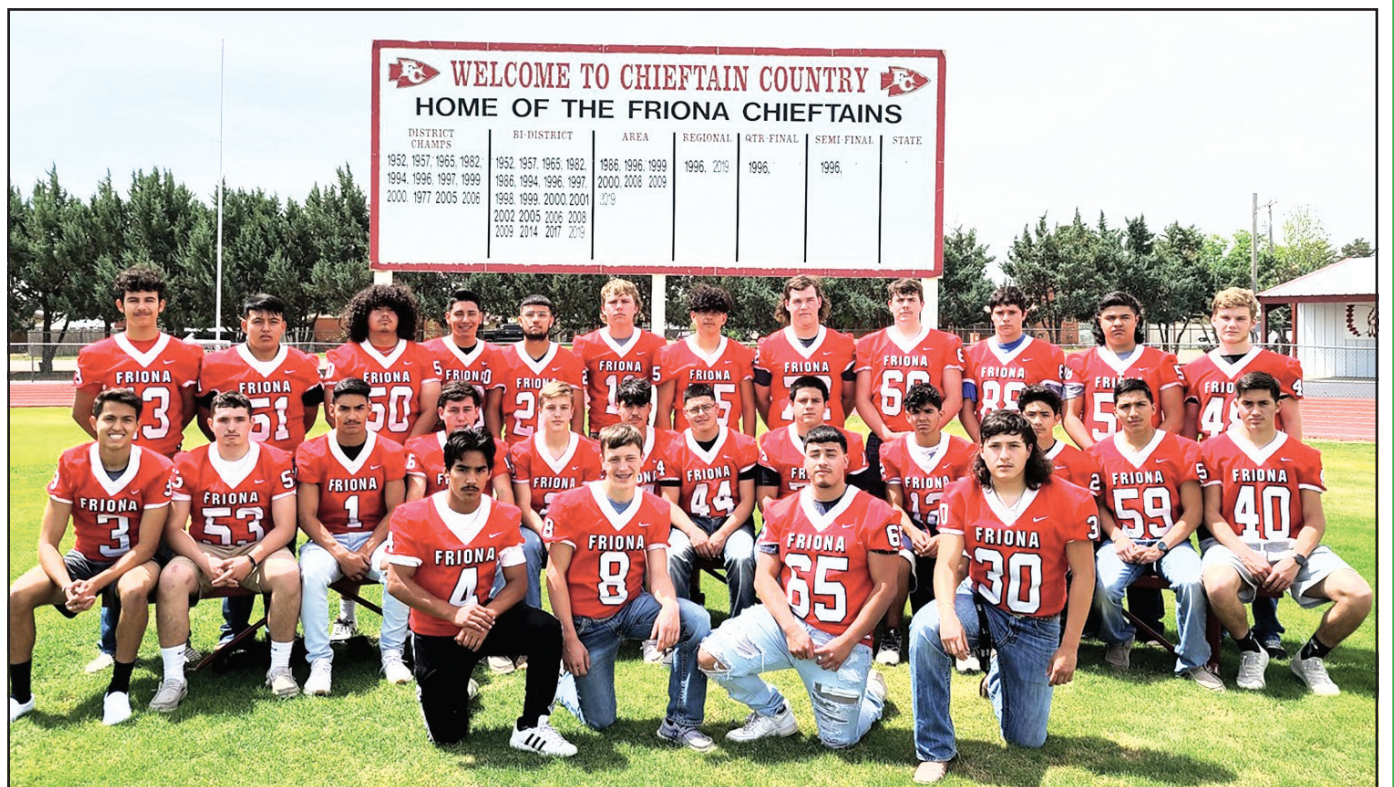

Check Your Mirrors

Last week's attack on our military at the Kabul airport in Afghanistan is a difficult reminder that war's residual effects are never ending. The sacrifice continues, even after military personnel are winding down an operation with plans of returning home. Unless we have family or close friends who are engaged or have served, our civilian perception of war can be limited. Books, television coverage, or movies are sometimes our only glimpse into conflicts around the world.

I watched a film recently which portrayed the peril of war. The movie does not have the agonizing graphic gore that was depicted in *Saving Private Ryan*. Nonetheless, it reveals the intense mental anxiety that soldiers and their commanders experienced as they were transporting supplies across the Atlantic from 1939-1945.

History books provide information regarding World War II's battles in the South Pacific, North Africa, and of course the European theater. The Battle of the Atlantic receives far less attention. Tom Hanks, well known for his dedication to telling stories of World War II, wrote the screenplay for *Greyhound*, based on the 1955 fictional book *The Good Shepherd*, authored by C.S. Forester. Hanks seldom disappoints on the screen, and this movie is no ex-

ception.

The Battle of the Atlantic was World War II's longest running fight. Transatlantic ships were tasked with running supplies across the ocean to the British Isles—whose war with Germany began in 1939, two years before the United States entered. In 1941, the US Navy provided escort on merchant marine vessels to the Allies in Great Britain. The dangerous threat of German submarines, known as U-boats, was constant. The middle passage of the journey, referred to as the Black Pit, the transports were out of range of Allied air cover. These ships relied solely on the skill of naval captains to relay the fleet and war supplies to their destinations.

In the course of the six years of crossing from 1939-1945, over 72,000 lost their lives in this mission. *Greyhound* includes a somber scene of burial at sea as it would have been performed numerous times during World War II. Flag-draped bodies are lifted and then slid into the sea, a burial witnessed only by their Maker and their fellow seamen. Hank's fictional character Captain Ernest Krause recites from the Anglican Book of Prayer the traditional Naval epitaph:

"Unto Almighty God we commend the soul of our brother de-

parted, and we commit his body to the deep; in sure and certain hope of the Resurrection unto eternal life, through our Lord Jesus Christ; at whose coming in glorious majesty to judge the world, the sea shall give up her dead; and the corruptible bodies of those who sleep in him shall be changed, and made like unto his glorious body; according to the mighty working whereby he is able to subdue all things unto himself."

It is difficult to fathom the grief of a parent whose son or daughter is buried at sea, not in his hometown cemetery. Hard to think about a child who has become fatherless or motherless because of the warped evil of madmen like Hitler or terrorist groups in Afghanistan bent on radical transformation.

A sense of gloom can consume us during current events, just as they did for those who lived through World War II's long engagements. If we can focus on the bravery, the commitment to a cause, and the sense of duty which military units around the globe perform every day it might give us hope that good will triumph over evil once more.

May the Lord bless and keep the families of those whose lives were lost serving not only our country but freedom-seeking citizens of another.

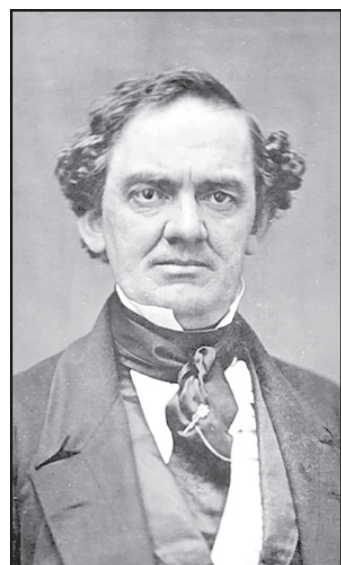

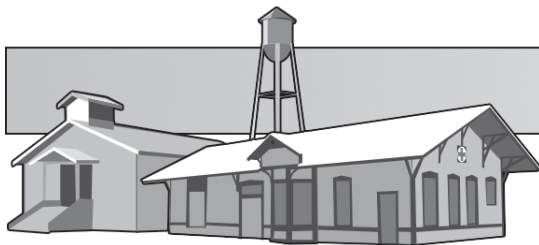
P.T. Barnum

Once, while he was touring Europe with the not-quite three-foot tall Tom Thumb, Barnum encountered Miss Jenny Lind, the celebrated "Swedish Nightingale." She was an operatic singer with a great following on the continent. Barnum quickly signed her for a national tour of America, and on September 1, 1850, he showed the world just how far his tastes reached.

The trip was a triumph. As someone once said of him, P.T. Barnum was "Disney before Disney."

September is National Honey month, so I gathered up a meal of recipes that use honey.

Herb Chicken with Honey Butter

Ingredients

- 1 large egg, lightly beaten
 - 3/4 cup seasoned breadcrumbs
 - 2 tablespoons dried parsley flakes
 - 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning
 - 3/4 teaspoon garlic salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 - 4 boneless skinless chicken breast halves (6 ounces each)
 - 3 tablespoons butter
- HONEY BUTTER:**
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
 - 1/4 cup honey

Directions

Place egg in a shallow bowl. In another shallow bowl, combine breadcrumbs and seasonings. Dip chicken in egg, then coat with breadcrumb mixture. Heat a large cast-iron or other heavy skillet over medium heat. Cook chicken in butter until a thermometer reads 165°, 4-5 minutes on each side. Meanwhile, combine softened butter and honey. Serve with chicken.

Honey-Mustard Brussels Sprouts Salad

Ingredients

- 1-pound fresh Brussels sprouts, trimmed and shredded
- 2 medium tart apples, chopped
- 1 medium red onion, chopped
- 1 small, sweet orange pepper, chopped
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- 1/2 cup green grapes, sliced
- 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 3 bacon strips, cooked and crumbled
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 2 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons honey mustard
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Directions

In a large bowl, combine the first 8 ingredients. In a small bowl, whisk remaining ingredients; pour over salad. Toss to coat.

Ingredients

- 2/3 cup packed brown sugar
 - 1/3 cup 2% milk
 - 2 cups all-purpose flour
 - 1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 - 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
 - 1/8 teaspoon ground cloves
 - 2 large eggs, room temperature
 - 1/2 cup honey
 - 1/3 cup canola oil
- GLAZE:**
- 1/3 cup confectioners' sugar
 - 2 teaspoons 2% milk

Directions

Preheat oven to 325°. In a small saucepan, combine brown sugar and milk. Cook and stir over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Remove from heat. In a large bowl, whisk flour, baking powder, cinnamon, nutmeg, and cloves. In another bowl, whisk eggs, honey, oil, and brown sugar mixture until blended. Add to flour mixture; stir just until moistened. Transfer the batter to a greased 8x4-in. loaf pan. Bake 50-60 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean (cover top loosely with foil if needed to prevent overbrowning). Cool in pan 10 minutes before removing to a wire rack to cool completely. In a small bowl, stir glaze ingredients until smooth, and drizzle over bread. Freeze option: Securely wrap cooled loaf in foil and then freeze. To use, thaw at room temperature. Glaze as directed.

Gas prices expected to rise after Hurricane Ida

Texas gas prices have fallen 2.6 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.79 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Gas prices in Texas are 5.1 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 87.8 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.23 today while the most expensive is \$3.59 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 2.2 cents per in the last week, averaging \$3.12 per gallon. The national average is down 2.9 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 90.1 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"While the national average price of gasoline

declined yet again over the last week, Hurricane Ida has been causing countless disruptions to critical infrastructure, including oil production, refineries and pipelines. We're likely to see a reversal this week, but motorists need not be too concerned at this point," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy.

De Haan continued, "I expect the national average to rise in the neighborhood of 5-15 cents per gallon in the next couple of weeks which is far smaller than the impact from Hurricanes Katrina and Harvey. However, with damage assessments still to come, it's possible we will see a slight deviation from that. While Colonial Pipeline shut Lines 1 and 2 as a

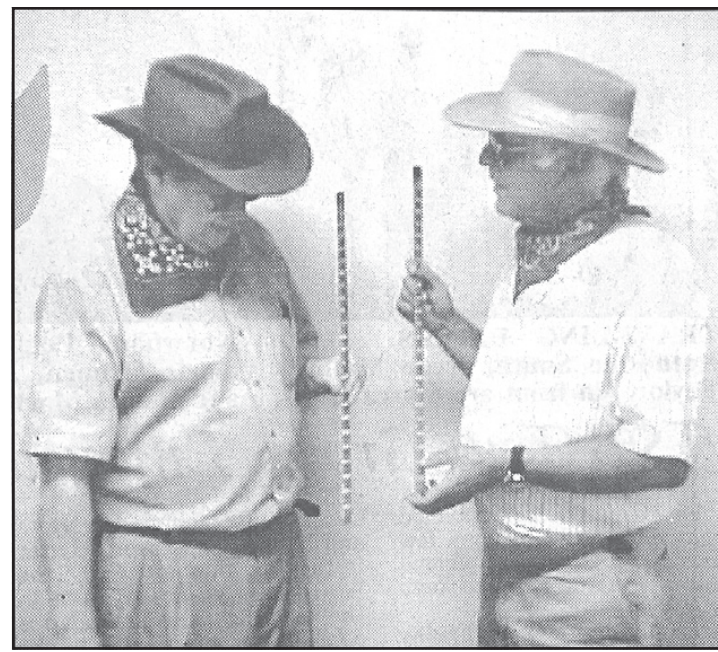
precaution, it's highly unlikely that this will cause any long-term disruption to fuel supply like we saw months ago after the company was hacked. The biggest question for refineries will be the flooding, which could alter the rise in gas prices, but the odds of a massive surge in gas prices nationwide are extremely low."

Local Beef Community Raises Over \$100,000 for SP4K Beef Stik Program

The Amarillo area beef community presented a check for \$105,500 to the Snack Pak 4 Kids (SP4K) Beef Stik Program. The money will provide beef sticks to hungry students through the Snack Pak weekend hunger program. The check was presented at the third annual Beef 4 Kids Classic golf tournament.

"I have one student that I know doesn't eat every night of the week. Snack Pak helps

to make sure this child has food over the weekend," said one teacher.

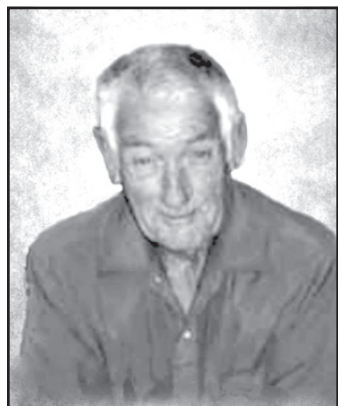
Percy was preceded in death by his parents; sisters Sarah Wells and Nina Carr, and brothers Glynn, Robert and Tommy.

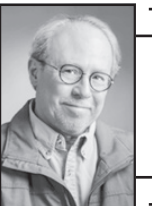

Elections bill passes House along party lines

The Texas House approved an elections bill Friday along party lines with 21 Democrats declining to participate. The bill, slightly different from previously passed Senate legislation, now heads a conference committee that will negotiate a final version.

The measure passed after House Democrats largely ended a second walkout that broke quorum. The Austin American-Statesman reported the bill would ban drive-thru and 24-hour voting, add ID requirements to mail-in ballots, and give greater leeway to partisan poll watchers' ability to observe both polling places and vote counting.

Republicans supported the bill as a means to reassure voters that elections are fraud-free. Critics called it an attempt to suppress voting among minorities and other groups that tend to support Democrats.

State Rep. Chris Turner, D-Grand Prairie, said the bill was inspired by former President Trump's claim the election was stolen.

"This bill was never about election security or voter integrity. It was always about using the big lie to justify restricting access to the ballot box," Turner said.

COVID-19 cases drop in Texas; hospitalizations, deaths rise

The number of new cases of COVID-19 in Texas dropped 14% last week when compared to the previous week, to 107,489. However, 1,351 deaths in the state were reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University, up 44% from the previous week.

The Texas Department of State Health Services reported 13,735 lab-confirmed COVID-19 patients in hospitals, an increase of 6% from the previous week. The number of hospitalizations is approaching the all-time high of 14,218 reached in mid-January.

A number of hospitals have reported all intensive-care unit beds are filled. DSHS reported only 325 available ICU beds statewide as of Sunday. People under the age of 50 are being admitted to hospitals with COVID-19 in the largest numbers since the pandemic began in early 2020.

Gov. Greg Abbott and the Texas Division of Emergency Management have announced openings of several COVID-19 therapeutic infusion centers to provide Regeneron's monoclonal antibodies to COVID-19 outpatients throughout the state. Visit meds.tdem.texas.gov to find a site near you.

Meanwhile, the pace of vaccinations has increased as the delta variant spreads, with an average of more than 80,000 vaccine doses reported daily during the past month. DSHS reports 13.6 million Texans are fully vaccinated, which is 46.6% of the state's population.

\$1.4 billion in summer food benefits

Texas families with children who have temporarily lost access to free or reduced-price school meals can receive electronic food benefits under a third round of grants from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) covers the summer months and provides a one-time benefit per eligible child. It can be used in the same way that Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program cards work to buy groceries. The program is administered by the Texas Health and Human Services Commission.

"As children across the state start going back to school, we're thankful we can provide this added benefit so Texans can provide nutritious food for their families," said Wayne Salter, HHS Deputy Executive Commissioner of Access and Eligibility Services.

Dust in the wind equals hazy skies

If the skies seem unusually hazy lately, even as temperatures approach the century mark in much of the state, the answer lies to the east — and we're not talking Louisiana.

Every year about this time plumes of dust make their way from Africa's Sahara Desert to America. Non-scientists call it rain dust, according to an article on the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality's website.

Summer storms in the Sahara kick up about 180,000 tons of dust into the atmosphere each year, causing some problems for folks with asthma or other chronic lung conditions, according to Weslee Copeland, TCEQ's senior meteorologist.

"The dust does degrade air quality when it's here," he says. "Most of the time it falls within the moderate range of EPA's Air Quality Index, which means most healthy individuals will not be affected, but those who are more sensitive may experience some respiratory effects."

The dust has one beneficial attribute: It generally suppresses the formation of tropical storms and hurricanes, though it did not prevent Hurricane Ida from hitting Louisiana Sunday as a Category 4 hurricane, on the 16th anniversary of Hurricane Katrina's landfall.

Pay-to-play requirements eased under new law

Texas taxpayers who challenge a state tax assessment or are denied a refund should find it easier to take their cases to court under measures passed during the regular legislative session.

State Comptroller Glenn Hegar pushed a bill that took aim at "pay-to-play" rules that forced businesses and individuals to pay tax bills under dispute before taking them to court to seek a refund.

Under HB 2080, taxpayers who disagree with a tax bill can now take their cases to the State Office of Administrative Hearings without first paying the disputed taxes.
