Commissioners approve new bank account for special funds

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, September 13, 2021 at 10 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

All four Commissioners were in attendance and Precinct 1 Commissioner Kirk Frye conducted the session in the absence of Parmer County Judge Trey Ellis.

There were no public comments. Minutes from the August 23rd meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's payroll report was also approved.

Commissioners cussed the need to open a new separate interestbearing bank account to receive and disburse funds related to the

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). This would allow for complete transparency in the handling of the designated monev. The Court approved the opening of the new account.

Sheriff Randy Geries reported that he was currently housing 29 inmates in the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center. Sheriff Geries also presented the 2022 Fees of Office for consideration by the Court. The proposed fees were approved.

The next scheduled Commissioners Court meeting is Monday, September 27th.

All meetings are open to the public. The Commissioner's Court reserves the right to go into Executive Session at any time. The agenda may be found on the Parmer County website. Information in this article is only a summary. Any questions concerning specific actions should be directed to the Commissioners Court.





Check Your Mirrors

Thank you, Eleanor Roosevelt

I come from a family of fans. We are sports fans, music fans, history fans. Sometimes we fan family, as with our beloved Uncle Clifton who just turned 95.

By fans, I mean passionately-consumed-and-verging-onstalking fans. It's not as scary as it sounds because we make fun of each other and our various objects of fandom. My brother Scotty latched on to the Beatles and the Yankees in the 60s. I followed suit with the Yankees but added Amy Grant, Abraham Lincoln, James Taylor, and Jack Black. Sara, a reader, found her fandom in characters such as Laura Ingalls Wilder and Nancy Drew and political scientists who know what they are talking about. To this day, younger brother Shane can break out into any Madonna song/dance-and often does. And the baby of the family went her way: the old Houston Oilers and Warren Moon, the Atlanta Braves and Chipper Jones, and women history makers who defied the norms. All of the heifers on their ranch have First Lady names. Jackie K (Kennedy) O (Onassis) is a real knockout.

My siblings and I have given birth to children who carry on this starry-eyed gene. The New England Patriots, Pat Summitt, Harry Potter and all things Hogwarts, Randy Rogers, Tim Tebow, Beyoncé, Rafael Nadal, and Alamo Drafthouse (yes, one can obsess over a specific movie theater).

We've attended their games, seen their concerts, watched their movies, and read their books or listened to podcasts about them. Sabrina even made it to Cooperstown to watch Chipper's in-

duction into the Baseball Hall of Fame, this after she flew with her longsuffering husband to watch Chipper's last game in Atlanta.

Our admiration does not stem from idolizing these people. Each of them is very human, with flaws and life experiences that make them relatable. Amy Grant divorced and remarried. Chipper Jones has six sons with three different women. James Taylor had a heroin addiction and spent time in a psychiatric hospital early in his career. Lincoln suffered from depression. Alamo Drafthouse prices are high, and Jack Black needs to lose weight. Still, in all of these, we find something admirable to which we are drawn.

"We need heroes first and foremost because our heroes help define the limits of our aspirations. We largely define our ideals by the heroes we choose, and our ideals -- things like courage, honor, and justice -- largely define us. Our heroes are symbols for us of all the qualities we would like to possess and all the ambitions we would like to satisfy."—Scott LaBarge, Markkula Center for Applied Ethics at Santa Clara University.

Who are your heroes? More importantly, do your children know about real people, real stories of those they can admire? Social media has created a strange phenomenon called influencers. It's very likely some of your children know more about PewDiePie, Kylie Jenner, Gary Vee, Kevin Hart, Emma Chamberlain, and Charlie D'Amelio than they do about Sam Houston, Florence Nightingale, Roy Benavidez, Chuck Yeager, Arthur Ashe, or Dwight D. Eisenhower.

It's ok—just point them in the

direction of a broader base of influencers. Maybe your family has an aunt who is raising three children on her own with no child support. The neighbor across the street may have a Purple Heart license plate. Make a connection to see if he or she would share their story with your kids.

Finally, junior high and high school students in rural schools have a unique opportunity to be influencers themselves. The little guy in First Grade who does not have a big brother is going to be watching closely at the pep rally. He sees you in the cafeteria when you choose to sit with someone who may need a friend. Those bus rides can mean everything to a kid who has been bullied all day but has a high school junior sit down beside him or her to share an afterschool snack. Have a chance to work with elementary students in their classrooms? Remember how you wanted to be treated when you were that age.

A Fifth-Grade book report on former first lady Eleanor Roosevelt was the beginning of what is now a long list of heroes. I may need to write a column just about her at some point. Considered the First Lady of the World, she overcame jokes about her looks and her voice to be an ambassador for equal rights, veterans, coal miners, those living in poverty, and women. She worked her fanny off, that much I figured out when doing the report. Since that report, I have continued to read biographies about her, and the admiration has multiplied.

Thank you, Mrs. Roosevelt. Thank you, Jack Black. I think you two would have been friends.



Rescue turned into recovery and Mr. Molden was removed from the silo around 8:45 p.m. that evening. Michael Molden was 51 years old and a Clovis resident. 



Halls of Montezuma

In 1845 the U.S. government annexed Texas, which set a feud in motion with Mexico. President James K. Polk ordered General Zachary Taylor to occupy the disputed territory along the Rio Grande River; meanwhile, the Mexican army attacked Taylor's troops, and America declared war.

Eventually, General Winfield Scott invaded Mexico with an army of 10,000-including 400 Marines-and won the day. He landed near Vera Cruz on the Gulf of Mexico and defeated their forces. Then, he moved on to Mexico City, and won his final victory at a fortified military academy known as the Halls of Montezuma; there, he



raised the American flag on September 14, 1847, and declared victory.

Guacamole

Good news Guacamole lovers. September 16th is National Guacamole Day. If you are a true guacamole fan, you probably already have your favorite preparation. Here are a couple of recipes to try if you need one or just want something different. I know some guacamole purists will disagree with these options, but sometimes it is worth trying something with a little twist.

Guacamole

Ingredients

- 3 Haas avocados, halved, seeded and peeled
- 1 lime, juiced
- 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne
- 1/2 medium onion, diced
- 1/2 jalapeno pepper, seeded and minced
- 2 Roma tomatoes, seeded and diced
- 1 tablespoon chopped cilantro
- 1 clove garlic, minced

INGREDIENTS

3 medium avocados

1/3 cup red onion, minced

pepper, finely chopped

1 teaspoon lime zest, grated

2 large garlic cloves, minced

3/4 cup all-purpose flour

3 tablespoons cilantro, minced

1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

2 cups dry breadcrumbs, unseasoned

vegetable oil, as needed for frying

1/4 cup pickled jalapeno

2 teaspoons lime juice

1/2 teaspoon salt

3 large eggs

sea salt, to taste

In a large bowl place the scooped avocado pulp and lime juice, toss to coat. Drain, and reserve the lime juice, after all of the avocados have been coated. Using a potato masher add the salt, cumin, and cayenne and mash. Then, fold in the onions, tomatoes, cilantro, and garlic. Add 1 tablespoon of the reserved lime juice. Let sit at room temperature for 1 hour and then serve.

Deep Fried Guacamole

DIRECTIONS

Peel and pit avocados. In a bowl, coarsely mash avocados; fold in onion, jalapenos, cilantro, lime zest and juice, salt, pepper, and garlic. Line an 8-inch square baking pan with wax or parchment paper. Spoon avocado mixture into pan; spread into an even layer. Place another sheet of parchment on top; freeze until solid, 6 to 8 hours. At least 30 mins before serving, in a small shallow bowl, beat eggs with 3 tablespoons water. Remove avocado mixture to a cutting board; cut into small cubes. Dip each cube in flour, then egg wash, breadcrumbs, and again in wash and breadcrumbs. Arrange in a large baking pan; cover and return to the freezer until firm, 20 to 30 minutes. (You can leave these overnight in the freezer if you want to have the prep work done ahead of time.) When you are ready to cook these, in a deep skillet or pot, heat oil to 350°F Fry frozen guacamole bites in batches until golden; drain on paper towels. Serve immediately sprinkled, if desired, with kosher salt.

CARIBBEAN STYLE GUACAMOLE

Ingredients:

- 4 avocados, ripe 3/4 cup red onion, diced
- 1/4 scotch bonnet pepper
- (any hot pepper will work)
- 2 limes, juice of
- 3/4 cup mango, diced (ripe but firm)
- 1/2 cup cilantro, chopped (shado beni)
- 1 garlic clove
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon olive oil

Directions:

Using a mortar and pestle, crush the scotch bonnet pepper, garlic, and salt into a somewhat smooth paste. Then place this wicked spicy paste into a deep bowl and add the peeled and diced avocado to it. Using the back of a fork, crush the avocado until you have a chunky texture (you can make it as smooth as you like). To prevent the avocado from going discolored, squeeze in the lime juice at this point and give it a good stir. It's now time to peel and cube the mango. Be sure to get a mango that's not fully ripe, so it's firm enough to dice and will not fall apart. You'll need about 1/2 of a large mango. Add the cubed mango to the bowl. Add the chopped shado beni (or cilantro) and top with finely diced onion. Don't stir yet. Heat the oil on a medium flame and just before you start seeing smoke... pour it directly on the diced onions. This will help take some of the rawness out, so you won't have karate breath after. Give it a good stir and serve or chill in the fridge. Remember to use the lime juice to prevent it going nasty looking (lemon works just as well). If you love heat, do add a bit more of the scotch bonnet pepper.

State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled

over \$3 Billion in August Comptroller **Texas** Glenn Hegar said state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.33 billion in August, 18.3 percent more than in August 2020. The majority of August sales tax revenue is based on sales made in July and remitted to the agency in August. Hegar stated, "August state sales tax collections continued to surpass year-ago and pre-pandemic levels, with the rate of growth in receipts from non-retail sectors again outpacing that from retail trade."

Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes in August: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$625

million, up 33 percent from August 2020 (before May of this year, that source of revenue had never topped \$500 million); (2) motor fuel taxes - \$331 million, up 15 percent from August 2020; (3) oil production tax — \$405 million, up 85 percent from August 2020; (4) natural gas production tax — \$215 million, compared to negative \$15 million in August 2020, attributable to substantial refund payments in August a year ago; (5) hotel occupancy tax — \$65 million, up 112 percent from August 2020; and (6) alcoholic beverage taxes — \$135 million, up 96 percent from August 2020.

Abbott calls third special session for **Sept. 20**

Gov. Greg Abbott has called a third special legislative session to deal with redistricting, to decide how to spend billions of dollars in pandemic funding from the federal government and to determine to whether state or local governments can mandate COVID-19 vaccines, as well as some pet issues of the governor that failed to pass recent sessions.

The third session begins Sept. 20 and by law can last no longer than 30 days. The second special session resulted in passage of hotly contested voting restrictions and what are considered the most restrictive abortion laws in the country, both of which are under legal attack. In the case of the latter, the U.S. Justice Department is suing the state, saying the abortion law banning the procedure at roughly six weeks of pregnancy is unconstitutional.

"The (Texas) act is clearly unconstitutional under long-standing Supreme Court precedent," Attorney General Merrick Garland said Thursday, as reported widely by media out-

Several groups have filed suit against the elections bill signed by Abbott last week, including Voto Latino, LULAC Texas, the Texas Alliance for Retired Americans, and the Texas American Federation of Teachers.

The law limits early voting hours, ends drive-in voting, and restricts mail-in voting. GOP leaders maintain that other provisions in the measure make it easier to cast a vote than before.

August cooler, wetter than normal for most of Texas

August is in the books and the first

day of autumn beckons. Dr. Mark Wentzel, a hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board, reports the month was cooler than normal for most of the state, and wetter than normal for about half of Texas. The U.S. Drought Monitor map for Texas shows just 1% of the state in drought.

"Over the last 22 years, we've averaged about 40% of the state in drought by the end of August, Wentzel wrote in his monthly report. "Since 2000, we've only had two other Augusts that ended with less drought area: 2004 and 2007."

Emergency SNAP benefits extended again

The Texas Health and Human Services Commission is extending emergency Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program food benefits once more in September, meaning SNAP recipients will again get an additional \$95 in emergency allotments. The funding comes from the United States Department of Agriculture.

"As we continue to navigate through the pandemic, we are pleased to provide this additional support to ensure Texans will be able to keep food on their table for themselves and their families," said Wayne Salter of the HHSC.

Duck hunters can expect another good season

The early teal hunting season began Saturday, and officials with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department say habitat conditions point to another productive season for hunters.

"Teal numbers are already impressive in many areas of Texas, especially the rice prairies of the Texas Gulf Coast and the playa wetlands of the Panhandle," Kevin Kraai of TPWD said.

The 16-day statewide early teal season runs through Sept. 26, with a daily bag limit of six. Blue-winged teal are by far the most prevalent duck found in Texas this time of year, according to TPWD.

Tuition program open enrollment underway

Open enrollment in the state's Texas Tuition Promise Fund began Sept. 1 and runs through the end of February. The plan allows parents and others to lock in today's tuition and fees at state public colleges and universities. The accumulated funds can also be transferred to private colleges and other institutions such as vocational schools, though the tuition is not locked in.

The TTPF program offers webinars throughout the enrollment period. More information can be found at TuitionPromise.org or by calling Monday through Friday at 800-445-GRAD (4723). Press Option 5.

COVID-19 cases, hospitalizations drop slightly


The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas decreased slightly in the past week, with the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University reporting 120,494 new cases, down 4.6% from the previous week. Total deaths statewide increased slightly to 1,789.

The number of lab-confirmed CO-VID-10 hospitalizations dropped slightly, with 13,285 reported in Texas, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services. Available intensive-care unit beds remain scarce, with just 330 open in the entire state, the least since the pandemic began early last year. Even more concerning are the few pediatric ICU beds open, with just 80 available, according to DSHS.

At least 45 school districts across the state have shut down in-person classes because of COVID-19 outbreaks affecting more than 40,000 students, according to the Texas Tribune.

The number of Texans who are fully vaccinated crossed the 14-million mark, which is 48.5% of the total population, DSHS reported.



PUBLIC NOTICE Explanatory Statements for the November 2, 2021 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 143)

HJR 143 proposes a constitutional amendment expanding the circumstances in which a professional sports team charitable foundation may conduct raffles to raise money for the foundation's charitable purposes. The proposed amendment would allow professional sports team charitable foundations of organizations sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association or the Women's Professional Rodeo Association to hold charitable raffles at rodeo events.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the professional sports team charitable foundations of organizations sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association or the Women's Professional Rodeo Association to conduct charitable raffles at rodeo venues."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 99)

HJR 99 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to authorize a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county and to pledge for repayment of those bonds or notes increases in property tax revenues imposed on property in the area by the county. The Texas Constitution gives the legislature the power to authorize an incorporated city or town to issue such bonds or notes but does not expressly give the legislature the power to grant that same authority to counties. The proposed amendment also provides that a county that issues bonds or notes for transportation improvements may not pledge for the repayment of those bonds or notes more than 65 percent of the increases in ad valorem tax revenues each year, and a county may not use proceeds from the bonds or notes to finance the construction, operation, maintenance, or acquisition of rights-of-way of a toll road.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a county to finance the development or redevelopment of transportation or infrastructure in unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted areas in the county."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 27)

SJR 27 proposes a constitutional amendment barring the State of Texas or a political subdivision from enacting, adopting, or issuing a statute, order, proclamation, decision, or rule that prohibits or limits religious services. The proposed amendment would apply to religious services, including those conducted in churches, congregations, and places of worship, in the state by a religious organization established to support and serve the propagation of a sincerely held religious belief.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit this state or a political subdivision of this state from prohibiting or limiting religious services of religious organizations."

Proposition Number 4 (SJR 47)

SJR 47 proposes a constitu-

tional amendment changing

certain eligibility require-

ments for a justice of the Supreme Court, a judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, a justice of a court of appeals, and a district judge. The proposed amendment provides that a person is eligible to serve on the Supreme Court if the person, among other qualifications, is licensed to practice law in Texas; is a resident of Texas at the time of election; has been either a practicing lawyer licensed in Texas for at least ten years or a practicing lawyer licensed in Texas and a judge of a state court or county court established by the legislature for a combined total of at least ten years; and during that time has not had the person's license to practice law revoked, suspended, or subject to a probated suspension. The same eligibility requirements would apply to a judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals and to a justice of a court of appeals. The proposed amendment further provides that to be eligible for appointment or election as a district judge, a person must be a resident of Texas; be licensed to practice law in Texas; and have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court in Texas, or both combined, for eight years preceding the person's election, during which time the person's license to practice law has not been revoked, suspended, or subject to a probated suspension.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment changing the eligibility requirements for a justice of the supreme court, a judge of the court of criminal appeals, a justice of a court of appeals, and a district judge."

Proposition Number 5 (HJR 165)

HJR 165 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the State Commission on Judicial Conduct (SCJC) to accept complaints or reports, conduct investigations, and take any other authorized action with respect to a candidate for a state judicial office. Currently, the Texas Constitution only permits the SCJC to take such actions as to persons holding a judicial office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing additional powers to the **State Commission on Judi**cial Conduct with respect to candidates for judicial office."

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 19)

SJR 19 proposes a constitutional amendment establish-

ing that residents of certain facilities have the right to designate an essential caregiver with whom the facility may not prohibit in-person visitation. The proposed amendment would apply to a nursing facility, assisted living facility, intermediate care facility for individuals with an intellectual disability, residence providing home and community-based services, or state supported living center. The proposed amendment also would authorize the legislature to provide guidelines for these facilities to follow in establishing essential caregiver visitation policies and procedures.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing a right for residents of certain facilities to designate an essential caregiver for in-person visitation."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 125)

HJR 125 proposes a constitutional amendment permitting a person who is 55 years of age or older at the time of death of their spouse who is receiving a limitation on school district property taxes on their residence homestead on the basis of a disability to continue receiving the limitation while the property remains the surviving spouse's residence homestead.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the surviving spouse of a person who is disabled to receive a limitation on the school district ad valorem taxes on the spouse's residence homestead if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of the person's death."

Proposition Number 8 (SJR 35)

SJR 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty. The Texas Constitution provides a property tax exemption to the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services who is killed in action, but the current exemption does not include members of the military who die during their service due to injuries sustained that are

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty."

Gas prices fall on lower demand

Texas gas prices have fell 1.3 cents in the past week, averaging \$2.81 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Gas prices in Texas are 4.2 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 93.0 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to Gas-Buddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.29 while the most expensive is \$3.59 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 1.9 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.15 per gallon. The national average is down 2.8 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 97.7 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"Sagging U.S. gasoline demand along with continued recovery after Hurricane Ida have helped gas prices edge slightly lower in most states from where they were a week ago. But with Tropical Storm Nicholas threatening another key area of refineries in Houston with significant rain, we could see the decline in prices hit the pause button," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy.

De Haan continued, "While Nicholas would appear to be a minor storm, we could see a deluge of water - the same issue that caused some significant damage in Ida's wake to refineries in Louisiana. Combined with the earlier storm, Nicholas could make things more challenging. However, as gasoline demand has now fallen for four straight weeks, there is more breathing room even if some capacity does temporarily go offline. It's too early to tell, clearly, but motorists should be aware."




PCAL Post #206 donates signs to county school districts
