# **Blood drive was a success**

The Friona community rose to the occasion again as they made the "2020-2021 Fingers Crossed" blood drive last Thursday a huge success. Even in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic, brave donors showed up to help others in need.

Out of the 56 who registered, 48 were able to donate. At the end of the day, Coffee Memorial Blood

Center employees collected 41 units of whole blood, 4 RBC (doubles/8 units), and 3 plasma (CCP) donations. A low iron level or high blood pressure are the main reasons that prevent some from being able to donate.

The convalescent plasma is used to treat patients who have contracted the COVID-19 virus. Anyone who has recovered from the COVID-19 virus and has not taken a vaccine is eligible to donate plasma for use in treating the virus. Call 806-358-4563 for more information.

Donors received a long sleeve tshirt and a free pass to "Escape the Trap House" in Amarillo. The next Friona community blood drive will be in April.

## **Future of rural telephone** service is uncertain

By state code, every Texan is entitled to a telephone connection. The ability to make and receive emergency 911 calls from anywhere in the state was the guiding force in the legislation. Telecommunication companies such as West Texas Rural Telephone are approved to fulfill that mandate.

The Texas Universal Service Fund (USF) was established to ensure that the networks necessary to provide that mandate could be built and maintained. The USF is funded by a broad-based assessment on instate voice calls made in Texas (about 27 million phone customers paying about 50 cents per month). These funds are allocated by the Public Utilities Commisison (PUC), through a third party, among the approved providers (i.e. WTRT) to support Texans in high cost and rural areas of the state. In turn, the providers have dedicated service areas that they are obligated to serve. They must maintain service quality and bear the responsibility of providing service to anyone in their territory who asks to have service. These service providers must also file detailed annual financial reports with the PUC.

Last Friday, the PUC reduced the payments sent to the rural telephone providers by 66%. Providers were notified by email of the impending shortage 72 hours before it happened. This shortfall has already caused some companies to stop new investments in networks, and further lost

revenues may result in layoffs, longer service response times, and ultimately higher local phone rates. Some small companies might be in danger of financial ruin. The PUC has known for over a year that changes were needed to keep the USF viable but has taken no action to either raise rates or find new income sources.

Faced with financial uncertainty and the responsibility for the integrity of the rural telephone network, rural phone providers, including WTRT, filed a lawsuit in Travis County District Court requesting a court order requiring the state to remit its missed payments and issue an injunction that requires the state to fulfill its obligations going forward. In short, the suit asks the court to require the PUC to fully fund the support the PUCT has previously approved for rural telephone customers. Amy Linzey, CEO of WTRT, said, "Filing a lawsuit is the last thing that West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative wanted to do and we are very disappointed that we had to do so — but with such a drastic reduction in state support, we simply did not have any other viable options."

With no relief, the reduced revenue could cost rural providers over \$80 million this year and over \$140 million in 2022. Eventually, rural customers could lose their phone and internet service. The 911 system could also be in jeopardy. Rural customers and their service providers face an uncertain future.

February joined the calendar with January around 700 B.C. When February was first added to the calendar along with January in 700 B.C. by Numa Pompilius, it became the last month of the year. Pompilius tacked on these

the lunar cycle. Julius Caesar attempted to align the calendar with the solar season creating the Julian calendar. February, already a short month, gained a few days bringing it to 28. Then every four years, a leap day was added. Under the current Gregorian calendar, the leap year functions differently. Leap years are divisible by four, with one exception. Centennial years must be divisible by 400. February is unique in other ways, too. Because it usually has 28 days, once every 6 years, it's the only month to have 4 full 7 day weeks. In the years that aren't leap years (otherwise known as common years), February and March start on the same day of the week.



## **Commissioners table lease agreement extension**

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, January 25, 2021 at 10 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

There were no public comments. Minutes from the January 11th meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Report and the Quarterly Report were also approved.

Commissioners discussed a lease extension involving the county's land in the Permanent School Fund. Disagreements arose over the wording of the extension and whether or not the county would have any control over the publication of an intended survey of the property by the company currently leasing the land. The discussion was tabled until the next meeting.

Approval was given for contracting of part-time assistance in the Treasurer's Office. Altha Herrington has been hired in the past to assist with the budget process and the end-of-year budget adjustments that are required.

Commissioners approved the purchase of a Road Grader for use in Precinct 1. The new grader will be purchased from Warren Cat in Lubbock utilizing their 5-year trade-in program. The \$127,600 payment will be made in full to avoid any interest charges. The purchase price for a new grader is \$272,000 without trade-in.

Anew COVID-19 Leave Policy was approved. The policy grants each county employee 80 hours of COVID-19 leave with the stipulation that they must take the vaccine when available to remain eligible for the leave time. The policy also becomes null and void if the federal government offers an identical COVID-19 Leave Policy.

In other business, a bond was approved for Tax Assessor Awyna Sanchez, twenty CE hours were approved for District Clerk Sandra Warren, and consideration on a water line under a county road was tabled until the next meeting.

Approval was given to the request by Bovina ISD for \$116,290.88 of its Permanent School Fund money to pay for construction projects.

An internet provider contract was approved with Plateau for \$392 per month to facilitate the installation of the new phone system.

A lease agreement was extended with Sea Scrolls for the Friona offices of Justice of the Peace #1, Department of Public Safety, and Parmer County Sheriff.

Commissioners accepted the resignation of long-time groundskeeper Andria Griswold.

Sheriff Randy Geries reported that he is currently housing 20 inmates in the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center. Approval was given for a security fence to

be constructed to protect the new generator that was installed at the center.

The next scheduled Commissioners Court meeting is Monday, February 8th.

All meetings are open to the public. The Commissioner's



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# **Government Authority**

In scripture, the authorities that God has established are an integral part of his created order and are to be honored. God's authority and sovereignty is the ultimate authority, and all authorities that he has allowed or instituted will give account to him. In Romans 13:1-7 scripture details the God given establishment and purpose of government authority, as well as the attitude a believer should have toward their government.

Paul makes clear that all authority is a subsidiary under God's authority, and that

one is to willingly submit to the government authority over them. The reason for such submission is twofold. First, you submit to avoid punishment, but secondly, you submit for conscience sake. Romans 13:5 says, "Therefore one must be in subjection, not only to avoid God's wrath but also for the sake of conscience." Based on these verses, it is impossible to be in step with the Lord, if you are blatantly disobeying the government authority that is over you, unless that authority is pressuring or forcing you to disobey God. This is because one's view of their government's authority is a reflection of how they view God's ultimate authority. Obviously, no government perfectly dispenses its authority, but the abundant abuses and imperfections of government authority, cause us to long for the one's authority who will one day fill the earth, as all things are made new and only under the jurisdiction of the King of Kings, the Lord of Lords, and the Prince of Peace, Jesus Christ!

## January 2021 WASDE report highlights

WHEAT: The outlook for 2020/21 U.S. wheat this month is for stable supplies, higher domestic use, unchanged exports, and lower ending stocks. The 2020/21 global wheat outlook is for smaller supplies, increased consumption, higher exports, and reduced stocks.

COARSE GRAINS: This month's 2020/21 U.S. corn outlook is for lower production, reduced corn used for ethanol, smaller feed and residual use and exports, and decreased ending stocks. Corn production is estimated at 14.182 billion bushels, down 324 million on a lower yield and slight reduction in harvested area. Sorghum production is estimated 2 million bushels higher as increased harvested area more than offsets a reduction in yield. Global coarse grain production for 2020/21 is forecast down 9.3 million tons to 1,438.5 million. This month's foreign coarse grain outlook is for lower production and consumption, and smaller ending stocks.

OILSEEDS: U.S. oilseed production for 2020/21 is estimated at 122.4 million tons, down 1.25 million from the previous report. Foreign 2020/21 oilseed production is relatively unchanged, with higher sunflowerseed mostly offset by lower soybean, cottonseed, peanut, rapeseed, and palm kernel output.

LIVESTOCK, POULTRY, AND DAIRY: The 2020 total red meat and poultry production estimate is reduced from last month. The beef production estimate is reduced on lower cattle slaughter. The pork production estimate is reduced as the slower pace of slaughter in late 2020 more than offset heavier carcass weights. The broiler production estimate is reduced on recent hatchery and slaughter data, while the turkey production estimate is lowered or recent production data. The egg production estimate is unchanged. The milk production estimate for 2020 and forecast for 2021 are raised from December on growth in milk per cow and higher dairy cow numbers. Fat basis imports for 2020 and 2021 are reduced from last month on lower expected imports of butterfat products

**COTTON:** The U.S. 2020/21 cotton outlook shows higher exports, and lower production and ending stocks this month.

Production is lowered nearly 1 million bales to 15.0 million, led by a 500,000-bale decline in Texas. The largest changes in the global 2020/21 cotton outlook this month are lower production and ending stocks, led by changes in the United States. World production is forecast more than 1.0 million bales lower.

The World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates are published monthly by the United States Department of Agriculture.


feel like they are females; we need to fight for the unborn; we need to fight to stay energy-independent; and, the list goes on and on with what is important to you.

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### **Gas prices unchanged Driver licenses expiration waiver ends in April**

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding the public the waiver on expiration dates for driver licenses (DLs) and identification cards (IDs) ends on April 14, 2021. Customers who need to renew are urged to make an appointment or renew online today.

The waiver, granted by Governor Greg Abbott in March due to the CO-VID-19 pandemic, applied to DLs, commercial DLs, commercial learner permits, ID cards and election identification certificates that expired on or after March 13, 2020.

"Driver License employees have worked diligently to help Texans during challenging times and should be commended for their dedication," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The Driver License Division has innovated to better serve constituents by implementing a new appointment solution to improve services and by providing extended hours at several locations across the state."

Online renewals still a convenient option

Many Texans are eligible to skip the

trip to the office entirely by renewing their DL/ID card or changing their address online at texas.gov. Customers can also renew by phone at 1-866-DL-RENEW (1-866-357-3639). The requirements and cost for online and phone renewal are the same as in-person transactions.

#### Scheduling an appointment

Services at driver license offices are now conducted by appointment only. To schedule an appointment or check availability, visit the online appointment scheduler. If you are unable to find an appointment at the office of your choice, check back for availability at that office or other locations nearby. Please check often as availability does change.

If you are unable to make your scheduled appointment, please reschedule or cancel it ahead of time. While the department is working to serve as many customers as possible, people with appointments not showing up continues to be a major obstacle. In December 2020, for example, approximately 31% of people were no-shows for their appointments.

The appointment system, which debuted in May 2020, is designed to provide additional convenience, reducing the time Texans wait in line. Customers can book appointments for a specific day and time, up to six months in advance, and show up 30 minutes or less before their scheduled time. Customers can check-in using the kiosk inside the office or from their mobile device.

All offices offer a limited number of same-day appointments. These appointments are available on a firstcome, first-served basis. Customers who book these appointments can leave the DL office until their designated time.

Additionally, most offices also offer customers without an appointment a spot on a "standby" list. These customers are required to wait in the office and are assisted in the event of a cancelation or no-show. The number of standby appointments available is limited to ensure all customers who are placed on the list will be served by the end of the day.

To ensure a safe environment, COV-ID-19 protocols have been implemented at DL offices.

Texas gas prices are unchanged in the past week, averaging \$2.09 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 16.5 cents per gallon higher than a month ago but stand 10.6 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.74 while the most expensive is \$2.81 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has risen 1.1 cents in the last week to \$2.40 per gallon. The national average is up 14.4 cents per gallon from a month ago but are still 12.6 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

"Finally, after several weeks of sharply rising gas prices, the pace of price increases has slowed significantly in recent days as prices are now largely caught up to oil's increases as of late," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "While the national average remains at its highest level since the pandemic, increases are likely to slow down in the immediate short-term unless and until oil prices see renewed momentum. When it comes to demand, Pay with GasBuddy data showed last week's gasoline demand at its highest level since November, another bullish factor as the nation continues to see slow improvement from the pandemic."



# **Check Your Mirrors**


January 27 is designated as International Holocaust Day. In 2005 the United Nations adopted a resolution "for commemoration of the victims of the Nazi regime." What struck me as even more significant about this resolution was its second mission statement: support the development of educational programs to remember the Holocaust and to prevent further genocide.

On January 27, 1945, the first Allied troops (the Soviets, in this case) reached the concentration camp in Auschwitz, Poland. Auschwitz was what could be referred to as a triple threat—a concentration camp to relocate Jews, a death camp, and if one were "lucky," a labor camp. When educating others about the Holocaust, the transport story is as compelling as any. Nazis loaded Jews on the rail cars such as the one pictured below.

"The train arrived in the middle of the night, so we were greeted by very bright lights shining down on us. We were greeted by soldiers, SS men, as well as women. We were greeted by dogs and whips, by shouting and screaming, orders to try to empty the train, by confusion. There is no way to describe your first coming to Auschwitz --Survivor Fritzie Weiss Fritzshall.

The Soviets discovered only remnants of humanity that January day. The Nazis had retreated with 60,000 Jews on a death march away from the camp. The SS left behind some 7,000 of the weakest prisoners to die in Auschwitz. One of the first Soviets to enter the camp, 21-year-old Ivan Martynushkin, recalled 65 years later his experience in a 2010 television interview.

"We saw emaciated, tortured, impoverished people," Martynushkin said. "Those were the people I first encountered. We could tell from their eyes that they were happy to be saved from this hell.



threatened by death in a crematorium. Happy to be freed. And we had the feeling of doing a good deed — liberating these people from this hell." (Washington Post, January 27, 2015). \*\*\*\*\*

Just as we cannot assume children will learn courtesy and manners independently without guidance, we must remember that much of textbook education, especially history, is crucial, too. We don't want our kids wiping their noses on their sleeves. We want them to learn to say please and thank you. We should also make it a priority that they know what hate and ignorance can reap.

Discussions are hard when it comes to explaining how the Holocaust came to be. Sure, it's impactful to show a PowerPoint of the emaciated prisoners, the piled corpses, the crematoriums-those visuals say far more than a class lecture. Watch The Boy in the Striped Pajamas and Schindler's List and Escape from Sobibor. Have them read The Diary of Anne Frank. But try to do this with your children as an informed parent, educator, or guest speaker. Preview the movies. Read the books first, or even better, with them. Then, create that safe space in your home or classroom where questions can be asked and candidly answered, age-appropriate. The how and the why of the Holocaust deserve this. Don't shoot from the hip. Inform yourself first and then fire a cannon-one that catapults the unbelievable events of 1939-1945 in a manner suitable for your audience.

In August 2017, I drove to New York City for the sole purpose of meeting Johanna

Reiss. Her book, The Upstairs Room, was a Sixth-Grade reading assignment for many of my classes. We began an email correspondence in 2015 that gave me an incredible opportunity to speak to a survivor of the Jewish persecution during World War II. She escaped the concentration camps due to her father's pro-active plans to relocate his children. For two years, Johanna lived in hiding. She was a prisoner of sorts in an attic with her older sister as

her only companion. Johanna invited me into her home in downtown Manhattan (a very modest place, not confused with penthouse living). She talked freely and delighted in showing me the artwork that her sister Sini had painted. She allowed me to take photos, walk through her rooms, ask any question, and afterward accepted my invitation to walk down the street to buy our breakfast.

Meeting Johanna was like a continuing education course for me. She has lived in the United States since the early 1950s. In her 80s now, much of her life's work today is telling her story to schoolchildren in the United States. On occasion, she will travel back to her hometown in the Netherlands and then to Germany






to speak to schools there.

your family may be ready for some road trips. Maybe you could consider some historical sites along with your beach and amusement parks. The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C., along with other history museums on the National Mall, are field trip heaven. For in-state educational opportunities to learn about the Holocaust, I have visited Holocaust Museums in El Paso and Dallas-both smaller but certainly informative. Houston and San Antonio also have museums dedicated to the remembrance of this event.



# **State Capital Highlights**

### Lawmakers start \$7 billion away from target

Texas House and Senate leaders appear to agree on their proposed budgets. Next, they just have to figure out how to cut \$7.2 billion.

Senate Finance Chair Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, worked with Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick to propose a state budget of \$119.7 billion in general funds. House Speaker Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, proposed the same budget figure, indicating a collaborative spirit at the start of the 87th session.

That spirit will be tested as legislators try to meet Comptroller Glen Hegar's budgeted revenue forecast of \$112.5 billion.

"We have many tools available to balance this budget, which will require us to re-establish our priorities, stretch every dollar and find more efficient ways to deliver services," Nelson said in a statement.

Among the priorities she set:

• Maintaining the education funding increases and teacher pay raises established in 2019, including \$3.1 billion to fund enrollment growth for public education and \$1 billion in additional state aid related to property tax compression in the 2022-23 biennium.

• \$5 billion for payroll growth and continued reforms to the Teacher Retirement System passed last session.

• \$8.1 billion to fund higher education institution formulas.

• Combined projected funding of \$8 billion for mental health across 24 state agencies, including an increase of \$19.5 million to maintain operations for the Texas Child Mental Health Care Consortium; more than \$1 million in new funding to create a peer-to-peer counseling network and increase access to licensed mental health providers for Texas Law Enforcement Officers; and \$145 million to continue community mental health grant programs.

• \$352.6 million for women's health

programs, including the continuation of the Healthy Texas Women program's enhanced postpartum care services implemented by the Legislature last session.

• \$57.6 million to continue fighting human trafficking through prevention, detection, victim services and the justice system.

• \$1.3 million to perform necessary maintenance on the Texas Election Administration Management System, which manages voter registration in Texas.

• \$39.1 million in new appropriations to fortify security at the Texas Capitol, including additional troopers and enhanced safety measures.

• \$30.4 billion to the Texas Department of Transportation to address the state's transportation needs, including \$26.4 billion dedicated for highway planning, design, construction and maintenance.

Phelan's statement indicated the same support for public education and also included an appropriation of \$74.2 billion for the Texas Medicaid program, including \$27.4 billion in general revenue. The House version includes an additional \$920 million to address projected caseload growth.

"The decisions we make during the 87th legislative session will have lasting effects on the future of our state, which is why the House will work to improve our business climate, foster economic prosperity, and do what's right for our students," Phelan said.

### **Strawberry fields forever**

You don't find many strawberry fields in Texas, but that could change if a seed planted by the Texas Department of Agriculture takes root.

The department has awarded a second grant to the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service to research and test how the state's farmers can make more money growing strawberries.

Leading the project is AgriLife extension's Russ Wallace, a horticulturist in Lubbock. You might call him the John Lennon of Texas strawberries.

"We're extremely excited about what we've learned thus far to successfully grow strawberries in Texas and increase profitability," Wallace said in an AgriLife news release. "This is the next step in our ongoing research where we'll be doing more work with shading trials, finetuning fertilization and additional work with herbicides."

Strawberries have some juicy potential as a specialty crop because consumers have shown an increasing hunger for locally grown produce, ag experts say, although they don't often use bad puns.

One of the research sites is Atascosa County's Poteet, the self-proclaimed strawberry capital of Texas. Poteet Strawberry Festival organizers recently announced the event will go on April 9-11.

Some readers of the festival's Facebook page criticized the move as having the potential to spread COVID-19 faster than jam on toast.

Festival organizers responded that "we've been working and hoping for a blessing that we can continue, within allowable restrictions or capabilities, but still continuing as possible. We hope all goes well."

## Southwest Volleyball Club team makes debut




