

Brad Theissen was named head football coach at Stratford High School, Wednesday night by the SISD Board of Trustees. Brad, who previously coached at Roosevelt High School, Bridgeport High School, and Roby High School, takes over the position vacated by Dwayne Gray.

Coach Theissen has been head football coach and athletic director at Roby for the past four seasons. After taking over a program which had not had a winning season in ten years, Coach Theissen was named the Lubbock Avalanche Journal "Coach of the Year" in 1990 finishing with a record of 7-3.

Superintendent of Schools, Sam Brite said, "We feel fortunate to get someone with such high character and respected by his peers. We feel that Coach Theissen can continue to provide the Stratford Elk winning tradition."

Public Notice

On February 22, 1994, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company ("Southwestern Bell" or "Company") filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") to restructure the Company's Local Transport and Directory Transport categories of its Switched Access Service. This matter has been assigned to Docket No. 12784. The tariff sheets in Southwestern Bell's application, if approved, will bring the Company's intrastate Access Service Tariff into structural parity with the Company's interstate Tariff No. 73 for Local Transport. Southwestern Bell's companion interstate tariff became effective on January 1, 1994.

The transport rate elements provide for the transmission facilities between the cutomer's premises and the end office switch(es) where the customer's traffic is switched to originate or terminate the customer's communications

Southwestern Bell proposes to implement the revised tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. Although the proposed tariff changes will affect all customers subscribing to Switched Access Service, the Local Transport and Directory Transport categories of Southwestern Bell's Switched Access Service is primarily for interexchange carriers. If approved, this application will result in an increase in Southwestern Bell's revenues of approximately \$1682.00 during the first year. Southwestern Bell proposes that the changes be effective on December 1, 1994.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. - 3 cups blanched almonds, toasted, finely ground
- 1/2 cup sugar 1/3 cup melted butter or
- margarine 1 cup raspberry preserves 2 tablespoons raspberry-
- flavor liqueur 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 can (8 oz.) almond paste
- 2 tablespoons butter or
- margarine, softened
- 2 cans (15 oz. each) Bartlett pear halves in light
- syrup, drained 1 oz. semi-sweet chocolate, melted

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix almonds, sugar and melted butter; pat mixture on bottom and sides of 10-inch tart pan. Heat preserves just to boiling; strain and discard seeds. Stir liqueur and lemon juice into preserves; brush mixture over bottom of crust.

Beat almond paste and softened butter until smooth; beat in eggs, one at a time. Spread mixture over bottom of crust. Carefully cut 6 vertical slashes in top of each pear half; arrange on crust. Bake at 350 degrees for 40-45 minutes. Cool to room temperature. Drizzle with melted chocolate.

Makes 12 to 16 servings.

PINEAPPLE COOKIES

- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 1/3 cup shortening 1/2 cup canned crushed pineapple, drained
- 2 eggs
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract 1 teaspoon baking soda

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a mixing bowl, combine all the ingredients; beat until mixed well. Drop by spoonfuls onto a greased baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees until brown.

Tips & Topics By Susie Spurlock

County Extension Agent

Texas has been celebrating the month of April as Child Abuse Prevention Month. I would like to share with STAR readers this week the information and types of "Hug Your Child with Your Words." Let us all remember that everyday each year in a variety of ways, we are influencing a child's self-esteem. Let us promote stopping child abuse 365 days a year.

"Hug Your Child With Your Words"

Your children first begin forming an opinion of themselves by the manner in which you talk to them. How they feel about themselves affects all areas of their lives. Is much of what they hear from you positive or negative?

Make ordinary, every-day experiences pleasant for your child. Set aside special times with each of your children. Allow them to choose an activity that they would like to do.

Catch your child being good and praise the behavior!

Move physically closer to your children when you talk with them. Hold them.

When you talk with your children or when they talk with you, stop what you are doing and look into their eyes.

Remember they are their own person and may do things differently than you.

Respond to your child with patience and understanding. Scolding or criticizing your child in front of others show lack of sensitivity and respect.

Share your positive feelings with your child, often.

For a heart-to-heart talk, go to the child's room or to a quiet place. Comments such as "That's no big deal" or "You shouldn't feel that way" makes your children believe that their feelings are not important

Through your daily words and actions, let your children know that they can't be replaced, that each is very special to you and that you love and value them.






