Boxers clash Saturday

Two state Golden Gloves champions will go toe-to-toe for three rounds in the feature bout of the First Annual Reese Boxing Tournament Saturday night.

Robin Blake, 1979 Texas Golden Gloves champion and national runner-up in the featherweight division, will meet Alvin Dixon, 1979 Georgia Golden Gloves champion.

Blake, a seventeen-year-old Levelland, Texas native, is passing up the Amateur Athletic Union regional championships in Denver, Colo. to participate in the Reese match. He will then go to Memphis, Tenn. to represent the United States in a boxing match with the East German National team.

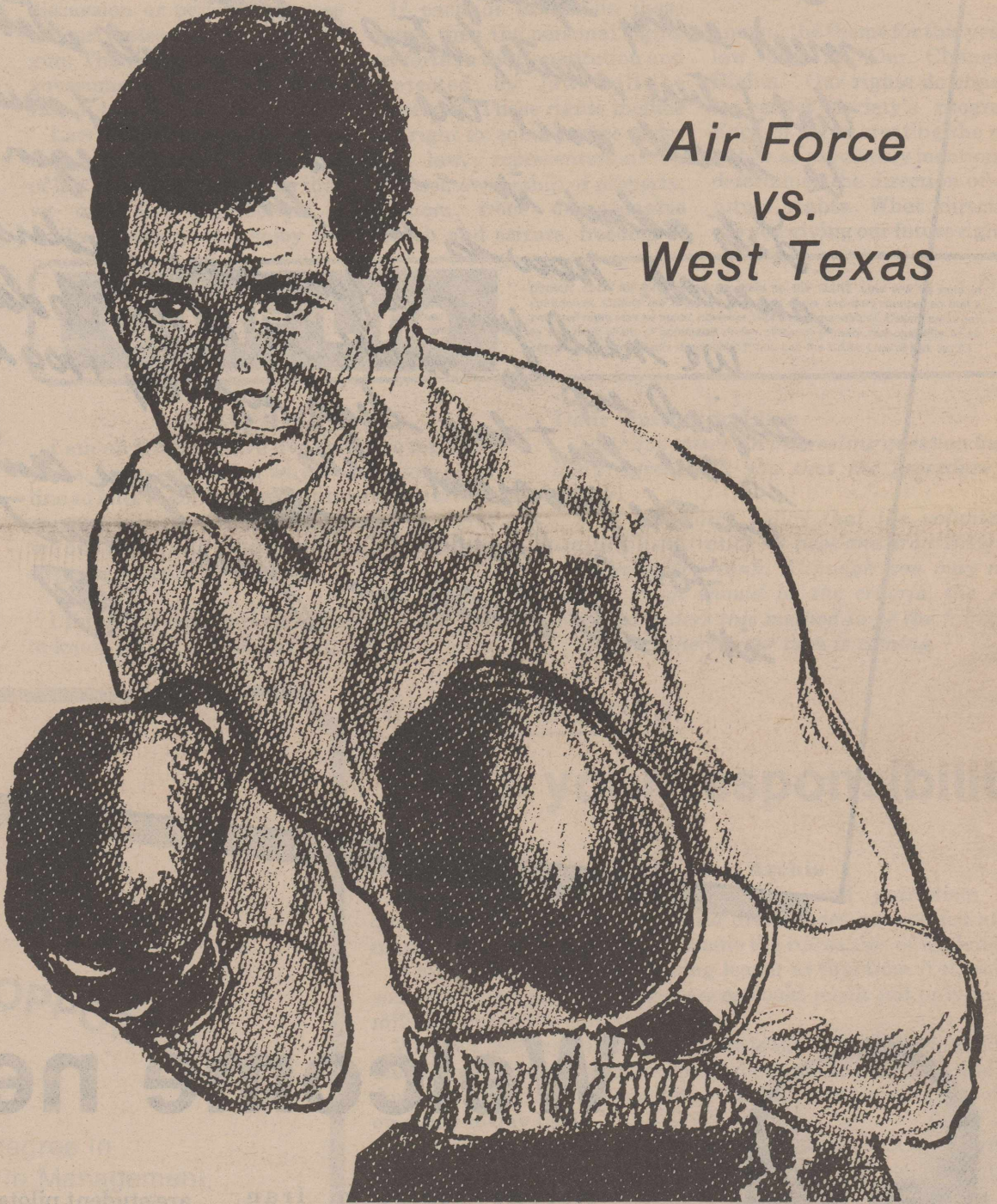
Dixon, a senior airman stationed at Robins AFB, Ga., was the novice 1978 Georgia AAU and Golden Gloves champion. The 22-year-old boxer is a native of Augusta, Ga.

The tournament is co-sponsored by the Reese Morale, Welfare and Recreation Division and the West Texas Golden Gloves Association. Bouts are scheduled in almost every weight division for the tournament, which begins at 7 p.m. in Hanger 82.

Col. Richard Ingram, Reese Wing Commander, and Col. Monte Montgomery, Reese Base Commander, will present the Outstanding Fighter and Sportsmanship trophies at the match. Lubbock Mayor Dirk West will present the Championship Trophy to the team winning the most bouts. Lubbock Police Chief J.T. Alley will serve as the timer and bell-ringer for the tournament.

All proceeds from the bouts will go to Morale Welfare and Recreation funds and the West Texas Golden Gloves Association.

Tickets for the tournament are \$3 per person. Children under 12 will be admitted for \$1 each. Military personnel will receive a \$1 discount. Tickets will be available through the Lubbock Parks and Recreation Department, Cardinal Sports Center, Sports Center, the Reese NCO and Officers' Clubs, and at the door.

Officials extend express deadline

In one last attempt to bring express bus service to Reese, base officials have extended the deadline for registering for the CITIBUS routes until 5 p.m. today.

Officials decided to extend the deadline late Tuesday when it became apparent that Reese had no chance of reaching the required 100 paid in advance

riders by the scheduled closing of ticket sales Wednesday night.

As of noon on Wednesday only 15 people had purchased the \$20 monthly passes.

"We felt as though we had to give Reese people one more chance to make the program work, said Capt. Gary Taylor, head of a special working group

that set up the proposed CITIBUS route.

Here's the package being offered:

- Two 42 passenger buses (maximum capacity) will circle Lubbock. One bus will run down fourth street and the other will head up Avenue Q to 50th Street, across town to the South Plains Mall and then wind its


way to 19th Street and Reese. Each bus will make five major stops along the way.

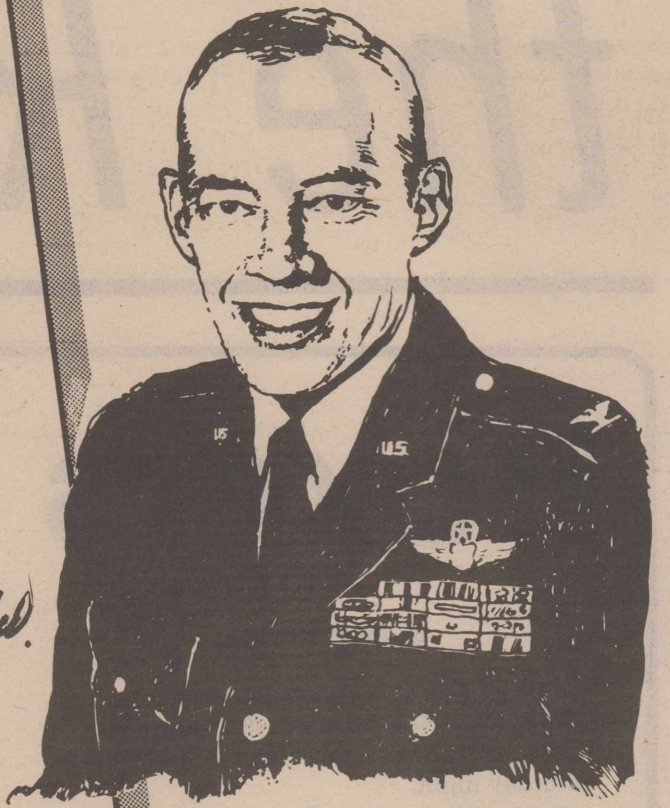
- Both buses will reach the base by 7:50 a.m., dropping passengers off at the base Theater.

- Monthly passes for the express route, which are good on all regular CITIBUS routes as well, cost \$20

A detailed look at the plan shows "Route-A" with stops at the (1) Civic Center, (2) Town and Country Shopping Center, (3) Christian Renewal Center, (4) Red Bud Shopping Center and (5) 4th and Elkhart Mini-Mart.

"Route-B" stops at (1) K-Mart, (2) Monterey Shopping Center, (Continued on page-14)

Law Day means justice

Law Day is a special day for rededication to the ideals of equality and justice under law.

The annual nationwide event is not a "lawyers' day." Rather, it is an occasion for honoring the place of law in our lives, for learning how the law and our legal system operates, and for understanding the necessity for such a system.

America's judicial system exists for the resolution of private disputes. In the interest of peace and security through legislative process, society has declared physical assault to be a public offense and instead has substituted the judicial process. The civilized man who has a dispute with another person which he cannot resolve by discussion or persuasion, goes to court instead of reaching for a gun. The citizen, as well as the government, must honor the rule of law.

Law Day's central message is that a just and democratic rule of law must prevail in order that we may live together in a civilized society and enjoy the

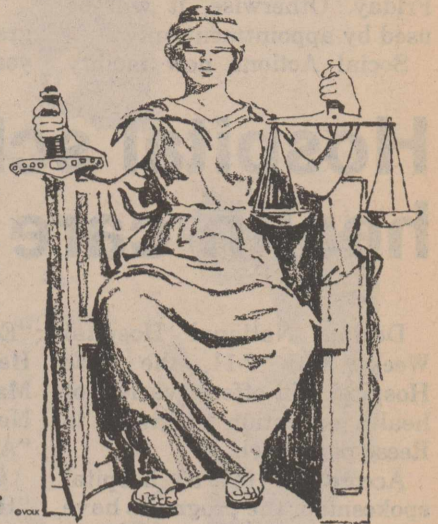
blessings of security and freedom. In the final sense, we ourselves create this rule of law, not only through our representatives in Congress, but also by our daily conduct, by our respect for the law and by our respect for the rights of our neighbors. The law is not something that others are called upon to exercise and defend, those responsibilities rest with each of us.

In order to meet our responsibilities, each of us must be aware of our duties as a citizen. These duties include obeying and upholding the laws, being informed on issues of government and community affairs, voting in elections, honoring the rights of others and the serving on juries if called.

If each of us fulfills these duties then the personal rights set forth in the Constitution and protected by law will be preserved. These rights include the right to: equal justice under the law, representation by counsel, ownership of property, freedom from unreasonable search and seizure, freedom of

religion and a fair and public trial if accused of a crime.

Although most of the rights and responsibilities are well



known, the theme for this year's law day is "Our Changing Rights." Our rights do change to reflect society's progress. Each of us, in creating the rule of law as previously mentioned, determines the direction of our future rights. What direction are you giving our future rights?

Guidas arrives on base as new enlisted advisor

Reese's new Senior Enlisted Advisor, CMSgt. Frank T. Guidas Jr., arrived here Saturday to renew a working relationship with Col. Richard Ingram that began three years ago at Shemya AFB, Alaska.

Chief Guidas served as the Air Base Group senior enlisted advisor while Colonel Ingram was the base commander at Shemya.

A 20-year Air Force veteran, Chief Guidas comes to Reese from Tyndall AFB, Fla., where he was the first sergeant for the Civil Engineering Squadron. He has been in the first sergeant career field for six years. Prior to that, Chief Guidas was a member of the medical corps, working in air and sea rescue.

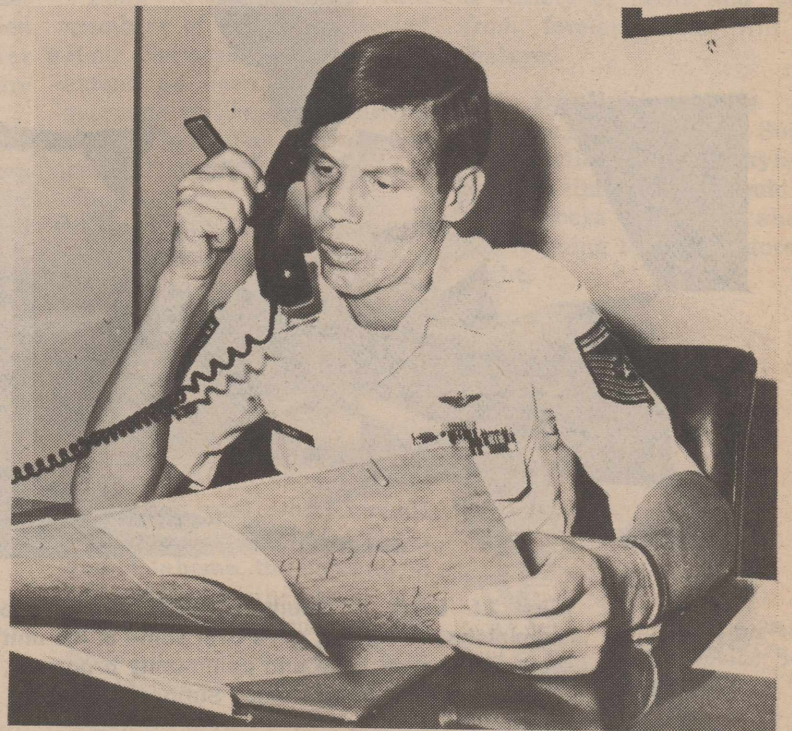
Chief Guidas wasted little time in getting out and around the base, visiting several Reese units over the weekend.

"I like people," he said. "That's why I enjoy the first sergeant career field so much."

A native of Greensburg, Pa., Chief Guidas pointed out that he isn't going to predict how he'll do as Reese's new senior enlisted advisor.

"I'm not a talker," he explained. "I'll let my performance talk for me."

A graduate of NCO Leadership School, the NCO Academy and the Senior NCO Academy, Chief Guidas says he can tolerate almost anything except

sub par appearance and performance by noncommissioned officers.

His willingness to get out among the enlisted ranks is already visible. While his wife Pearl remains in Florida to complete his daughter Cheri Ann's senior year in high school, the chief has by-passed the senior NCO quarters to live with the lower ranking enlisted people in Dormitory 230.

"I feel that as the senior enlisted advisor I work for the

enlisted men and women at Reese," he added. "To do the job right I have to get out from behind my desk and talk to people. I can do my paperwork at night."

Chief Guidas concluded by saying that he will continue the "open door" policy, but; that he is a strong believer in the chain of command.

"If a worker can't get results through the chain of command I'm available 24 hours per day," he said.

Supply establishes CE service store

Civil Engineering personnel find it easier to obtain the parts they need because a parts service store has been put into operation here.

Following a directive from Air Training Command the 64th Supply Squadron has established a service store facility eliminating Civil Engineering bench stock.

The store is housed in Supply Warehouse 19 and was in full operation April 23. "The new facility is customer oriented and set up much like a grocery store," said Capt. Wilford Foster, chief Management and Procedures Branch. "By moving the stock to easy-access, low-tiered bins, grouping like items together, and arranging everything alphabetically, it is easier and quicker for CE personnel to find needed parts."

Eliminating the bench stock system has taken the middle man out of the supply operation. Formerly, it was difficult to determine whether an item not in the bench stock was in the warehouse. Items were often arranged poorly and there was a problem of matching part numbers with Air Force stock numbers. Often, customers were compelled to seek items at civilian outlets.

In the new system, every item available in the warehouse is on easy-to-reach display. CE personnel will find that an errand that sometimes took several hours to complete has been reduced to a few minutes.

"We hope to make enough improvements in our operation to win the ATC Supply Effectiveness Award this year," said Captain Foster.

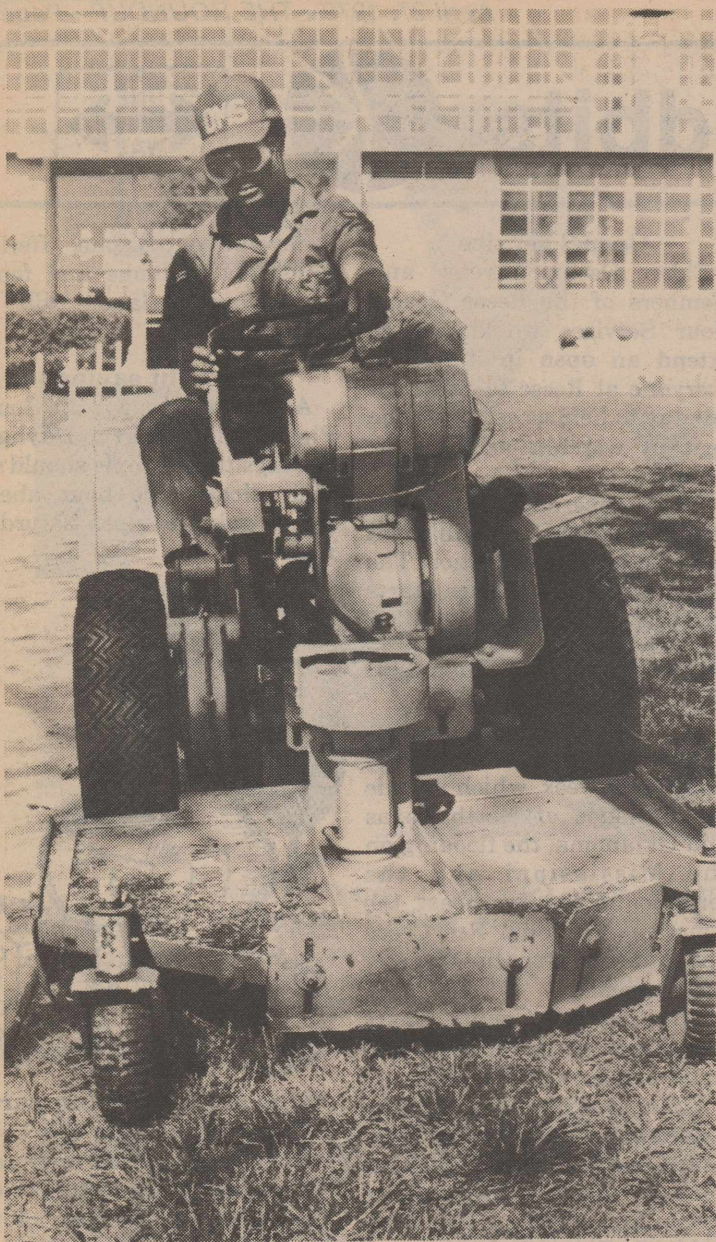

First-quarter statistics reveal 'hot check' woes

With the value of returned checks given on base mounting over \$18,000 in the first three months of this year, "hot check" writing is a subject of growing concern at Reese.

Statistics over the last three months show that the number and value of returned checks is growing at an alarming rate. These statistics reflect only what has occurred at on-base facilities, such as the commissary, base exchange, and the Reese branch of the Lubbock National Bank.

The number of checks returned has increased from 91 in January to 169 in March. The increase in the value of the checks was even more dramatic, \$3,225 for January and \$8,163 for March. The total value for returned checks in the first three months of this year amounted to \$18,524.

Reese's problem may be a reflection of a nation-wide trend in which statistics show that returned checks total \$20,000

per day for each 10,000 population.

According to Maj. Roy Markle, commander, Comptroller Division, the rising trend does not necessarily mean that there is a greater percentage of people writing hot checks, but that there is a greater number of bank accounts being opened, particularly with the advent of the Sure-Pay Program. Consequently, there is a greater number of people with checking accounts who do not know how to manage them. Base officials have indicated that the biggest problem is among young airmen who have had little or no experience with banking accounts.

While most of the checks are later collected, Maj. Markle continued, the big problem lies in the extra expense of handling. The end result is that it freezes a great deal of money that could otherwise be circulating in the economy.

Because of the increased cost

of handling these checks, most stores charge a bad check fee that can be as much as \$10. The branch bank on base currently charges \$7.50 to handle returned checks. By the time everything is straightened out, bouncing a \$2 check can cost the check writer \$17.50 or more.

Air Force regulations covering financial responsibility spell out policy on debt complaints and continued abuse of check cashing privileges can lead to actions under the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

"There was a time," remembered Maj. Markle, "when it was virtually impossible for military personnel to cash checks. Then the military placed emphasis on financial responsibility and the situation improved. Now, unless the present trend reverses, we may drift back to the old state of affairs. I hope not."

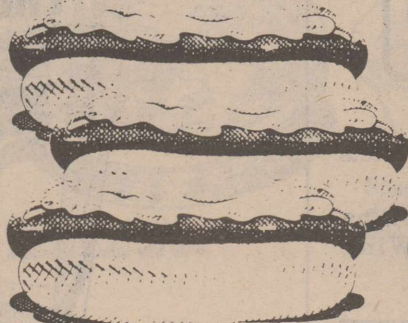

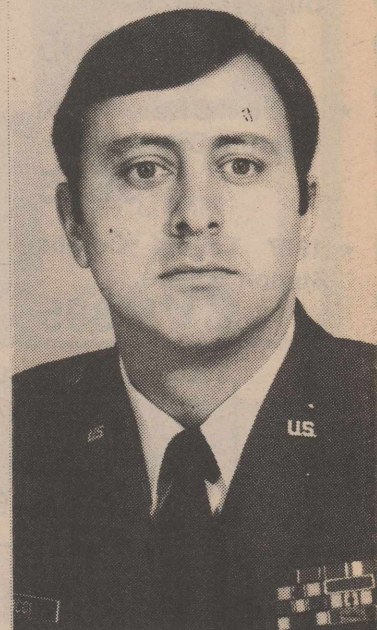
"Neither the "aggressive" nor the "victimized" behavior is the

McClure joins weather test

SrA Joe McClure of Detachment II, 24th Weather Squadron at Reese will be leaving for Hawaii in May to participate in what has been called the largest scientific experiment ever held.

The experiment is part of the Global Atmospheric Research Program, a joint effort of the World Meteorological Organization and the International Council of Scientific Unions. The project involves 149 nations and thousands of scientists and technicians

worldwide. This effort is intended to increase the accuracy and time span of weather forecasting and provide the most complete record of global weather data ever assembled.

Air Force Military Airlift Command aircraft and Air Weather Service personnel have taken part in the United States' contribution to the experiment. Airman McClure participated in early phases of the program and when he returns it will be to take part in the final data

collection phase of the experiment.

Airman McClure's task has been to operate Dropsonde equipment over the Pacific. The Dropsonde is an air sampling device, which, when dropped from an aircraft, senses and transmits temperature, humidity, wind speed, and wind direction every 11 seconds until it hits the surface. This information gives the weather forecaster a cross section of the atmosphere at that location.

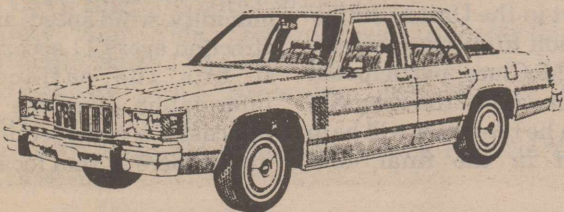

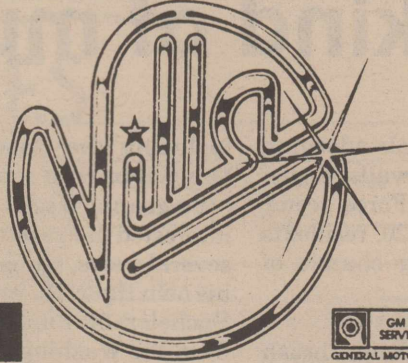

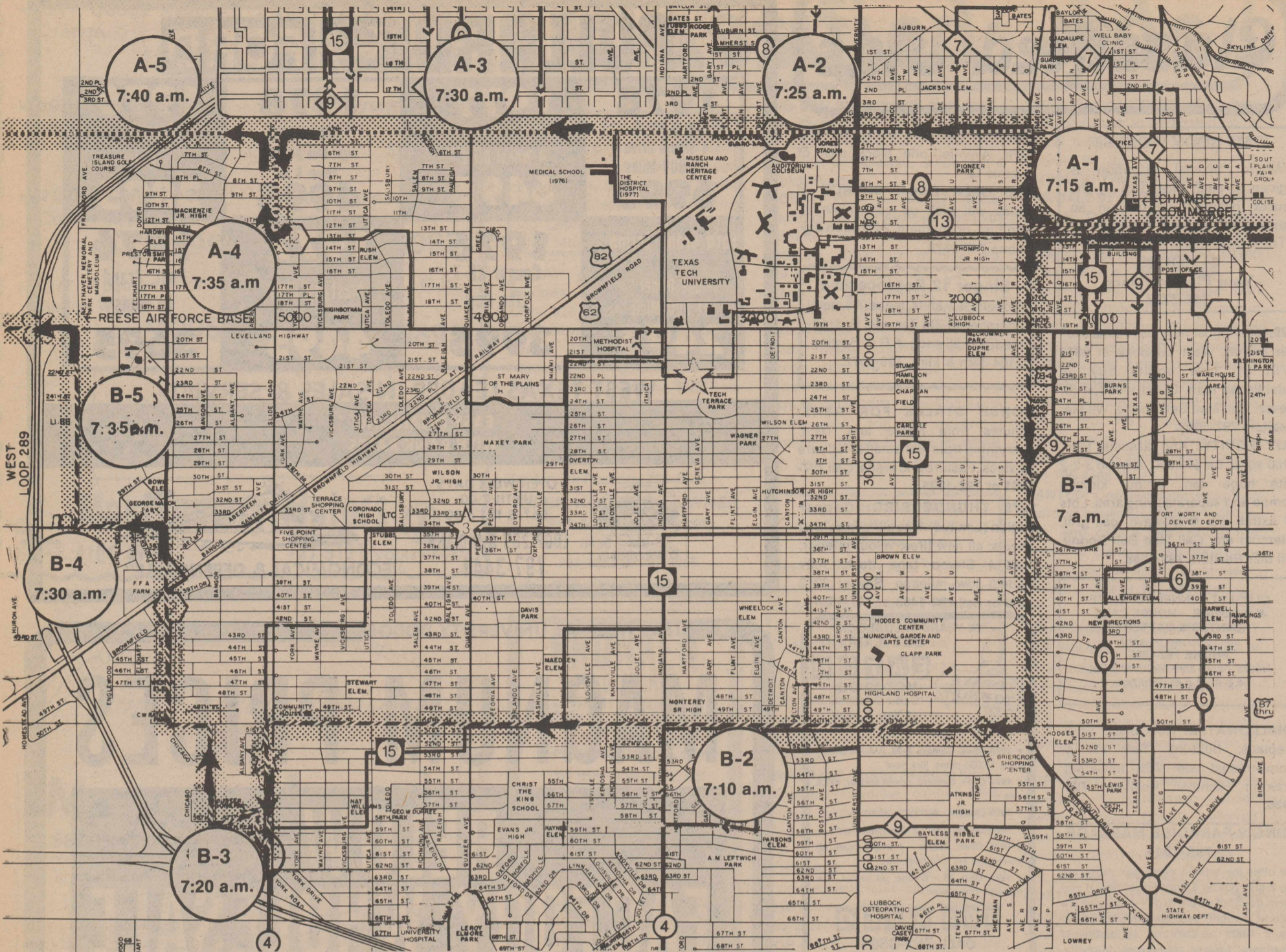

Express routes

The map above shows the two routes proposed for CITIBUS express service to Reese. Route "A" runs across the north side of town while Route "B" runs down Avenue Q, across 50th street and then winds its way from the South Plains Mall to 19th Street. The circled areas on the map represent the approximate location of the major stops. Most of the CITIBUS regular routes can also be seen.

Specific pick-up points at each stop are:

and Country Shopping Center, in front (south side) of Oshman's Sporting Goods; Christian Renewal Center, intersection of 4th and Toledo; Red Bud Shopping Center, at the Red Bud sign, southeast corner of Furrs; and Mini-Mart, intersection of 4th and Elkhart.

- Route B: K-Mart, 34th and

Q, at the K-Mart sign in the parking lot; Monterey Shopping Center, in front of the former Bix Texan Steak Ranch; South Plains Mall, on the north side of Dillard's; Intersection of 34th and Frankfort, across from the Minit-Mart; Sunset Station Post Office.

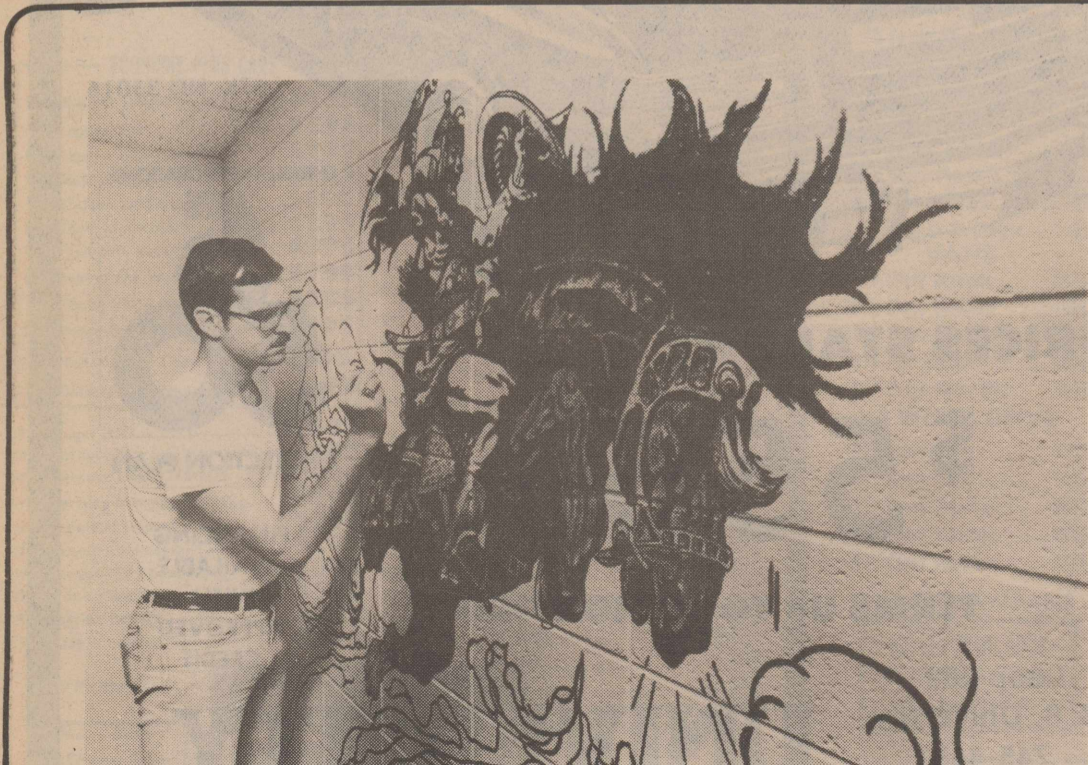
"The fate of this program

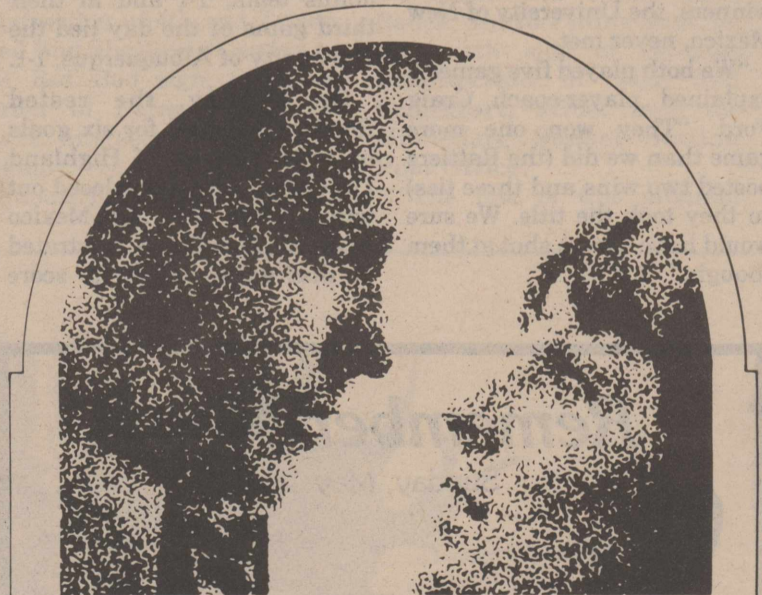
