Last fall I had to go to the school and get my niece because her allergies to the smoke and the smoke was blowing over and around the Mary Allen. One member of my family is critical enough that smoke blowing into town can put them into severe enough respiratory distress that on several occasions a hospital visit is required to correct the damage.

Last year on more than one occasion the ashes were blowing into town bad enough that it was piling into the corners of the parking lots at the businesses at the four way stop. This is not only inconsiderate but illegal According to the Sherman County Representative for the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, Rule 111.107 States: The Authority to conduct outdoor burning under regulation rule 111.105 does not exempt or excuse any person responsible from the consequences, damages, or injuries resulting from the burning and does not exempt or excuse anyone from complying with all other applicable laws or ordinances, regulations, and orders of governmental entities having jurisdiction, even though burning is otherwise the conducted in compliance with this regulation.

Under Rule 111.105 #3: Burning shall be commenced only when the wind will carry smoke and other pollutants away from city, town, residential, any recreational, commercial, or industrial area, navigable water,
