



Comptroller announces \$2.9 billion transfer

On Tuesday, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced that he recently completed the transfer of more than \$2.91 billion into the State Highway Fund (SHF) and the Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF; commonly known as the "Rainy Day Fund"). Each fund received nearly \$1.46 billion, or 50 percent of the total transfer.

"The Rainy Day Fund and the State Highway Fund are key components of Texas' long-term economic success and help provide the foundation needed for our future growth," Hegar said.

Hegar continued, "Texas is expe-

riencing a strong economic recovery, and our population continues to boom as more and more people and businesses seek out the jobs and opportunities created here in Texas. It is critical that we continue to invest in the infrastructure needed to maintain our fiscal health and keep our economy growing while at the same time acknowledging the uncertainty that remains and setting aside dollars to ensure we are able to weather future downturns."

The transfer amounts are based on crude oil and natural gas production tax revenues in excess of 1987 collections. If either tax generates more revenue than the 1987 threshold, an amount equal to 75 percent of the excess is transferred.

In November 2014, voters approved a constitutional amendment allocating at least half of these severance taxes to the ESF, with the remainder going to the SHF for use on non-toll highway construction, maintenance and right-of-way acquisition.

According to the Texas Constitution, the ESF transfer must occur within 90 days after the end of the fiscal year. When fiscal 2021 ended on Aug. 31, the ESF balance was \$10.3 billion.

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Local teens injured in accident

A preliminary Department of Public Safety (DPS) investigation indicates that on November 10th, at approximately 11:15 a.m., a 15-year-old juvenile male, of Friona, was driving a Dodge Pickup truck north on County Road 19 (a dirt road*). The driver of the pickup was traveling at an unsafe speed for the condition of the dirt road and lost control of the vehicle. The pickup truck entered the west shoulder and rolled over multiple times. Two of the juvenile male passengers were ejected from the bed of the pickup truck.

*[At the time of the crash the condition of the dirt on the road was loose/powdery making it more difficult to drive on.]

The 15-year-old male juvenile driver along with a 15-year-old juvenile female passenger and a 15-year-old juvenile male passenger were transported to Parmer Counter Medical Center in Friona with minor injuries.

The two 14-year-old male juvenile passengers ejected from the bed of the pickup truck were transported to hospitals by air. One was airlifted by AeroCare to UMC in Lubbock with serious injuries. The other one was airlifted by Apollo to Amarillo Northwest Texas Hospital with serious injuries.

All occupants of the vehicle are from Friona. The DPS does not release names of juveniles. The crash is still under investigation.



Can you hear me now? — for some time the State of Texas has had a financial agreement with local communications companies to provide service for rural areas of the state. The costs of providing that service is reimbursed from a state-administered fund that collects fees from phone customers across the state. Because of changes in consumer habits, that fund has been steadily depleted and no action to replenish it has been taken by either the Governor of Texas or the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) which oversees it. 





Pears

December is National Pear month. They can be used much like an apple. I found a couple of recipes to use up those pears you just bought: one sweet and one savory.

Pork Chops with Pear Chutney

Chutney:

- 1 shallot, diced
- 3 tablespoons cider vinegar
- 2 tablespoons light brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon unsalted butter
- 1 1-inch piece peeled fresh ginger, cut into coins
- 1 teaspoon Madras curry powder
- 1 cinnamon stick
- Kosher salt

Pinch crushed red pepper

- 3 pears, peeled, cored, and cut in large dice
- 2 tablespoons dried cranberries
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro

Chops:

8 thin bone-in pork chops, each about 4 ounces Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper 2 tablespoons vegetable oil

Directions

For chutney: In medium microwave-safe bowl, stir together shallot, vinegar, brown sugar, butter, ginger, curry powder, cinnamon stick, 1/4 teaspoon salt, and red pepper. Cover and seal with plastic wrap and heat in microwave oven on HIGH for 1 minute. Carefully remove plastic wrap and stir in pears and cranberries. Re-cover and microwave for 10 minutes more. Carefully poke holes in plastic wrap to release steam and set aside.

For pork chops: Heat a large skillet over mediumhigh heat. Pat pork chops dry and season with salt and pepper to taste. Add 1 tablespoon oil to pan and heat until shimmering. Lay 4 chops in pan and sear until golden on one side, about 3 minutes. Turn and cook 1 more minute. Remove from pan; set aside and keep warm. Repeat with remaining oil and chops. Add chutney to pan and, scrape up any brown bits from bottom using a wooden spoon. Simmer until slightly thickened. Stir in cilantro. Serve chops with chutney.


For the Crumb Topping:

Steps to Make It

Gather the ingredients. Pre-heat oven to 375oF. Mix sliced pears with lemon juice, sugar, ginger, and flour. Place mixture in pastry-lined pie plate. For the topping, cream together the butter and brown sugar; stir in flour. Spread topping over pears in the pie shell. Bake pie at 375 F for 45 minutes, or until pears are tender and topping is nicely browned. Serve warm or cold, with whipped cream or vanilla ice cream.

Gas prices fall again


Texas gas prices fell 6.0 cents during the past week, averaging \$2.94 per gallon according to Gas-Buddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Gas prices in Texas are 12.0 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand \$1.14 per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$2.45 while the most expensive is \$3.99 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 3.4 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.37 per gallon. The national average is down 1.4 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands \$1.26 per gallon higher than a year ago.

"Gas price declines are slowly picking up momentum. With oil's recent fall and the jury out on a new Covid variant, Omicron, we could be in store for lower prices based on many countries turning back to travel restrictions, limiting oil demand and potentially accelerating the drop in gas prices," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy.

De Haan continued, "There remains a very high level of uncertainty ahead of us as OPEC has also delayed its meetings to await more market movements and information on Omicron. But so far, Americans can expect the new variant to push gas prices even lower. Beyond the next few weeks, it remains nearly impossible to predict where oil and gas prices will head, though turbulence is guaranteed."

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

Dear Parmer County Friends,

THANKS to YOU, Parmer Paws Animal Outreach Center exceeded its fundraising goal for The Panhandle Gives/ Giving Tuesday! While the exact number is still being calculated, we know we topped more than our goal of \$10,000 in individual donations! As an added bonus, a local business matched your \$10,000! Yes there are a lot of exclamation points in those few statements, but we are so excited! Be assured that every dollar you donate goes straight to the daily care of the almost 350 animals we rescue annually in Parmer County.

At present in our shelter, we have three dogs

from Bovina, three from Farwell, one from Friona, two that were abandoned in the country, and thirteen assorted cats, so you see we work hard to help every part of the entire county. Each animal we take in cost us at least \$100 in vaccines and parasite eradication/ prevention. Animals in need of emergency vet care or surgery cost over \$1000. This year we have had to cover two amputations, a hip surgery, and five cases of parvovirus. There is also the cost of daily care.

We are fortunate that Merrick Pet Care provides all our dog food, and a local Friona business pays our water bill, because without these folks it would be impossible to operate. We pay electric, gas, internet, and gasoline for transports. There are always additional expenses such as cat litter, reward training treats, cleaning products, toys, and many other unexpected needs that pop up. Recently we installed shelves in the cat rooms so when it is too cold on the catios, our furry friends can climb and lounge inside. Most of the time, our volunteers donate these extras in addition to their presence.

Our volunteers are amazing! Every day someone must go to the shelter--- and sometimes the pounds--- to feed,

scoop poop, medicate, and provide play time for our animals. Every day. Holidays included. When the wind is blowing sixty miles an hour or there is a foot of snow on the ground. When we are not at the shelter we are taking critters to the vet, doing paperwork, networking with other rescues, and a million other things that pop up. And that is all in addition to our regular jobs and busy families. The stress of worrying about how we are going to continue providing care for these abandoned animals becomes overwhelming.

Samsung taps Taylor for new plant

Electronic giant Samsung announced last week that it will build a new semiconductor manufacturing facility in the Central Texas town of Taylor, about 40 miles northeast of Austin. The \$17 billion investment will be the largest foreign direct investment in Texas to date and brings the company's total investment in the state to \$35 billion.

Samsung already operates a facility in Austin, its lone U.S. manufacturing plant. The deal was helped along with a \$27 million Texas Enterprise Fund grant, according to Gov. Greg Abbott's office. In addition, city, county and school district officials put together incentive packages worth of hundreds of millions of dollars, according to the Austin American-Statesman.

The project will create more than 2,000 high-tech jobs, thousands of indirect jobs and at least 6,500 construction jobs. Construction is slated to begin early next year with a target completion date in the second half of 2024.

"Samsung Austin Semiconductor has been proud to call Texas home for more than 25 years," said Dr. Sang Sup Jeong, president of Samsung Austin Semiconductor. "We are excited about our growth and future opportunities in Central Texas and appreciate the support from all Central Texas leaders."

Winter Storm Uri's impact on pine trees studied

The damage caused by Winter Storm Uri to the state's trees is still being assessed. While many hardwoods whose crowns turned brown after several days of bitter cold have recovered, pine trees in East Texas are now suffering from an invasion of beetles. The beetles attack both stressed and healthy pine trees, but can only successfully invade severely stressed pine trees, such as those recovering from Uri.

"Looking back at the past nine months, the fact that these beetles are now taking center stage in the decline and death of our pine trees is inevitable," said Allen Smith of the forest service. "Uri was a major stressor of trees, and the following extended droughty conditions throughout the pine regions of East Texas added additional stress."

Standing beetle-killed trees should be removed and burned or otherwise disposed of to stop the emergence of beetles. Smith said the best-case scenario for pine trees is for a wet winter in East Texas so that trees have ample soil moisture when they start growing again in the spring.

State to get \$408 million for charging stations

Texas is slated to receive \$408 million for electric car charging stations under the recently passed federal infrastructure plan and could apply for additional grants, according to The Dallas Morning News. The money comes under a Biden administration plan to shift half of passenger vehicle sales in the U.S. to electric vehicles by 2030.

The state needs more than 14,000 charging stations to support the number of electric vehicles projected to be traveling on Texas roadways by 2030, according to a 2018 report from Environment Texas. The state had just over 52,000 registered electric vehicles as of last June, according to the Morning News story.

COVID-19 cases drop, as do deaths

While new cases of COVID-19 are spiking again in the Upper Midwest and Northeast, the number in Texas dropped during the past week to 14,745 — down 36% from the previous week. The number of new deaths reported in Texas by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University in the past week totaled 254, down 57% from the previous week.

However, the number of hospitalizations of lab-confirmed COVID-19 patients in the state was virtually unchanged at 2,681, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

The number of Texas who are fully vaccinated continues to inch upward, with 15.838 million reported by DSHS as of Sunday. That is 54.3% of the state's total population.

Still, while noting hospitalizations are at their lowest levels in many months, officials are still cautious. "We're certainly in a better place right now than we have been in quite a while," Chris Van Deusen, spokesperson for the Texas Department of State Health Services, told the Texas Tribune. "But we are sort of starting to see things change again. And you know, if there's one thing we know about this pandemic, it's that it's going to keep changing."

Meanwhile, another variant of COVID-19 named "Omicron" has been discovered in South Africa and several other countries. Experts are concerned that the new variant may spread more aggressively than previous versions and could prove to be resistant to current vaccines.

Experts urge Texans to get flu shots

A resurgence of influenza this winter is overdue, and Texans are urged to get vaccinated.

"Flu is overdue right now," Dr. Donald Murphey, an Austin pediatric infectious disease specialist and chair of the Texas Medical Association Council on Science and Public Health, told the Texas Newsroom.

"We should be concerned about flu returning. Flu is here every year consistently and last year, with mitigation for COVID, we didn't have a flu season at all," he said.

Murphey added that this year's flu season could be even worse as the decline in COVID-19 cases leads to an increase in public gatherings with fewer people wearing masks. The Texas Medical Association encourages flu shots for everyone 6 months of age and older. TMA says Texans can safely get vaccinated for the flu and COVID-19 at the same time.

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

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


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Xcel Energy readies systems for cold weather ahead

Xcel Energy is prepared for cold weather and is reminding customers they can also take steps to maintain a high level of comfort while saving on monthly bills. "Winter weather on the plains of Texas and New Mexico can present a host of challenges from extreme cold to high winds to ice and snow, and sometimes all of this at once," said David Hudson, president, Xcel Energy - New Mexico, Texas. "We've spent a decade investing in system improvements that will stand up against extreme weather, and these investments proved their worth during last winter's strongest storms. We're ready for whatever winter brings and we want to provide everything customers need to stay comfortable and manage their energy costs."

Xcel Energy has invested more than \$3 billion in transmission line improvements since 2011 that have strengthened the grid and provided more options for moving power from neighboring states served by the Southwest Power Pool. Additionally, area power plants and wind farms were designed for cold weather and are continually being improved to withstand extreme temperatures. Winterization preparation reviews are conducted annually each fall at Xcel Energy's Texas-New Mexico power plants, and new wind farms such as Sagamore in New Mexico and Hale in Texas were built with "cold weather packages" that allow the turbines to run in subzero temperatures.

Xcel Energy owns and operates almost 8,000 miles of high-voltage transmission lines and more than 16,000 miles of lower voltage distribution lines across the area. The company has invested millions in recent years in pole replacement and conductor wire upgrades that have hardened the grid against high winds and ice. And ongoing efforts to upgrade voltages in neighborhoods older to a company standard provide more options for Xcel Energy to reroute power for faster restoration in the event of weather related outages.

Customers can ensure their homes and business are prepared for extreme temperatures by having their heating equipment checked ahead of winter and taking steps to make interior spaces more airtight by adding weather stripping around doors and windows. Customers can take advantage of Xcel Energy's Home Energy Services pro-

gram to have approved contractors inspect their property for drafts and make the necessary adjustments free of charge. Information on this program can be found online at xcelenergyefficiency.com.

Winter heating accounts for about half a typical customer's monthly energy costs, so it's possible to realize big savings in the winter if customers keep warm air from escaping to the outside and ensuring heating units don't have to run as often.

Another important way to save on heating costs is to adjust the thermostat 7 to 10 degrees Fahrenheit from normal settings for eight hours a day. These adjustments are made easier by installing either a programmable or smart thermostat, both of which allow the customer to schedule thermostat adjustments. A smart thermostat offers the added benefit of allowing adjustments to be made remotely via a mobile app or the internet using a smart phone, tablet, or computer. Customers can be notified of outages in their area and gain valuable information on restoration times if their home or business is affected.

National Handwashing Awareness Week

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension offers handwashing tips

National Handwashing Awareness Week begins December 5-11th, in observance of the importance of proper hand hygiene technique. Handwashing is a fundamental way to prevent getting sick and reduce the spread of germs and viruses, such as respiratory, diarrheal, foodborne and travel related illnesses.

So how does handwashing prevent the spread? Some viruses have a protective fatty coating that surround it, such as Covid-19. By using soap and lathering for 20 seconds, germs and chemicals are physically removed. According to the Centers for Diseases Control (CDC), "soap lather forms pockets that trap germs, dirt, and chemicals and removes them" while rinsing. Soap and water offer the best deterrence but when this is not available, use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.

The most common respiratory infections (flu, colds, pneumonia, bronchiolitis, coronavirus, etc.) are caused by viral pathogens and can be reduced by 16%, when practicing handwashing. Similarly, foodborne illnesses (Salmonella, Listeria, Norovirus, etc.) can be transmitted through handling raw meats, like chicken, and then preparing other foods without having properly washed hands. Other ways germs can spread is by touching your mask; touching contaminated surfaces that are frequented by others such as doorknobs, tables, gas pumps, shopping carts; touching your eyes, mouth, and nose; and coughing, sneezing, and blowing your nose then touching people's hands and/or objects.

What can we do during Handwashing Awareness Week and after? According to Extension Program Specialist Julie Tijerina, "By remembering key times to handwash, we can reduce getting sick or spreading the germs." Some of these key times, according to the CDC, include:

- Before, during and after preparing food
- Before and after eating food
- Before and after caring for someone who is sick with vomiting and diarrhea
- Before and after treating a cut or wound
- After using the toilet
- After changing diapers or cleaning a person after they have used the bathroom
- After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing
- After touching garbage
- Tijerina offers CDC's 5-Steps to correct handwashing:
- 1. With clean running water, wet hands and apply soap
- 2. By rubbing hands together, create a lather focusing under nails and between fingers
- 3. Scrub for 20 seconds
- 4. Rinse with clean running water
- 5. Using a clean towel, dry hands

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
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
