

prescribed medication currently being used.



AF Aid Society loans assist with cost of college education

Education of children beyond the high school level is more and more becoming prohibitive in costs for Air Force personnel. To help, the Air Force Aid Society has loans available.

The Aid Society provides loans with a maximum amount of \$2,000 per student per school year at an interest rate of 5 per cent each annum. Loans are made on the basis of the parents' income, assets, size of family, any particular financial

difficulties or obligations, student summer earnings, scholarships or gift aid, loans and the total cost of attending a specific institution for one academic vear.

Personnel eligible for these low cost loans are the unmarried, dependent sons and daughters of:

 Air Force personnel who died on active duty or after having been retired from active duty for length of service or

- Air Force and Reserve personnel who retired from active duty for length of service or disability;
- Air Force personnel on extended active duty; and
- · Air National Guard and Reserve personnel on extended active duty with the Air Force.

Guyana cleanup tasks services

Air Force personnel and aircraft were key elements in the U.S. response to the recent tragedy in Guyana.

Air Force involvement began on Nov. 18, when the Military Airlift Command sent a C-141 and a reserve medical team to Guyana to assist the members of California Congressman Leo Ryan's group, attacked during a visit to Jonestown.

Additional airlift was required after massive suicides were discovered. A joint task force was established, involving hundreds of Air Force, Army, Navy, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve personnel. Twenty-five C-141 and ten C-130 flights were operated to set up the airlift. Three HH-53 helicopters were provided to transport the remains from remote Jonestown to Georgetown.

Air Force Reserve C-130H aircraft refueled the helicopters enroute, Air National Guard C-130 crews provided all support airlift from the Panama Canal

The joint task force operated in three locations in Guyana: Georgetown as a support base, Jonestown as a command post and Matthews Ridge as a logistical base and refueling area. The HH-538 made approximately 30 shuttle missions, flying the remains to Georgetown. C-141 aircraft then airlifted the bodies to Dover AFB, Del.

At Dover, some 100 Air Force men and women volunteered to assist, 60 helping the 12-person mortuary staff, while others cleaned transfer cases for reuse. A family center for the next-in was operated by volunteers. Fifteen part-time information specialists assisted the fiveperson information staff in handling the 120 news media representatives and over 300 telephone requests.

Reese commissary among ATC projects

Reese's new commissary is among several "people" projects planned for Fiscal Year 1979 in the Air Training Command.

These projects include family housing, dormitories and recreation facilities as well as commissaries.

Reese's new commissary is now in the "secondary" design stage. Base and Air Force Commissary officials got a look at the primary designs a couple of weeks ago and expect to see the contracted architect's reworked designs sometime in late January. These designs will be 65 per cent complete with the third and final (95 per cent complete) designs expected in March or April.

Present plans are for the new commissary to be built where the Base Exchange warehouse (bldg. 535) is now. The warehouse will be renovated into a "modern supermarket" type facility.

Once completed, the commissary will be the starting point for a new shopping center that will include nearly all of the Base Exchange facilities. Initial estimates on the commissary project predicted completion by late summer or early fall of next year. However, revised estimates lean more toward late fall or early winter.

Other ATC projects

Family housing projects scheduled for the fiscal year are the upgrading of 278 Wherry units at Keesler AFB, Miss., and 251 at Mather AFB, Calif.

Other family oriented projects in the construction program include new commissaries at Randolph AFB, Tex. youth center at Sheppard AFB, Tex; and child care center at Gunter AS, Ala.

A new bachelor enlisted dormitory with a solar energy heated hot water system is planned for Lackland AFB, Tex. Upgrading of enlisted dormitories at Mather AFB and Squadron Officer School bachelor officer quarters at Maxwell AFB, Ala., are also in the contruction program.
