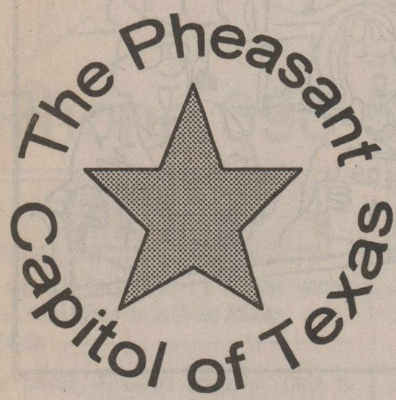

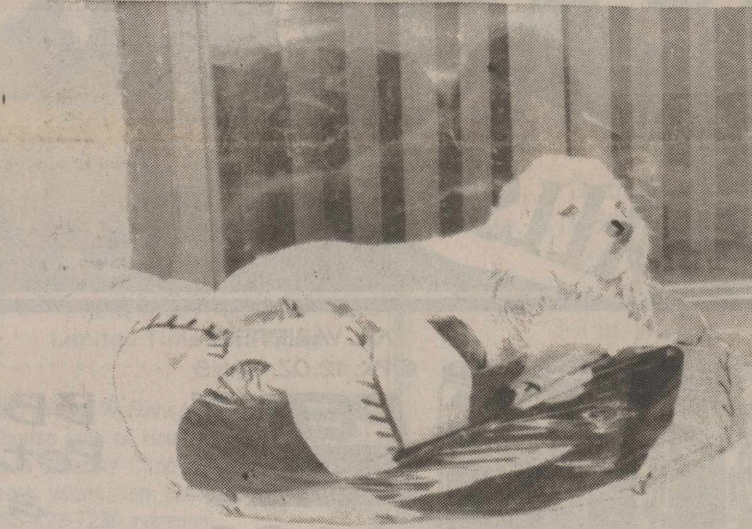

## The Coalition For Vehicle Choice's Halloween Spooky, Safe Secrets

Austin, Tx.-There will be plenty of ghosts lurking this Halloween, and Toni Barcellona, Texas State Coordinator for the Coalition For Vehicle Choice wants to remind all trick-or-treaters, young and old, to stay safe while celebrating Halloween night.

In most areas, trick-or-treating begins after sun down, so it is harder for motorists to see. Statistics from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration show that last year, 112 people were involved in traffic-related fatalities on Halloween night. Of these, 10 were child passengers of vehicles and 7 were child pedestrians-all under age 15.

"That's a good reason why small children should always be accompanied by an adult while trick-or-treating in neighborhoods," said Barcellona. "Have kids walk in groups as they go out. Holding hands to form a chain can be fun, and it helps make sure children stay in a bunch as they cross streets."

In addition, she suggested these practices:

\*Look left/right before crossing streets to make sure cars are not coming.

\*Cross at intersections & not mid-block.

\*Stay on well-lit, well-traveled routes

\*Walk & don't run from house to house.

\*Carry a light so others can see you. Glow-in-the-dark "light sticks" are available that allow kids to bend the wand to "energize" non-toxic glowing substances that can be used just like a candle, only more safely, because there's no flame.

\*Reflective strips or paths also make the little ones' costumes more visible to motorists who might have a hard time seeing them on dark neighborhood streets.

For young-at-heart adults who still like to dress in costume and join private parties or crowds downtown, remember that if you are driving to a Halloween Party, don't put your mask on until you get to your final destination. Masks not only obstruct your view—they can distract and startle other drivers as they pass you by.

Motorists and pedestrians alike must do their part and follow proper safety rules to make Halloween night safe. from carelessness accidents. Drivers should remember.

\*Don't speed; obey all posted speed limits

\*Use extra caution to watch out for children in residential areas.

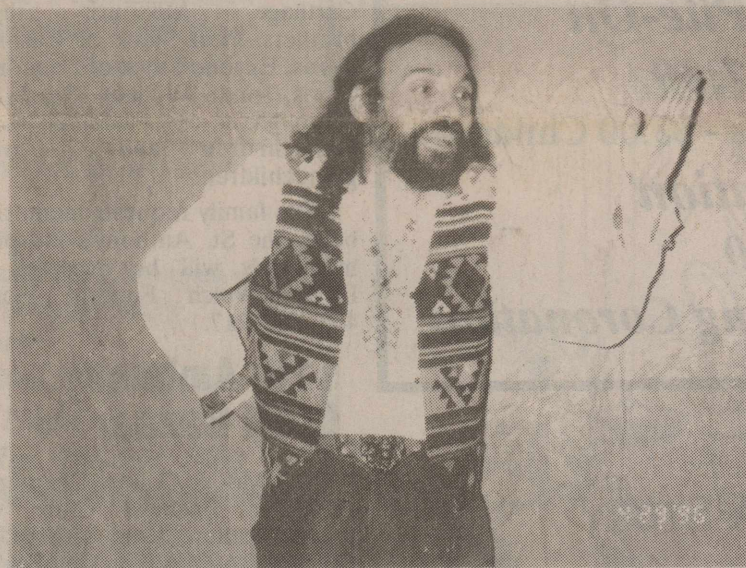
\*Be alert for people darting in and out of streets in costumes.

Barcellona concluded, "Safety can be simple. By following these common-sense reminders, we can all help make Halloween both fun and safe."

## Papa Joe's Traveling Storytelling Show Coming To Stratford

Everyone is invited to Step into a Story with Papa Joe's Traveling Storytelling Show. It's coming to the Imagination Station on Tuesday, November 5th. Family Night Showtime is 6:30 p.m. Admission is free. Papa Joe will be entertaining students the next day, as the Imagination Station hosts two more shows for some of the area elementary schools.

Joseph Gaudet, who is known by audiences young and old simply as "Papa Joe", is a professional storyteller. Gaudet, 39, did not set out to be a professional storyteller. While working on a degree in educational psychology for early learning environments. Gaudet decided he wanted to develop a communication program for children. Ten years and about 3,500 performers later he is traveling around the United States and Europe giving between 300 and 400 shows per year. Now Gaudet and his wife Sues travel

the country in a small recreational vehicle with a PAPAJO license. Although it is not an easy lifestyle, Gaudet says he really doesn't have a choice but to keep telling the stories children ask of "Papa Joe." If they ever stop asking, "I'll go do something else" he says.

Papa Joe is like a folktale, traveling the land, telling stories so alive you can jump inside. He's coming all the way from New Hampshire for his first visit to the Texas Panhandle.

Be sure to mark your calendar for this unique event. Unlike TV or even stage performances, Papa Joe interacts with the audience to create a program that all will enjoy.

Papa Joe will be performing at Storytime at the Sherman County Library on November 13 for a 45 minute program beginning at 11:15. All 3 and 4 year olds are invited to attend with an adult. The program is free of charge.

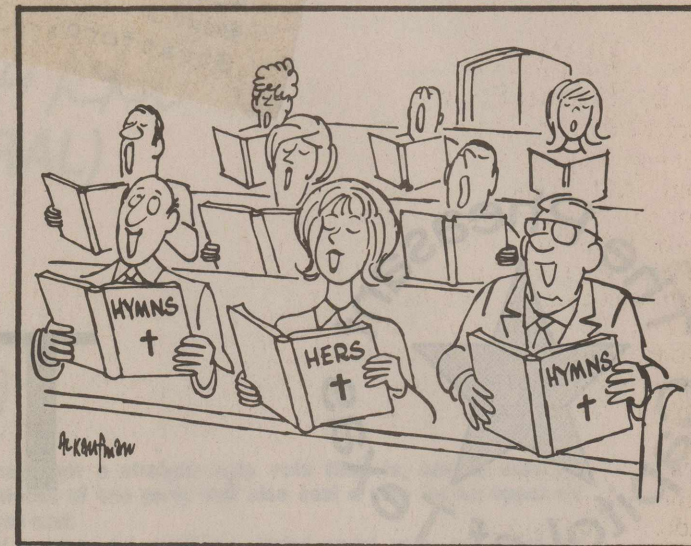
# Scot News

## Annual National Spelling Bee To Be Held In 1997

The Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas A&M University, Canyon, will continue the annual National Spelling Bee for students in public, parochial and private schools for 1997.

The educational regional bee will be held on April 5 on the campus of the university in Canyon where approximately 40 county champions will complete for the 1997 district title and the opportunity to participate in the Scripps Howard National event in late May in Washington, D.C.

All county champions will be guests of the sponsors on April 5, beginning with a luncheon on the WTA&M campus.

There will be prizes for all contestants.

# Letter To The Editor

For Your Information:

The Texas Government code Ch. 415, Sec. 415.015 states that anyone elected to the office of sheriff, if not a licensed peace officer, must obtain a peace officers license within two years of taking office or be removed from office.

The Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Officers Standards and Education (T.C.L.E.O.S.E.) sets the minimum standards for obtaining a peace officer's license. To obtain a license a person must pass a physical exam, a psychological exam, and be accepted into an accredited academy. The person must then attend a minimum of 560 hours of training, about 10 months, in the academy and graduate. The person must then pass the T.C.L.E.O.S.E. test.

Before taking office as sheriff eight years ago, Sheriff Jack Haile obtained his peace officer's license at his own expense. Sheriff Haile is the only candidate for Sherman County Sheriff to hold a peace officer's license.

## Cooking With Pumpkins

The pumpkin patch yields more than just jack-o-lanterns and holiday pie filling. Extension nutrition specialist Dr. Dymple Cooksey says it's time to elevate the status of the pumpkin. The festive gourd is really quite versatile. Cooksey says a half cup of pumpkin gives you a full day's supply of vitamin A. Pumpkins are also low in calories--so long as you don't plop a helping spoonful of whipped cream on top. Cooksey says fresh pumpkin can be substituted in recipes that call for winter squash or sweet potatoes. They are certainly delicious in puddings, custards and soups. You can also cut them into chunks and team them with salt, pepper and nutmeg, or mix them with apples, pears, rhubarb and other fruits and vegetables. Cooksey says they taste good with grains such as rice in a casserole. You can even make the seeds into a snack by roasting them at 375 degrees for 20 minutes. For cooking, select smaller pumpkins-ones that are five to eight pounds. They can last through the winter if you store them in a cool, dry place.

## 45th Annual Beef Bull Performance Test

The Annual Beef Bull Performance Test at Panhandle State University, Goodwell, Oklahoma, is underway again. This is the test station's 45th annual test. The bulls were officially weighed on test Saturday, October 12, 1996. There are 73 bulls consigned to the test this year representing 7 different breeds-Angus, Belgian Blue, Gelbvieh, Hereford, Red Angus, Salers and Simmental. Fifteen cooperators from the state of Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas have bulls on test.

Also, 34 head of steers have been consigned this year. Feedlot and carcass data on these steers will provide important information for herd improvement to participating breeders.

The test covers a period of 112 days during which data will be collected on each bull's average daily gain, weight-per-day of age, frame score, scrotal circumference, fat thickness, rib eye area and pelvic area. Feed efficiency is measured on a pen basis. The bulls are fed a growing ration consisting of rolled corn, rolled oats, chopped alfalfa, cottonseed hulls, molasses and protein supplement. Performance summaries will be reported at 28 day intervals during the test. The test will be completed February 1, 1997 and the 45th Annual Bull

Sale is scheduled for Saturday, February 22, 1997.

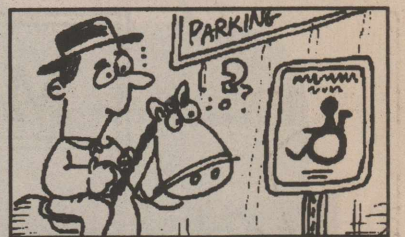
