Cars with out-of-state license must have 1960 Texas tags before 1961 tags may be sold for the cars, if the cars are registered any time before April 1.

All vehicles must bear 1961 tags by midnight of April 1, 1961.

To avoid delay and confusion bring your certificate of title and last year's registration receipt.

Your County Tax Collector is Required under the Law to Examine the Title and License Receipt before he can renew the registration of your vehicle.
