

(b) A person commits an offense if the person:

(1) is at least 15 years old:

or highway of this state;

(3) is occupying a seat that is equipped with a safety belt; and (4) is not secured by a safety

(c) A person commits an offense if the person;

(1) operates on a road, or highway of this state a passenger car that is equipped with safety

(2) allows a child who is at least four years old but less than 15 years old to ride in the front seat of the car without requiring the child to be secured by a safety

(d) A passenger car or a seat in a passenger car is deemed to be equipped with a safety belt if the passenger car is required under Section 139E of this Act to be equipped with safety belts (Safety were part of the manufactures original equipment,)

(e) An offense under this section is punishable by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$50, not to include court costs.

This is a request to ask citizens to comply with the law. We may not agree with this, but it is the law. The Stratford Police Department is giving this notice to allow citizens to get used to wearing their seat belts before December 1, 1994.

GHASTLY GLOBS AND WIGGLY WORMS

Ghastly Globs

1 1/2 pounds lean ground beef

1 cup 3 Minute Brand® Quick Oats

2 eggs, beaten

To Prepare Blood Sauce: Combine cranberry sauce, catsup, barbeque sauce, Worcestershire sauce and lemon juice in saucepan; bring to a boil, stirring frequently. Add meatballs to sauce and simmer 15 to 20 minutes.

To Assemble Ghastly Globs: Insert one toothpick into each ghastly glob. Attach one olive to end of toothpick; repeat for each ghastly glob. Arrange ghastly globs on top of spaghetti. Makes 36 ghastly globs.

GHOULS AND GOBLINS FRUITED STEW

Topping 3/4 cup honey

1/3 cup vegetable oil 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

To Prepare Fruited Stew: Combine bananas, apples, grapes and peaches. Toss with cinnamon. Divide evenly among eight custard cups and top with oatmeal topping.

PUMPKIN PATCH BROWNIES
