Geske sworn in as **Parmer County Sheriff**

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday January 10, 2022 at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and Texas Flag.

Minutes from the December 21st meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Payroll Report was also approved.

The regular meeting schedule for 2022 was approved. The Court will meet on the 2nd and 4th Monday of each month. The Court will meet every Monday during the months of August and September to work on the next year's budget. The 2022 Holiday schedule was also approved.

Precinct 1 Commissioner Kirk Frye was elected to serve as the County Judge Pro Tem. He will conduct meetings when the County Judge is not able to attend.

The 2022 Salary Grievance Committee was selected from the Grand Jury pool. Also, electrical work and the installation of a hot water heater at the J.P. #2 office in Bovina was approved.

Commissioners also met in Executive Session to review applications for County Sheriff. After returning to regular session, Commissioners voted unanimously for Chief Deputy Eric Geske to serve as the new Parmer County Sheriff until the General Election in November. Geske was sworn in by County Judge Trey Ellis. The position became open when former Sheriff Randy Geries retired in order to run for County Judge.

All meetings are open to the public. The Commissioner's Court reserves the right to go into Executive Session at any time. The agenda may be found on the Parmer County website. City approves 50-year water study

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday, January 10, 2022 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 619 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

There were no public comments. The Minutes of the December 13, 2021 regular meeting were approved.

The accounts payable for December 2021 and the financial statement for December 2021 were approved. The first quarter (Oct-Dec 2021) financial statement was also approved. The City made its last bond payment of \$243,960 and is now debt free.

Brandt Engineer Group, Ltd. of Amarillo was approved to develop a 50-year comprehensive

water study for the City of Friona. The study is contracted to cost no more than \$119,000 to produce. The finished product will be comprised of a complete inventory of all assets including capabilities, deficiencies, projections of population and industry expansion along with model that will be able to run various scenarios in order to solve short-range and longrange issues.

The Council approved the submission of solid waste grant applications to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) pertaining to the City of Friona Baler Project and the Forklift Project. Plans are for the City to able to recycle cardboard.

OJD Engineering Inc. of Amarillo was selected to provide engineering/architectural services for the 2021 Friona Community Park Redevelopment Project.

In other business, bids will be solicited for an agricultural lease and plans are underway for a possible day care center to be located at the Redeemer Center. The Council also authorized a Task Force to develop plans for the use of the property recently purchased from 4-Way Pump.

*** State Election News — The Land Commissioner race is the only statewide seat that is an open race, since incumbent George P. Bush is running for Attorney General. While Republicans have held all statewide seats for more than two decades, Democrat challengers have filed in every statewide race. Texas Senate: All 31 Senate seats are on the ballot due to the redrawing of district lines. Five of the 31 seats are open, with no incumbent on the ballot. Texas House: In the 150-member House, a

Applications will be reviewed by February 18th and grants will be awarded on March 15, 2022. ***

Upcoming feature story — According to studies by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, milk production in Texas increased 190% from 2001 to 2020 (from 5.1 billion to 14.8 billion pounds), the largest increase

in milk production in the U.S. Consequently, Texas went from being No. 10 to No. 5 in milk production. Now, the imminent expansion of milk processing capacity in the Panhandle may position Texas as the No. 3 dairy state in the country within the next five years.



Curried Chicken

National Curried Chicken Day is January 12, 2022. It just so happens that Jarrett found and made this Butter Chicken recipe this last weekend. It was delicious and made the house smell amazing. Hopefully, you will enjoy the recipe as well. We ate ours with tortillas, but you can use rice or the Naan bread recipe I have also included.

Butter Chicken (murgh makhani)

INGREDIENTS

For the chicken marinade:

28 oz (800g) boneless and skinless chicken thighs or breasts cut into bite-sized pieces

1/2 cup plain yogurt

1 1/2 tablespoons minced garlic

1 tablespoon minced ginger (or finely grated)

2 teaspoons garam masala

1 teaspoon turmeric

1 teaspoon ground cumin

1 teaspoon red chili powder

1 teaspoon of salt

For the sauce:

2 tablespoons olive oil

2 tablespoons ghee (or 1 tbs butter + 1 tbs oil)

1 large onion, sliced or chopped 1 1/2 tablespoons garlic, minced

1 tablespoon ginger, minced or finely grated

1 1/2 teaspoons ground cumin

1 1/2 teaspoons garam masala

1 teaspoon ground coriander

14 oz (400 g) crushed tomatoes

1 teaspoon red chili powder (adjust to your taste preference)

1 1/4 teaspoons salt (or to taste)

1 cup of heavy or thickened cream (or evaporated milk to save calories) 1 tablespoon sugar

1/2 teaspoon kasoori methi (or dried fenugreek leaves)

INSTRUCTIONS

In a bowl, combine chicken with all of the ingredients for the chicken marinade; let marinate for

30 minutes to an hour (or overnight if time allows). Heat oil in a large skillet or pot over medium-high heat. When sizzling, add chicken pieces in batches of two or three, making sure not to crowd the pan. Fry until browned for only 3 minutes on each side. Set aside and keep warm. (You will finish cooking the chicken in the sauce.) Heat butter or ghee in the same pan. Fry the onions until they start to sweat (about 6 minutes) while scraping up any browned bits stuck on the bottom of the pan. Add garlic and ginger and sauté for 1 minute until fragrant, then add ground coriander, cumin and garam masala. Let cook for about 20 seconds until fragrant, while stirring occasionally. Add crushed tomatoes, chili powder and salt. Let simmer for about 10-15 minutes, stirring occasionally until sauce thickens and becomes a deep brown red color. Remove from heat, scoop mixture into a blender and blend until smooth. You may need to add a couple tablespoons of water to help it blend (up to 1/4 cup). Work in batches depending on the size of your blender. Pour the puréed sauce back into the pan. Stir the cream, sugar and crushed kasoori methi (or fenugreek leaves) through the sauce. Add the chicken with juices back into the pan and cook for an additional 8-10 minutes until chicken is cooked through and the sauce is thick and bubbling. Garnish with chopped cilantro and serve with fresh, hot garlic butter rice and fresh homemade Naan bread!

OPTIONAL: To thin out the sauce, add a couple tablespoons of ghee or butter at the end of cooking, and gently simmer it through. Alternatively, add a small amount of water.

Naan Bread

Ingredients

NAAN BREAD

1/4 cup warm water

2 teaspoons granulated sugar

1 1/2 teaspoons active dry yeast, or instant (rapid rise) 3/4 cup warm milk

3/4 cup plain Greek yogurt, or natural plain yogurt

1/4 cup vegetable oil, plus 2 tablespoons extra for cooking

4 cups plain flour plus extra for dusting -- (19 1/2 oz. or 560g)

1 teaspoon baking powder

1 teaspoon salt

GARLIC BUTTER TOPPING

1/4 cup butter, melted (optional)

2 cloves garlic, minced 1 teaspoon fresh chopped cilantro or parsley

Instructions FOR NAAN BREAD

Combine together the water, sugar and yeast. Let sit for 5-10 minutes or until the mixture begins to bubble on top. Add in the milk, yogurt, oil, flour baking powder and salt. Mix until the dough comes together

with your hands. Turn dough out onto lightly floured surface. Use floured hands to knead the dough until smooth, about 3 to 5 minutes. Lightly grease the same mixing bowl with a small spray of cooking oil. Transfer dough to the bowl and cover with plastic wrap. Let rest at room temperature for about an hour until doubled in size. When ready to cook, divide the dough into 10 equal pieces. Roll into balls, then use a rolling pin to roll each piece of dough into a large oval, about 6-inches long and 1/8-inch thick. Repeat with remaining dough. Heat a large cast iron skillet over mediumhigh heat. Grease skillet all over with 1/2 teaspoon of the extra oil. Place one piece of the naan on the oiled hot skillet and cook until bubbles form on top, about 1-2 minutes. While cooking, brush the top with a little oil. Flip and cook for another 1-2 minutes, until large golden spots appear on the bottom. Remove from the skillet and wrap in a clean kitchen towel. Repeat with the remaining naan (keep them wrapped in a towel while you work).

FOR OPTIONAL GARLIC BUTTER TOPPING

Combine melted butter and minced garlic together in a bowl. Brush each naan with the garlic butter and top with the fresh herb of your choosing.

Gas prices edge downward

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 1.7 cents last week, averaging \$2.86 per gallon, according to Gas-Buddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 0.9 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 86.5 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.45 while the most expensive was \$3.99 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 2.3 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.29 per gallon. The national average is down 5.5 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 97.5 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"Oil prices have remained stubbornly strong, touching nearly \$80 per barrel last week, pushing gasoline prices higher even as U.S. gasoline demand starts to struggle. Some of this is typical seasonal weakness, but the lack of demand is likely enhanced by omicron cases surging and Americans who are just a bit more hesitant to get out right now," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy.

De Haan added, "In addition, unrest in Kazakhstan, the 18th largest oil producer, is likely leading to impacts on oil production, while continued unrest in Libya also worries markets and overpowers the seasonal drop in gasoline demand. Without improvement or stability in oil producing countries, we're likely to continue to see upward pressure on oil prices."

Not just your favorite verses, but read the stories of people like you who either trusted God or didn't and see how it worked for them. Meditate on His Word. Listen to God speak to you through the inspired authors of this great work. A good rule of thumb on how much to read is to read as often as you eat food.

Simple right, you do eat, so read too!

Now add to this regiment of reading, praying. Pray often and for others. Let God know what is on your heart, not forgetting what is on His. Write them down if it helps focus on each word, don't be casual be specific. Spiritual exercise like this does require consultation with the Physician. Some times this stuff will make you sweat; (drops of blood) just ask Him. When we read and pray we open up a conversation with God and this is the beginning of a great relationship. I have said it before and you will hear it again, but that choice is still yours.

Realistic Expectations

Realistic expectations make all the difference in your outlook and attitude, and a huge key to having realistic expectations is having expectations grounded in reality and truth. The first place to look for such grounded expectations is God's Word, which lays out the truth about so much in your life from how you got here, why you are here, what is wrong with you, what is wrong with the world, and what is the solution. The more you are grounded on the truth of God, the stronger and steadier you will be in our crazy world.

One key area to have right expectation is when you go through trials and difficulties. In James 1:12, God tells you his expectation for you in trials by saying, "Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those

who love him." Notice the word steadfast, because that is God's aim for you in trials, and should be yours also. Steadfastness is being fixed in direction, firm in one's resolution and purpose, and unwavering in your convictions. Being steadfast through trials means that you will cling to the Lord, no matter the challenge, difficulty or outcome, because He is your Rock and Refuge and your trust is in Him, not in an outcome or circumstances. Our tendency in trials is to be steadfast in hoping things turn out like we want, but in reality they may not, or our tendency could be to drift to despair instead of cling to Christ. Both of these tendencies fail, but if your sights are set on 'remaining steadfast under trial' that is a goal that will carry you as you cling to the Lord, standing on His promises, being carried by the Holy Spirit and glorifying God along the journey.

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

Emergency SNAP benefits again extended

The Texas Health and Human Services Commission is again extending emergency food benefits this month, with more than \$307 million in emergency allocations expected to help more than 1.5 million Texas households.

"As Texans ring in the new year, this additional support will help families start 2022 with food on the table for themselves and their children," said Wayne Salter, HHSC deputy executive commissioner.

The agency received approval from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to extend the maximum allowable amount of benefits provided through the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program. That means recipients will receive at least \$95 in emergency SNAP allotments by Jan. 31, in addition to their regular allotment.

Texans in need can apply for benefits at YourTexasBenefits.com.

Former Houston NFL player pleads guilty to fraud

A former linebacker for the Houston Texans has pleaded guilty to taking part in a scheme to defraud a player health care reimbursement fund by submitting false claims totaling more than \$129,000.

Shantee Orr is one of eight former NFL players accused in a case led by Texas Department of Insurance investigators working with prosecutors from the Harris County District Attorney's office.

"Those claims were for rehab therapies and medical treatments that were never actually provided," TDI prosecutor Rick Watson said. "The players and the trainer would each get a cut of the money that was reimbursed by the fund."

Orr pleaded guilty to a third-degree felony, paid restitution and will serve five years' probation.

Insurance companies line up to sue ERCOT

As the one-year anniversary of the winter storm that left millions without power approaches, more than 100 insurance companies are suing the state's main power grid operator and a number of electricity providers, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

Defendants are the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, as well as companies that supply power through ERCOT. The power failure caused more than \$10 billion in property damage, primarily to residences.

The suit claims ERCOT "failed to adequately prepare for the 2020-2021 winter season, and in fact, planned to fail," noting that the agency had projected the

state would end up in the highest state of emergency in the event of an extreme weather event, the Statesman reported.

ERCOT controls nearly all the state's power grid.

Abbott sues feds over vaccine mandate for Guard

Gov. Greg Abbott last week announced he will sue the federal government to fight a COVID-19 vaccine requirement for members of the Texas National Guard.

In a letter released last week, Abbott prohibited the Texas National Guard from punishing any service member who does not receive the vaccine.

"Unless President Biden federalizes the Texas National Guard in accordance with Title 10 of the U.S. Code, he is not your commander-in-chief under our federal or state Constitutions," Abbott wrote. "And as long as I am your commander-in-chief, I will not tolerate efforts to compel receipt of a COVID19 vaccine."

The Biden administration maintains the secretary of defense has the legal power to require vaccines. In a mid-November press conference, Pentagon press secretary John F. Kirby said, in part, "When (guardsmen are) called up for their monthly training, they're still federally funded. So (the secretary) has those authorities. And he believes, and this is a larger point, that vaccinated forces are a more ready force."

COVID-19 cases more than triple in past week

The omicron variant of COVID-19 has sent cases skyrocketing throughout the state, with a record-high 413,994 new cases reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University in the past week — nearly four times the number reported the previous week.

A total of 717 new deaths were reported, up 70% from the previous week.

The Texas Department of State Health Services reported 9,803 lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations as of Sunday, an increase of 77% from the previous week. Just a month ago, hospitalizations had dropped below 3,000, according to DSHS. The number of new cases this past week is more than ten times the total reported a month ago.

Second round of vaccine funding begins

A second round of funding for the state's COVID-19 vaccine outreach program has begun. Organizations can apply for grants ranging from \$50,000 to \$1 million "to engage in vaccine education and outreach with the goal of increasing

the number of fully vaccinated Texans against COVID-19."

Money will be awarded for projects that increase access to COVID-19 vaccines or provide outreach to populations disproportionately affected by the virus.

"As with the first round of funding, DSHS is confident that community-based organizations are perfectly positioned to offer local support for those who seek access for and information about COVID-19 vaccine services," said Imelda Garcia, DSHS associate commis-

sioner for laboratory and infectious disease services.




In Debt




Chavira named to All-Press Pass Football Team

New agreement allows U.S. Pork, Products into India for First Time

On Monday, United States Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack and Trade Representative Katherine Tai announced that the government of India has agreed to allow imports of U.S. pork and pork products into India, removing a longstanding barrier to U.S. agricultural trade. This news follows the successful revitalization of the U.S.-India Trade Policy Forum held in New Delhi in November 2021, during which Ambassador Tai raised the importance of access for U.S. pork with Indian Minister of Commerce Piyush Goyal.

"This new opportunity marks the culmination of nearly two decades of work to gain market access for U.S. pork to India – and it signals positive movement in U.S.-India trade relations," said Secretary Vilsack. "We will continue working

with the Indian government to ensure that the U.S. pork industry can begin shipping its high-quality products to consumers as soon as possible."

"India's agreement to allow U.S. pork imports for the first time is great news and a significant development for U.S. producers and for Indian consumers," said Ambassador Tai. "We will continue working to strengthen the U.S.-India trade re-

lationship and I appreciate Minister Goyal's efforts to facilitate this important development."

In 2020, the United States was the world's third-largest pork producer and second-largest exporter, with global sales of pork and pork products valued at \$7.7 billion. In fiscal year 2021, the United States exported more than \$1.6 billion of agricultural products to India.



FISD releases financial audit report

Dianna Wright, FISD Business Manager, released the district's 2021 audit report this week (see left). Wright stated, "Our audit went well! It was a clean audit and there were no findings. Our fund balance (money not spent and put in savings) increased by \$2,582,423.00 and I am very proud of that. This is the most it has increased since I have been at the district."

One of the reasons the fund balance was so high is that the district had access to extra grants last year due to the Covid pandemic. These grants saved money in the local budget. One of the major items bought with the grant money was technology.

Wright continued, "On the C3, it shows in that first column (10 General Fund) at the bottom that the Change in Fund Balance is \$2,572,942 instead of the \$2,582,423. That amount in the C3 includes Local Funding and Child Nutrition which is a negative fund balance. Child Nutrition is always negative state-wide. On the positive side, all students eat free."



85th Annual Parmer County Stock Show Regulations

GENERAL REGULATIONS 1. ELIGIBILITY: The Parmer County Junior Livestock Show is open to all 4-H & FFA members under the supervision of the county agent or vocation-al agriculture teachers of the county. Exhibitors must be enrolled in grades 3 through 12 in one of the four public schools in the county or they must be a resident of Parmer County attending a home/private school in grades 3 through 12. All exhibitors must be verified in the Quality Counts Program. The youngster's Quality Counts number must be on each entry card. 2. Entry cards and fees must be returned to the exhibitor's supervisor. All en-tries are due the third Friday of December. Late fees will be double and cash only. Entry fees have been set at a rate of \$15.00/steer; \$15.00/ lamb; and \$15.00/barrow and \$15.00/goat, and \$5.00/ Rabbit, Heifer \$30.00. 3. Floor prices will not be set on any animals. All animals will be taken home by exhibitors after the show. 4. Weigh-in will be as follows: Sheep, and Goats will classified and weighed in from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m. Tuesday. Barrows will be classified as weighed from 2:00-6:30 p.m. Wednesday. Re-weighs: any animal that does not weigh within the required weight ranges at its first weigh-in will be allowed one re-weigh. The re-weigh must occur during the scheduled weigh-in time. Beef check in on Tuesday turn in Steer weights. 5. Validation tags will be used for ear tags in each species. Tags of other shows will not be allowed. 6. Pens will be assigned by community. 7. Exhibitors may show four animals per specie (4 goats, 4lambs, 4 steers, 4 barrows) however, exhibitors may only enter seven total. 8. All animals entered in show will have been owned by exhibitor and fed under the supervision of the county agent or vocational agriculture teacher as follows: Rabbits no ownership deadline, Goats and lambs by November 1, 2021, barrows by December 1, 2021; and steers by July 1, 2021. Steers, Lambs, Goats, and Barrows must be validated under the Texas Validation system by the appropriate date. All animals must be continuously owned for the designated period immediately prior to the show. Animals must not have been sold through a premium sale during the ownership period. 9. Each exhibitor may only sell two animals in the premium auction. If an exhibitor places more than two animals high enough to qualify for the premium auction, the premium sale animals will be designated as follows: an exhibitor's highest placing animals will be sold. Should an exhibitor have more than two animals qualify for the sale and be the same placing, then the heavier weight animals will sell. (EXAMPLE: 1st place steer, 3rd place barrow, and 3rd place lamb. The steer and the barrow would sell. The steer was the highest placing animal, and the barrow weighed more than the lamb of equal placing.) 10. If an animal that has placed high enough to qualify for the premium sale is dropped because an exhibitor has two other animals in the sale, the next lower placing animals in the class will move up into that sale

position. 11. SHOWMAN-

SHIP: Steer, Barrow, Lamb

& Goat shows will have two age divisions, Junior 8-13 and Senior 14 and up. Each species judge will select showmanship winners within their division. Showmanship classes will be held upon the completion of judging each species and will be open to all exhibitors of that species, within each age division. Showmanship selection will be based on the exhibitor efforts within the classes as well as during showmanship competition class. (All ages will be as of January 1, 2022) 12. All animals must remain on the show grounds from weigh-in until released by the superintendent. 13. Any exhibitor found in violation of rules set forth in this booklet is subject to a review before the stock show appeals committee and possible dismissal of the exhibitor from all show activities. 14. PROTESTS: Any protest must be in writing accompanied by \$250.00 cash deposit and a written statement to the general superintendent of show. Appeals committee will air this pro-test and if valid refund the money; if invalid, the money will be placed in the general fund. Their decision will be final. 15. The appeals committee shall consist of one member from the stock show committee from each community and 4-H (5 in all). A majority (3) shall represent a quorum. 16. Substitute showman: If the animal's owner has one of the following situations, a substitute showman is permitted; if a conflict with other school related activities, physical injury or illness, family emergency, more than one animal in the same class. 17. The state mandated "no pass, no play" rules will apply. If an exhibitor is not scholastically eligible by U.I.L. rules, then the exhibitor and his/ her animals are not eligible to compete in this show.

Lambs 1. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendent's discretion. Classes will be as follows: A. Fine wool-this class will include only purebred or grade Rambouillet or Delaine or a cross between the two breeds. B. Fine Wool Crossbreed-this class will include lambs sired by a Suffolk, Hampshire, Corriedale or Columbia ram and out of fine wool ewe. Lambs that carry more than 50 percent medium wool breeding will go into a medium wool class. C. Medium Wool-this class will include only purebred or grade medium wool or crosses of predominate medium wool breeding. D. Southdownsthis class will include only purebred or grade Southdown's. E. **Dorper**-this class will include only purebred or grade Dorper's. F. **Decisions**-as to how sheep will be classified will be left to the classifier of the show 2. There will be a Champion and Reserve of each of the above classes. The Grand Champion and Reserve champion will be named. 3. All lambs must be validated under the Texas Validation Program to be eligible for the show. 4. Lambs must weigh 80 pounds to show. 5. Lambs must have been shorn within 21 days of the show. Boots and foretops may be left on lambs. 6. Ewe lambs may be shown. 7. Ownership deadline is November 1, 2021. 8. General show rules apply. Entry fee-\$15.00/head. 9. Scrapies tags will be allowed to

remain in Lambs ear.

Market Goats 1. Only wether or doe goats are eligible to show. 2. The show is open to any breed or crossbred. Ownership deadline will be November 1, 2021. 3. Horns must be tipped. 4. Goats may be shown with hair or may be slick shorn. 5. Goats must weigh between a minimum of 60lbs and a maximum of 115lbs. A three pound tolerance will be allowed. 6. Exhibitors will be allowed to use halters or collars in the show ring. 7. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendents discretion. 8. General show rules apply. Entry fee-\$15.00/head.

Steers 1. Breeds will be as follows: - British - American - Crossbreds 2. Class sizes will be determined at the discresuperintendent's tion. 3. Steers must weigh 900 pound to show. 4. All Steers must be validated under the Texas Validation Program to be eligible for the show. 5. Ownership deadline is July 1, 2021. 6. Any steer deemed wild or unruly will be barred from the show. 7. The first place steers in each breed will compete for Breed Champion. The second place steer to the Breed champion may compete for Reserve Breed Champion. The three Breed Champions will com-pete for Grand Champion. The Reserve Breed Champion behind the Grand Champion may compete for Reserve Grand Champion. 8. Grooming: A. No change of the major color pattern of the animals by painting or dying, will be allowed. B. Any grooming material that allows color to come off form any animals will not be allowed at show. Number of Entries: Each exhibitor will be permitted to show as many as four(4) heifers in the dairy show, but no more than two(2) heifers in any one (1) single class, with the exception of the Championship classes. 4. **Dress**: Each person holding or exhibiting an animal in the ring should be dressed in white, preferably in white trousers and white shirt. Clothing my not have any insig-nia other than 4-H or FFA emblems. 5. Ownership/Validation/ Reg**istration**: Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor and must have been owned by the exhibitor on or before November1, 2021, as evidence by date of transfer, record date, or received date by the breed asso-ciation. Registration copies must be submitted to the Parmer County Extension AgriLife office on or by November 1,2021. For grade heifers, ownership papers including RFID tag number, birth date, exhibitor name, and dairy of origin must be submitted to Parmer County Extension AgriLife office by November 1st 2021 and must be presented to Superintendent of dairy show at check in no later than 3:30 on day of arrival. 6. Classification: Heifers will not be divided by breed. They will be divided into clas-ses by date of

birth. Classes will be deter-

mined after all heifers have been checked in. 7. Classes: Classes will be shown in the Following order: 1. Heifers, born September1-October 15, 2021, 2. Heifers, born June - August 2021, 3. 

Beef Heifers 1. This show will be a jackpot show and these animals are not eligible for he premium sale.

2. Ownership and Registration: Animals must be owned by the exhibitor and registered in the records of the respective

breed association (in the name of the exhibitor) on or before November 1st. Permanent Iden-tification (i.e. brand or tattoo) must be present and must match the reg-istration paper of the animal. 3. Partnerships. Original registration papers must be solely in the name of the exhibitor. Partnerships of any form will not be allowed. 4. Age: Heifers may not be over 24 months of age on the day of the Par-mer County Jr. Heifer Show. 5. Validation: All junior breeding beef heifers (including potential substi-tute heifers) Must be validated through the Texas 4-H and FFA Breeding Heifer Validation Program. Heifer validation will include online registration paper submittal and physical validation with DNA Hair sampling for all entered and potential substitute heifers. 6. ID Verification: The tattoo or brand will be checked on heifers during check-in and must match the permanent ID that appears on the original registration paper. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure the brand tattoo is legible prior to arrival of the show. Exhibitor's will be dis-qualified if their heifer does not have a matching tattoo or brand, or if the tattoo or brand is illegible. 7. Classification: Heifers will not be divided by breed. They will be di-vided into classes by date of birth. Classes will be determined after all heifers have been checked in. 8. Grooming: Heifer grooming guidelines will be the same as the Steer Show. 9. General show rules apply. Entry fee-\$30.00/ head.








The new "East" Allsup's store should be open for business within the next couple of weeks. The old building will be torn down to make room for additional parking.









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
