Acting AF Secretary calls for bigger raise

Acting Secretary of the Air Force Hans Mark has urged Defense Secretary Harold Brown to ask the President to reconsider the pay cap that will limit the October pay raise.

In a memorandum to the Secretary of Defense, Dr. Mark wrote, "I believe it would be appropriate for DoD to request the President to reconsider the tentative decision on a five and one-half percent pay cap and recommend a seven percent pay raise for military members and federal civilian employees in October 1979."

The five and one-half percent pay was included as part of the administration's proposed

budget for fiscal year 1980. It is considered an example of the president's efforts to combat inflation by keeping federal pay increases within specified guidelines.

Dr. Mark supports his request to Secretary Brown with an analysis that shows that a seven percent increase would be in compliance with the President's wage increase guidelines and would make such a raise more consistent with pay raises being given to non-federal employees.

"Morale, especially as it affects retention, must be accorded very serious consideration in the coming months,"

Dr. Mark said in the memo. He was referring to the concern that many military members have expressed about benefit and pay reductions in the past few years, including last year's pay cap.

"I do not make this recommendation lightly, and fully recognize the continued need for fiscal restraint in the coming years," Dr. Mark continued. "An effort now to mitigate the impact of the second consecutive pay cap would strengthen confidence among the military that the defense leadership is sensitive to their financial problems..." (AFNS)

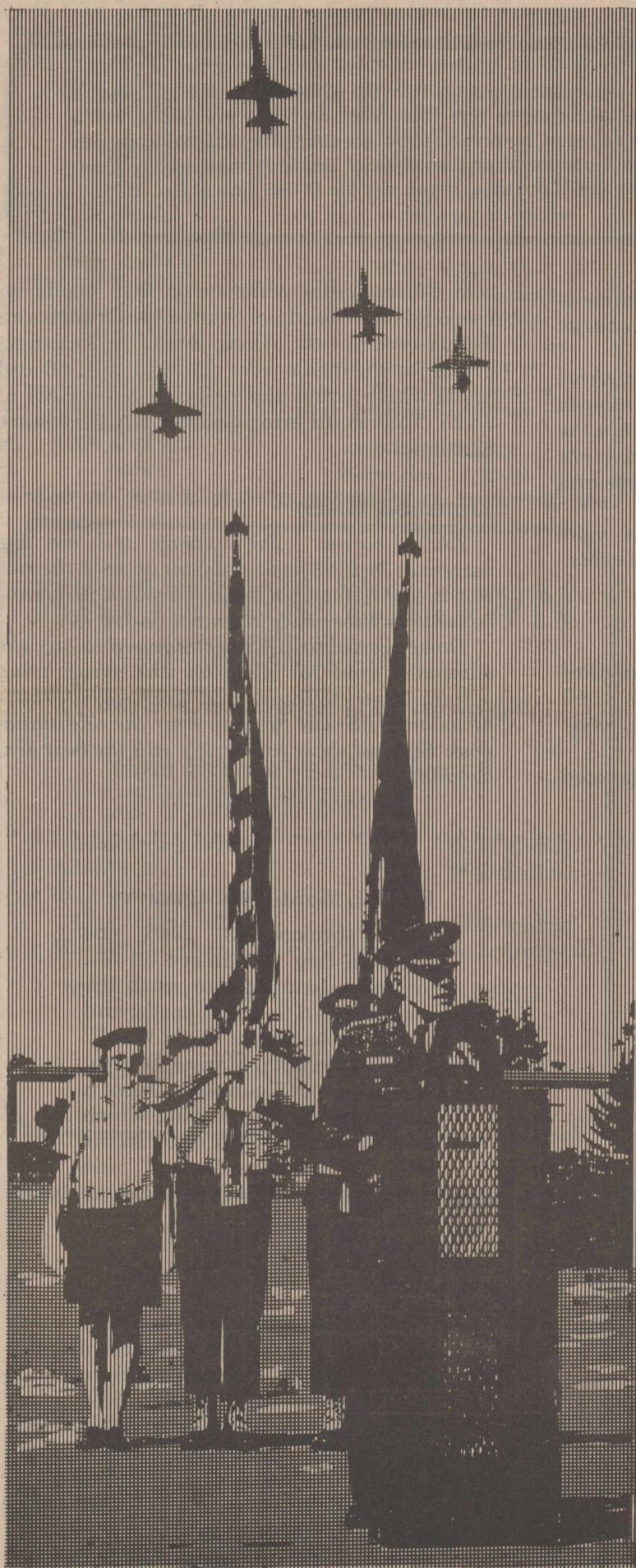
He pointed out that Social Actions has prepared a special 15 minute briefing for supervisors on identification of marijuana and symptoms of its

use. He also noted that Security Police patrols have been increased in the housing area and that squadron officials have hiked dormitory inspections.

Electric bills

If our electric bills for the base run approximately \$20,000 a month and our base budget is \$1,154,000 a year, what is being done with the other \$914,000?

Dear Energy Budget:

The figures you quoted are apparently from an article on energy conservation in the May 11 issue of The Roundup.

I agree the wording was a bit confusing. The \$20,000 electricity bill quoted in the article referred only to "peak demand charges" which are based on the highest 15-minute usage period during the month.

Our total monthly charges for electricity are considerably more. For example, in April, our electricity usage charge was only \$4,663.

However, added to that were fuel adjustment costs (\$46,985) and the peak demand charge (\$21,251) for a total of \$72,899.

With the air conditioning season here, these costs will undoubtedly go up. We will all have to conserve as much as possible to stay within the \$1,154,000 budget for utilities which, incidentally, must also pay for natural gas and water.

Thanks for your interest. We need more people who are concerned about energy costs.

Breakfast rates

I am calling in reply to the Care Line of May 18th. It said the weekend breakfast was \$1.50 and the man who wrote in was asking what happened to the other 85¢.

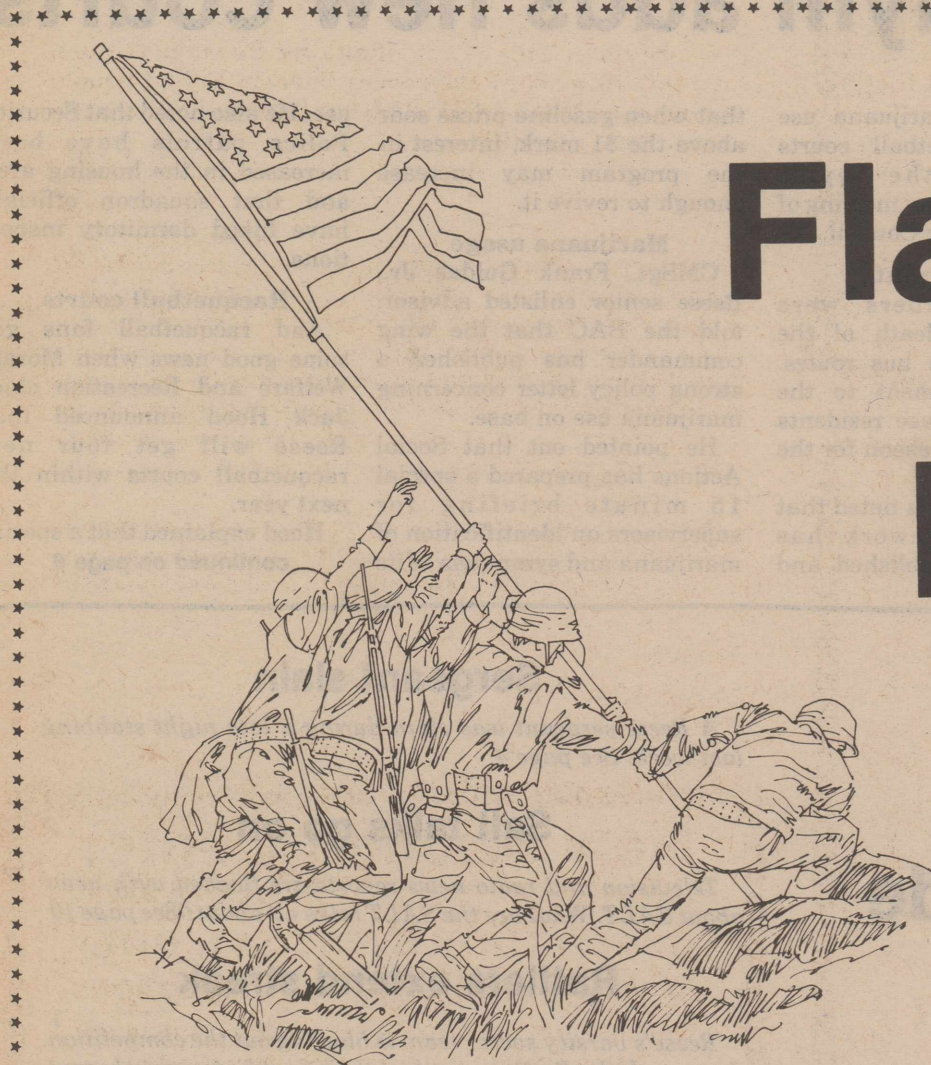
In your reply it says the Air Force directed

that dining halls which serve two meals on weekends and holidays change to a brunch and dinner-type menu. Along with this change, prices for the meals were changed to \$1.50 and \$1.75 which equal the daily rate for BAS of \$3.25. That is an error because BAS rates are \$3.00.

Dear \$3 BAS:

You're correct. The experts tell me the increases in BAS have not kept up with the rise in the cost of food. DOD absorbs this difference in cost for those holding meal cards.

Those receiving BAS are required to pay the computed cost for food for the meal being served. Until DOD increases the BAS rate those of us on BAS will have to bear the additional cost. Even at these prices, it's still the best deal around.



Flag Day '79

As we celebrate National Flag Week, I ask all of you to remember Mt. Suribachi, our flag, those who did their duty and those who will continue to do so in the future.

The flag over Iwo Jima was and is still a symbol of victory and military dedication for all Americans.

Legal office geared to aid base people

Need some assistance in doing battle with that computer that keeps sending you incorrect statements on your charge account?

Reese's legal office can help you with that problem and a variety of other concerns. And best of all, the service is free.

Military people and their families have an important resource in their legal assistance office, but they don't always realize it. Too often they wait until after they're in a legal bind to seek advice. They might have avoided problems if they had checked with the legal office before making a commitment.

A base lawyer will examine

documents and explain them to you, whether they are leases or purchase agreements for cars or furniture. And he will advise you on personal finances, insurance, the sale or lease of personal property, or the sale or purchase of a home. He will also counsel you on your civil rights — and, if the need arises, on your civil wrongs: such as recovering damages after an automobile accident.

He comes in handy for a variety of domestic concerns as well. If you want to write, review, or revise a will, your "service" lawyer can advise you on estate planning, distribution, and inheritance laws. And he can prepare the documents for you. He can also help with problems of citizenship, immigration, passports,

adoption, separation and divorce, nonsupport, and dependents born overseas.

A base lawyer can assist you in a variety of legal situations. He can be a real asset at income tax time, helping you with your tax returns and advising you on Federal, State and local tax matters. The services of an authorized notary public are also normally available through the legal assistance office.

The only thing your Service lawyer normally can't do is represent you in civilian court, but; he'll advise you of your rights and assist you in obtaining civil counsel. He will either refer you to a competent civilian lawyer, or, if you can't afford the fees, to the legal aid society.

Sergeant slain in stabbing

A Reese sergeant was slain in a late night stabbing off base last Saturday.

According to Texas Department of Public Safety reports, SSGT. William H. James, 30, was found stabbed to death in his car just two miles east of FM 179 at approximately 11 p.m. Saturday. Reportedly, Sergeant

James suffered multiple stab wounds in the upper body.

A 21-year-old Lubbock woman has been arrested for the slaying and charged with voluntary manslaughter.

Sergeant James, a worked in the 64th Organizational Maintenance repair and reclamation branch, also worked as the assistant kitchen manager in

the Officer's Club and was the bay chief of his base dormitory.

He is survived by his father, Johnnie M. James, Phoenix, N.C., and mother Reta M. McDonald, Leland, N.C. He also had a son, Keith, and daughter Kimberly, who live with their mother in Selma, Ala.

Memorial services on base are

scheduled for 3:30 p.m. today in the base Chapel.

Sergeant James' stabbing marked the second violent death of a Reese airman in the Fourth Street — FM 179 area within a week. On May 27, A1C Louis Wagner was struck and killed by an automobile while walking to a service station for gasoline.

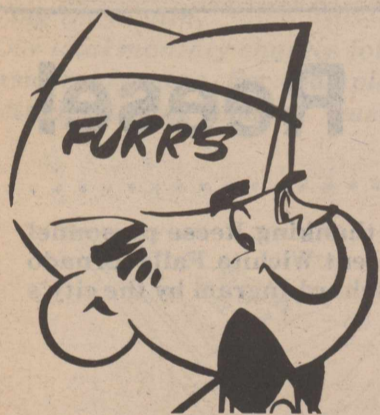

AF removes restrictive officer assignment rules

Air Force officials will remove two restrictive assignment policies — one affecting officers with five years of service without any overseas duty, and the other dealing with overseas assignments for officers nearing retirement.

The changes will be in an upcoming revision to AFR 36-20.

Officers with five years of service and no overseas time will be able, depending on Air Force needs, to be reassigned from one stateside base to another.

Under previous policy, they were "frozen" at the continental U.S. (CONUS) base and could be assigned only to an overseas location.

While waivers of the policy were sometimes approved by the Air Force Manpower and Personnel Center, officials recently determined it was unnecessarily restrictive to have an across-the-board policy of this type.

The change permits greater flexibility in matching available requirements with individual officers' career objectives.

The other revised policy affects overseas assignments for officers nearing retirement. The policy change will allow any officer who can complete an overseas tour prior to mandatory retirement to be

selected for such an assignment.

Previously, if officers had an established retirement date and the overseas assignment would be their last tour of active duty, they were not, "... in so far as possible ..." selected for overseas.

The restriction exempted some officers with established retirement dates from involuntary overseas duty.

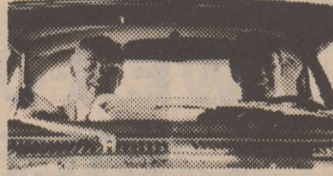
As a result, officers without retirement dates had to assume a greater share of the overseas duty. In addition, the restriction is no longer necessary now that a retirement application cannot be submitted earlier than a year before the requested retirement date.

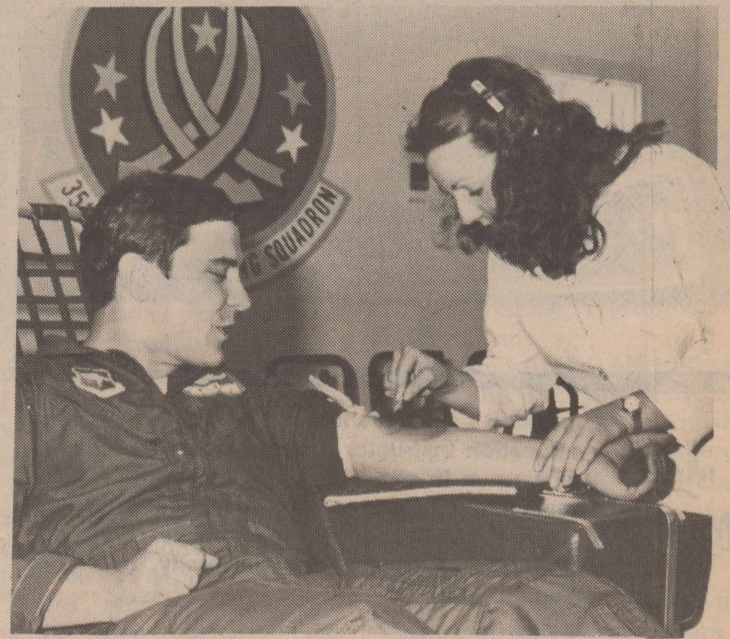

Lieutenants' actions prevent jet accidents

Two lieutenants at Reese recently received recognition for their actions in averting serious damage and possible injury in unrelated incidents.

Second Lt. Russell J. Deluca was performing acrobatics on a solo practice-flight when the cockpit filled with dense smoke and the aircraft began to vibrate violently. Selecting 100 per cent oxygen and venting the cockpit, the lieutenant notified Terminal Radar Approach Control of his situation and shut down an engine that had begun to show low oil pressure.

After a single engine landing, the lieutenant relied on

emergency ground egress procedures to escape safely.

In another incident, 2nd Lt. Jose R. Bravo was flying his first T-37 solo when his left engine exploded during a touch-and-go. With minimum time and runway remaining, Lieutenant Bravo started abort procedures and succeeded in stopping the aircraft with runway to spare.

Supervisory personnel later found debris from the destroyed engine intake and exhaust on the runway. Due to the lieutenant's accurate decision the T-37 was not damaged further and he escaped possible injury.

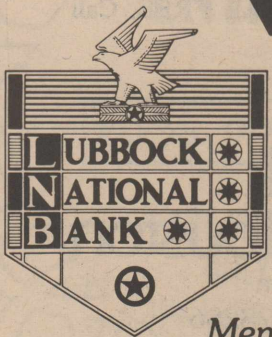

AF revises eligibility for early discharge

Some airmen will see a continuation of the policy that permits early separation when they return from overseas.

According to Reese personnel officials, members with less than six months' retainability when they complete overseas short tours of 15 months or less will continue to be separated early at the U.S. port, Air Force has announced.

This is a change from previously announced policy, to be implemented Oct. 1, 1979, to discontinue the practice of early separation at the port for all short-timer overseas returnees except those with less than 30 days' retainability.

Congressional action to reduce early release programs resulted in the original policy change. Now, the Air Force has been given the authority for fiscal year 1980 to exempt

individuals returning from overseas where dependents are not authorized or are restricted.

Officers and airmen completing overseas long tours of 18 months or more will not be separated early at the port unless they have less than 30 days' retainability.

Long- and short-tour returnees with at least six months of retainability may be reassigned to a continental U.S. location.

Others completing long tours must either extend their dates of separation to obtain the required retainability for a CONUS assignment, or extend their overseas tour so that their return and separation dates coincide.

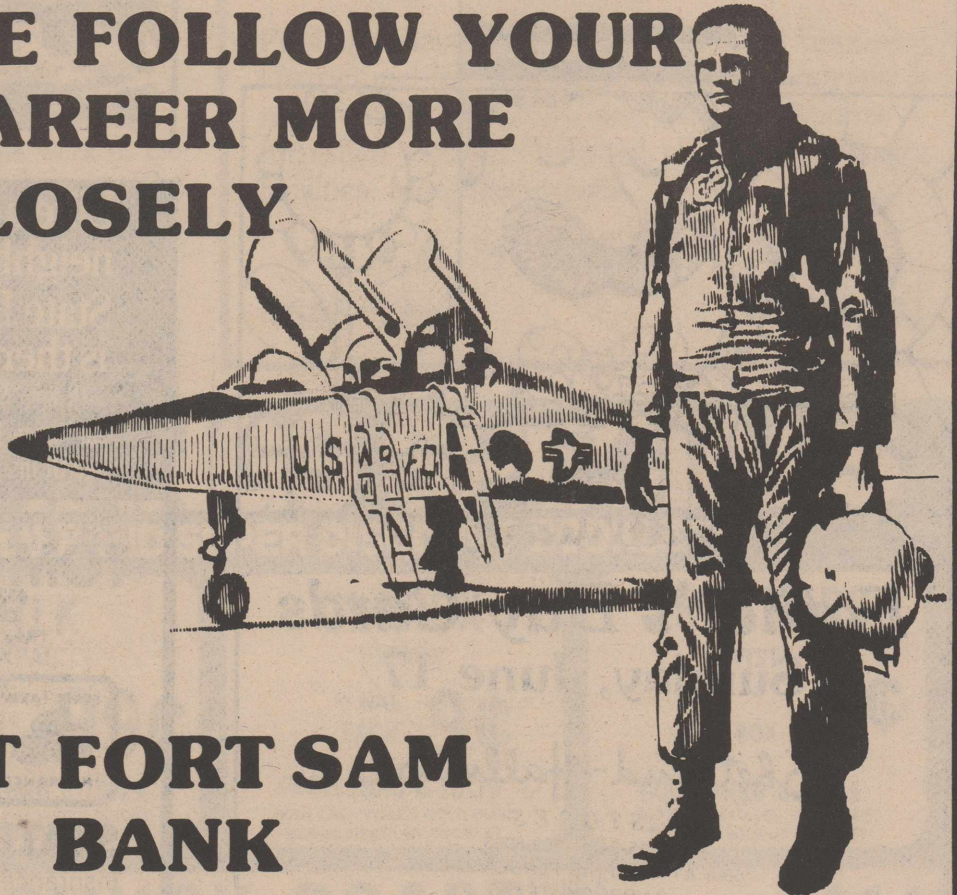

California bases meet gas crunch

Quick action by commanders, extra effort from security police and a lot of patience on the part of Air Force people have helped lessen the impact of California's gasoline crunch.

Reports from Air Force bases around the state reveal a well-organized response in the face of scarce gas supplies.

Bases report measures to operate their exchange gas stations at regular, if curtailed, hours which are working well.

In an open letter to the March AFB military community, Col. Billy S. Lyons, commander, 22nd Combat Support Group, wrote: "We can't do anything about the amount of fuel available, but common sense and consideration will go a long way in helping us buffet the inconvenience."

Like other commanders, Colonel Lyons emphasized the need to expand car pools, use public transportation, and limit driving to necessary trips.

California Governor Jerry Brown authorized use of an odd-even rationing system earlier this month. Officials at the Army and Air Force Exchange Service say their rule is to comply with local authorities, and bases in affected counties are using the plan.

In San Bernadino County the plan was adopted in metro-

politan areas. Norton AFB followed suit.

At Vandenberg AFB, in the hardest hit area, one of two BX stations has been closed and the other has limited hours. Officials there said there were "a few anxious moments before the weekend, but nothing serious."

At George AFB, the service station operates three hours a day, but does so five days a week.

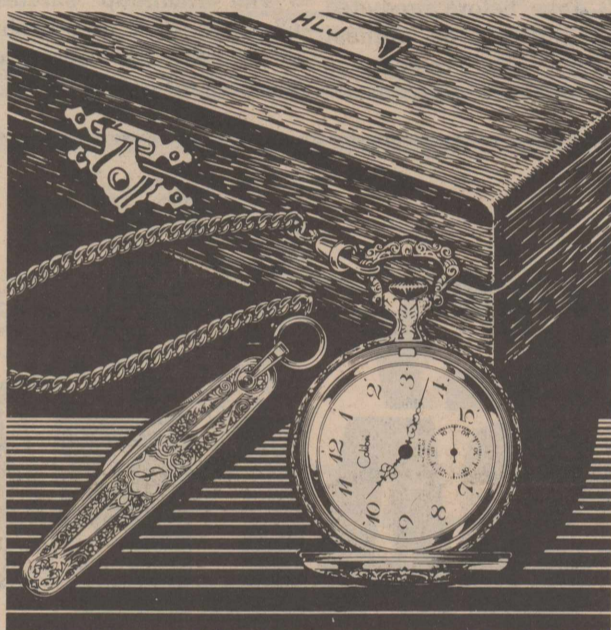
They haven't gone to the odd-even rationing system yet at Beale AFB, in the northern part of the state. As at many bases, security police are working to keep lines from becoming congested at service stations.

Beale reports a recent spot shortage of unleaded gas with no supplies available for a few days.

At Reese, base service station officials elected to go to a daily rationing system ensuring that at least some gasoline would be available to its patrons throughout the month.

Hours of operation were also curtailed slightly to help conserve gas.

According to a Base Exchange spokesman, Reese will receive 72,000 gallons in June, nearly 20,000 gallons more than the May allocation.

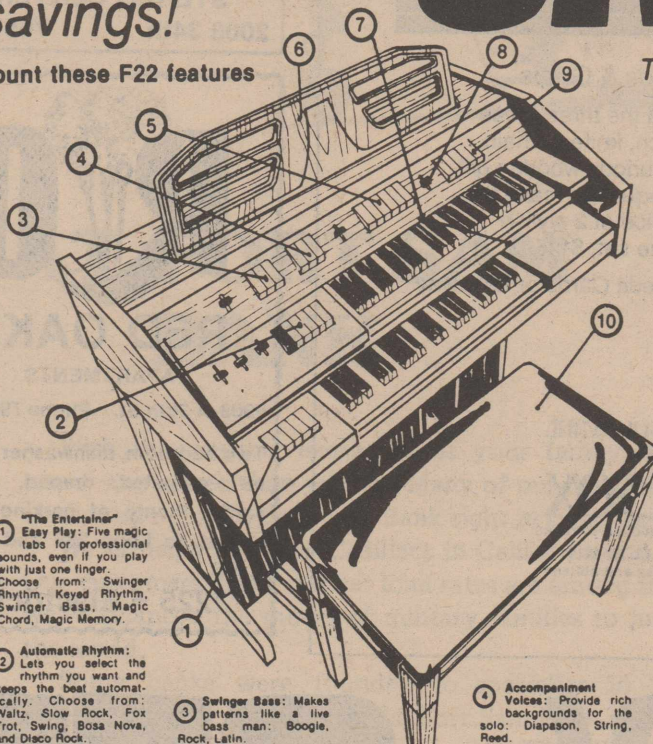

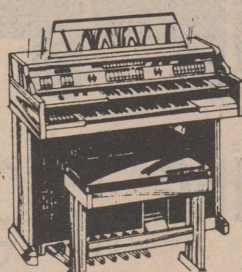

AFAS offers student loans

Reese dependents will have access to a new guaranteed student loan program that broadens eligibility, covers a wider range of education and boosts loan limits, according to a recent announcement by the Air Force Aid Society.

No assessment of a family's ability to pay is made. Enrollment, or acceptance for enrollment in a qualified school, is the sole academic qualification. Under the old system, need criteria and specific grade averages had to be met.

Loans under the new system, called the General Henry H. Arnold Student Loan Program, will be available for the upcoming 1979-80 school year. CMSgt. Alfred W. Chock, Ext. 3643, can provide information to interested parties at Reese.

Loans will be available to attend any post-secondary institution that the U.S. Office of Education approves for the program. Undergraduate, graduate, professional and

The new program will not immediately replace the current Arnold Education Assistance Program. It will, however, provide loans to dependent children who may not qualify under the old rules, or those who simply prefer the new program.

certain vocational and nursing schools are included. The old plan covered only undergraduate and vocational schools.

A prime feature of the new plan is that need is presumed.

Maximum undergraduate loan size is increased to \$2,500 a year. The undergraduate limit is \$7,500 for any period of years. The old program had a \$2,000 annual ceiling and a four-year \$8,000 maximum total. (AFNS)

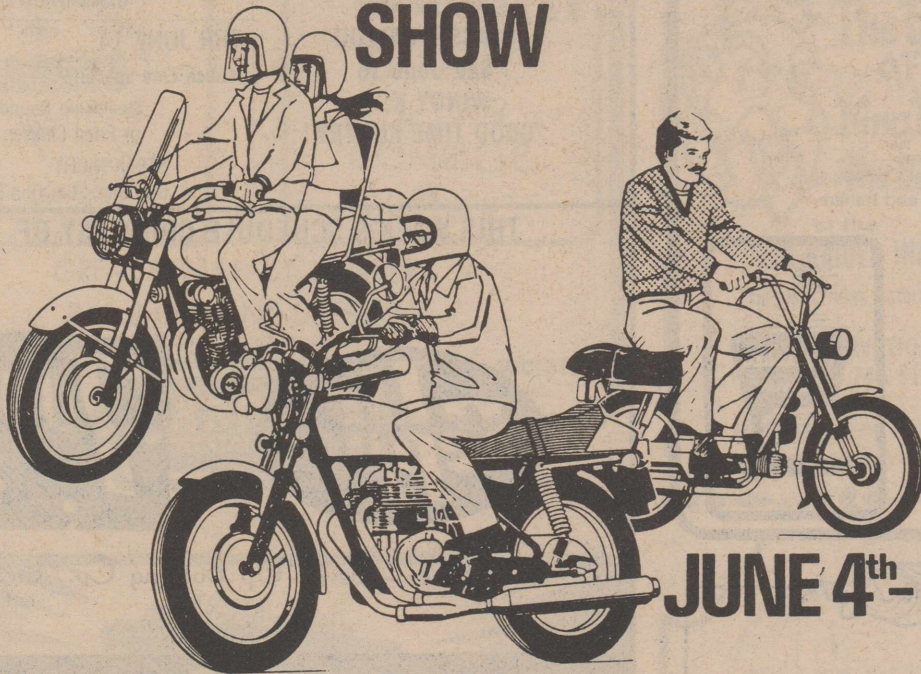

AF workhorse boosts defenses

B-52 adds hardware

The Air Force has accepted delivery of the first production system of a computer-managed electronic countermeasures set for the B-52 strategic bomber.

The Northrop Corp. built the system to increase B-52 survivability against enemy threats by automatically jamming radar signals upon command.

The system automatically controls and directs radiated power of the improved countermeasures jamming

transmitters, and focuses available energy against the most immediate threats. The system consists of an airborne receiver, a signal processor, transmitter, electronic warfare officer's control panel and ground equipment.

Brig. Gen. Melvin F. Chubb, deputy for strategic systems, Aeronautical Systems Division, accepted the new countermeasures set in ceremonies at Northrop Corp. facilities near Chicago.

"The equipment we see here today culminates an intensive effort by my company, the U.S. Air Force, and your company, the Northrop Corp., to compress what would normally be an 18-month program into 12 months," General Chubb told some 500 Northrop employees.

General Chubb praised the efforts of those involved in producing what he called, "a notable addition to the new generation of B-52 strategic bomber."

SALT talks go on

These days you can hardly escape the talk about SALT on television and radio and in newspapers and magazines.

What is it?

SALT — which stands for Strategic Arms Limitation Talks — is an effort by the United States and the Soviet Union to agree on how to limit vital security forces.

Right now, with Congress and the American people considering whether we should approve such an agreement, we ought to know at least some basic facts about SALT.

Recently, Secretary of Defense Harold Brown said the following are the basic elements of the prospective SALT agreement:

A treaty to last until 1986, that will:

- Set equal limits on strategic nuclear delivery vehicles.

- Establish various sub-limits on MIRV'd systems (that is, ballistic missile systems carrying multiple warheads to hit more than one target and heavy bombers carrying air-launched cruise missiles).

- Limit each side to one new ICBM type, with a maximum of 10 re-entry vehicles.

- Bar increases in number of re-entry vehicles on existing ICBMs.

- Provide measures to permit unimpeded verification by national technical means.

A protocol, to last three years, that will:

- Bar deployment of ground-launched and ship-launched cruise missiles with ranges greater than 600 kilometers (approximately 370 miles) during that period, while permitting unimpeded testing and development of such vehicles of any range.
