



## Filing for Texas Primary Elections is open

The filing period for the 2022 Texas Primary Elections officially opened last Saturday allowing candidates to file with their respective party chairs for a place on the March 1, 2022 primary ballot.

For primary elections, candidates file their applications with their state party chairs or, in the event that a district is wholly contained within a single county, their county party chairs. The state and county chairs, in turn, upload approved candidates into the Texas Secretary of State's portal.

To file for a county office, contact either Parmer County Republican Chairman Bill White at 806-265-7031, or contact Glen Maxey at 512-656-6337 to file as a Democrat since there is currently no Parmer County Democrat Chairman.

**The filing period for county, district, and state-wide offices ends at 6:00 p.m. on Monday, December 13th. Early voting for the March 1, 2022 Primary Elections begins on Monday, February 14th.**

District Judge Gordon Green's (D) resignation will take effect at the end of this year. A replacement will be appointed to fill the position until next year's November election. County Judge Trey Ellis has decided not to run for office again. He will serve as County Judge until his term ends at the end of next year. Justice of the Peace Pct. 1 has been vacant since the resignation of Jo Beth Gipson.

## Friona to receive \$62,790.83 sales tax allocation for November

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that he will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$1.07 billion in local sales tax allocations for November, 20.6 percent more than in November 2020. These allocations are based on sales made in September by businesses that report tax monthly, and on sales made in July, August and September by quarterly filers.

The City of Friona will

receive \$62,790.83 for the month of November. This represents a 35.26% increase over the \$46,418.91 received in November 2020. So

far in 2021, Friona has received \$547,649.03 in sales tax allocation. This amount represents a 12.93% increase over the \$484,935.24 received

in 2020 during the same time period. The Friona Economic Development Corporation will receive \$15,697.71 of the allocation for its operations.

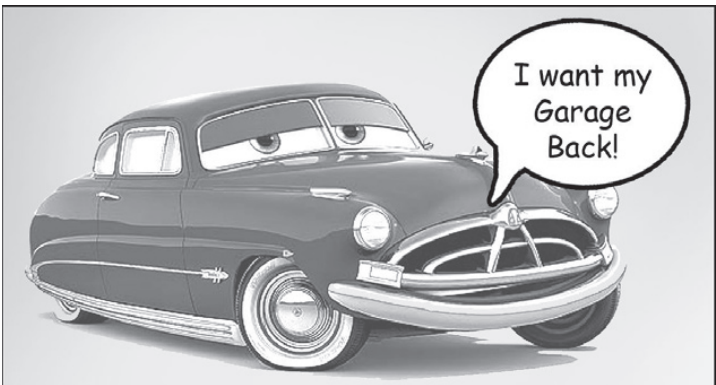

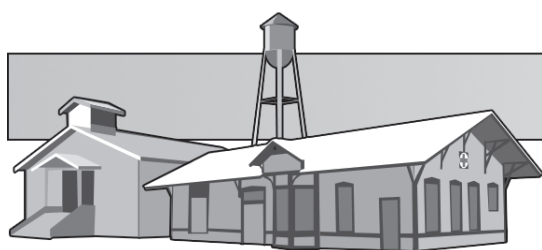

## Homemade Bread

National Homemade Bread Day is November 17. I found a couple of easy homemade bread recipes in case you want to try your hand at some fresh, just out of the oven bread. Sounds like a good way to warm up the kitchen on one of these coming cold days.

**EASY HOMEMADE BREAD RECIPE**

This is the recipe you should follow for making homemade bread in the oven:

**Ingredients**

- 2 cups warm water (110 degrees F/45 degrees C)
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1 1/2 tablespoons active dry yeast
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 cup vegetable oil
- 5-6 cups flour -You can use all-purpose flour OR bread flour!

**Directions**

In a large bowl, dissolve the sugar in warm water and then stir in yeast. Allow to proof until yeast

resembles a creamy foam, about 5 minutes. Mix salt and oil into the yeast. Mix in flour one cup at a time. Knead dough for 7 minutes. Place in a well-oiled bowl, and turn dough to coat. Cover with a damp cloth. Allow to rise until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Punch dough down. Knead for 1 minute and divide in half. Shape into loaves and place into two greased 9x5 inch loaf pans. Allow to rise for 30 minutes, or until dough has risen 1 inch above pans. Bake at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) for 30-40 minutes. Cool, brush with butter and enjoy!

**TIPS:**

The easiest and best way to avoid sunken bread is to use a cooking thermometer to check the inside of the loaf. Fully cooked bread will register 200°F on a thermometer.

If you use instant yeast, you can add it directly to your other dry ingredients when making bread. If you use active dry yeast, you'll need to first dissolve it in warm water before using it in a recipe. For the sake of ease, I just always buy instant yeast. BUT, this recipe works for both!

**Effortless Rustic Bread**

**Ingredients**

- 3 cups warm water
- 1 1/2 tablespoons active dry yeast
- 1 1/2 tablespoons coarse salt
- 6 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup cornmeal

**Directions**

Mix water, yeast, and salt together in a large bowl until mixture becomes foamy, about 10 minutes. Stir flour into yeast mixture until well incorporated. The dough will be loose and look wet. Cover bowl loosely with a damp towel and let sit for about 5 hours. Shape dough into 2 loaves using damp hands. Place loaves on a cornmeal-dusted

work surface and score the tops a few times with a sharp knife. Allow loaves to double in size, 30 to 60 minutes. Preheat oven to 425 degrees F (220 degrees C). Place loaves on a baking sheet. Bake in the preheated oven, spraying the surface of the dough occasionally with water, until golden brown, about 20 minutes.

## Gas prices fall slightly

Texas gas prices fell 2.2 cents last week, averaging \$3.03 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Gas prices in Texas are 8.4 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand \$1.23 per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.59 while the most expensive is \$3.89 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 2.6 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.40 per gallon. The national average is up 9.5 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands \$1.28 per gallon higher than a year ago.

"As of Sunday evening, the national average price of gasoline posted its first weekly decline in months. As the price of oil continues to struggle, Covid cases flare up and anxiety over demand starts rising, motorists are likely to see the declines continuing into this week," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy.

De Haan continued, "While it's not known how long market conditions will continue to push gas prices down, it appears that the fall should last through Thanksgiving, just in time for millions of Americans to prepare to hit the road for the holiday. However, the damage may already be done. According to GasBuddy's Thanksgiving Travel Survey, being released tomorrow, a significant portion of Americans say the high gas prices already led them to re-think their plans."

# State Capital Highlights

## Filing period for 2022 primary opens

The filing period for the 2022 Texas primary elections opened on Nov. 13, allowing candidates to file with their respec-

tive party chairs for spots on the March 1, 2022, primary ballot. For primary elections, candidates must file their applications with their state party chairs. If a district is

solely contained within a single county, a candidate would file with the county chair.

The filing period for county, district and statewide offices ends at 6 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 13. Early voting for the March 1 primary begins on Feb. 14. Among the statewide offices on the ballot are governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller, agriculture commissioner, land commissioner, railroad commissioner and seven states on the state board of education.

## Task force on concert safety formed

Gov. Greg Abbott last week announced the formation of a task force on concert safety after at least nine people were killed and hundreds injured at the Astroworld Festival in Houston on Nov. 5. Members include safety experts, law enforcement officials, firefighters and leaders from the Texas Music Office, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission and a half-dozen other state entities.

The task force is led by Brendon Anthony, director of the Texas Music Office.

“Live music is a source of joy, entertainment and community for so many Texans — and the last thing concertgoers should have to worry about is their safety and security,” Abbott said.

Lawsuits have been filed on behalf of more than 200 victims. Defendants include rapper Tra-

vis Scott and concert promotion giant Live Nation, according to a report in the Houston Chronicle. The deaths and injuries occurred when a crowd rushed the stage as Scott performed.

## Drought conditions spread in October

Blame it on La Niña. Drought conditions throughout much of the state continued to expand in October, thanks in large part to the weather conditions caused by the atmospheric phenomenon, which pushes warmer and drier conditions in the southern United States while causing cooler, wetter weather in Pacific Northwest.

Dr. Nelun Fernando of the Texas Water Development Board wrote recently that this winter is likely to be drier and warmer than average. The U.S. Drought Monitor released last week indicates 61.4% of the state is considered abnormally dry, while nearly 38% of the state is in moderate or severe drought.

Most of the drought areas are in East Texas, the Panhandle and Far West Texas.

## Alligator snapping turtle going on endangered list

The alligator snapping turtle, which is North America’s largest freshwater turtle species, is slated to be listed as an endangered species by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, pending public comment due by Jan. 10. The turtle, a popular target of poachers in Texas and other states, can weigh more than 200 pounds.

In recent months, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and other agencies and institutions teamed up to repatriate a couple dozen confiscated alligator snapping turtles to their native Texas rivers. While all states ban commercial harvest of

the turtle, recreational harvest is allowed on a limited basis in Louisiana and Mississippi.

The Texas comptroller’s office has contracted with the Environmental Institute at the University of Houston–Clear Lake to develop long-term monitoring procedures in an effort to develop more effective conservation measures.

## Vast majority of COVID-19 deaths among unvaccinated

A study by the Texas Department of State Health Services during the Delta variant outbreak of COVID-19 indicates unvaccinated Texans were 20 times more likely to die from the virus than those who had received one of the vaccines. From the report: All authorized COVID-19 vaccines in the United States are highly effective at protecting people from getting sick or severely ill with COVID-19, including those infected with Delta and other known variants. Real world data from Texas clearly shows these benefits.

Meanwhile, the total number of new cases of COVID-19 in Texas in the past week rose slightly to

23,350, as did new deaths at 846, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. Since the pandemic began, 4.28 million Texans have been diagnosed with the virus — 14.6% of the state’s entire population. COVID-19 has taken the lives of 72,760 Texans, roughly equivalent to the entire population of Harlingen.

The good news is that at least for now, the number of hospitalized, lab-confirmed COVID-19 patients continues to drop, with 2,736 reported by DSHS as of Sunday. That is down 75% from mid-August levels.

DSHS also reports the number of Texans who are fully vaccinated continues to inch upward, with 15.67 million reported, a number that now includes children ages 5-11 who are now eligible for the vaccine.

# In His Own Words

On November 19, 1863, Gettysburg National Cemetery was dedicated by a coterie of celebrated patriots which included the renowned orator, Edward Everett. He spoke two hours; President Lincoln’s speech was two minutes.

Nobody remembers Everett’s words, but Lincoln’s 275—the Gettysburg Address—remains memorable, significant, and relevant.

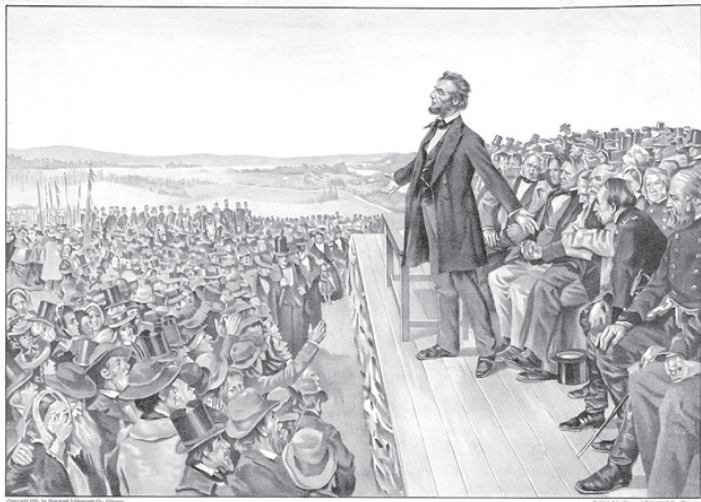
The president had traveled there by train a day earlier to unify his thoughts, which he scribbled on the back of an envelope. Shortly after he had dinner, Lincoln finished writing.

Henry Jacobs, a witness to the event, was so moved by Lincoln’s remarks as he stood in front of the speaker’s stand, that he felt compelled to record his thoughts:

“At first his voice sounded a little strained and high-pitched, as if he were trying to throw his voice to the outer edge of the crowd. He held in his right hand the manuscript he had brought from the White House... He emphasized the words ‘of,’ ‘by,’ and ‘for’ (the people) with a stiff yet sweeping bend of his body, holding the manuscript rigidly in both hands.... Then he drew himself up to his immense height, with his arms outstretched, as he impressively uttered the final words, ‘shall not-perish-from-the-earth.’”

### Our Vision Can Improve with Age

Some Bible stories unsettled me when I was little, confused me as a middle-schooler, and—as an adult reader—brought yet another perspective.

When baby Moses was placed in a basket, I was sad. I was also five years old. All I could think was that his mother was giving him away.

As a skeptical sixth grader who had just studied Egypt, I thought, “There are crocodiles in the Nile. Wasn’t there a safer place for Baby Mo?”

Once I became a mother, the sacrifice Jochebed made for her child made perfect sense.

\*\*\*\*\*

The Walking Man from Galilee challenged the scholars to look at the Law with different eyes. Two thousand years later, Jesus would still be shaking his head at us because we misapply the point of many Bible stories.

Recently, I re-read one that gets only nine verses devoted to it in Genesis. Before and after those lengthy family tree spreadsheets (so and so begat so and so and so on and so forth), the incident at Shinar appears. Wednesday night or Sunday morning Bible school classes.

I was there. Even took four semesters of Bible history at the Christian university from which I graduated. In each of those settings, the Tower of Babel construction project (Genesis 11) fascinated me.

Who could blame people for wanting to build a tall tower after The Flood? A child’s point of view would see this as perfectly logical, safe, and smart. Perhaps Noah’s descendants were still a bit leery of low-lying places. My middle-school brain thought that people working together on a big project was a good thing—unity

and teamwork were noble concepts.

It would be in college when I saw with clearer vision the tragedy of Babel. The professor highlighted God’s tone in verse 6, and everything clicked.

...You are one people, with one language, and *this is what you choose to do with your unity? Really?*

At this place in Babylonia, the people were motivated not by unity but by vain ambition. The main lesson taught to me as a child was that they were wrong to try and build something to heaven. What I finally understood from that Old Testament story was

that a selfish pursuit, in any form, is a house of cards waiting to fall.

*“Let us build us a city and a tower, whose top may reach unto heaven; and let us make us a name...”*

Let us make us a name. For ourselves. For our glory.

In response, Jehovah made sure tongues were confused and garbled. No longer able to communicate, people scattered, and the project ended. In this origin story of how the world came to have various languages, God thwarted misplaced pride.

The same story heard with three different mindsets, seen through three separate lenses.

Whether you are nine or ninety, do not fear the questioning voice when it speaks to you. It’s o.k. to be skeptical or doubt—those are signs of faith growth spurts. If nothing else, re-reading and analyzing something at a different age empowers you to strengthen your foundation.

Bible Bowl Trivia: The word *nimrod* refers to a person making dumb choices. Nimrod was Noah’s great-grandson who was the king in Shinar during the commissioning of the Tower of Babel.

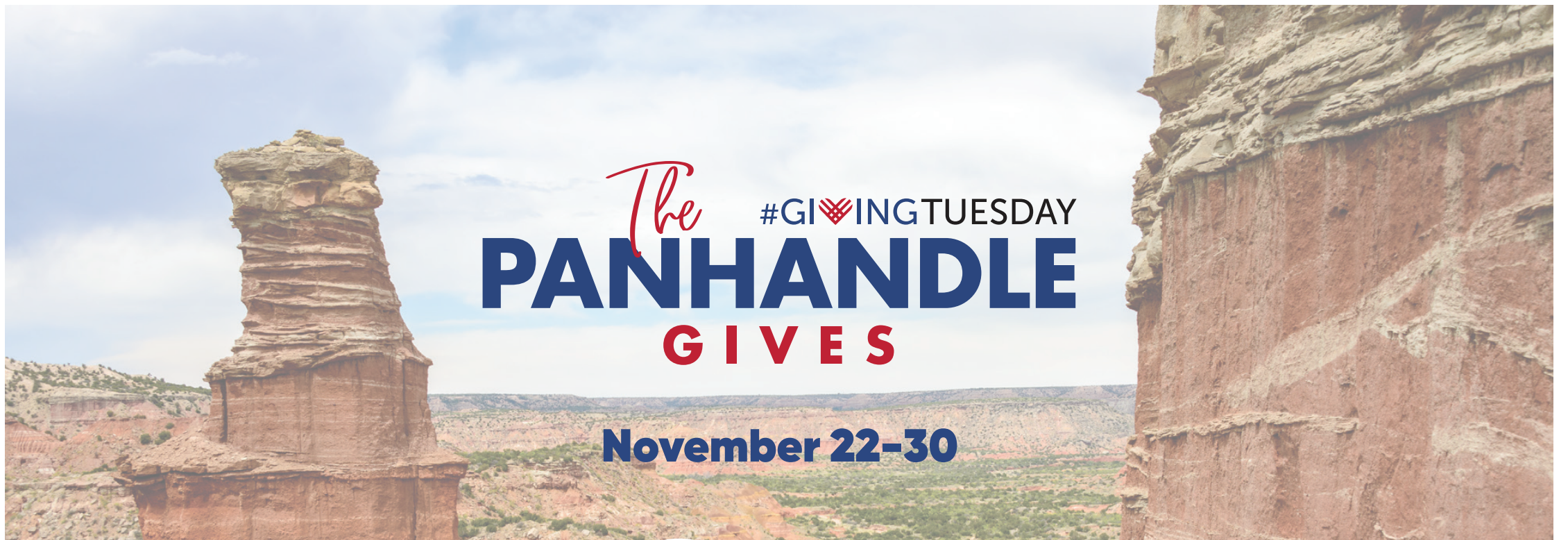
